Coconut Grove Post Office Superintendent He Earns A Rest After 40 Years Of Service

There was a party going on at the Coconut Grove Post Office on a recent afternoon. The party was a tribute to a man and his 40 years of service with "the same company."

The man was Claude Acton, superintendent of the Coconut Grove Post Office.

"There's nothing like it to make a man feel humble," said Acton, recognizing the tribute given him by employees of his station.

Pulling up a chair he began the story of his 40 year career.

Came Here In 1923

It started in 1920 when Acton rode the train as a Railway Service worker. He came to Miami in 1923 after working in the Chicago and Cincinnati offices.

It was here a few years later that Acton entered the "most educational" part of his career. As a clerk in the Inquiries

and complaints Department he learned just how many types of people there are in the world and how to get along with them.

In 1927 he became an office foreman. For the past 14 years he has served as Superintendent of the Coconut Grove Post Office where he "really likes it." "Folks here are just like my hometown—kind of homey," said Acton, who claims Worthinton, Ind., as his original home.

The fact that Coconut Grove serves as a home for some notable personages whose name and money can afford them the privilege of being difficult, makes little trouble for him.

Nice People

"All the people around here are nice." The rich and poor—the famous and the average pose few problems and complaints for Acton.

His own philosophy of life and way of getting along with people are probably the reason.

Who Will Wear Junior Orange Bowl Crown?

A new Junior Orange Bowl Queen will be chosen on Dec. 17 at the War Memorial Youth Center in Coral Gables. Already the grownups are putting the finishing touches on plans to make this event unforgettable for the young participants.

Last year 63 excited youngsters competed in the finals of the contest, when 13-year-old Jean Dunlap of Miami was crowned queen. A total of 683 girls took part in local preliminary contests conducted by the recreation departments of 15 Florida cities and towns, extending from Ormond Beach to Key West.

Entries From Everywhere

Based on inquiries already received, Larry Larimore, president of the Junior Orange Bowl Committee, predicts that the 1960 contest will attract entrants from the widest area in its 10-year history. For the first time, the Florida West Coast will be represented, with entries already assured from Port Charlotte. The winner will preside over a festive Queen's ball and will ride the float of honor in the huge Junior Orange Bowl Parade on Dec. 29.

What Judges Look For

The contest judges look for the combination of poise, personality, carriage and general appearance which constitutes the typical American girl. Talent and professional experience are not factors. Contestants must have reached their 12th birthday but not their 14th by Dec. 1 in order to be eligible.

All candidates must be selected in municipal recreation department preliminary contests and officially entered by these departments before Dec. 10.

Prospective entrants should inquire of their local recreation department which may obtain full information and entry blanks from the Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce, 50 Aragon Avenue.

The three girls picked from South Miami will compete with girls from other cities for the coveted title of Miss Junior Orange Bowl.

Only qualifications are that the girls be between 12 and 14 years of age at the time of the elimination.

Action Taken By Plaintiff Voluntarily

A police brutality suit against South Miami and two of the city's police officers has been voluntarily dismissed by the plaintiff.

John W. Crew, 6280 SW 58th Ave., who filed suit against the city last month alleging police brutality, removed the suit from Circuit Court. This does not mean that Crew could not file at a later date, according to South Miami City Attorney, George B. Hardie Jr.

The two police officers involved are Loren Pucket and Ralph Greenwood.

Crew alleges that on a night late in August he was putting his car away when the two police officers approached.

They said Crew had run a red light and asked to see his drivers license.

Crew refused to show his license and told the officers they would have to get a warrant to see it.

The officers returned the next morning with the warrant and asked Crew to come with them to South Miami police station.

An argument followed with Crew refusing to go to the station. The officers finally had to handcuff Crew to get him to the station.

At the station, Crew was permitted to make bond.

Crew said he and his children was brutally handled by the officers at his home and later at the station.

Crew was found guilty last month of running the stop light at Miller and Red Road that the officers had accused him of running.

San Amaro Widening Set To Get Underway

The widening and beautification of San Amaro Dr., from Miller to Ponce de Leon Blvd., scheduled to get underway soon has left one property owner unhappy.

The residence of Donald V. Hunter, 5530 San Amaro, will wind up only 15 feet from the street when the improvement is completed.

The program, being paid for by the University of Miami as part of its general plan to re-route Main Campus traffic, contemplates widening and dividing San Amaro, with a landscaped island separating the north and southbound lanes.

