**Song of the Open Road (Partly) As Le Jeune Work Moves Along; February Finish Date Confirmed**      **Room Rent Policy Set Once More**

The open road beckons—two wide lanes each way — on Le Jeune Road now from Tamiami Trail to Bird Road after the stretch of binder covering was laid this week.

The finish paving on this same stretch will be laid after New Year's, completing this part of the project, according to Frank C. Palmer, superintendent for Troup Brothers Construction Co.

And the remaining portion of Le Jeune, between Bird Road and South Dixie Highway will be completed by the end of February — in time to meet the extended 48-day deadline granted by the State Road Department after numerous changes in plans, Palmer said.

Sidewalks, lack of which had caused some downtown merchants to howl some weeks back, are all completed except in the Bird-South Dixie portion, he said.

"I could have built a road in half the time had traffic been stopped," Palmer said in

citing the slow process of road construction while cars worked their way between men and equipment.

But the delay was granted after it was found that the plan to use heavy concrete ditch covers over a deep drainage ditch was not feasible beyond a certain point.

Concrete pipe had to be ordered and substituted.

Other delays resulted from changes in the island at University Drive and Le Jeune and the location of a drainage outfall behind Coral Gables High School.

The City Commission did Tuesday by ordinance what the courts said it couldn't do legally by resolution—set up a policy on room renting in Coral Gables.

Back in July of this year, Judge Ray Pearson ruled that the City could not amend its ordinance prohibiting room renting in residential and other areas not zoned for the purpose.

The suit was brought by Mr. and Mrs. James W. Nichols, of 225 Salamanca Ave.

**Blue Road Pipe Cost Tops Bridge**

Item: Blue Road Bridge, \$25,000.

Item: moving water pipe for new Blue Road Bridge, \$50,000. These are the estimated costs involved with construction of the new bridge over the Coral Gables Waterway between Granada Boulevard and University Drive.

City Manager L. W. Robinson Jr. said Tuesday he expects bids to be called on Jan. 18 for the bridge project. The schedule calls for completion by July 15.

Meanwhile, the City of Miami Water and Sewer Board, which has a 48-inch water pipe going over the canal, will have to remove approximately 176 feet of it and replace it with 193 feet of pipe under the canal.

In addition to this, Robinson said, Consumers Water Co. will also have to remove a small feeder line.

The new bridge will allow boats with a 10-foot clearance to pass underneath.

Montgomery, who was tourney chairman, indicated that he wasn't happy about the price, but he indicated it was a matter to be taken up at a future tourney.

Said Guy H. Williams, 19th Hole Restaurant manager:

**Riviera Day School Told By Court: Pay Tax Bill**

Riviera Day School has lost its appeal in Circuit Court on exemption from City real estate and personal property taxes.

Judge Ray Pearson has upheld Tax Assessor T. C. Blount in ruling that the school, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lorin E. Coppock Jr., does not qualify for exemption as a non-profit institution.

Blount has estimated the tax at \$800 for this year and a comparable amount for each of the three years he is allowed to back tax under the law. Coppock maintained that

Blount ruled on a technicality. The Coppocks operate the school on a lease with the corporation that owns it. But they are also owners of the corporation.

This was done to offset the possibility of a heavy liability action, but Blount, backed by the City Commission, ruled that this took the operation out of a non-profit category by separating ownership and operation.

The school is located at 6800 Nervia St.

Dearborne School, 311 Sevilla Ave., initially ruled not exempt by Blount, was later reinstated after an audit by the City's Internal Auditor Paul Gleman.

# Damn Yankees & Tall Buildings!

(A two-story building addition is underway at Miracle Mile and Salzedo Street while across the way at Salzedo and Aragon Avenue a three-story structure is rising. Nobody's said so, but it looks

like a race to us. We decided to ask Rodney Miller, one of the buildingest men in these parts, about how he got a job done in record time — 36 years ago.)

Rodney Miller built a \$3½

million dollar hotel in Coral Gables in record-breaking time of 10 months. How?

