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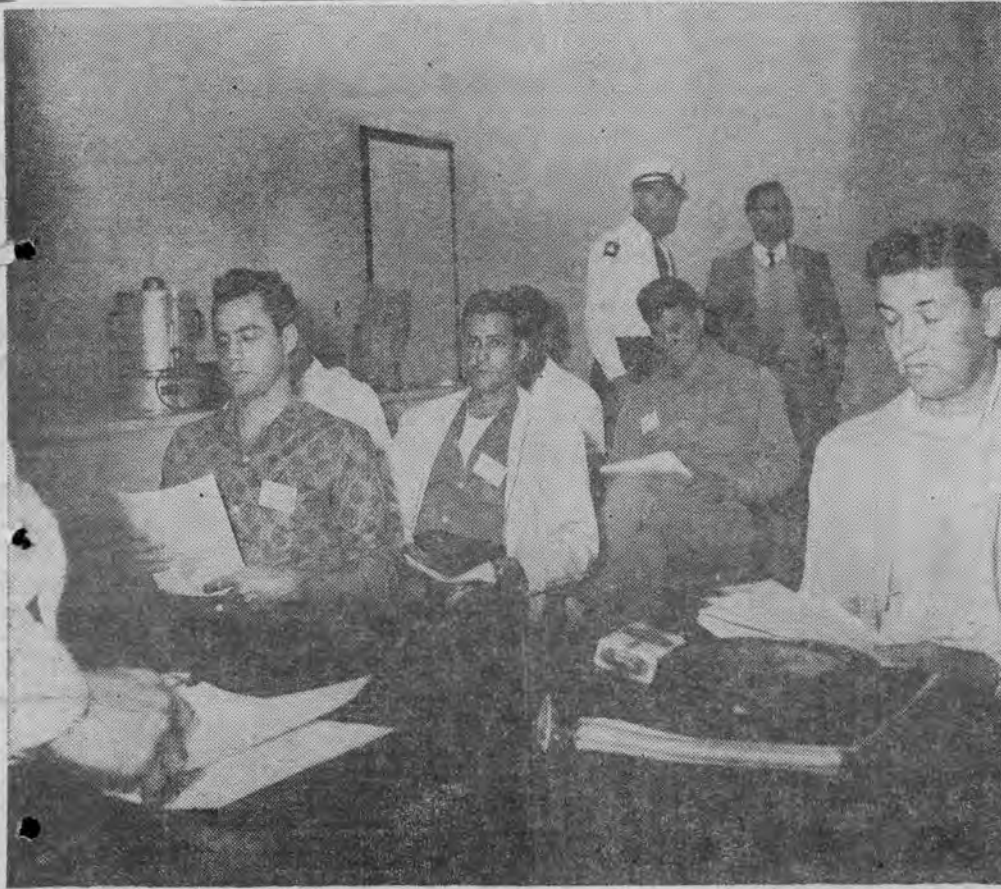

Six Weeks Program

Coral Gables Trains 18 New Firemen

Eighteen new firemen reported for duty recently for indoctrination and training at Coral Gables' soon to be completed fire station on South Dixie Hwy.

Chief Paul Matheson, Capt. Ralph Boartfield, training officer, and Personnel Director Robert Harrison briefed the men on their duties and responsibilities.

Construction of the new fire station itself is expected to be completed in a few days.

The 18 new men will undergo an extensive six-week basic training program before being assigned to various fire companies.

To Be Assigned

The lucky ones will be assigned to the plush new quarter of a million dollar station, the others will go to the old station at Salzedo and Aragon.

Following a six-month probationary period, the men will be regularly assigned. They may quit or be released at any time prior to this without recourse.

Employment of the 18 new men and expansion of the Fire Department to two stations will create openings for three new lieutenants.

Woman Leaves Apartment Sale Proceeds To UM

The University of Miami has been presented with proceeds of the sale of an apartment building from the estate of the late Mrs. Myrtle Taylor Bradford, pioneer Miami art patron.

The \$25,000 gift presented Friday, Feb. 10, to UM president Jay F. W. Pearson by J. McGibben Brown and Robert Draper, trustees for the estate, will be used to establish the Myrtle Taylor Bradford Memorial Art Scholarship Fund for UM students.

Mrs. Bradford died Dec. 12, 1958. Her will specified that Brown and Draper should determine if the Coronado Apartments building, 249 NE 17th Ter., was suitable for use as a museum for the Miami Art League. If not, the building was to be sold and the proceeds donated to the University for the specific fund.

The trustees, both former presidents of the Miami Art League, decided conversion of the building to a museum was not economically feasible.

