

Daniel, R.P.: Cutaneous Diseases, PROC. FMA, Session, 1880,

Gives a brief discussion of various common cutaneous diseases such as: urticaria, herpes zeeter, heat rash, various exanthems (smailpox, chickenpox, measles), syphilis and eczema. Usually describes the signs, occasionally symptoms, and often a note on predisposition, prevention and therapy. Mentions a smallpox epidemic in Jax. "just at the close of the late war." Thinks smallpox less virulent in Florida climate. Finds negros less susceptible to local skin diseases but more susceptible to measles. Thinks scarleting less severe in Florida. Mentions epidemic dengue in Jax. in 1850 (p. 109) Recommends morphine grains 1/6 or k for urticaria. Notes a form of elephantiasis arabum used to be common among the Greeks and Minorcans in St. Augustine - called "Barbadoes leg." No longer seen.

Davidson, William Henry: Diaries

A transcript of a portion of them by Maude Hollowell
of Pensacola together with some biographical material

Davidson (1825-1916) was a Harvard educated engineer who for a period was inspector of the port at Pensacola. He left manuscript diaries for various years ranging from 1852 to 1879. Only a small part of this relates to medicine and disease see the correspondence of E.A. Hammond dated 5/16/74. Hammond assures me that the transcript is reasonably accurate and provides most of the medical information. Betty Vickers in her article on meditine in Escambia Cty. utilized most of the material, I believe.

These consist of 114 seperate items all but 2 of which are in manuscript - ledgible. Sixty-three items relate to his personal business (purchases of food, supplies, equipment, lumbar, brick, tin, etc., receipts for taxes, promissory notes for the hire of servants) all prior to the Civil War. These show the prices of such items at that time. Rarely are drugs purchased; no books or medical instruments are listed. Indeed, there is nothing to suggest he was practicing medicine except a receipt for payment of \$10 for occupational tax on which he is listed as a physician in the town of Quincy, Fla., for the year ending May 1st, 1869. This receipt is titled: "United States Internal Revenue," and is No. 315, paid Sept. 28, 1868. The remaining 51 items relate to his post as Medical Purveyor for the Confederate States Army, Districts of East and Middle Florida. They are dated: Oct. 1, 1862 to Mar. 8, 1865. Almost all are letters or circulars from Surg.-Gen. Saml. Preston Moore to Davidson who is first addressed at Tallahassee and later Quincy. Most of these are simple administrative matters of little consequence; I have briefly noted. A few I have copied by hand in toto; zeroxing is not permitted by Elizabeth Alexander - she feels it fades handwritten documents. Finally, I have listed all disbursements to Davidson; these are not likely all he received but they are all noted in these papers. For my notes see the manuscript file Civil War Medicine.

A biographical sketch of this German physician who served as a hospital steward in the Seminole Wars then settled into private practice at Key West. In the postwar years he served as a contract physician for the army and owned a drugstore in Key West. The account is written by his granddaughter, the widow of Michael Price deBoe, who practiced ophthalmology in Miami for many years.

James Howard DeVotie was an apparently well educated, single man who served as a hospital steward in various hospitals of the Confederacy. He mentions Virginia, South Carolina and the Lake City Florida Hospital in the three items I have obtained photocopies of. The complete papers in the above reference cover many years before, during and afterthe Civil War. Only the three letters to his father dated: Apr. 29, 1864. Apr. 24, 1864 and May 4, 1864, relate to Florida - all are written from Lake City. He finds the Confederate Hospital there in deplorable condition and comments that the Surgeon in Charge, J.S. Morel, should be courtmartialed for incompetence and dereliction of duty.

Have read and indexed material I thought useful. This book must be used with caution for I think he has made numerous unwarrented assumptions and has arrived at unjustified conclusions. He sets out to prove the generally held idea that disease eradicated the native population and tries to identify the diseases by associating them with the prevalent diseases in the Carribbean basin at that time. At times he takes the mere mention of a disease in a small group and blows it into a wide scale epidemic. A large part of the book also deals with food supplies and famine. There are many references to Florida.

In response to criticism of the conduct of the Army, the president appointed a commission to investigate the validity of the many charges. The results of this investigation appear in the above volumes. Through the Calder Medical Library I was able to borrow from the Pentagon Library the first 7 vols. and from the Univeristy of Florida Library, the 8th vol. In manuscript files "Spanish American War Medicine" and "Camp Miami," are photocopies from these volumes of material related to the Florida camps. In Vol. 7, is a fairly detailed index of testimony given the commission; I have listed paging related to Key West and Miami. Much of the pertinent information in these volumes I have recorded in the chronological

file.

Dowler concludes that large doses of quinine were probably used by Lannaec some time prior to his death (1822) in the treatment of pneumonia. He also quotes a Thomas D. Mitchell of near Philadelphia as having used such doses in 1824, of Henry Perrine having used them in Mississippi in April 1826, and Samuel A. Cartwright who seems to claim that Perrine was his protege and to imply that he taught Perrine this custom.
