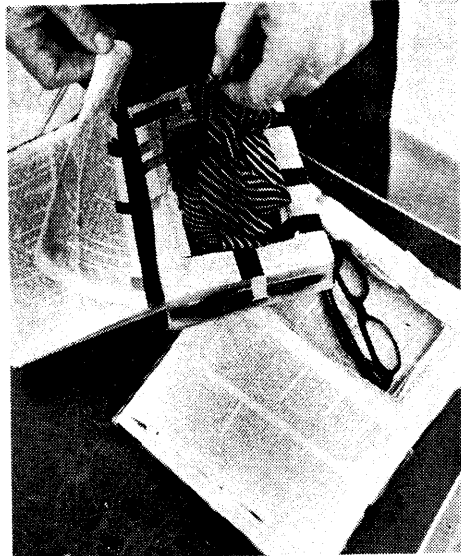

'Pigeon Drop' Con Game Here

 South Florida's warm winter has brought with it the con artists and their pigeon drop game, Coral Gables police reported this week.

Gables detectives said that a Gables woman who lives on Sidonia Avenue was their first report this season of the smooth game devoted to seeing a gullible person come to a smooth parting of her money.

But the Gabelite, perhaps sensing something was up, walked off just in time.

She was walking along the 1300 Block of Ponce de Leon Boulevard when a woman approached her and ask if she knew of an available apartment.

Casually, the woman opened her purse, exposing several large bills and said she had \$10,000 in it.

Moments later, a Negro woman came up with a Manila envelope, which she said she had just found. She also exposed several large bills and said she had counted \$53,000 in it.

At this time the Gables woman walked off and the pigeon drop failed to get its bird.

What was supposed to happen, Gables police said, is that the two women were to suggest that they and the Gabelite split the \$53,000 in the Manila envelope.

To insure her silence, the Gables woman — if she had fallen for it — was to put several thousands dollars as collateral that the money find would be their secret.

The woman who approached her about the apartment and supposedly had \$10,000 with her would give her fair share; also the victim was to hand over her deposit several days later

and would receive an envelope, with her share.

She would open the envelope, police said, and find it empty. She'd be swindled out of her money.

Taxes 'Freedom' Phone Here Not in Tiff

Let Freedom Ring's line is still busy and is not involved with the Internal Revenue Department, Mrs. **Mary Gacek**, local director said following publication of a United Press International story in The Miami Herald.

The problem was with the headline and not with the story which correctly told how **Dr. William C. Douglass**, a Sarasota doctor and national director for the recorded message had been ordered by the IRS to make his personal income tax records available, something he has refused to do.

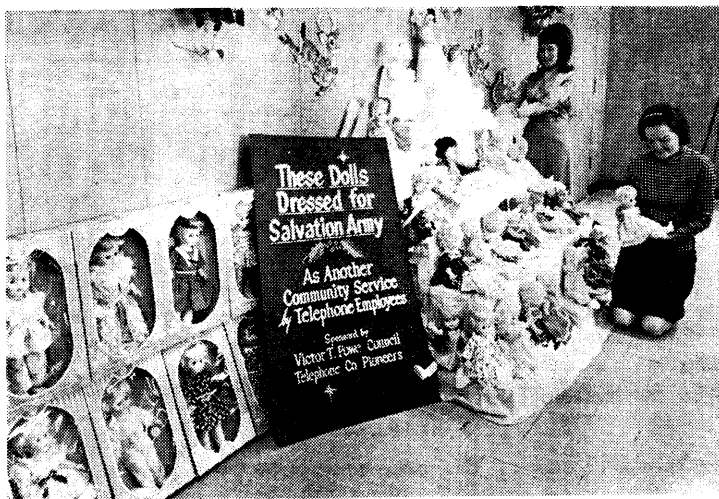
"I tried to talk him out of it," said Mrs. Gacek of a conversation she had with **Dr. Douglass** some months ago in which he told her of his plan to file a blank personal income tax form in protest to the use of American funds to help communist countries.

"He'd be better off supporting the Liberty Amendment," said Mrs. Gacek of the proposed constitutional amendment that would repeal the income tax as the backbone of federal power and revenue.

"This is entirely a personal thing with **Dr. Douglass**," said Mrs. Gacek, "and has nothing to do with Let Freedom Ring."

