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SHERIFF TO BE OUSTED

DADE County's "Keystone Kop," Sheriff D. C. Coleman, reading the hand-writing on the wall and realizing he is about to be dumped in the ash-can, continues to violate the law under the guise of enforcing the law!

But unlike the late and lamented King Edward, Coleman won't retire gracefully but continues to hang on to his shaky throne like a bat to a rafter!

But Dade County will get shut of Keystone Coleman as surely as SWILL SMELLS—and you may lay to that, mates!

Let's look at the record smeared on Dade County's books by this official version of the historic On-Again, Off-Again Finnegan—this Sheriff D. C. Coleman, who can't see a bawdy house when he stumbles over one and there are hundreds operating here, but who can swoop down on peanut gamblers and beat his breast in self-adulation for accomplishing this dubious achievement.

For three years, while Dave Sholtz was governor, this same Sheriff Coleman did not molest book-makers. When the Blue Law element protruded their Blue Noses and demanded that the gambling be smothered, Coleman's supporters bleated:

"Whether or not a peace officer has sufficient evidence upon which to convict, that peace officer may not do so if the raid is made without a search warrant!"

That's pretty plain, isn't it? Yet go back over the files of the daily papers and you'll find where Sheriff Coleman utterly disregards the search warrant provision. In other words, Coleman simply doesn't give a damn, and makes unwarranted pinches solely to avert the wrath of the Governor!

Naturally, there's a nigger in the woodpile. Governor Cone has openly boasted that because of strict bookie law enforcement he is saving the State

Miami Benefactor Jailed

A. F. Hill, a resident of Dayton, Ohio, and more recently of Miami, is in jail working out a sentence in the filth of the prison farm because he followed the advice of Captain Hardy Bryan of the Kavanaugh Cavalry. And to add insult to injury, Hill is part owner of a 225-acre tract of land which he and his associates were good enough to loan the city of Miami for an airport in order that it might be used as an inducement to persuade the Navy to maintain an air station here.

Mr. Hill was a guest of the Y. M. C. A. where he has been for several months. He likes to play penny ante, and one such game resulted in his getting notice to move. He consulted Captain Hardy Bryan of the Kavanaugh Cavalry who advised him to retain possession of the room. Upon his return to the Y. M. C. A. Hill discovered that his effects had been removed and the room re-rented. He entered, in the innocent belief that police captains sometimes know what they are talking about. Whitewash Seen For Bus Tragedy

THE spectacle of a 19,000-pound bus, laden with humans, careening over one of the most dangerous highways in the country at a speed of 65 to 70 miles an hour, was painted by witnesses at the inquest in Coral Gables this week.

A blown-out front tire was the sole cause of the tragic bus accident on the Tamiami Trail last week, according to Connie Freidin, local garage owner, who led in the rescue work.

"The tire was a 14-ply cord, worn slick, but still apparently good," Freidin said. "It had probably been injured by a blow, perhaps weeks previous to the time it let go under the terrific pressure caused by the capacity load and high speed."

Tags For Visitors

FLORIDA is constantly seeking new sources of income, and as a result have passed some tax laws that have worked a hardship on small wage earners who can ill afford to pay the multiple taxes inflicted on them by our allegedly learned law makers in Tallahassee. Now comes an idea that contrary to working a hardship, is an actual convenience, and in many cases a money saver for the tourist.

Thousands of tourists visit Florida each year, bringing with them their automobiles bearing their own state tags which will expire before they really want to leave the state. As a result they are placed in the position of either having to purchase a year's Florida tag or go through a complicated and in some cases impossible process in an effort to have their own state's tags mailed them.

Why couldn't the state of Florida issue a 90-day tag, charge a small sum for it and make it effective long enough for the tourist to complete his visit and get safely home. The tag could be distinctive, carry a Florida advertisement, and in a majority of the cases it would be allowed to remain on the car in its home territory the year out, thus constituting a running advertisement.

It need not be compulsory for visitors from states which allow drivers to operate far into the spring on old tags, and care could be exercised that they be issued to bona-fide tourists, and not to those from other states who hold positions in Florida during the season.
