CITY Commissioner R. C. Gardner hints broadly that much money is being spent by the Dunn Bus Company in an attempt to win the bus franchise election next month. Commissioner Gardner knows that the vast avalanche of good will built up by Mr. Dunn during the last decade will pay him dividends now in the form of an overwhelming vote of confidence from the public and it is hard to conceive why he still carries on his stubborn fight for a municipally owned transportation system which the PUBLIC DOESN'T WANT and which the CITY COULD NOT PAY FOR ANYWAY.

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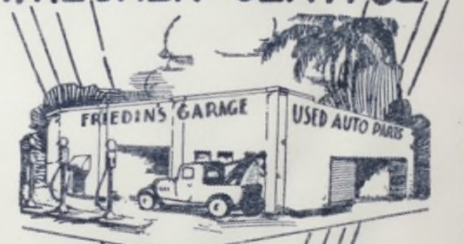

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# Miami Life Goes To War—Staff Writer Covers The Battlefield.

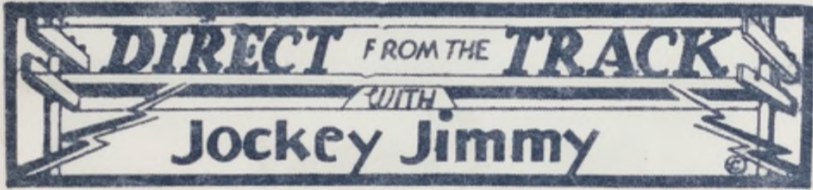
PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 18, 1937—THE WAR between Governor Quinn of the State of Rhode Island and Walter E. O'Hara, managing director of Narragansett Park continues while the Democratic party shudders at the thought of what may happen at the next election. Now above all times when there is so much discussion about Supreme Court, the Governor of the smallest State in the Union, calls out the militia and declares a State of war within one mile, surrounding Narragansett Park. Racing at this \$3,000,000 plant is through as long as those soldiers are on the job.

I went out to the track this morning to get the low-down on everything, but was stopped 5 blocks away by soldiers with bayonets, machine guns and everything that would be needed to stop anyone—however, the bayonet would be sufficient. After showing the guard my credentials, I was escorted to another officer, then another and another—finally I landed at headquarters and with several other newspapermen was given the regulation permit that would allow one to enter and leave Narragansett Park without restriction. This war-time pass is a hard thing to get. . . Mayor Thomas P. McCoy of Pawtucket and Chief of Police Mills of Pawtucket were refused admittance in the zone.

Inside the track there were about a hundred newspapermen, cameramen, movie men, etc., because today O'Hara is more than National news. The regular routine of getting things lined up for the races goes on—it comes 1.15 p.m. post time, the bugle blows, just the same as it always did at posttime, but—there is no answer to the bugle today, no horses, no jockeys, no horse players. . . NOTHING—except the militia who upon hearing the bugle, jump around like chickens with their heads cut off.

O'Hara is here, ready to face a barrage of cameras, Paramount News, Pathe News, they are all here—but O'Hara won't talk—he talked once, a month or so ago when he called Governor Quinn A DAMN LIAR—today Governor Quinn is on top, because Quinn did what he said he would do, call out the militia because there will be no racing at Narragansett Park as long as O'Hara is the head man. O'Hara is in a jovial mood and gives the newspapermen many a laugh.

The situation is dead-locked, as long as the troops remain, O'Hara knows there can be no racing. The latest move is to the effect that horses coming from other tracks, can't even get into Narragansett Park. O'Hara announced there will be no racing while the troops are here, in order to protect the customers. . . there are no customers, so the Narragansett Park meeting that was to run until November 11th is off. Rockingham Park located within a couple of hours ride from here, continues with its eighteen-day extension. We have not heard the last of the calling out of the militia, going over the head of the Supreme Court decision, because it is a political battle, between Governor Quinn and Walter E. O'Hara.
