As partners in the enterprise he had slaves who had escaped to the Union and become Union soldiers during the Civil war. I believe Schafer said the venture failed.

Noting the similarity of the name, I wrote to Dr. Karl Hanson of Jacksonville (a personal friend) to inquire if this man was a relative. Karl says not; his only doctor relative having been his father, Henry Hanson, who was connected with the Florida State Board of Health for many years.

Dr. William Hanson, a graduate of Edinburgh, who had been in Mexico when Emperor Maximilian was overthrown, came to Key West in the 1880's. His son, W. Stanley Jr., was born there. He moved to Fort Myers, taking with him Mango seeds which he distributed among his neighbors. He organized English syndicates for buying immense tracts of land and promoted a coconut plantation on the Caloosahatchee River. The plantation was destroyed by the freeze of 1886. He developed a tobacco farm; and he engaged in phosphate dredging in the Caloosahatchee River. He took care of ailing Seminoles who came to town for treatment.

I have seen much of Dr. Harrison, and have found him, while entirely unassuming, a man of strong character, clear head, sound judgement, and possessed of the courage of his convictions. The diary has very little mention of disease and treatment.

A native of Suffolk County, New York, went to pensacola the latter part of 1826 as physician to the Naval Hospital. Claims quite a record for the cure of yellow fever. Except for a few short intervals of absence from his post, Dr. Hulse spent the remainder of his life in pensacola, dying there Aug. 29, 1856, at the age of 59.

He wrote several articles for the medical literature: Yellow Fever, Maryland Medical and Surgical Journal, October 1842.

Yellow Fever, Baltimore Medical and Surgical Journal, 1843.

He also mentions a thesis which he wrote in 1823 concerning his theories on yellow fever which apparently were repeated in the article of 1843. Cash gives quotes from letters he wrote in the above reference.

In Nott, J.C.: Yellow fever, etc, N. Orleans Med. & Surg. J. 4: 563-601, p. 591, paragraph 4, is mention of Dr. Hulse and the statement that he had informed Nott in 1841 that he had been in Pensacola 18 years and had not seen a case of Scarlet Fever. This suggests that Hulse came to Pensacola in 1823.
