After the Civil War, in which he served from April 1861 till late 1864, he returned to Suwannee Co. and represented the county in the Florida House of Representatives in sessions of 1865 and 1866."**

He did become surgeon general - see his book: Statistical Report on the Sickness and Mortality in the Army of the United States, 1840, for much detail on disease in Florida between 1819 and 1839.

See card in the chronological file dated Feb. 3, 1839:

Lieut.-Col. (Thomas) Lawson shared the command of the Louisiana Volunteers which were part of Gen. Gaines force that moved from New Orleans to Ft. Brooke on Feb. 3rd and put into the field from Ft. Brooke on Feb. 13, 1839. Thus he functioned as a line officer as well as a medical officer.

Under an article entitled "Dr. Lawton Invests" mention is made of a Dr. Harry Lawton of Cleveland, Ohio, who had been coming to Miami as a regular visitor for several seasons and now had bought "...land next to Commodore Roome's place near the fort, and have put out a 250 foot wharf, built a handsome pagoda and have a grove of over 150 trees." He goes on to state, "I have named my place Lawton Cliff. I shall build no sanitariums, but have my patients stop at the royal palm and visit them there." It does not state whether he was an M.D. or an osteopath.

Powell's expedition which left Key West on Oct. 13, 1836, to proceed to Cape Florida and New River "to capture two hundred Seminoles in a night attack." Note #127 on p. 135 attributes the above to the Logbook of Vandalia. It also notes Army & Navy Chronicles, 10 Nov., 1836 (301) and 11 May, 1837 (298): "Dr. E.T. Leitner is said to have been killed and scalped by the Indians."

Motte: Journey into Wilderness, Leitner with them at the Haulover, Jupiter Inlet, Christmas, 1837 - he was travelling with Lt. L.M. Powell of the Navy. (p. 168)

pp. 182-185: gives much detail about Leitner who apparently "fellow student, having pursued our professional studies together in the same office in Charleston, under the auspices of Dr. J.E. Holbrook." Motte discusses his personality and death at length.

It has a fine corner entrance surmounted by an ornamental glass transom, and an imposing front ornamented with massive glass show windows. The interior is appropriately fitted up and most conveniently arranged. The stock comprises a full line of choice drugs and patent medicines, together with a large assortment of toilet and fancy articles, notions, etc. An ample force of assistants is employed and the annual business is proportionately large. Dr. L'Engle is a native of Duval County, Florida, and was educated in his profession at Charleston, S.C. In addition to the above business he is proprietor of a large coal and wood yard at the foot of Washington Street, and is also the owner of the steamers "Seth Low," "R.L. Maybee," and "Oyster Bay," engaged in towing vessels to and from this city. During the war Dr. L'Engle served as a

medical officer in the Confederate army.

Altho I did not read the proceedings minutely, there seems no information about L'Engle except that he was at Fort Moultrie, S.C. in the fall of 1858 and cared for patients during a yellow fever epidemic there. See: Proc. of Court Martial for the Trial of Surgeon B.M. Byrne.

He apparently was a very active contributor to the medical literature, chiefly in the field of orthopedics and obstetrics. He is listed as "a representative from Florida on the Executive Committee of the Centennial Medical Commission." There is no indication that he practiced medicine in Florida.

His absence from this post in 1882 caused some speculation that the yellow fever epidemic might have been prevented if the quarantine efforts had been subject to his skillful direction."

This business failed and at least for a time I gather he practiced medicine in Florida. He left a handwritten manuscript - his autobiography - possibly in 2 volumes. His great grandson, J.D. Lindner has Vol. 1 which he has transcribed (covers 1819 - 1860). Vol. 2 has not been found.

The summer of 1765 brought a physician of extraordinary ability to British West Florida. Dr. John Lorimer, who accompanied the 21st Regiment when it relieved the 22nd at Mobile. Dr. Lorimer's commission was 'dated the 14th day of March 1765,' and it reads in part, 'George III by the grace of God, King...to our trusty and well-beloved John Lorimer, surgeon, greetings. We do by these present constitute and appoint you to be surgeon to the hospitals for the service of our forces at Pensacola, etc., in our Province of West Florida in America...' Lorimer was the first qualified physician in the area to supply a study of health conditions and endemic diseases. Some of this is quoted in the above reference. Lorimer is mentioned as having been visited by Bernard Romans and William Bartram in their respective books. Lorimer's name is listed at

the surrender of Ft. George<sup>1781</sup> of Pensacola as one of the  
hospital staff. He is mentioned as, "John Lorimer,  
Esq., surgeon." Nothing is known of him after this time,

1781.

Dr. Lorimer also made astronomical observation which are referred to by Bernard Roman<sup>s</sup> and in 1776 was appointed king's botanist at a stipend of 50 pounds per year.

In a footnote on page 551 of the above reference, it notes that Lorimer was appointed Justice of the Peace on March 5, 1769 and was elected a member of the First Assembly of west Florida, meeting in November 1776, and served as Speaker Pro-temp in April 1767 - further references are given.

On page 556 of the above reference mention is made that probably Dr. Lorimer went to New York after the surrender at Ft. George.

It goes on to give some details.

This may be the same man as H.G. Lungren - see card under that name.

"March 31 (1863) - A group of Confederate medical officers, including Dr. H.Y.G. Lungoon of Florida, has dispatched to the Confederate Secretary of War a protest directed to the Federal government for the manner in which captured Confederate medical officers are being treated. Surgeons and their assistants who remained behind to treat the wounded captured at Perryville, Murfreesboro and Ft. Donelson were arrested and confined to penitentiaries. As they were being transported from Nashville to Cincinnati, they were marched through the public streets where they were subjected to the hootings and jeerings of the crowd. In some cases their surgical instruments, private baggage, ~~and~~ money and even their gloves were taken away."