Hunter appeared before the City Commission Tuesday to ask that the street not be paved all the way to the sidewalk.

The City Commission indicated that the entire program could not be upset for one residence,

but told Hunter that no parking restrictions would be placed in the short block in front of his home.

Hunter purchased the home from a builder who had obtained a variance to build the home so close to the street before the University planned the improvement.

The University is giving up 15 feet of its property on the east side to make the widening possible.

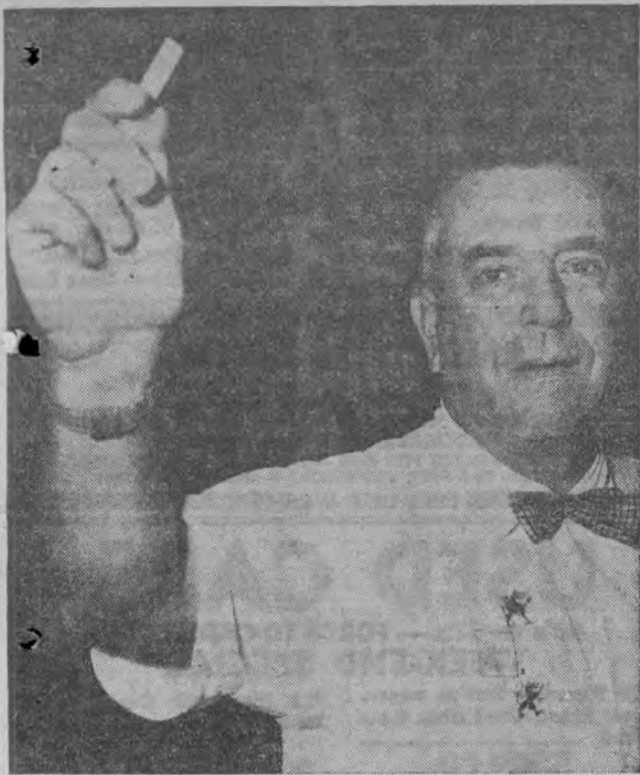

Former Military Man

Is American Youth Soft? Teacher Doesn't Think So

Do you think America's youth is going soft? If so, you had better tip toe by Col. Francis Barnes, a military man who is tired of pessimistic people who "howl like a hound dog."

Col. Barnes clings to the opinion that America's youth is on the right road as firmly as doe a village smithy clenches his hammer.

"I'm sorry, I can't find anything wrong with our youth," said Barnes, 8710 SW 41st St. "I couldn't be happier if I was put on a South Sea island."

"I think we'd better take a second look before we howl like a hound dog."

"What's wrong with our

youth? I heard it after World War I, the depression, World War II and after. You were of a generation that was lost," he said, pointing to this reporter.

"I was of a lost generation, he was, we all were. It seems we like to lose a generation every-time one comes along."

The 56-year-old teacher at Southwest Miami High leaned forward. "But we forge ahead. The flappers of yesterday are running the country today."

Barnes, a science teacher, has worked with young people most of his life. He's worked with them during war with bullets whining and he's worked with them in the classroom with questions popping.

"These are good wholesome people," said the former tank commander. "I do not hold that opinion . . . that they're weak and vacillating."

"I believe in our youth . . . I think they're worthy and that they're trying. And brother, if we don't bank on them, we'd better cash in."

Not a very tall man, but husky, Barnes strikes a distinguished appearance. He has thick, curly hair with equal portions of black mixed with grey and a wisp of a mustache.

Often, he'll cut the air with his hands to stress a point. And when he's relaxed, he'll sit back, light a cigarette at the end of an ornate holder and puff contentedly.

Right about now, he was relaxed. He sat back and lit a cigarette. ". . . The world is moving right fast now and the youth will be slipping into your shoes and mine."

"And when they're ready," he leaned forward and cut the air with his hands, "I believe you and I can grow old without worrying our heads off."

