He did apparently practice obstetrics for in a note on deciding the sex of the unborn child he mentions experience at the Boston Lying-in Hospital.

The office of Dr. Mallett is in the popular Oxford Building, at the junction of Laura and Duval streets. He is a member of the Duval County Medical Association.

The house was converted into a small hospital opening as such on October 6, 1908. By 1911 it was too small so an adjacent domicile was purchased and connected by a cross way. At this time there were thirty beds available, two of which beds were supported by Monroe County for charity patients. Maloney died of a coronary thrombosis about World War I. He eventually became one of the leading local surgeons of Key West in the early 1900s.

He served as Chairman of the Deacons for a number of years and served Oviedo, Christmas, Geneva and Chuluota as physician for those twenty five years. His wife Pearl, served for many years as president of the Woman's Missionary Union and superintendent of the Primary Department of the Sunday School. In the earlier years when the river between Chuluota and Oviedo was up, Dr. Martin would go to the river and be ferried across by boat and taken on to make his calls in that area."

Master Alonzo was from the town of Moguer, also the home of the 20th century poet, Raymon Jiminez, who in 1956 was recipient of the Nobel Prize. Alonzo is described as fisico (physician) which would imply some formal medical courses at a university, but he may have been only in attendance on lectures for a short period and no degree conferred. He was assigned as surgeon of the Nina. He remained at the Spanish Colony, La N~~e~~avidad near Cape Hatien, and was murdered by the natives as Columbus learned on his return during his second voyage.

Master Diego, surgeon assigned to the Pinta, was probably a friend or protege of the Pinta's Captain, Alonzo Pinzon. He apparently returned to Spain with Columbus and Roddis gives no further information about him. Master Diego is given no title in the list except that of Master and is probably a barber surgeon.

Surgeon with Columbus

Roddis: The First European Medical Men in the New World

Master Sanchez, surgeon of the Santa Maria, was associated with the Harana family of Cordova, long friends of Columbus. Diego de Harana was the Marshall of the Fleet. His cousin was the mother of the younger son of Columbus. Sanchez remained in the Colony named La Navidad, near Cape Haitien when Columbus returned to Spain. He was massacred by the natives, as Columbus learned on his second voyage. He is referred to in the list of the ship's company as Cirujano (surgeon) which would indicate that he was not a barber surgeon but a member of the regular guild of surgeons. Roddis thinks he was a man of considerable professional standing.

Born in Monticello, April 25, 1825; married Mary Ann Cooper, Oct. 28, 1848; lived a while in Madison, Fla. then moved to Micanopy; with his father-in-law, Dr. James A. Cooper, he opened a drug store in 1853 known in later years as the "Old Reliable Micanopy Drug Store." Studied at Augusta Medical College the winter term of 1857-58 obtaining a degree of Doctor of Pharmacy in March 1858. Thereafter practiced medicine in Micanopy. Enlisted in Co. F, Fourth Fla. Regiment, June 1861; served until honorably discharged on April 17, 1865. Resumed practice in Micanopy, but around 1900 moved to Tampa and opened the Nebraska Pharmacy there. Health failed and he returned to Micanopy ten days before his death, April 14, 1914. The above mentioned letters cover ~~xxxxx~~ Sept. 12, 1861 to Feb. 27, 1862 when he was stationed at Cedar Key and Fernandina. Only a little of medical interest - this abstracted in the master file.

Associated with Dr. Merridith Mallory, Dr. Oscar Freeman and Dr. Dean Steward. Served in the U. S. Army during World War II being separted as a Lt. Col. Was first president of the Florida Diabetic Association which was founded in 1951. He and his wife Parky had one daughter, Susan (Mrs. William Slemons III, who lives in New Orleans).

Although he is not listed as a doctor in the Confederate Service, I believe this is the Dr. Maxwell about which I have other records.

Began service in the Army of the Confederacy as Lt. Col. in the 1st Florida Cavalry - see notice of this unit in training at Camp Mary David, 6 miles out of Tallahassee, and "is being mustered into Confederate service." (July 1, 1861): Fla. 100 Years Ago, July, 1961, p. 1.

"G. Troup Maxwell has announced himself as a candidate for the Confederate Congress from the Second Florida Congressional district. Elections will be held in October." Fla. 100 Years Ago, June 1963, p. 3. (under dated June 15, 1863)

Trupe Maxwell we found listed in Ocala, and Palmer notes that an old resident of Tallahassee thought Dr. Trupe Maxwell went into the Confederate Army when the Civil War broke out, and on his return to Florida settled at Gainesville where he died.

According to a letter on Yellow Fever published in the Charleston Medical J. and Review 2:145-150, 1874 (see manuscript file, "Yellow Fever," for photocopy) Maxwell was living in Tallahassee in 1853 and volunteered to go 20 miles to help with the yellow fever epidemic at Newport that year. IN 1857, he was in charge of the Marine Hospital at Key West and had an extensive private practice in Key West. By 1860, he was back in practice at Tallahassee. This letter dated Nov. 4, 1873, is apparently written from New Castle, Delaware. Also in this letter is mentioned a nephew, Dr. Jackson Maxwell, who apparently was a part of his household at Key West and caught yellow fever during the epidemic there in 1857.

Maxwell volunteered and served during the Y.F. epidemic at Tampa, mid-Sept. to Mid-Dec. 1887. (see Wall: Y.F. at Tampa, Plant City, etc. in manuscript file, Y.F.)

Swann concerning information about Reid, dated "Jacksonville, Fla. June 29th, 1894, and signed "Geo. Troup Maxwell."

He began the practice of medicine at St. Stephens, N.B., where he practised two years. In 1852 he came to Jacksonville and practised until 1862, when he entered the Union army in charge of the general hospital at Beaufort, S.C., till the fall of that year, when he was made surgeon of the Eighth Maine Volunteers, in which capacity he served till the spring of 1863. He was made surgeon of the 31st Maine in 1864. The 31st was the finest regiment from that State. Every man was six feet or more tall. At the close of the war in 1865 he resumed his practice in this city. Dr. Mitchell is a member of the consulting staff of St. Luke's Hospital and also the acting marine surgeon of the marine hospital in this city. Dr. Neal Mitchell was born in Jacksonville in the year 1855. He received a preliminary education at Lapham

Institute, North Scituate, R.I., and subsequently entered Amherst College, from which he graduated in the class of 1877. After leaving Amherst, he entered the Long Island Medical College, graduating therefrom in the class of 1880. He was also for a time at Bellevue in New York. In the latter part of 1880 he returned to Jacksonville and began practising with his father above-mentioned, with whom he has since been associated. Dr. Mitchell is president of the Board of Health for Jacksonville and Duval County, and also a member of the consulting staff of St. Luke's Hospital. Their office is located in the family residence at Forsyth corner of Julia Street. He purchased "Beauchamp" in 1875, where he has since resided during the winter, his summers being spent professionally at Louisville, Ky. Dr. Muguet has recently undertaken at Beauchamp the culture of silk-worms, in which enterprise he seems quite successful.