Ceremonies To Dedicate Seven Schools In Area

A total of 13 schools, seven in this area, will be dedicated in two separate evenings of ceremonies Feb. 28 and March 7 at the schools.

According to the Dade County School Board, the 13 schools, were all constructed during the last two years.

Total cost of the new schools is \$8,276,425, with 7876 pupils attending in 328 classrooms.

On each of the two evenings,

the programs will begin at the schools at 8 p.m. From 8:15 to 8:30 p.m. Dr. Joe Hall, Superintendent of Schools, will speak to each of the schools' dedication programs via television channel 2.

With Dr. Hall will be a pupil from each of the schools who will give information about his or her school.

Following the telecast, a 30-minute program will be held at each school in which a member of the school board will speak briefly.

No Parking, South Miami Council Objects

South Miami Council Tuesday night, Feb. 21, turned down a seven-story, 102 unit hotel in the heart of the business district because no off-street parking was provided.

Overriding the city's Planning and Zoning Board, the city fathers unanimously denied an appeal from realtor-investor Norm Kutner to build the hotel on the southwest corner of Sunset Dr. and SW 58th Ct., one block from South Dixie Highway and two blocks from Red Road.

"I think the city has cut its own throat," said Kutner, following the denial. "This hotel would have done a lot for the city's business district. Parking is impossible to get. If I did get it, the cost of the hotel rooms would be exorbitant."

Kutner said he would abandon the hotel now and concentrate on other ventures.

"Whoever heard of a hotel having to provide parking?", Kutner asked following the meeting. "Even if I said I would go out and try to get some parking, the land owners around there would jack up the price way out of proportion."

Speaking in behalf of Kutner at the meeting was H. J. Hoodwin, a consulting engineer, who said that the hotel would provide about 200 more people a day for South Miami businesses.

Hoodwin said the hotel would be 70 by 116 feet in size and contain some 17 units per floor from the second through the seventh floor.

The ground floor would contain a lobby, service and dining areas and small retail shops.

"There is a terrific demand for a hotel in South Miami," Hoodwin told the Council, "especially since most people have moved away from the cities to shopping areas."

He added that he believes most of those using the hotel would be people who would not feel the need for a car.

Hoodwin said that financing for the hotel is available without parking and for this reason didn't feel the city would require parking.

Southwest YMCA Dedicates Building On Sunday

Southwest YMCA, formerly housed in rented quarters in Coral Gables and South Miami, dedicated its first building at 3 p.m. Sunday.

Permanent headquarters is a two-story structure on 10 undeveloped acres owned by Southwest "Y" at 4300 SW 58th Ave.

The "Y" moved from its last rented site at 4040 Red Road to the new site about a month ago.

Ready To Begin

"We've been squaring things away during the last month," said Southwest "Y's" executive director John Barber, "and we're ready now to show off the new building."

The service of dedication was performed by Dr. Frank Alfred Mathes, president of the Greater Miami Ministerial Association and a Southwest YMCA Board member.

Cutting the entrance ribbon to the new building was the mayors of the three cities served by SW "Y". From Coral Gables will be Mayor John Montgomery.

Representing South Miami and West Miami were Mayors Paul U. Tevis and Edmund Cooper, respectively.

Wynne To Speak

Winston Wynne, former chairman of the Southwest YMCA Board under whose direction the property was purchased and initially developed, was the event's principal speaker. Wynne, a county commissioner now, will tell what this facility means to Southwest Dade County.

Others taking part in the ceremony were Donald Robbins, chairman of the dedication committee; William R. Robbins, president of the Greater Miami YMCA; J. E. Merrifield, chairman of Southwest YMCA, and Rogers Eikenberry and Frank Kerdyk, property development committee members.

Following the dedication ceremony a reception and tour of the new building was held. Included will be plans for proposed programs of the Southwest "Y".

The 10 acres was purchased in 1956 and unused until this

time. The land, because of excavations prior to the YMCA purchase, is lower than surrounding areas and unusable until fill is added.

Fill has been added periodically since the YMCA purchase and the 10 acres has been fenced.

Given To 'Y'

The building was given to the "Y" as a one-story structure by Coral Gables Federal Savings and Loan Association last year and moved to the new site.

There the building was made into a two-story structure with the addition of a basement.

The building is on the east end of the 10 acres. Adjacent to the building, several softball diamonds are being readied for the "Y" summer recreation program.

Long range plans call for a swimming pool on the west five acres of the site.

floor of the building will be used as a game room. The upstairs floor will be used as a club meeting room seating some 40 people and a separate office room to hold 100 people.

