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



The physician has been battling for six years with the IRS since he began his fight against communism by at tacking American leaders from the President on down whenever they act in behalf of communism, she said.



There must be some sense of satisfaction, if not exhaustion, this week among that valiant and persistent band of protagonists who finally have stirred some action over the Metro tax roll mess.

Due most of the credit, of course, is former Coral Gables Tax Assessor Tommy Blount.

For more months than he probably wants to remember, Blount has cried loud and long that inequities - and possibly collusion - exists in the suspect Metro tax roll.

Few would listen. Most simply characterized Blount as a hysterical anti-Metro propogandist whose interests extended only to preserving his job.

Mr. Blount is more sincere than that. Further, he is one of the longtime professionals in tax assessing in this county.

What makes this so peculi-ar, like a good many of the other attacks on private busi-ness by government, is that government-owned utilities (like the water company) are so poorly operated that they cannot exist without continuous rate increases.

Florida Power and Yet Light (like a good many pri-vate utilities) has never had a rate increase, and continrecord prosperity ues through small management. \* \* through smart, tight-fisted

IF THE average homeown er who pays his utility bills would stop and think:

Government-owned utill-ties pay no taxes and continto raise rates simply to ue keen the front door open.

Privately - owned utilities pay in this county millions of dollars a year in taxes (which buy and support parks and other government services) and make money for their stockholders without a single rate increase.

It's no secret that Metro, for example, has the author-ity under Article 1, Section 14, to take over all utilities in this county.,

If anyone for a minute thinks that would be a bargain, look at the record.

No government service repeat, none — has ever been operated efficiently or profitably and exists solely on the arbitrary and unilatdecisions of increased eral taxes.

If, for example, the trend of government ownership in community service continues into utilities, for example
the average taxpayer is going to lose the benefit of taxes which are paid by these corporations, and face the prospect of even (1)higher user rates and (2) added personal taxes to to make up for the lost fran-chise and property taxes of the corporations.



# **Kids Milk the Most Out Of Udder Nonsense for Dairies**

The scrawled writing and crude drawings of a batch of South Dade children are paving a golden road to success for a multi-million-dollar dairy campaign for Florida's largest advertising agency.

Around the maze of corridors that is the advertising complex of Bishopric, Green and Fielden, there are nothbut pleased 'Oooohs,' and 'Ahhhs' over the stroke of genius in their campaign for the Southeast Florida Dairy Institute's milk campaign.

You've heard the slogan, "It's Too Good To Be Just For The Young." And you've probably seen those cute, little tykes painting cows and such on a wall.

Now, South Dade children — as well as elementary school children everywhere --- are finding their own lit-tle slogans and drawings done in a child's inimitable scratch hand, . . . find-ing themselves in major newspapers ads singing the laurels of milk.

"The idea developed over the past two years of the campaign when some people would send in their kids' drawings and say 'Why don't you guys wake up and use these,'" explained Jack Green, one of the agency's brains.

"You've heard our slogan - 'It's Too Good To Be Just For The Young.' We thought we'd get some children in-volved.

"It was a natural. Kids and milk and cows.

Some 30 posters were sub-mitted by children, and this was slimmed to about 12 for advertising use.

For example, eight-year-old Terry Brown drew 'I Like Milk Because (he misspelled 'because' and it was left that way) It Makes Me Strong.' He also hacked Strong.' He also hacked 'strong' to death and it remained just that way.

And Kim Foster, also eight, chicken-scratched that "You Can Buy Milk at Any Store . . Milk Will Help Make You Grow Strong." To hammer home her point, she drew a picture of a little girl — the kind every school kid draws — with a dress that looked more like a kite, sev-eral strands of hair shooting straight up and in pointed shoes.

"Primarily, it's very honest," Green said, rolling back his swivel chair, perhaps in his mind numbering all the cartons of milk ringing up on a register.

"It's uninhibited. We had one kid who drew Super Cow with a veil and another one who said 'Don't Cry over Spilt Milk.'"


Both Green and Ruth Kassewitz, account supervisor with the Veen Corporation, the public relations firm working with Green, agreed that the very simple beauty of these poster drawings take parents back to the days when they were young.

"This attracts attention and it's nostalgic," Mrs. Kas-sewitz pointed out. "Kids and dogs and cows always draw attention.

"I think it's got charm. People can relate to it be-cause they can remember when they were children and did it."