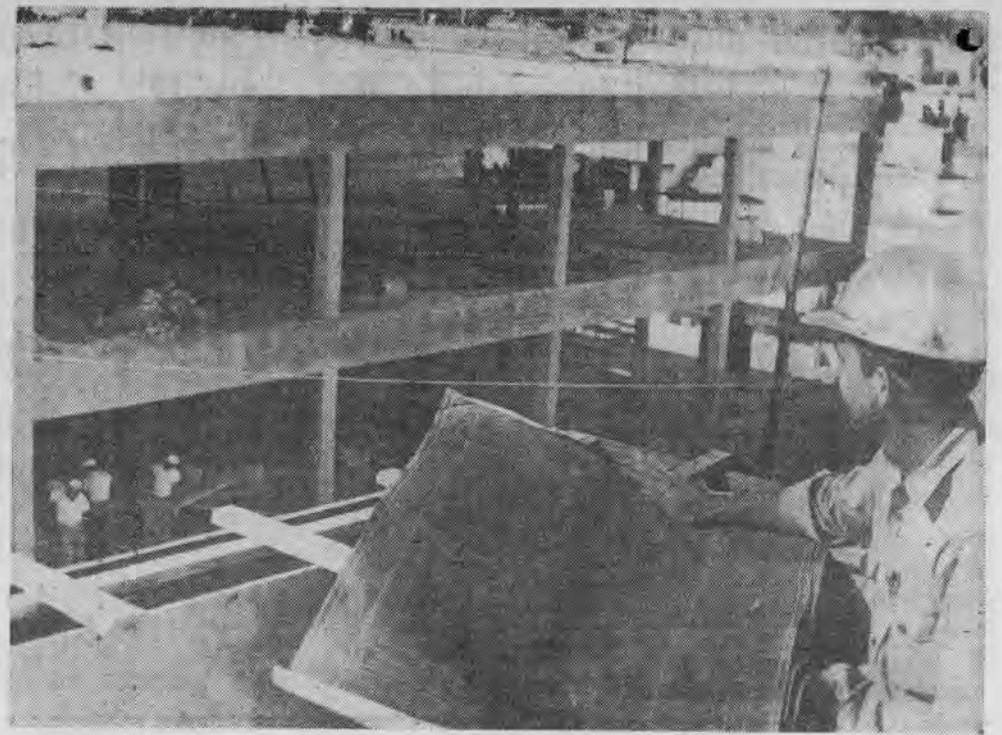
He used psychology. He pitted man against man.

"I decided to send up to Minneapolis and bring down a gang of Swedish carpenters and then I sent to New York to get some Italian laborers. I put them on one side," he said, telling how he built the Miami Biltmore Hotel in 1925. "On the other wing, I had Southern men from Georgia and points South.

"They were put in competition. So that's why the building was completed in record time.

"If the Southerners were lagging, I went over and said 'Hey! Are you going to let those damn Yankees beat you? I didn't have to say anything to the Yankees, they were pretty well keyed up on the issue."

The Italians and Swedes numbered about 150 men. So did the Southerners. They finished their wings under fierce competition and then worked

together on the tower.

There was no bonus, but the men were paid nine dollars a day.

Rodney Miller was then general foreman and general su-

perintendent for Thompson-Starratt builders. Today he's at his Coral Gables Federal Savings and Loan Association. He's been a senior vice president there since retiring from the building business in 1955.

"The Ku Klux Klan came to me," he recalled "and said, 'You'd better get rid of those

Italians. We don't want them here.'

"I told them I didn't think they (the Italians) were doing any harm. So I advised them (the Klan) to leave them alone. And they did."

And so a hotel, now the Veteran's Hospital, was built in record time.

### Room Rent Ordinance Up Again

ordinance passed on first reading Tuesday an owner of improved residential property in which he resides may rent as many as three rooms providing:

The property, alterations or additions were made prior to June 27, 1944 (the date of the anti-room renting ordinance).

Ownership must have been obtained prior to March 1, 1960.

An agreement must be made with the City that heirs, successors and assigns will not be passed on the right to rent.

Owners pay the City \$10 per year per unit.

No complaints were registered by neighbors within 300 feet.

The ordinance also sets up a hearing board, sometimes called a hardship board, to hear complaints.

A second reading is necessary for passage. Thirty days following that time are needed for the ordinance to go into effect.

### Cool, Man, Yeah, But It's Noisy

Coral Gables became one of the few communities in the country to attempt to control air conditioner noise when it passed an amending ordinance Tuesday.

The legislation had been recommended by Commissioner Joe Murphy over a year ago when complaints about noisy air conditioners began to mount in City Hall.

The former commission attempted to handle the complaints by using the existing zoning ordinance on noise, but City Manager L. W. Robinson Jr. reported reaching a dead end with recalcitrant noisy air conditioner owners when they failed to make changes.

Conditioners having a noise factor of more than 60 decibels will be considered too noisy. A decibel is a unit measurement of sound. A decibel measuring machine has been purchased by the City.

Only air conditioning units having a rating of 12,000 BTUs per hour or one-ton capacity are affected.

The ordinance also sets up the conditions for the measurement of sound.

A second reading and a 30-day waiting period is necessary before the ordinance becomes law.

Building permits for a total of 39 new homes costing \$9,980 to \$12,200 have been issued to F & R Homes Building Corp. in Southern Estates subdivision. Costs do not include land values.

The homes were designed by R. J. Schneider and Milton C. Harry.

### Goodbody I-Low Bidder On Bonds

Goodbody and Co. was selected by the City Commission Tuesday to handle its \$1 million capital improvement bond issue.

The money, \$981,491 after the \$18,509 premium had been deducted, will help finance the new library, a new bridge on Blue Road, parkway improvements, expansion of recreational facilities, extension of sanitary sewer facilities and street improvements in the downtown commercial area.

Goodbody was low bidder on the issue with an interest rate average of 3.87283 percent.

"It is the best and most advantageous to the city," Finance Director Kenneth Allyn said of the firm's bid.

