**AND WITH A \$100,000 LURE IN ADDITION TO THE \$50,000 PRIZE AT HIALEAH and the \$10,000 AT TROPICAL PARK, THE INDUCEMENTS TO HORSEMEN, and CONSEQUENTLY TO THE TALENT WHO FILL THE COFFERS, WILL PROVE TO BE IRRESISTIBLE.**

There's no denying the fact that the cream of thoroughbreds was transported across the country to Santa Anita and Tanforan in the Golden State last season. But with the ante in Southern Florida boosted more than 100 per cent, the bulk of High Hat Horseflesh will again head this way in quest of that Loud Speaking Dough.

It has been a common wail that Dade County tracks were operated on the premise that the track operators should get their "take" off the top with horse-owners, players and merchants scrambling for the dregs.

**THE BROWARD COUNTY OPERATORS, PROFITING FROM THE DADE MISTAKES, PLAN TO INTRODUCE SOMETHING IN THE WAY OF AN INNOVATION — A SYSTEM WHICH WILL SHARE THE PROFITS, PRIMARILY, WITH BROWARD RESIDENTS AND WITH HORSEMEN and PLAYERS. MIAMI, OF COURSE, WILL ALSO REALIZE GREAT PROFITS DUE TO THE INCREASED INFUX OF RACING TOURISTS THE NEW TRACK IS CERTAIN TO ATTRACT.**

Living conditions, being much cheaper in Broward County, will result in a great boom among apartment and rooming houses there but the easy accessibility of the track to Miami and, particularly, Miami Beach, will do much to boom business in these communities, too.

Competition will be keener and higher calibre racing will result. If the Dade tracks are to glam onto their share of patronage, they must meet the Broward challenge or fold up.

The Hollywood crowd pooh-poohs the idea that five-day racing will hurt the sport and are seriously considering introducing this innovation in an effort to win the good will of merchants. In the advent this goes through, the Dade operators will either have to stand and deliver the same package of good will or alienate the public to Broward turnstiles.

But at the Delaware track, which takes only 3 per cent, the bookies elsewhere would be compelled to pay 97 per cent, which cuts their "take" materially on bad days.

FLORIDA'S United States Senator, Claude Pepper, is no longer a "rookie" in senatorial halls. Senator Pepper's maiden speech, made June 18 on the eve of a vote on relief appropriations for 1938, was so powerful that it even commanded attention from the Washington press. The Washington Daily News carried the following story, in part:

"The Senate, somewhat subdued by a resounding rebuke from a rookie member, prepared to vote today on the 1938 relief appropriation. The rebuke was administered by 36-year-old Claude Pepper of Florida. It was his first speech in the senate, and it was as remarkable a maiden effort as any within the recollection of his colleagues—Senators stayed in their seats and listened with an attention seldom accorded any speaker—When Pepper concluded, senators formed a line at the rear of the chamber to congratulate him, an unusual demonstration for a new member. Senate liberals were particularly cordial."

According to the newspaper articles Senator Pepper started his address by reading President Roosevelt's second Inaugural address and asking "why it is that whenever the President tries to extend the social frontiers, as he promised then, something always happens to his efforts?" He then recited the story of the children of Israel, who came within sight of the promised land and were afraid to advance the last few miles and take possession.

In conclusion, after a lengthy biographical sketch of Pepper's life, the Washington Daily News story says, "His newly discovered ability as an orator promised today to make him a leader in the group which gives aggressive support to President Roosevelt's social and economic reforms". The story was written by Ruth Finney, the Daily News veteran political report-
