"Amid the sanguinary scenes which so often attend the birth of a new nation; where peaceful, happy homes are daily lost, and human life balances on the slenderest thread, the death of an individual is ordinarily but little felt or regarded. In the decease, however, of <u>Dr. Robert Southgate</u>, the profession of which he was a brilliant member, has sustained a serious loss, and a large circle of admiring friends a severe affliction. "In his earlier years, Dr. Southgate was connected with the medical staff of the United States army, from which he resigned some time before the commencement of the war to engage in civil practice.

Summers was the first editor listed on the masthead of the above journal and the most prolific single contributor. He produced 6 scientific articles in the course of the journals existance (Nov. 1885 to August 1886). The other editors were Chas. H. Mallett and Neal Mitchell also of Jacksonville. Summers is given to flowery rhetoric and I suspect many of the mixe editorials are his but none of them are signed. I have found no biographical data about him and he was not a member of the FMA as late as 1893.
