Manuscript compiled by Mrs. Thomas Osgood Otto and filed in the manuscript file under "O", for Otto.

Born in Koenigsberg, Germany; educated at Bonn Univ.; left Germany during student revolt and went to England. Met a young English girl, Maria Bolton (or Belton) who was impaled on a picket fence. He helped her down, became a friend of the family and after coming to America, sent for her to come to marry him. Otto joined the U.S. Army as a medical aide in the Indian wars at Philadelphia. Fought in Florida and given a tract of land in West Florida by the government. ? Was in the Confederate during the Civil War. *← probably not* Became a contract surgeon to the U.S. Army stationed in Key West. Had four sons and two daughters. One son,

Otto, Josef, Dr.

Josef, graduated from the University of Pennsylvania Medical School and was a member of the Staff of Professor William Osler (his picture appears in a book on the life of Sir William Osler) but he never practiced in Florida. He died of Tuberculosis in Tuscon, Ariz. Another son, Osgood Otto Sr., was the father of Thomas Osgood Otto who practiced in Miami. ^{Osgood} Thomas Otto Sr. was a pharmacist and owned two drug stores in Key West. His other children are: Mizpah Otto de Boe, Josef Otto (a lawyer and judge) and Robert Eugene Otto (an artist).