Entrance to the site is through SW 45th St.

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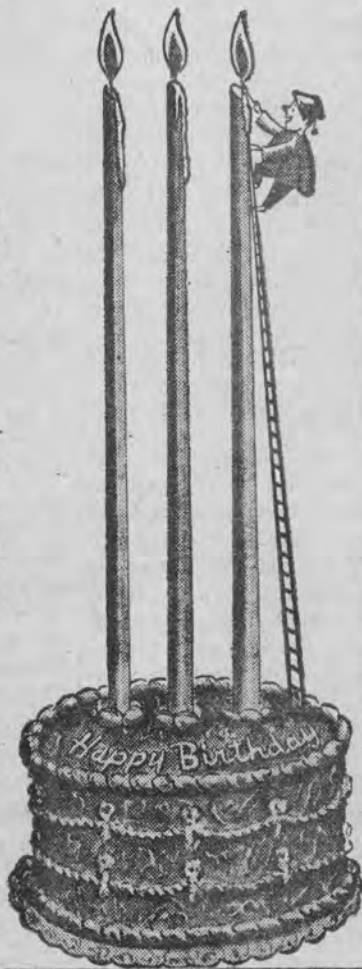
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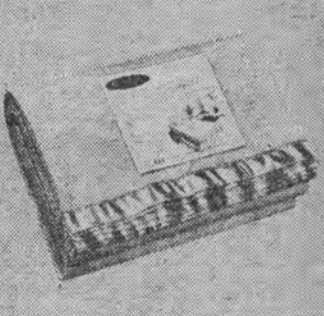
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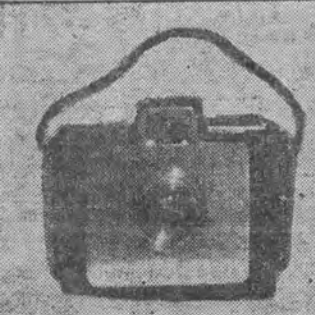
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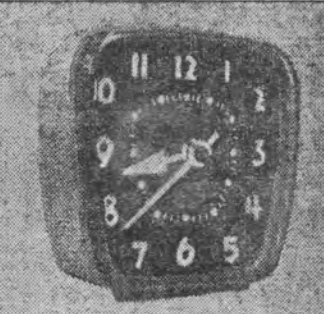
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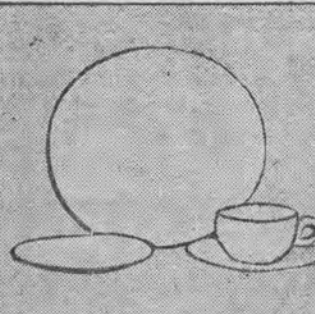
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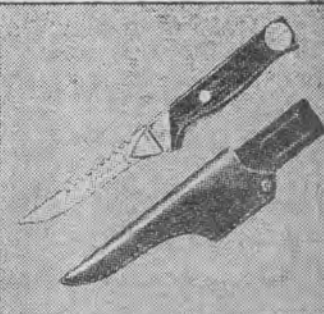
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Miller Heights Citizen Association James Frey

He Builds Bridges Of Friendship

Seventy years young and still going strong could be one way of describing Joseph W. Hunter, 1042 Sorolla Ave. One might even say that Joe, as he prefers to be called dabbles in "construction work."

Actually he is a retired medical service representative, and the only "construction work" he does is in the field of "Building Bridges of Friendship."

Hunter has been chairman of the International Contacts Committee for the Rotary Club of Coral Gables since 1957. The Committee's purpose is to bring the people of the world closer together and enable them to have a better understanding of one another.

Lack Of Understanding

"Most of the problems of the world are due to a lack of international understanding," said Hunter. "What we're trying to do ... International Contacts is to ease the tensions among men and nations by bringing the youth of foreign countries together with our own people."

Each month he sends congratulatory letters to all the new clubs in the Rotary world, and each week he brings two new overseas students to the meeting of the Coral Gables club.

With the help of Dr. Louis Melina, who is in charge of foreign student registration at the University of Miami, Hunter is able to get in contact with all the newly registered foreign students.

The list of countries that have been represented is vast. Practically all of South America has been represented, not to mention students from Mexico, Cuba, France, Germany, Hungary, Spain, China and Japan.

Keep In Contact

Many of the students keep in contact with him even after they have gone back to their homeland.

"It's pleasing to know that I've been remembered," said Hunter. "During the years that I've been in this pleasant work the dividends have come in regularly."

