Never, at any time, during the extensive negotiations and litigation, have Commissioners Sewell, Williams or Rigby, gone on record as "bullheads" not willing to arbitrate and compromise if they are satisfied that the people are getting a square deal.

Should the issue remain in litigation any prediction of a settlement date would be ridiculous. The problem can be kicked around for years and almost anything can happen.

Every butcher-shop in town charges for the "paper" around meat, weighing it with the meat. The paper costs the butcher about 2 cents a pound and he sells it for 50 and 60 cents. The chain stores prepare sugar in advance and have 5- and 10-pound packages under the counters.

During 1936 1,583 homeless and needy children, from wee babies up to sixteen years of age, of all creeds, from all over Florida have been served by the society. 333 of which were cared for by the Southeastern Branch in Miami.

Foster parents who have opened their arms and homes to these little mites have enriched their own lives immeasurably with the deep joy that comes from having fond tiny arms entwined around their necks . . . baby eyes shining with the ecstasy of being loved . . . and the satisfaction of selfish service to humanity.

That each child accepted for placement by the Children's Home Society of Florida be in need of this care and that homes requesting children be worthy, is a matter of careful research.

Does the State's Attorney know that there are more than 3,000 slot machines operating in Dade county when by every stretch of the law there should be only 1806?

Does he know that there are 2,325 slot machines in Miami, Miami Beach and Hialeah alone, to say nothing of the vast number out in the county?

Does he know where records of these machines are kept, at Miami Beach and how much effort is being made in CERTAIN QUARTERS TO KEEP THESE RECORDS IN SUCH A STATE OF CONFUSION THAT THE SEASON WILL BE OVER BEFORE THEY CAN BE STRAIGHTENED OUT?