The physician has been battling for six years with the IRS since he began his fight against communism by attacking American leaders from the President on down whenever they act in behalf of communism, she said.

Unlike another anti-communist crusader, **Billy James Hargis**, who has had his tax exemption lifted recently by the IRS for alleged lobbying by legislation, Let Freedom Ring has never claimed tax exemption and operates at a financial loss, according to Mrs. Gacek.

There must be some sense of satisfaction, if not exhaustion, this week among that valiant and persistent band of protagonists who finally have stirred some action over the Metro tax roll mess.

Due most of the credit, of course, is former Coral Gables Tax Assessor Tommy Blount.

For more months than he probably wants to remember, Blount has cried loud and long that inequities — and possibly collusion — exists in the suspect Metro tax roll.

Few would listen. Most simply characterized Blount as a hysterical anti-Metro propogandist whose interests extended only to preserving his job.

Mr. Blount is more sincere than that. Further, he is one of the longtime professionals in tax assessing in this county.

What Mr. Blount has been saying for months is now being investigated by Circuit Court and, miracle of miracles, by the Metro Commission itself, that last to wake up.

We suspect that what will be ultimately uncovered will be the biggest tax assessing mess this county has ever seen. There are those who will picture the mess as the result of an overworked, misunderstood staff.

We think not.

Regardless, several thousand taxpayers — who are carrying the burden of the untaxed and the under-assessed — owe Mr. Blount at least a word of thanks for not giving up.

We should be thankful, first, for the peace that we know in our homes, and the blessings of being able to enjoy our homes.

The Irony Mr. High Now Faces

The ironies of life never fail to amaze me.

Something of a new irony must have been set here in our county when the Miami Water Department came hat in hand before Miami Mayor Robert King High and the rest of the Miami city commission and said, quite frankly, it needs a rate increase to make ends meet.

If your memory isn't too short, you'll remember it was Mr. High and the rest of the City Commission which has been whacking away at Florida Power and Light Company for months, finally getting a rate cut, and now trying to find a way to get more profit trimmed from the power company.

What makes this so peculiar, like a good many of the other attacks on private business by government, is that government-owned utilities (like the water company) are so poorly operated that they cannot exist without continuous rate increases.

Yet Florida Power and Light (like a good many private utilities) has never had a rate increase, and continues record prosperity through smart, tight-fisted management.

IF THE average homeowner who pays his utility bills would stop and think:

Government-owned utilities pay no taxes and continue to raise rates simply to keep the front door open.

Privately-owned utilities pay in this county millions of dollars a year in taxes (which buy and support parks and other government services) and make money for their stockholders without a single rate increase.

It's no secret that Metro, for example, has the authority under Article 1, Section 14, to take over all utilities in this county.

If anyone for a minute thinks that would be a bargain, look at the record.

No government service — repeat, none — has ever been operated efficiently or profitably and exists solely on the arbitrary and unilateral decisions of increased taxes.

If, for example, the trend of government ownership in community service continues — into utilities, for example — the average taxpayer is going to lose the benefit of taxes which are paid by these corporations, and face (1) the prospect of even higher user rates and (2) added personal taxes to make up for the lost franchise and property taxes of the corporations.

What's City Doing Printing Anyway?

Currently attracting more attention than some of its councilmen would like is a hassle involving the City of South Miami, its City Manager Roland Eastwood — and some printing.

It seems that the City Manager is a pigeon fancier (did the Council know this when it hired him?) and is accused of having taken advantage of his position to use the city's printing press to print 30 or 40 pages of a pigeon fancier's book.

Among those who have any interest in the matter at all, which seems to be pretty few, opinion seems to be divided roughly into two groups — one would throw the city manager out, and the other takes a sort of noble oblige attitude about the whole business.

AS A MINORITY of a minority, to me there is another question at least equal in importance to the legality and/or morality of the pigeon printing.

Why is the City in the printing business anyway?

A quick look at the classified ads shows that there are several printers in South

Miami, paying rent, occupational licenses and taxes.

If the City needs printing — and it seems to have been getting more than it wanted — why not let the local firms bid on it, or let contracts annually?

THE STOCK answer given in questions of this sort is that it's cheaper; saves the taxpayers' money. Presumably it would be given in this case also.