His mailbox is continually crammed with letters bearing postmarks from the four corners of the earth.

There are very few students that he doesn't recall by name, and very few that don't thank him for the services he has rendered them.

"Everyone of them has as much personality as fleas on a pup," said Hunter. "It's been wonderful working with them, and I hope that they have learned as much about us as we have about them."

Hunter has been a member of Rotary International for 22

years. Because of his work as a traveling medical service representative he was able to get a cross-sectional view of the workings of the Rotary club.

First Idea

It was at one of his many

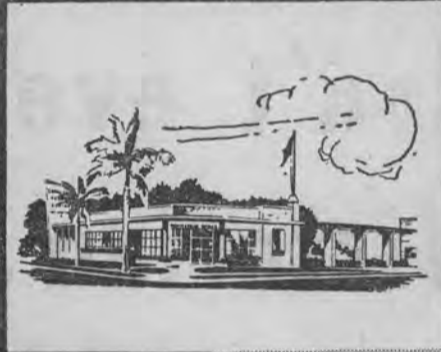
"make-up" meetings that he first realized the potential of the foreign student program. The St. Petersburg Rotary "imported" some of the students from Florida State University for one of their meetings. The students put on an entertainment program that was well received by all the members and their families.

When Hunter returned to Coral Gables he decided to avail himself of the material in his own "back-yard." The plans were laid to better international relations with the help of the University of Miami foreign students.

For the past five years the International Contacts Committee, a sub-committee of the International Service Committee of the Rotary club, has been running with nary a flaw and Joe Hunter will always be thankful that he has had the mind and the will to help in the "Building of Bridges of Friendship."

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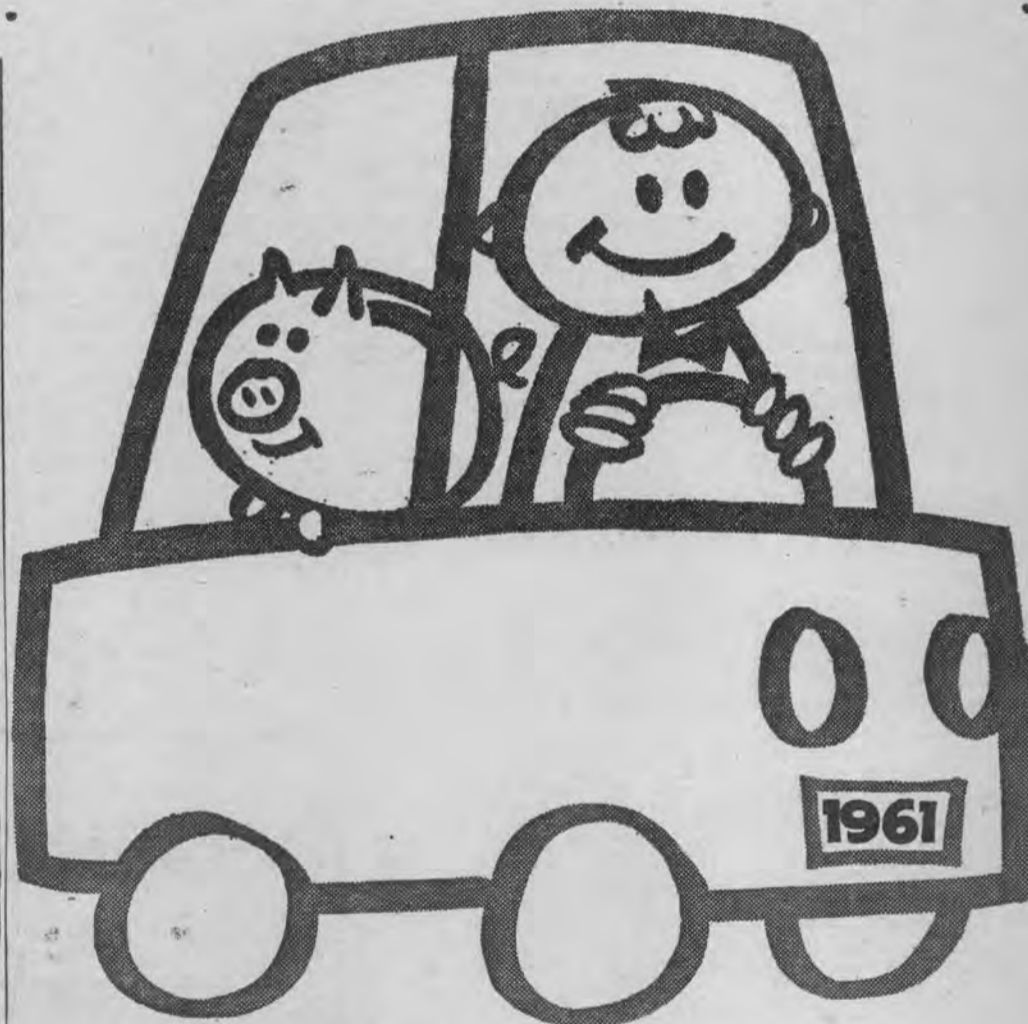

Mrs. Comer is a member of the Coral Gables Garden Club, an accredited Flower Show Judge and is presently teaching at Vineland Elementary school.