A 3.4 percent interest rate will be paid between 1962 and 1975; 3.70 percent between 1976 and 1982; and 3.875 percent between 1983 and the 1986 maturity date.

There were five other bidders on the million-dollar bond. E. J. Van Ingen and John Luu-ween, 3.9497 percent; Robinson-Humphrey, 4.070689 percent.

Ira Happe and Co., 3.98444 percent; Pierce-Carrison-Wolbern, 3.9793; and Merrill Lynch Fenner and Smith, 3.96627 percent.

An emergency ordinance was passed by the City Commission to get the issue before the Circuit Court for validation as soon as possible.

Those are justified howls from area travel agents over the setting up of competition for them in the heart of the University of Miami campus. An airline ticket office is being established, threatening much of their student business.

But the evildoers here, it seems to The Times, are not the University but the airlines themselves. It is to them that the agents should look. For it is the airlines, not the University, who are committing the act against their own customers, i.e., the agents.

The problem is one in the larger context of how much, if any, business should be operated for students on the University campus. Until now the UM has wisely stayed out of this field. We believe intelligent talk from City officials here to the right parties on campus will maintain that tradition.

Meanwhile, the travel agents should direct their umbrage to the culprits, not the handmaidens.

Hot dog lovers everywhere—and we want our names prominent on the list—will agree with former Mayor Jack Montgomery's opinion that 35 cents is too much to pay for a hot dog (see story on page 1).

While his comment was made relative to the asking price at the just-concluded Gables Open golf tourney, we'd like to add our protest on the grounds that 35 cents is also too much when there is no tourney.

Most of us duffers labor under enough handicap on the golf course without being penalized on the 19th hole. Twenty-five cents is sufficient.

## A Straight Answer For Some Mushy Thinking

Well, sir, that was an interesting emotional outburst from Cardinal Cushing up Boston way the other day when he claimed that the city has been "betrayed and black-mailed across this country."

Subject of his complaint was that eye-opening, well-crafted CBS television documentary on how a bookie joint operated in Boston with the indulgent overlooking of the local police.

The Cardinal, addressing an audience at the annual policeman's ball, said he hasn't seen the film but, "I am not interested in seeing it. I am only interested in knowing who was behind it, who was responsible for it."

The Christian Science Monitor, an eminent journal published in the Cardinal's own city, answered him well and swiftly:

"Boston has indeed been 'betrayed' to the rest of the country. Not by CBS telecasters. The camera doesn't lie. Not by state troopers. They were on no false goose chase at Swartz's Key Shop.

"Not by political reform figures who dared to speak out about the city's shame and the state's shame.

"Boston was betrayed, all right. By the policemen photographed entering the key (and bookie) shop. And by those political leaders who sought to shrug off the matter; or who sought to make the reformers and investigators the goats for having dared to show the public how laws were being winked at.

"Few citizens doubt that a majority of the Boston police force is honest. But the taxpayers are not interested in hearing the kind of self-congratulation indulged in by their police commissioner and other leaders at the annual Policemen's Ball, when the commissioner has not even troubled to explain to the public why 10 members of his force were photographed entering an illegal gambling place..."

Local artist Bert Boucher, displays his best work to date, with a show of 25 drawings and paintings at Village Corner Gallery. The artist and his material must be understood before the true meaning of his message can come across.

Boucher, in his best work fixes his paper surface, which is sometimes wrinkled, with a wax base, his color drawing medium is thin crayon. For build-up texture effect, he then scratches with a blunt instrument. A lacquer is sometimes added to seal the wax.

Boucher's major works do not light up with gay color or allow you to use the adjective "beautiful"; rather, they are sensitive reflections of the artists' experience or imagination.

"Paris Remembrance" and "Remembrance of an After-

noon" use a dark background technique with the vibrations of light portraying the abstract figures. The situation of happy loneliness is well worked out.

The subject of love is delicately achieved in "Entangled." Two nude lovers in contemplation are placed in the foreground of a tapestry-like background of half circles.

"Conversation With the Night" is a show stopper. The vibrations, foreboding and eeriness of the nocturnal are captured in this painting. There's a dominating figure but not dominating to the degree that the city at sleep and the flickering of lights are allowed to prove it's scene valid.

If you've ever walked or awakened in the scary darkness of night, you'll find that you've been in this picture before.

He gets lost in the crowd, and if parochial politics and petty intrigue are felt in his school, he goes through the motions of teaching but is careful not to attract too much attention.

This way of doing can be, and often is, crushing in its results. If we persist in what eventual effect can we expect?

 While sitting here in the deep snows of New York I thought my fellow Gableites might be interested in knowing what a real winter is like.

But other developers had pulled it off while we slept and he was encouraged by their success. He was unfortunate in being last in line.

