The case is reported by Surgeon S.M. Palmer, P.A.C.S."

Note: altho the initials are given as "S.M." I am reasonably certain this was a printer's error. The case is indexed under "T.M. Palmer" and there is no other mention of an "S.M. Palmer" in the indexes of all the volumes.

"Private James B. Fant, Co. B. 17th Mississippi Regiment, was on May 9th, 1864, admitted to the Howard Grove Hospital, Richmond, Virgiani, with a lacerate wound of the scalp in the left temporal region, caused by grape shot. On July 8th, erysiplas attacked the wound, and death resulted on July 29th, 1864. Surgeon T. M. Palmer, C.S.A. records the case."

In this letter Marth Reid thanks Yonge for a donation of \$ 40 from four people and for \$ 457 which Yonge himself had donated. She mentions "a lot of very badly wounded men from the Brintow Station fight" including: "William Barkes - who is among the desperately wounded. The leg was amputated by Dr. Palmer a few days ago - after giving every chance of saving it if possible. It has been almost a hopeless case from the first but he seemed better yesterday and I trust through God's Mercy his life will be spared. Assure his parents if you know them, that everything will be done for him that the skill of surgeons and the kindness of nurses can accomplish."

T.M. Palmer home on furlough - health shattered

Aug. 9, 1862

"August 9 - The Family Friend of Monticello reports the arrival there of Dr. T.M. Palmer, surgeon for the 2nd Florida Hospital in Richmond. The paper says that 'the Dr.'s health is very much shattered.' It is expected, however, that a few weeks' rest will recuperate him sufficiently to permit him to return to his organization. This, it is said, 'is his intention.'"

Thomas Palmer, surgeon, with the 2nd Fla. Infantry assembled near the old Brick Church in West Jacksonville, in the section known as LaVilla - "is being mustered into Confederate service." (July 13, 1861) Thomas W. Hendry was also a surgeon with that unit at the time. See: Fla. 100 Years Ago, July, 1961, p. 1.

"Dr Palmer served in the Constitutional Convention of 1861  
which passed the Ordinance of Secession. It met four times -  
January 3, January 21, February 26, March 1, April 18, and  
April 27, 1861. It also met January 14 and January 27, 1862.  
He was one of the signers of the Ordinance of Secession.  
He was never a member of the Legislature."

Palmer, the author of the above reference, and died in 1896, after many years of practice in Monticello.

Mrs. Ziemba intends to write an article about him, in the not too distant future.

In 1929 while hunting he accidentally shot his arm off. He was replaced for some weeks by Drs. John Dees and Andrew (Sadie) Hinton who came out from Miami and then finally by Dr. M. Sewell Pender who had just finished his training at the James M. Jackson Memorial Hospital.

Dr. George Morton Payne arrived at Micanopy in 1835 to begin his practice of medicine. He practiced there throughout the Seminole Indian War, sometimes with the help of the <sup>Army</sup> surgeons. He was among the first of the Central portion of the State to recognize the advantages of raising sweet oranges and importing and importing selected seeds from China which he distributed throughout the County, thus forwarding the citrus industry. He was the father of George Booker Payne.

Although the above information is repeated in Barrow's: Early History of Medicine in Alachua County, it is probably incorrect. See letter from Ashby Hammond, June 1982, in the file "Alachua County Medicine." G.M. Payne was listed as an attorney in the 1850 census list. His son was John M. Payne and he became a physician. George B. Payne was likely a first cousin of George Morton Payne.

Dr. Perrine published his experience in the Philadelphia Medical Journal, about the year 1826. If we are not mistaken, Dr. Fearn, of Huntsville, Ala., gave his first large doses of quinine in 1829 or 30. From a recent conversation with Dr. James Metcalf, who resides in the vicinity of Natchez, and is one of the oldest living practitioners of that region, we have learned that about the year 1820, he had adopted the practice of giving large doses of quinine

in the exacerbation of fever; and with the happiest effects. Dr. M. says he taught the practice to Dr. Perrine, who lived in his neighborhood. Dr. Metcalf is now a wealthy planter of high standing, and is probably the first physician, either in America or Europe, who gave large doses of quinine in the hot stage of bilious fever, with a view to cut short the disease. This is what we have termed the abortive method, and one which we think is applicable to all the forms of malarious fever, including yellow fever..."

He apparently was ill when he came to Florida because of an anemia, but felt dedicated as a physician to the point that he literally worked himself to death, dying in 1907 at the age of 39. He was also the first superintendent of public instruction. This section of Nance's book was written by Ada Coats Williams and is most interestingly done. In the above account is a description of eye surgery carried out under hypnotism by Dr. Platts.

In 1871 he became interested in "physical research" and wrote "numerous essays on Mesmerism, Hypnotism, Animal Magnetism and Psycho Physical Principles involved in the manifestation of extraordinary vital forces". He came to the United States in 1883 and apparently practiced in Tampa and was alive at the time this sketch was printed (1894).
