against him for 1058.54 \$ and finally satisfying it Jan. 16, '56.
He is listed in this book as Dr. Jno. B. Taylor. (p. 35).

Born in 1839 at Teedville, New York (later Trout Creek) Country school education followed by medical school; and served as a surgeon in the Union Army during the Civil War. He began to doubt the Bible and came up with the theory that the earth was a hollow globe and that the inhabitants of the earth lived on the inside of the globe rather than the outside. He also thought that the sun, the moon and all the stars were contained inside a globe 25,000 miles in circumference. He also believed in a social system based on collective ownership and organized the Koreshan Unity. ~~XXXXXX~~ This group was to apply the principle of collective ownership in daily life. In 1893 at the World's Fair, a real estate man convinced him that Charlotte Harbor area was suitable for his colony and the first group of colonists moved

James Rufus Tryon

JAMES Rufus Tryon was the 10th Surgeon General of the U. S. Navy, a post that had been created only 22 years earlier but whose history goes back to 1842 with the establishment of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery of the Navy Department. An able medical statesman, he originated many new ideas and policies during his 4-year term.

He was appointed to this office, which carried with it the rank of Commodore, by President Grover Cleveland on May 10, 1893, after an extensive Naval service afloat and on shore.

Tryon was born in New York on Sept. 24, 1837. He received B.A. and M.A. degrees from Union College, and in 1861 he got his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania. Two years later

he was appointed an Assistant Surgeon in the Navy.

As a young officer, he served first in the West Gulf Squadron, and after the Battle of Mobile Bay he was put in charge of the wounded who were transferred to the Naval Hospital at Pensacola, Florida.

After the Civil War he was ordered to the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery in Washington. While there he was assigned the job of writing a naval medical history of the war. Congress, however, did not appropriate funds for its printing, and the manuscript has been lost. After Asiatic and North Pacific tours of duty and the post of delegate to the International Congress at Copenhagen in 1884, he was named the Fleet Surgeon of the White Squadron which was

made up of the first steel ships of the modern navy.

On assuming the post of Surgeon General, Commodore Tryon's past experiences led him to recommend a number of innovations. Among his proposals were a hospital ship to be attached to the fleet; the creation of a Hospital Corps; an increase in the number and rank of medical officers; the building of additional naval hospitals; and the establishment of a naval medical supply depot. He also advocated women nurses for the

hospitals and their employment as a part of the Navy, the germ of the idea of the present Navy Nurse Corps. Most of these proposals, however, were not enacted until later.

Commodore Tryon retired in Sept., 1899, and spent the last years of his life at Coxsackie, N. Y., where he died March 20, 1912. Union College has included his portrait in its gallery of distinguished graduates and has prepared an official biography of him.

This physician who founded the New Smyrna Colony was a member of the governing council of East Florida taking his seat on January 15, 1767, and retaining it until December 1771. He was titular secretary and clerk of the council and was always a member of the "inflamed faction" and of a "leveling mind" voting with Drayton against the measure of the controversial Governor Patrick Tonyn. He was suspended as secretary and clerk of the council on March 30, 1776, reinstated in 1777 and received his _____ until June, 1785. He had harsh words to say about Dr. Robert Catherwood--see under Catherwood. He was also appointed clerk of the crown on August 21, 1766 but never served in this capacity. There are more comments about his political activities in this book of Mowat's. During his last year in St. Augustine he was kept in custody by

Tonyn but he was released in May 1781, and returned to Charleston "where in spite of Tonyn's warning, he was permitted to resume his profession of medicine." He remained in Charleston and died there in 1792 and according to Mowat, it was one of their earliest members of the South Carolina Medical Society. (page 106).
