"Dr. James Kelly (of Charleston who was appointed by the Florida Association to be physician at Alachua after Dr. Samuel R. Ayers left) apparently did not agree to serve as physician for the Florida Association, nor did he find much of a settlement in Alachua. Some years later, he testified that he landed in St. Augustine on November 1822, and stayed there three months before going to Paladka (Palatka). Later he traveled West on the road 'cut by Mr. Hayne for the New York Company' as far as Levy's Plantation, where the road ended. He stayed seven or eight months and frequently visited Wanton's dwelling nearby. He further testified that there were no other white people in the vicinity."

In a medical news item on the above page under the title, "Pensacola Now Has Third Class Station," is the following complete quote:

"The many friends of Dr. S.R. Mallory Kennedy, now of Pensacola, Florida, and of his father, Dr. T.S. Kennedy, of New Orleans, will no doubt be pleased at the promotion of X young Dr. Kennedy to the position of Acting Assistant Surgeon in charge of the third class station of the Marine Hospital Service. Dr. Kennedy, who has also the distinction of being nephew of Senator Mallory, was recently further distinguished by being elected the vice-president of the Florida State Medical Association."

Also listed in the same journal, Vol. 65, p. 59, July 1912, as a donor to the Chaille Memorial Fund. Here it is noted that he was of the class of 1905 at Tulane University Medical Department, and that he resided in Pensacola at that time.

Kennedy, Thomas S., M.D.

This doctor came to Florida and settled at Ft. Lauderdale on Oct. 2, 1899. He is one of the founder members of the Dade County Medical Association. He lived at Ft. Lauderdale until his death, the date of which I don't have at the time I'm typing this card. His autobiography is very colorful and at times, I suspect, a little embellished.

In fn #34, Part II, p. 48, it is noted that Kennedy "was educated in medicine at the University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn." and enrolled there in 1900 at the age of 38. According to The Miami Metropolis, Jan. 10, 1902, he returned to Ft. Lauderdale with his bride, Mary Dent of Mars, Georgia soon after his

his attendance at medical school (suggests 2 yrs. of school).  
In the Metropolis, Sept. 4, 1904, he is noted as having returned  
to Ft. Lauderdale after some post graduate work in New York.

In fn 72, p. 48, Part II, it is noted that on the 1910 census  
Thomas S. Kennedy is listed as 50 years old, married to Mollie,  
age 43 and having a son, William age 7, and a son, John age 4.

On p. 43 of Part II, he describes being rear-ended by a "heavy  
Hudson car travelling 60 miles per hour" and "it broke me all  
to pieces, very near." He was brought to the Miami City  
Hospital (this occurred on Jan. 14, 1922). He came out of that  
with a lift in his show and a cane by says" I am now nearly  
~~xxxxxx~~ 76 yrs. old (1936) and still going strong."

Kenworthy, Dr. Charles J.:

Dr. Charles J. Kenworthy was born in Philadelphia, Pa., in the year 1824, and graduated from the Pennsylvania Medical College in 1846. In 1849-50 he was connected with Bellevue hospital in New York city, and the Charity hospital on Blackwell's Island, holding the offices of house physician in the former, and house surgeon in the latter institution. For nine years subsequently he was in Australia, where he held the position of senior surgeon in the Ballarat hospital and physician of the Ballarat almshouse. Dr. Kenworthy came to this city in the year 1875, where he has since practised his profession. His residence is at the corner of Duval and Market streets, and is one of the finest in the city

County commissioner, Duval County, and in charge of  
Duval County Hospital and Asylum (later Duval  
Medical center) 1877.

Waring, J.I.: Hist. of Med. in S.C.

On pages 38-43 are details about this man who was born in County Carlow, Ireland, about 1700 and came to Carolina in 1718. He was a doctor for the poor of St. Phillips' parish in Charleston and took part in an expedition to St. Augustine against the Spaniards (the date is not stated). Following the death of his son from smallpox in 1738, he became greatly interested in smallpox inoculation and later became famous as an inoculator when he returned to England in 1741. He was the author of "An Essay on Inoculation" that was published in London in 1743, and a monograph entitled "The Analysis of Inoculation" which went through many editions. Dr. Waring does not give a biography of this man in his biographical section.

Kilmer, Washington, M.D.

Mentioned as going from Orlando to Tampa to help in the yellow fever epidemic of 1887 (October), when five of the local physicians were sick. He was stricken and later died of the disease. (Barker: Seasons of Pestilence, p. 80; she refers to the Times-Union, Nov. 3 and Nov. 11, 1887, both on page 1)

On the above page is quoted a report from Assistant Surgeon B. King dealing with the conditions at the hospital at St. Marks and specifically mentioning flooding of the hospital on Sept. 16, 1821. It doesn't clearly state that King was at St. Marks but the implication is that he was.

In a list of letters received Ellis Hughs, Asst. Surg. At Ft. Lauderdale, 1839-1840, mentions a Quart. Rept. July, 25, from "Dr. Benj. King S. n." Ellis Hughs Journals, p. 301

Dr. Albion W. Knight was born in the State of Maine in the year 1822. He was educated at Bowdoin College, from which he graduated with an A.B. in the class of '41. He subsequently graduated from the State Medical College at Bowdoin with the degree of M.D. in the year 1848. Dr. Knight began the practice of medicine at the White Sulphur Springs, Hamilton County, Fla., in 1849. He remained at this point until 1872, and then came to Jacksonville, where he has since been located. Dr. Knight is secretary of the Duval County and State Medical Societies, also of the City Board of Health, and has held the position of health officer for over eight years. He is also a practising physician, his office being located at No. 75 West Bay Street.

The story of this short-lived Florida university is found in 'some historical notes concerning Florida State College for Women' by Dr. Venila L. Shores, published in the Tallahassee Historical Society Annual for 1937."