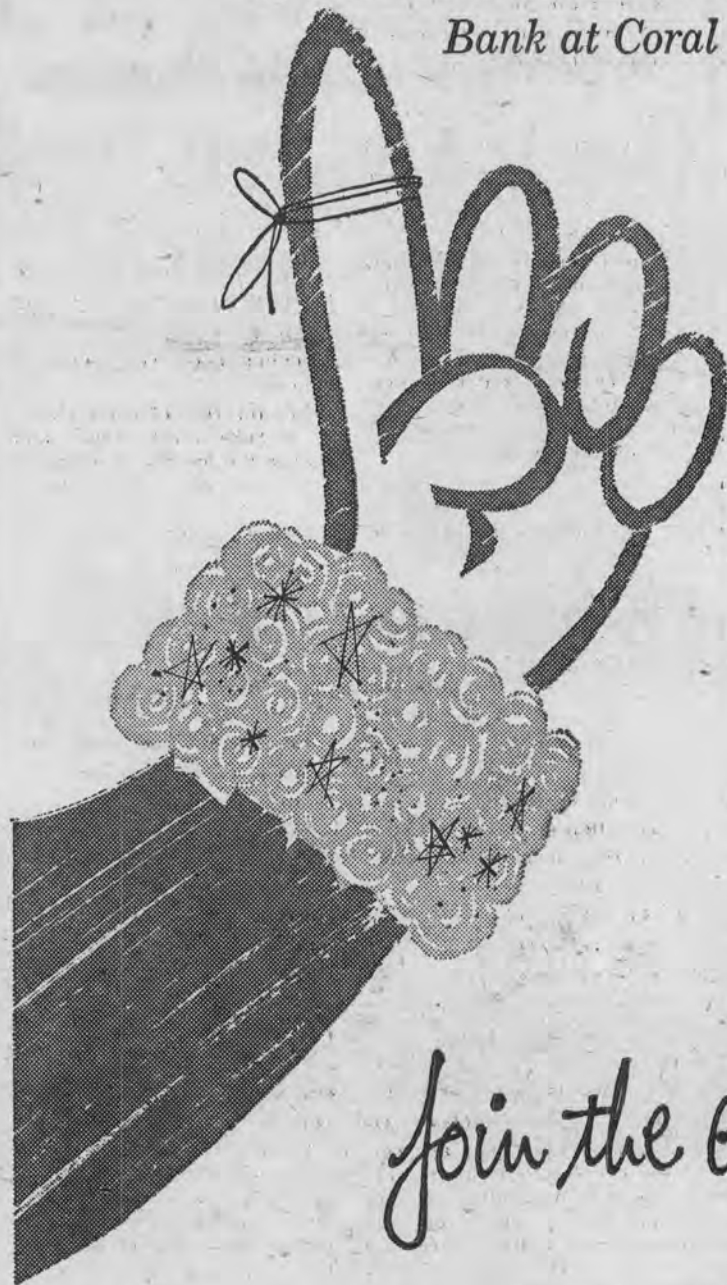

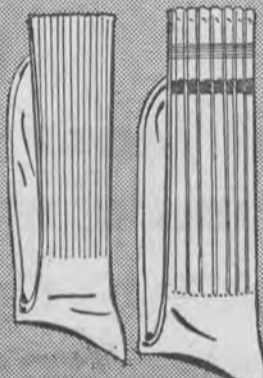

## Cuban Records in Gables And Police Knew It

The fact that a Cuban anti-Castro organization's records were once stored here was known to Coral Gables police, Chief William Kimbrough said Monday.

But beyond that Kimbrough had no comments on the legal battle between the various members of Democratic Revolutionary Front over the more than six tons of records.

Felix Gutierrez Fernandez, a Cuban millionaire, is seeking in Dade District Court to recover the records seized at 3155 Ponce de Leon Blvd. following the abortive April 1960 invasion of Cuba.

Judge Lucien C. Proby Jr., however has turned down Gutierrez.

"I intend to appeal the case," Owen Freed, Gutierrez' attorney, said Tuesday.

Gutierrez, who operated Kinleff Corp., an import-export business to Cuba, claims that his own business records are among the Front's papers, Freed said.

The plaintiff maintains he never belonged to the Front but allowed it to use his facilities.

Sheriff's deputies, armed with a warrant, raided the Ponce address last May 3, and seized the records.

Bert Burris, advertising consultant for the City of Coral Gables, accepted the award on behalf of the city.

