Recounts the marriage of Dr. Robert Jackson, of the hospital staff at Ft. Brooke, to Nancy Collar, September, 1836. They were given a freshly cleaned and whitewashed room in the hospital to live in. About 1838 Dr. Jackson was released from the Army at his own request and built a house on the bayfront near the mouth of Spanishtown Creek. This was destroyed in the hurricane of Sept. 1848. Later they rebuilt on Platt Street and the home was still standing at 205 Platt Street when McKay wrote his article. They had 5 children.

Drs. P.E. & C.W. Johnson (father and son) are practising homoeopaths, their office being advantageously located in the second story of the handsome and imposing Astor Block. Dr. P.E. Johnson was born in New York in the year 1826. He received an academic education at Knox College, Illinois, from which he graduated in the class of '47. Subsequently he graduated from the Western College of Homoeopathy, Cleveland, O., in the class of '52, and from the Hahnemann Homoeopathic College of Philadelphia in the class of '55. For several years he practised medicine at Alton, Ill. Later he abandoned the profession for a period, and during the war was engaged in cotton speculation in Louisiana and Mississippi. At the close of the war he resumed the practice of his profession in Alton, Ill., where he remained until 1872, when here moved to Jacksonville and located as stated in the above heading. Dr. C.W. Johnson was born in the State of Illinois in the year 1856. He was educated at Knox College of that State, graduating therefrom in the class of '78. He subsequently entered the Cleveland

Homoeopathic Hospital College at Cleveland, from which he obtained the degree of M.D. with the graduating class of '81. He began practising in this city in company with his father in the same year, in which connection he has since remained.

Wife's name, Julia. Home at the S.W. Corner of Eaton and Duval Streets purchased in 1853; possibly came from St. Augustine; employed in the summer of 1855 as physician at Fort Taylor (Tequesta, 1954). "With summer approaching, concern over the possibility of yellow fever manifested itself among the workers. As a measure of reassurance the War Department authorized the employment of a local physician, Dr. S. F. Jones, at a monthly salary of \$150. His position could not be considered a sinecure since, in addition to his professional solaces, he was required to perform general clerical duties."

Mentions that Dr. F.S. Jones will vaccinate anyone at the council chambers free of charge. Perhaps this is the same man who appears on the card under Jones, S.F. and there has merely been a transposition of initials.

In the Herald and Southern Democrat, Vol. 7, no. 8, July 30, 1841, is a note that Dr. S.F. Jones was appointed Port Physician. (again copied verbatim from Wiles' notes in the St. Aug. Hist. Soc. Lib.)

Wm. J. L'Engle mentions a Dr. Jones reporting seven recoveries after the yellow fever with black vomit. See: L'Engle: Letters of Wm J. L'Engle, etc, letter of Nov. 10, 1854.

Also in the same reference, letter of Feb. 29, 1855:

"... Dr. Jones was attending one of Mr. S's (? F for Filor) negroes, who he represented x to be quite sick, and according to the negroes statement 'was getting no better fast' - and I was called and prscribed # 39, and bread and water diet, which brought the chap to his senses immediately, and he reported himself ready for duty in less than 24 hours after; my prescript ion was not administered however, but the earnestness with which I recommended it, effected a speedy cure and Mr. Filor was convinced that Dr. Jones either knew nothing about the case, or was physicing his negro when there was no necessity for it, for the sake of a fee - I think myself, in this instance, he was 'more than x fool', so in that way the old doctor has lost the only family in town among our upper tens, that continued to employ him after I began to practice in town."
