



# WIDENER FACING PRISON!

**S**HALL Florida Justice be tempered by the Wampum in Widener's Wallet? Some folks say it is easier for a Camel to crawl through the eye of a needle than for a Rich Man to gain entrance to Heaven. But others paraphrase that crack to say that it is like falling off a log for a Rich Man to detour around the ample Maw of prison in Florida. Is that a fact?

Is Joseph E. Widener so sacrosanct, so inviolable that he may with impunity be foul the governmental structure of this state and sneer at the precepts set up by the People?

**WILL THE "SUCKER MONEY" WHICH WIDENER AND HIS APOSTLES GLEAN THROUGH THE WINDOWS AT HIALEAH PARK EACH SEASON — AND WILL THE TAXES WHICH HIS RACING PLANT PAYS THE STATE EACH YEAR — KEEP THIS ARROGANT FLOUTER OF LAW AND ORDER FROM WEARING PRISON STRIPES?**

These moot questions today are paramount from the Georgia line to Key West. — BUT ONLY TIME WILL GIVE THE ANSWERS.

As long ago as 1934, Miami Life pointed an accusing finger at the high places of Tallahassee. Today, this accusation, which at the time was scoffed at, has been vindicated.

Ollie H. Gore, former high official of the Miami Jockey Club, and self-admitted "messenger boy" for Widener, has confessed his part in the paying of a \$50,000 bribe to Governor Dave Sholtz for delivering "bag and baggage" unwarranted racing dates to the Hialeah plant.

The State Senate has demanded an investigation. And "the sun shines no more in the Mudville" of Florida Big League Racing. For even the Federal Government has interested itself in the case—partly to learn if that \$50,000 was accounted for in Income Tax re-

turns. AL CAPONE IS PERFORMING AT ALCATRAZ ISLAND SIMPLY BECAUSE HE "FORGOT" TO CALL HIS SHOTS WHEN MAKING HIS RETURN.

Now it might be a good idea for every Floridian who is laboring under the delusion that the chain-gangs are for RICH and POOR alike to cut out the following verbatim quotations of the state statutes and paste them in his hat for future reference:

Section 7481. BRIBERY OF EXECUTIVE, LEGISLATIVE OR JUDICIAL OFFICER. — Whoever corruptly gives, offers or promises to any executive, legislative or judicial officer, after his election or appointment, either before or after he is qualified, or has taken his seat, any gift or gratuity whatever, with intent to influence his vote, opinion, decision or judgment on any matter, question, cause OR PROCEEDING WHICH MAY BE THEN PENDING, OR WHICH MAY BY LAW COME OR BE BROUGHT BEFORE HIM IN HIS OFFICIAL CAPACITY, shall be punished by imprisonment in the State Prison not exceeding five years, or in the county jail not exceeding one year, or by fine not exceeding three thousand dollars. (Compiled General Laws of Florida, 1927).

You will note the capitalized portion above, which is ours. Your attention is called to that clause because through it Widener might find a loop-hole. Section 7482 of the same law proceeds as follows:

OFFICER ACCEPTING BRIBE — Every executive, legislative or judicial officer, who corruptly accepts a gift or gratuity, or a promise to make a gift, or do an act beneficial to such officer, under the present agreement or with the understanding that his vote, opinion or judgment shall be given in any particular manner or upon a particular side of any question, cause or proceeding which is or may be by law brought before him, in his official capacity, or that in such capacity he shall make any particular nomination or appointment, shall forfeit his office, be forever disqualified to hold any public office, trust or appointment under the Constitution or laws of this state, and be punished by imprisonment in the State prison not exceeding ten years, or in the county jail not exceeding one year, or by fine not exceeding five thousand dollars. (Compiled General Laws of Florida, 1927).