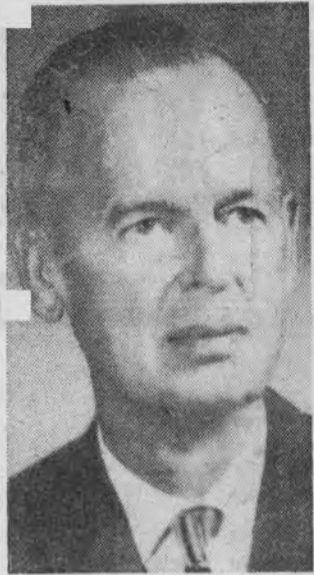

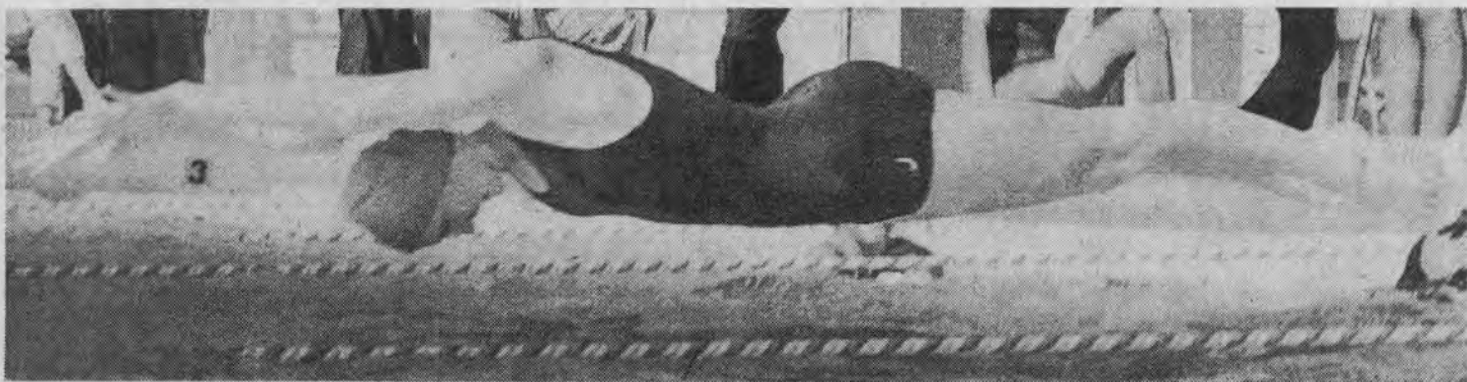

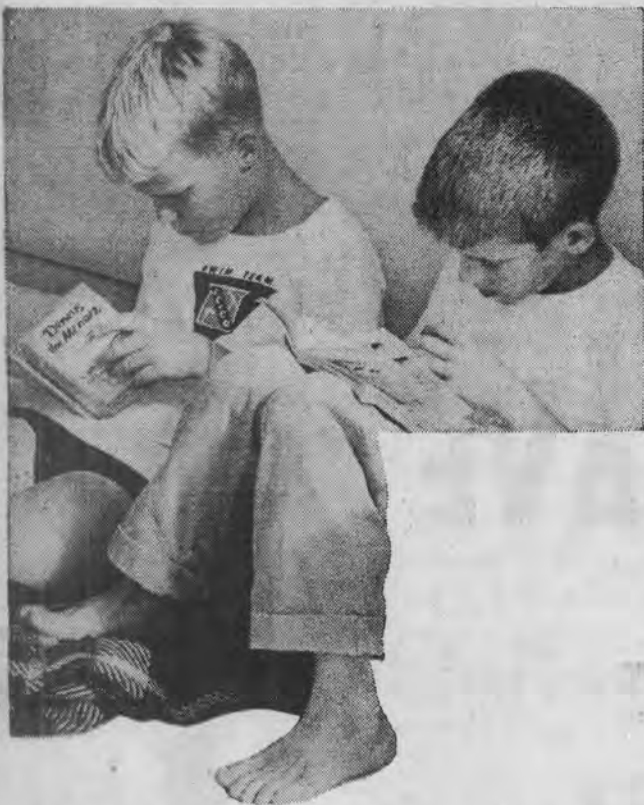

# Mailman's Christmas: He Barks At Wife But Brings Joy to Door

What does Christmas mean to your Coral Gables mailman? It means hard work.

He's one of about 65 carriers. He'll work 84 hours a week, without a day off, for about two weeks. Our carriers will deliver some 80,000 pieces of mail each day.

"It means that you get up at 3:30 in the morning, eat, dress and shave and get here by 4:30 a.m. And then you work 12 hours a day, seven days a week.

"And when you get home, you're worn out and frazzled," said Kenneth Knable, superintendent of the Coral Gables Branch of the Post Office.

"You eat your supper and go to bed. Then your alarm clock rings and it's another day. And it's no real pleasure at all."

Knable said it's the mailman's job to work about 84 hours during Christmas season. He usually works five days a week, but he'll now have to work seven to deliver all the cards and packages Gableites will mail.

By working seven days a week, less substitute carriers (12) will be hired. This means the more experienced regular carrier can do the job better and faster.

A Gables mailman is paid anywhere from \$4,345 to \$5,305 a year. He gets time-and-a-half for overtime.

"It's rough on the family," said Knable, a postal employee for more than 36 years and a husband for 30 years.

"You don't get to see them (your family) and if you do you bark at them. You lose all contact.

"Now the wife, she's got to be a very understanding woman. And she has to assume all the responsibility for the children at Christmas."

But Knable said that a mailman has a very special reward. It helps to ease hours of long work and time away from the family.

"I think he gets a personal

satisfaction. People know the mailman's coming and they're expecting something. And the kids run out to meet him.

"Somebody's waiting for him. I think he gets a big boost out of that."