On the records, perhaps it does. Of course the pigeon book doesn't show up on the records, or at least it wasn't supposed to.

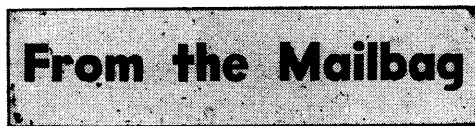
But the money which makes the city go has to come from the people who live and work in it, and it would seem that the citizens ought to be free from competition by the city.

Any governmental body has certain advantages over a private institution within its jurisdiction.

First, the government collects taxes; the private business pays them.

Furthermore, the private business has to make a profit to continue existence, the government operations frequently take pride in the fact that they lose money, which they can do only by use of the protection racket called tax increase.

Maybe the city ought to get rid of the printing press and keep the manager.

Law Library Idea Deferred

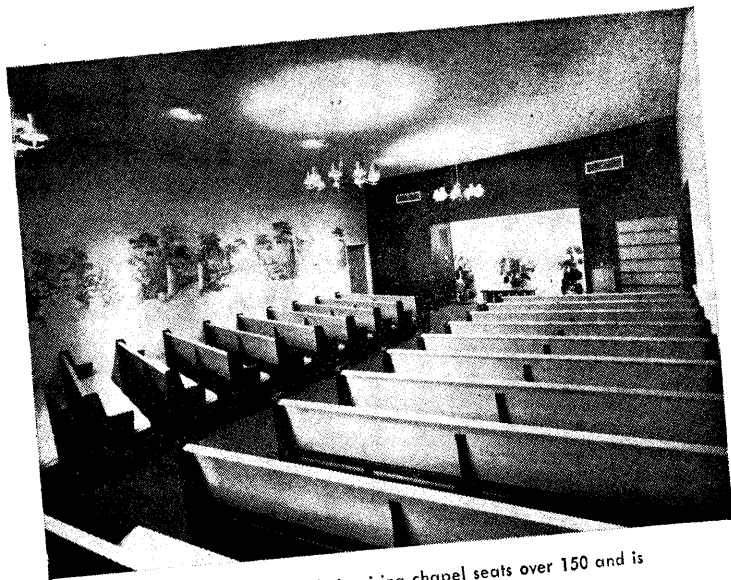
The proposal to include a law library in the new Coral Gables Public Library has been deferred by the City Commission until a report is received from its consultant.

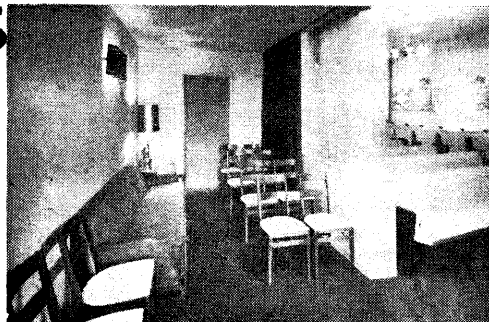

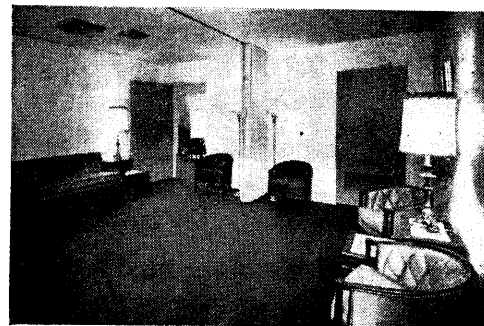

"We contribute to the Minister's Fund and other church projects, but we are basically a group of retired people who meet each Thursday morning to do something we all like to do," said Mrs. Dailey.

Everything the Club uses to make its toys is donated by local merchants. "Economy Awning Supply Company saves all their scrap material for us and Dawson Furniture Company gives us all their old cushions to use for stuffing our animals. About all we buy are needles, pins, thread and other small necessities," she said.

The scrawled writing and crude drawings of a batch of South Dade children are paving a golden road to success for a multi-million-dollar dairy campaign for Florida's largest advertising agency.

Around the maze of corridors that is the advertising complex of Bishopric, Green and Fielden, there are nothing but pleased 'Oooohs,' and 'Ahhhs' over the stroke of genius in their campaign for the Southeast Florida Dairy Institute's milk campaign.