Now, folks, we shall see what we shall see. Is the blindfold to be slipped from the eyes of Justice, so she may peek a bit in order to see whether the culprit in the prisoner's dock is Special Privilege? Or will She cut

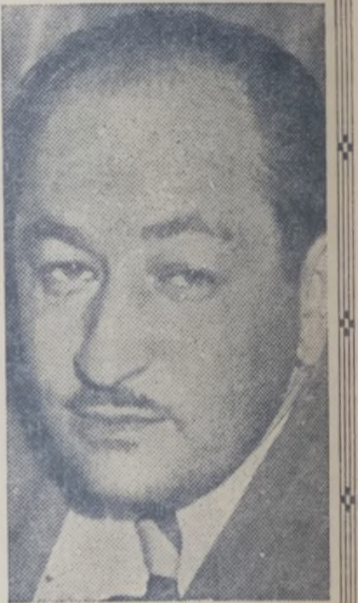

### MORE ABOUT CLEARY

1931 he lists himself as an investment broker. Around town he is known as the "Elk" club gambler." Gambling and Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary are synonyms.

When Frank P. Ford prepared to open the Embassy Club in 1929 Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary elbowed himself into the picture. He appointed himself the "fixer" and wrote his own ticket for twelve per cent of the profits made through GAMBLING. During the winter of 1929 the Embassy Club was the Monte Carlo of the south and MR. ARTHUR JAMES, alias (Jack) CLEARY, without investing one thin dime in the joint cut himself an \$18,000 slice of the profits. Here is how he did it.

When others connected with the gambling mob failed in an effort to procure protection Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary popped up in certain quarters and demanded to know why a certain island gambling resort was permitted to operate and why discrimination was shown against the Embassy Club. To make a long story short he bluntly told the "powers that be" that if the Embassy Club didn't "go" he would register a long and very, very loud "squeal" against the island casino. He got away with the bluff and went on the pay-roll for twelve-percent of the "take."

When time came for filing income tax returns for the year of 1929 Mr. JAMES ARTHUR, alias (JACK) CLEARY blithely tripped over to the federal building and whispered to Uncle Sam that his total income after making proper deductions was a mere \$4,901.81 and that he didn't owe the government a cent. THE \$18,240.00 WHICH HE RECEIVED FROM LAWRENCE TOBIN, CASHIER, OF THE EMBASSY CLUB, just slipped his mind and was never thought of again until the FEDERAL GRAND JURY indicted him for failure to make a partnership return for the year.

A second indictment charging ARTHUR JAMES, alias (JACK) CLEARY with failure to remember the trifling item of \$18,280 which he received as his share of gambling profits from the Embassy Club in 1931, followed the first and MR. ARTHUR JAMES, alias (JACK) CLEARY was promptly "pinched" and haled into federal court in Tampa. His attorneys after taking one look at the evidence piled up against him promptly entered a plea of nolo contendere (which is equivalent to a plea of guilty in any man's court) and Federal Judge Alexander Akerman hung a couple of \$500 fines around the "fixer's" neck. The fines were imposed on May 20, 1933 and the matter might have been closed there except for the death of Joseph C. Dillard, one of the "partners" in the Embassy Club who was indicted with Cleary and four others. Dillard was killed in an automobile accident and Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary's attorneys immediately filed a motion to withdraw the nolo contendere plea and enter one of not guilty. The motion was granted and the case was transferred to Miami where it was heard before Judge Akerman.

In making the plea to withdraw the nolo contendere his attorneys declared that the plea was entered only to avoid publicity and notoriety. Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary finally beat the "rap" and was acquitted.

Of course insinuating that Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary waited until after the death of Dillard (who undeniably would have made an excellent witness against him) before filing his motion for withdrawing his original plea, is the farthest thing from our mind, but after all it does make sense. Herman J. Jesse was foreman of the jury which acquitted Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary and what a swell raking that jury received from Judge Akerman when it returned the verdict of "not guilty."

After this recital of Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary's "inside" connections with the gambling fraternity we are forced to arrive at one of two conclusions.

There is a mob controlling gambling and Mr. Arthur James, alias, (Jack) Cleary has been cold-decked or Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary is attempting to drag a herring across the trail in an effort to scare the city commission into granting him a license to form a "mob" of his own—

Take it either way, but you'll still have Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary, gambler, kibitzer, chiseler and "fixer" doing his man-about-town stuff and there isn't much to be done about it except—

To make sure that if, and when, gambling is legalized, that people with records like Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary are "dealt out." Somehow we feel that with such eliminations there will be less chance of "people who want to make a bet" being "blackjacked" and a much better chance of old Uncle Sam getting his "cut" with others at the steering wheel. It will be tough on Mr. Arthur James, alias (Jack) Cleary, of course, because he may eventually have to go to work.