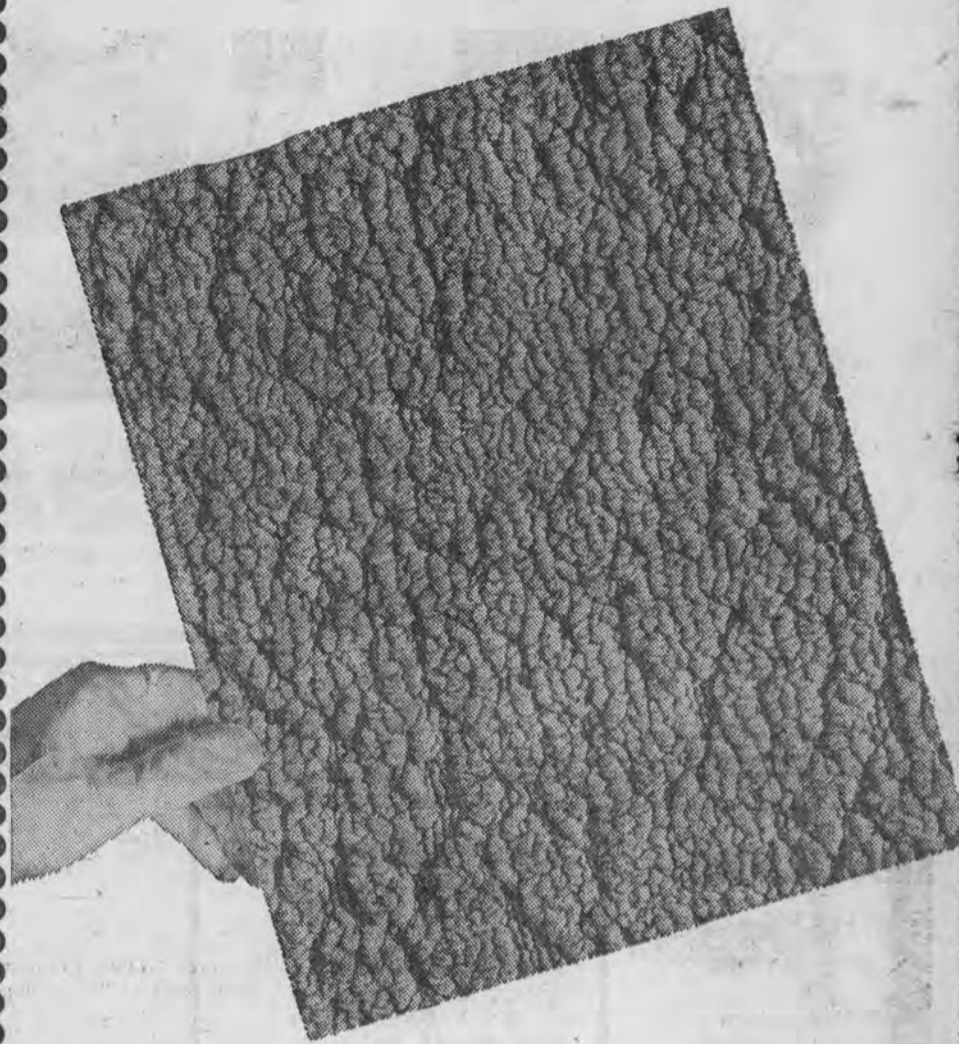

# Over Oysters and Fruit Salad He Tells Us Why He Did It

The transaction which a few weeks ago created the largest lumber company in Florida was accomplished with surprising ease says Denis V. Renuart, one of its chief architects.

"We all knew each other well. We all trusted each other. We'd had appraisals made by reputable firms.

There just wasn't anything to disagree over."

The result was the formation of Renuart-Bailey-Cheely Lumber & Supply Co. with Babelite Denis Renuart 1221 Mariola Ct., chairman of the board.

Over a luncheon of blue point oysters and fruit salad last week, he freely discussed Renuart the businessman, Renuart the man and Renuart the grandfather (22 grandchildren).

Sales of the combine will be upward of \$10 million annually. Each of the three companies had a healthy multi-million business of its own as an independent, why unite?

"There's the economic advantage of centralized book-keeping and other shared overhead," answered Renuart. He dipped an oyster in the hot sauce.

"But the biggest advantage is in mass purchasing. We can get better prices in the vol-

ume we'll be buying." He nodded to an acquaintance who'd just come into the Miami Club dining room.

"You asked me if we weren't the first lumber yard in the Gables. That's true. We're still the only one.

"I grew up in the province of Manitoba, Canada, and came down here in 1923 with my dad, who'd seen the area on vacation, and my wife and three children. Within a year or two six other brothers had joined us.

"Our first yard was on Alhambra Circle where the hembra company is now. Lumber was being delivered by wagon when we came in Coral Gables was only two years old.

"You may not believe it but land prices were higher then than they are now. We had a lot of fun building houses for George Merrick.

"I guess the greatest thrill I had was right after World

War II. Dad had been ill for a couple years and we weren't even allowed to discuss the business with him. We'd moved the yard from Alhambra out on Ponce de Leon where it is now and he'd never known it.