To hammer home her point, she drew a picture of a little girl — the kind every school kid draws — with a dress that looked more like a kite, several strands of hair shooting straight up and in pointed shoos.

"Primarily, it's very honest," Green said, rolling back his swivel chair, perhaps in his mind numbering all the cartons of milk ringing up on a register.

"It's uninhibited. We had one kid who drew Super Cow with a veil and another one who said 'Don't Cry over Spilt Milk.'"

Both Green and Ruth Kasewitz, account supervisor with the Vein Corporation, the public relations firm working with Green, agreed

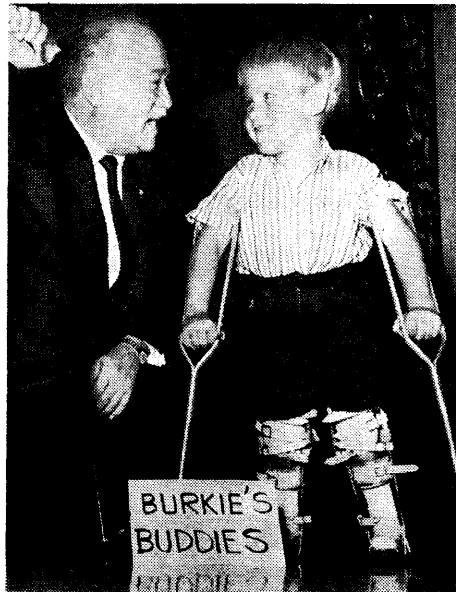
that the very simple beauty of these poster drawings take parents back to the days when they were young.

How's your "buenos dias" these days? Do you have a yen to brush up on your Spanish? Here's an unusual opportunity, if you act fast.

Mrs. Beatrice Peskoe, president of the American Youth Exchange here, needs just five families in the Southwest section (or anywhere, for that matter) who would like to throw open their doors in January to five young Latin boys.

The welcome mat is being spread for these youngsters as part of the continuing program that AYE has carried out the last seven years of bringing up high school age Latin kids to live with American families and find out all about the "Yan-ful life."

In exchange, each year a

group of American youngsters are scattered throughout the 21 countries of Latin America for a most unusual 10 weeks during their summer vacation.

Because the Latin school vacation starts in January, they are invited up from January until the end of March. U.S. kids start their trek down south during June, so regular school is not interrupted.

Mrs. Peskoe, whose vitality and enthusiasm for the project shines through when she speaks, is placing about 175

students from seven countries this year. They are being sent to 16 states.

"It isn't necessary for us to place as many kids here as in other parts of the States that do not have much Latin influence. For that reason, our quota here is quite low. But we do need those five families."

The application blanks the students anxious to come for a look-see to the States have filled out list their hobbies, interests, and other family information which will help the director here place them in congenial homes. These kids have a strong sense of responsibility, and the directors down



Following a wedding trip to San Juan, Puerto Rico, the couple will live in Gainesville, Fla.

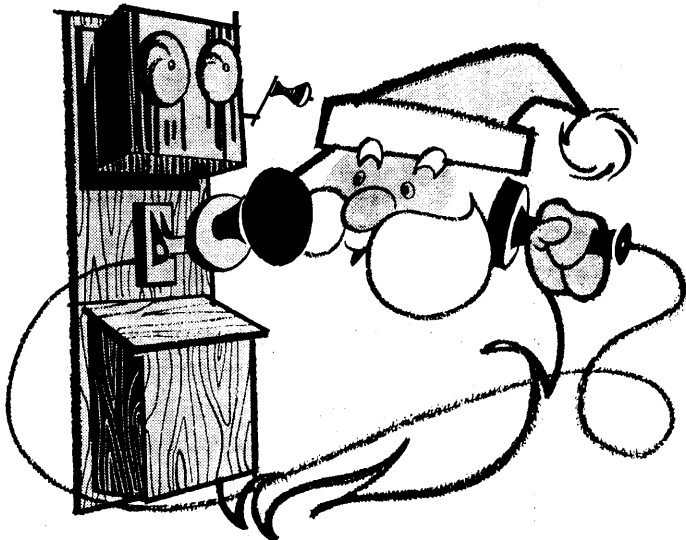


