Like any good fish story, the story of the Kelley Fleet only gets bigger and better over the years.


In 1957, the Kelley family started fishing the waters off South Florida with a converted PT boat nicknamed the Mucho-K that would soon gain a reputation as a virtual fish magnet - hauling in huge numbers of colorful, edible, and, no doubt, surprised fish everyday.

Today, a fourth-generation Mucho-K is joined by the other members of the Kelley Fleet (the New Popeye, Myster, Cap. Rudy, and Hurricane) to make up the largest driftfishing operation in the country.

Experienced captains and crews are there to help the beginning angler bait his hook and land a monster. They often employ the services of the modern sonar equipment to satisfy both novice and more serious angler as they find just the right spot to "stop and drop". And when you bring your catch back to the docks, they'll be glad to clean and filet them for you.



STOP WISHING, GO FISHING

Built in 1954, the Haulover Fishing Pier's colorful thirty-year history is rich with stories of skillful fisherman and their elusive quarry. One hundred twenty pound tarpon and eight hundred sixty-five pound sharks are just a few of the many records pier anglers still brag about.

Pier owner Ben Carne tells us that pier fishing has evolved over the years, "In the late 60's and early 70's fishing was a bit more consistent. Pier fishing has now developed into a fine art requiring more refined skills, experience and good equipment."

Pier fisherman are now having their best luck on the morning and evening tides, catching plenty of mackerel, snook, and barracuda.

HAULOVER BEACH SAFETY AND SECURITY

Two groups active in maintaining a safe, secure and aesthetically pleasant atmosphere at Haulover Beach are the Metro-Park Rangers and Lifeguards. While they are separate entities they work in tandem, providing essential services to the beach goers at Haulover.

Sunny Isles District has six Dade County Park Rangers assigned to patrol the major parks and they are easily recognized in neat white shirts, smokey the bear green straw hats, green trousers and smiles.

Park Rangers are on patrol weekends and all holidays and at special events to "protect and serve". Organized three years ago to provide for safety and information, the Park Ranger has been trained in public relations, first aid, traffic control and assisting people. With 15 to 20 thousand visitors each weekend to Haulover Park and thousands more to Greynolds Park, the Rangers combine foot patrol with constant vehicle patrol of the parks. Park Rangers are empowered to issue citations for violation of park rules and to control traffic/parking problems. However, there main role is to keep visitors informed and happy while in the parks.

Gerald Arenberg, park ranger sergeant, states that the park Rangers "are not here to be police officers. Our job is to make the parks a great place to bring your family to swim, to play golf, to fish or have a picnic. I think that the parks are the safest places in the County. If you see us on foot patrol don't be surprised if we walk up and say hello and how can we help you?

HAULOVER BEACH LIFEGUARDS

Just as the Park Rangers are responsible for patrolling the whole park, the lifegurads are equal to their task of keeping watch over Haulover's two miles of beach. The vital role of the lifequards is ensuring visitor Four lifequards: safety. Lt. Dave Battenfield, Douglas Manuel, Joseph White and Robert Peuty have a combined total of over 36 years experience at Haulover Beach alone. Not only are they and their colleagues expected to pass a lifeguard training program before being employed by the County but also a rigorous test is administered every six months. These quidelines ensure a quality lifequard program at Haulover Beach.

Awareness is a key for the lifeguards; they maintain a close relationship with central personnel and attend numerous job-related seminars and meetings with their supervisors. Like the Rangers the lifeguards are also in radio communication with the County-wide dispatch system and are equipped to handle most emergencies.

Public relations is also essential in the role the Lifeguards play at Haulover Beach. A high level of visibility makes them the people to turn to for information. Because of the pride they take in their work, the Haulover Beach Lifeguard staff is one of the most professional crews in the nation.



GREYNOLDS MAINTENANCE

THE IMPORTANCE OF TURF AERIFICATION

A number of mechanical, cultural practices are commonly used in turfgrass management to help develop and sustain quality turf. These practices physically alter the plant's environment by removing and/or relocating soil and organic materials. Coring, slicing, spiking, and vertical mowing are different methods that are used and they vary in the degree of cultivation.

Coring or aerifying is the most intensive form of cultivation. Coring uses hollow tines that remove turf, thatch, and soil in cores of 0.25 to 0.75 inches in diameter and up to 3 inches long. There are a number of commercial coring machines available.

The main function of aerifying is to open up the soil and thatch layers and allow oxygen in and carbon dioxide out of the root zone. Roots and soil micro-organisms use oxygen for respiration and other metabolic processes, and release carbon dioxide. Water and nutrient uptake depend on the soil having adequate amounts of oxygen so that roots can function properly. If the oxygen is used up in the soil, absorption by roots ceases.

Aerification provides many benefits to turf: root and shoot growth are stimulated around the holes, and poor root systems can be quickly improved if diseases and nematodes are not a problem. Dense roots are often observed in aerifier holes.

Cultivation by coring helps alleviate many physical problems that cause poor aeration, such as soil compaction, layering, and thatch.

The importance of aerification in Florida is often underestimated because people think our sandy soils are sufficiently porous, but many cultural problems occur that stem from the lack of oxygen in the root zone. Thatch and heavy rainfall can seal the soil and prevent oxygen movement into it. Root degeneration usually then will occur in water-logged soils making it difficult to get fungicides into the root zone to prevent this from happening.

Aerification is an important turf management tool that can help correct existing problems and prevent other problems from occurring. High quality turf often depends on aerification.


NEWS FROM THE STORK

ARCH CREEK GETS NEW PARK MANAGER

The Metro-Dade Parks and Recreation Department Sunny Isles District has a new Park Manager at Arch Creek Park, Patricia Cunningham, a Florida native from Ft. Lauderdale, has recently returned to Florida from Western Samoa in the South Pacific, where she was a Peace Corps Volunteer for two years.

Patti received her Bachelor Degree in Biology at Warren Wilson College Swannanoa, North Carolina. As part of her college work program she was involved in the forestry program, landscaping, teaching (biology and ornithology) and green house operations. Patti has also worked with the Y.A.C.C. at John Lloyd State Park, the Y.C.C. at the Everglades National Park and with the Division of Forestry Withalacoochee Environmental Center.

This summer camp will stress environmental education and include canoe trips, nature hikes and other naturalistic activities.