"One day we decided it was time to tell him. We took him in an ambulance over to the new place. He couldn't believe it. He looked at it and gave us that approval we'd been waiting for. It was a great day for us."

Renuart, who will be 61 in January, has two of his four sons in business with him. His other two children, both girls, are married.

Traveling is one of his chief

hobbies and one he hopes to do more of in a few years.

We were down to coffee and apple pie by now.

How did the merger of these three companies suggest itself? "We'd known each other individually for years and talked about our problems. One day, somebody suggested, 'Why don't we go together.' We all liked the idea and that's how it happened."

## Inertia Hurts Latins--Beyer

Inertia is one of the biggest problems in the way of development in Latin America, Dr. Robert C. Beyer, professor of Hispanic - American History, told People to People Program members recently.

"If the people themselves do nothing, nothing is done," said Dr. Beyer, who recently spent some time in Colombia studying the Community Development Program — a joint effort of some firms and the government.

Whereas the idea of community development is second nature to us, Dr. Beyer said, in Latin America it is very weak.

But Dr. Beyer saw hope in the community development program well underway in many areas of Colombia.

"I could feel excitement in that community," he said of an area near Cartagena, Coral Gables' sister city in the People to People exchange program.

A similar program has worked well in India and the Philippines, Dr. Beyer said, and if it does not run down in Colombia great things may be accomplished there.

The UM professor said in the past the central government had been depended upon to provide activity.

Colombia has been held back by a bloody civil war between the Conservatives and Liberals in which an estimated 300,000 deaths have occurred. Other problems have included land reforms, social and economic unrest.

Dr. Beyer is the first of a series of speakers scheduled to address the People to People Program members.

## People Plan May Expand Its Scope

Members of the Coral Gables People to People Program Tuesday discussed the desirability of expanding their contacts to include people from all walks of life.

Contacts discussed would also be enlarged to include other than social and cultural ones which have characterized past meetings with citizens from Coral Gables sister city of Cartagena, Colombia.

The proposals were put forth Tuesday by Robert Kingsley, past president, and Mrs. Dorothy Hosken, secretary, after the group read an editorial by the mayor of Cartagena calling for more "little" people to people contacts.

The collection of 11 gross pencils and 5,000 sheets of writing paper and the possible addition of two sewing machines by the Coral Gables Woman's Club to be sent down with a school vehicle was reported at the meeting.

Funds for the vehicle are still being solicited by the group. It will be used for school transportation.

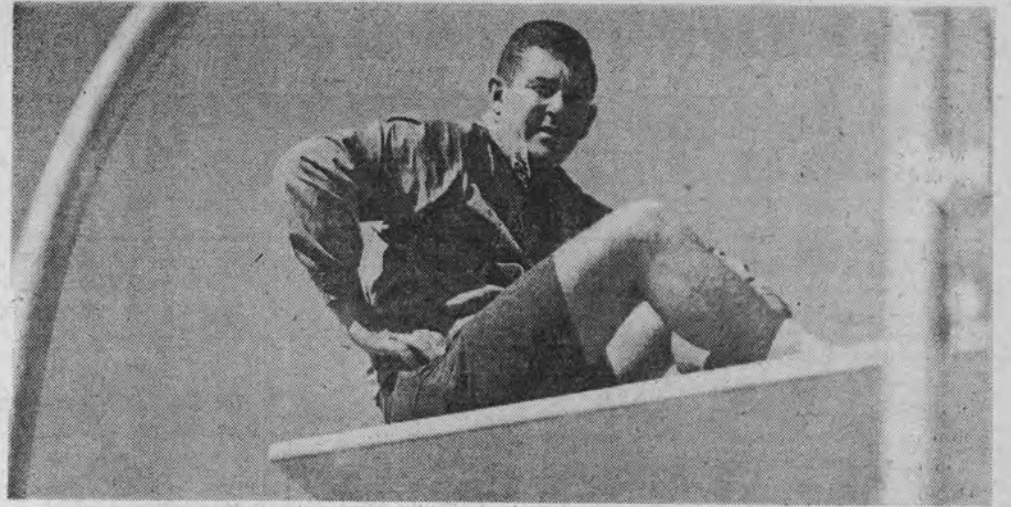
After the club had interviewed him four times and studied his background, notably his work as athletic director for SHAPE (Supreme Headquar-

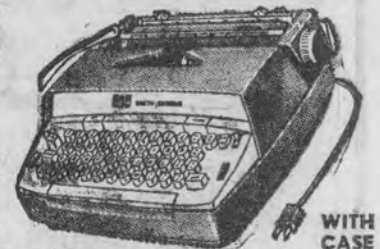

# Consumers Appeals Rate Decision; Could Affect You

Consumers Water Company decided to fight South Miami in District Court of Appeals following a lower court decision which upheld that city's right to lower water rates.

The case could result in lower rates for Coral Gables and the county area adjacent to both the Gables and South Miami served by Consumers. This is because the District Court ruled that South Miami had a right to set its rates based on a system-wide survey of profits.