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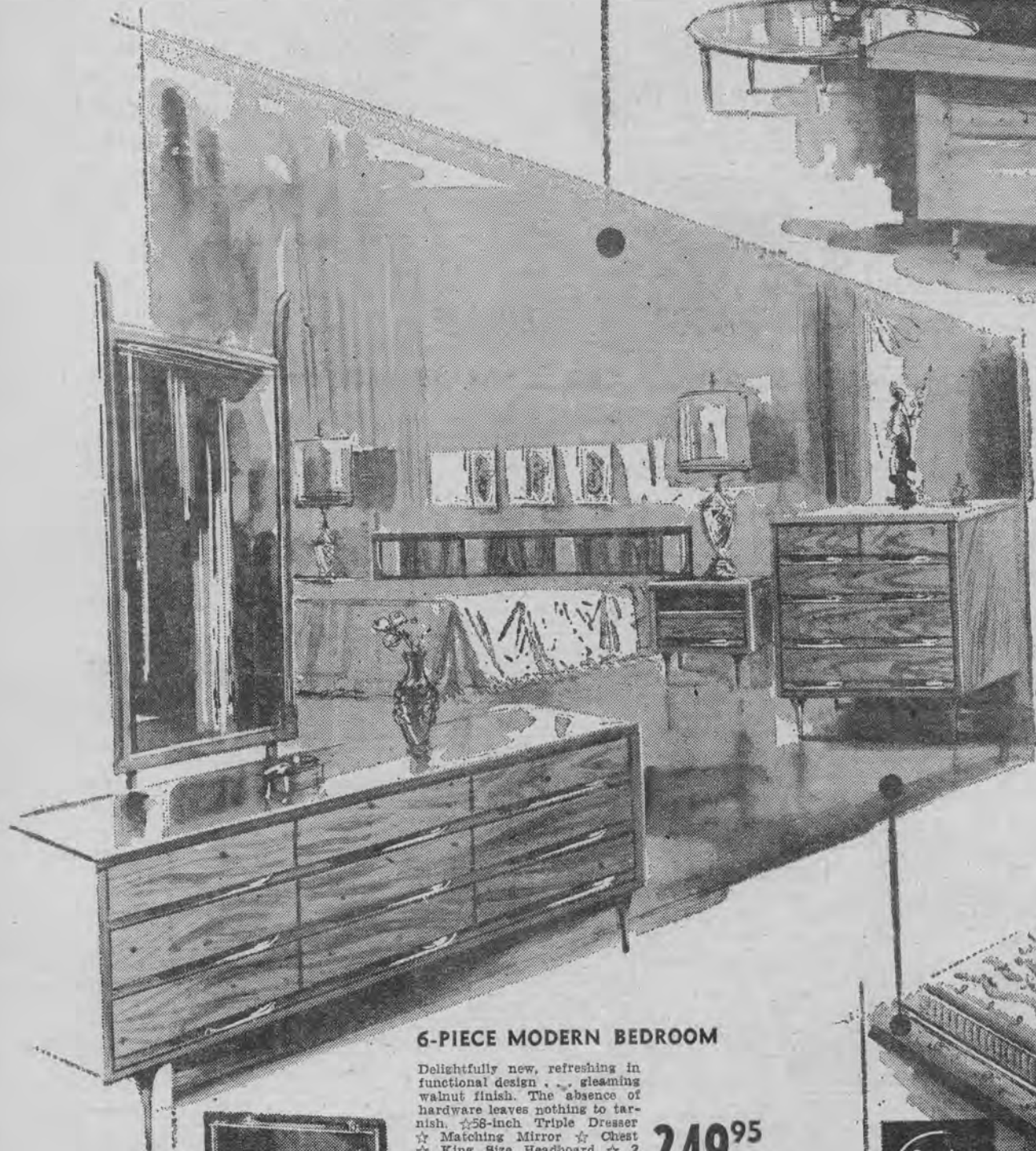
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
