

I have seen much of Dr. Harrison, and have found him, while entirely unassuming, a man of strong character, clear head, sound judgement, and possessed of the courage of his convictions. He has had very intimate acquaintance with yellow fever at Charlestor Cedar Keys, Jacksonville and Fernandina. Since quitting practice he had deovted himself to hunting and fishing, coming into town only semi-occasionally. The negroes of the settlement near him, called Harrison's, are many of them his former slaves and their descendents. They and many others of their race in and around Fernandina go to him with their ailments. He says he tells them as well as he can what the matter with them is, what to do, and when they are serious ill goes to see them. As he is admirable situated and equipped for froming intelligent independent opinions in medical matters, I have found his acquaintance not only pleasar but very profitable."

She may have also practiced some in Volusia Cty after the War - her husband first tried to establish a colony of freed slaves and when that venture failed he organized The Florida Land and Lumbar Company, a for profit venture, which founded Hawks Florida - now, I believe, known as Edgewater Florida. The diary has very little mention of disease and treatment.

A native of Suffolk County, New York, went to pensacola the latter part of 1826 as physician to the Naval Hospital. Claims quite a record for the cure of yellow fever. Except for a few short intervals of absence from his post, Dr. Hulse spent the remainder of his life in pensacola, dying there Aug. 29, 1856, at the age of 59. He wrote several articles for the medical literature: Yellow Fever, Maryland Medical and Surgical Journal, October 1842.

Yellow Fever, Baltimore Medical and Surgical Journal, 1843.

He also mentions a thesis which he wrote in 1823 concerning his theories on yellow fever which apparently were repeated in the article of 1843. Cash gives quotes from letters he wrote in the above reference.

In Nott, J.C.: Yellow fever, etc, N. Orleans Med. & Surg. J. 4: 563-601, p. 591, paragraph 4, is mention of Dr. Hulse and the statement that he had informed Nott in 1841 that he had been in Pensacola 18 years and had not seen a case of Scarlet Fever. This suggests that Hulse came tp Pensacola in 1823.