"The decision has been made to appeal," said Ed Kellermann, Consumers vice president, Tuesday. "We were not and are not satisfied with South Miami's position."

City Attorney Ted Semple said this week that he will have report to the City Commission next Monday which will outline the City's legal posture.

Metro, meanwhile, has not taken up the decision, according to Assistant County Manager Hoke Welch, a Gables resident.

Welch said that he will bring the case to the Commission's attention for its Dec. 19 meeting.

Kellerman said Tuesday that much of the company's appeal will pivot around the report of Frank Kelly, court-appointed master who ruled in favor of Consumers, but was overruled by Circuit Judge Joe Eaton.

South Miami in 1958 lowered Consumers' minimum from \$1.50 to \$1.40 after the company has sought to increase rates.

Consumers got an injunction and went to court to prove it was entitled to more money.

A three-year fight resulted with victory for South Miami in Circuit Court.

In 1959, a few months after Consumers sought a South Miami increase, it also sought to increase rates in Coral Gables of 17 per cent and jumped the minimum in the County area it served from \$1.50 to \$1.80.

The Gables City Commission ordered the company to show cause why the rates should be increased, but the matter never came to a head as Metro moved in to purchase General Waterworks Corp. and its Consumers holdings for \$7.1 million and proposed an ordinance freezing rates at the existing level.

Negotiations later broke down and South Miami's suit remained a barrier in the way of increased rates.

## CD Main Job For Harrison

The appointment of Robert Harrison to be assistant city manager is primarily a Civil Defense job, City Manager L. W. Robinson Jr. explained recently.

Harrison's main function will remain personnel director and the City Commission may still appoint acting city managers from time to time in Robinson's absence to carry on regular administrative duties, the city manager said.

Finance Director Kenneth Allyn served in that capacity over the weekend following his appointment by the Commission.

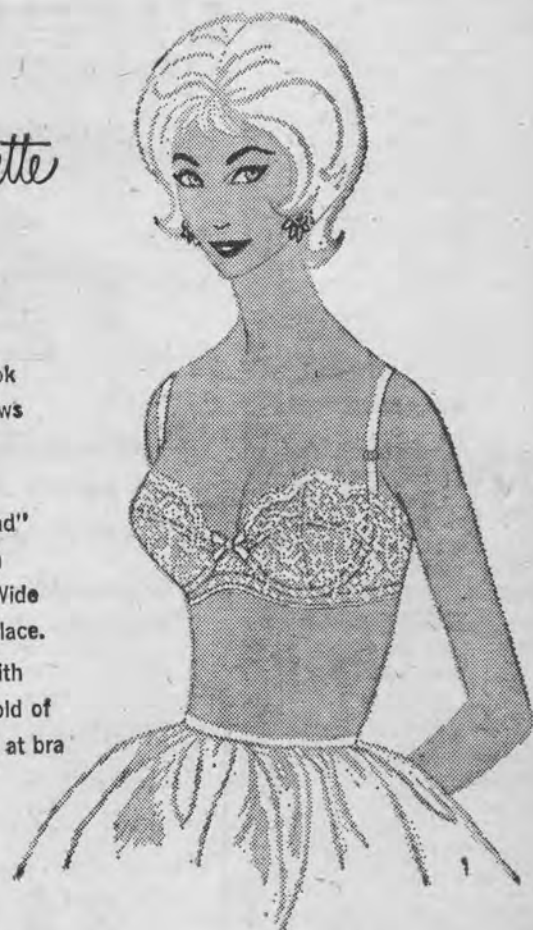

The seasonal service will be accompanied by the string quartet from the University.

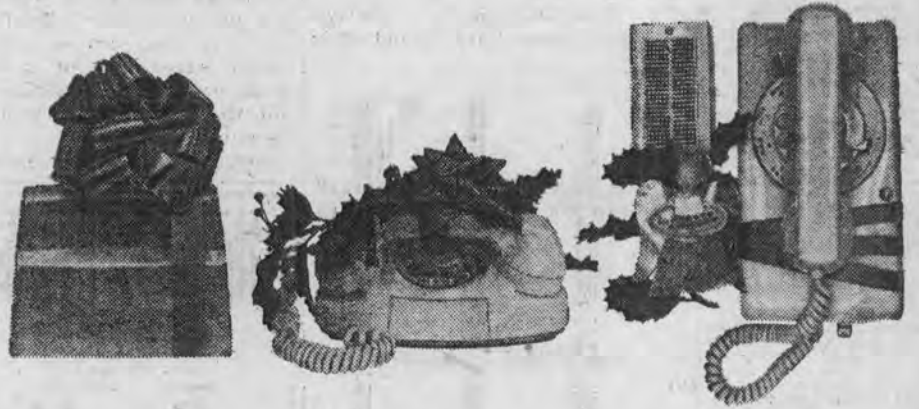

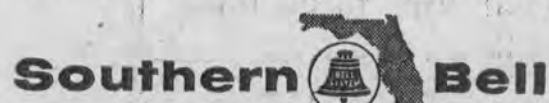
