Studed medicine at the University of Erlangen - also natural sciences. Came to America in June, 1777 as chief surgeon to the Ansbach troops. When he died, Sept. 10, 1800, he was President of the United Medical Colleges of Ansbach and Bayreuth. See the bibleography file for his travels in America.

Mr. Scruggs also has 175 pear-trees, all bearing, and figs, lemons, limes, grapes, etc. The grove here is claimed to be one of the finest in East Florida. There is a fine dock and private landing just in front of the house dock 500 feet in length. Mr. Scruggs was born in Jefferson County, Fla., and educated in Tennessee, where he studied medicine. He served in the Confederate army during the war, and since then has been railroading. He is now conductor on the Florida Southern Railway. There is a natural curiosity on this place, a fine boiling spring, supposed to be partly iron and magnesia, never as yet analyzed. The place is a very valuable one, and is understood to be for sale.

Abraham is also mentioned by McCall: Letters From the Frontier, p. 302: "Micanopy quietly retired; - he returned the next morning, when Thompson directed Abraham, - a negro, once a slave of Dr. Sierra of Pensacoal, but for many years past claiming to belong to Micanopy, and now his interperter, - to ask the chief what he had to say in reply to the Agent's order to prepare his people to embark at an early day at Tampa Bay."

Gifford in talking about guavas makes the following statements: "Many years ago a Captain Simmons and his wife, a physician, came to settle in South Florida. The country was sparsely inhabited and peaceful, and there was practically no sickness. The doctor told me that transportation was so difficult that her patients were dead or well by the time she got to them. There was little doing in real estate, so about the only occupation they could think of was the manufacture of Guava Jelly. For years they shipped this jelly to all parts of the world and people came from miles around to get this guava wine.

"This guava factory was located on David Fairchild's place in Coconut Grove (footnotes state the foundation of the factory still could be seen in 1944). At times there was

a big pile of seeds and refuse by the roadside and paths led to the factory through the woods from every direction. The jelly was shipped away, but the wine was for local use. I still have some jugs made in the mountains of North Carolina and shipped South to hold this guava wine. This is how many of us got our much needed vitamins..."

This lady was a physician who came to practice in Cocoanut Grove in 1892, was born in Delaware County, New York, in 1854, attended the Women's College of Pennsylvania, graduating in 1879, practiced in Elizabeth, New Jersey, married Captain Albion R. Simmons in 1891. She practiced in Cocoanut Grove, Florida, from 1892 until her death, February 2, 1909, of "tuberculosis of the brain." During a part of this time she was the only physician in the Cocoanut Grove area. The biographical sketch contains a great deal more information particularly as relates to life in the Grove at that time. It also contains information concerning the status of Women in the Medical Profession at that time.

"Amid the sanguinary scenes which so often attend the birth of a new nation; where peaceful, happy homes are daily lost, and human life balances on the slenderest thread, the death of an individual is ordinarily but little felt or regarded. In the decease, however, of Dr. Robert Southgate, the profession of which he was a brilliant member, has sustained a serious loss, and a large circle of admiring friends a severe affliction.

"In his earlier years, Dr. Southgate was connected with the medical staff of the United States army, from which he resigned some time before the commencement of the war to engage in civil practice.

"Having established himself at St. Augustine, Florida, he was there actively employed in professional pursuits, when Virginia, his native State, seceded. At once he abandoned home and interest and tendered to her governor his services, which were immediatel

accepted. Passing from the State service shortly after to the Provisional Army of the Confederate States, he only ceased to serve them diligently and faithfully with his death, which occurred on the evening of the 23rd instant. (? Mar. 23, 1864)

"Dr. Southgate was conspicuous, in and out of the army, not alone for his richly stored mind, and his rare and brilliant talents, but for a mild and gentle character, and a pure, spotless morality. In his demise, his afflicted family, his professional brethren, the army and the country have, indeed, sustained an irreparable loss. Peace to his ashes."

He served in the war as private, surgeon of the Forty-seventh Virginia Infantry, then surgeon of brigade, and finally chief surgeon of the First Division, Third Army Corps, in the Northern Army of Virginia. At the close of the war he resumed practice at Baltimore, where he remained three years. In 1870 he removed to Savannah, Ga., and four years later came to this State. He first located in Orange County, where he still owns an orange-grove. In 1880 he came to Jacksonville, where he has since practised. Dr. Spence is a member of the State and county

I have found no biographical data about him and he was not a member of the FMA as late as 1893.