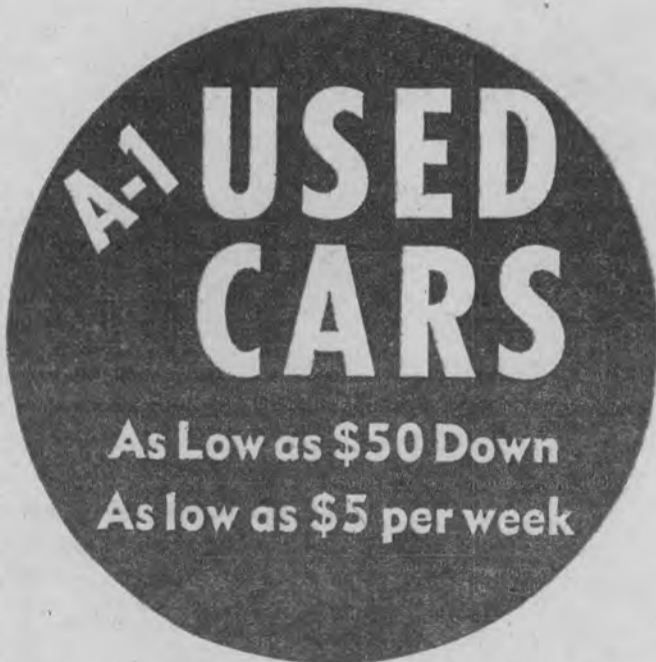

With all the talk today about the betterment of Negro communities, it might be wise for us for a change to look at the "good side" of the question.

We are always hearing about the plight of the Negro—the slum areas—and what should be done about them. There can be little disagreement that much work should be done in an urban renewal program to get rid of the slum areas which selfish landlords have been able to maintain through the use of powerful money and powerful political influence. In the downtown Miami Negro districts, there can be little question that such slum conditions must be alleviated.

But, we rarely hear about the forward steps which have been taken to provide excellent Negro housing in beautiful suburban communities.

In South Dade, for example, we have one of the outstanding examples of what can be done. Our town—although very few people realize it—has one of the most beautiful Negro suburban communities in the entire South. It is known as Richmond Heights—a few miles from South Miami off U.S. Highway One.

Seven-Year Development

Richmond Heights has been developed over the past seven years. Today there are more than 3,000 homes built and hundreds more under construction. Homes vary in price. There are small development-type areas in

Richmond Heights in the \$10,000 class and there are luxurious homes with pools and cabanas in the \$30,000-and-up class. The occupations of the home owners vary from laborers to doctors and dentists. There are 100 teachers and school principals who live there.

Until Richmond Heights was developed, these homeowners could find little comparable housing in South Dade. These families were forced to live in the old slum areas until the new Negro community came into being.

Mrs. Ora Taylor, a former teacher and dean in Negro schools in Florida, is one of the original settlers in Richmond Heights. Today, a real estate broker, she is unofficially known as the "mayor of Richmond Heights." Mrs. Taylor said the development of Richmond Heights has done more for the Negro than provide excellent housing.

"It has given the people who live here a complete new outlook as to community responsibility and civic improvement," she said.

Civic organizations have sprung up; the residents are working toward construction of a swimming pool and recreation park; two new churches are under construction and residents are currently at work on a "get out the vote" campaign.

Serious Matter

"We take voting seriously in Richmond Heights," Mrs. Taylor said. "We have tripled our voter registration for the upcoming election and the Democratic and Republican groups here are forming car pools to take voters to the voting areas."

Right now, residents have to drive to nearby Perrine to vote, but Mrs. Taylor said residents of Richmond Heights have applied to the County Commission for their own precinct in future elections.

Gables Approves League Dues

Coral Gables city commissioners approved the expenditure of \$1460 to the Dade County League of Municipalities as its share of dues.

The Commission balked at payment last year and demanded to see a report of expenditures.

City Commissioner Robert Searle is League president this year and City Manager L. W. Robinson Jr. is secretary.

Home Site Will Become Parking Lot

A plan to convert a piece of residential property near South Dixie Hwy. to a parking lot to serve proposed commercial buildings was approved 4-1 by the Coral Gables City Commission Tuesday.

Only Commissioner Joe Murphy voted against J. Allen Brown's plan. Brown, a prominent real estate developer, is the owner of the controversial land located on the north side of Menendez, northeast of Rosario.

Special Use

The move had been unanimously approved previously by the Zoning Board, which recommended that special use of the property be granted.

Nineteen objections were received, but the city ruled that 13 of them were from residents who lived more than 1300 feet from the proposed parking lot site and were not to be considered.

A public hearing on the proposal was held on Sept. 26.

No change in zoning was entailed by the Commission's action.

Brown will be allowed to use the area for parking only and may not build anything other than a single-family residence on the property, if he decides to build later.

Brown, in making the request, pointed out that his plan was in keeping with the city's off street parking policy.

County Building Dips Sharply, But Cutler Up

Four builders in the Cutler Ridge area have contracted to purchase 196 lots during the past 90 days. The total value of purchase is in excess of \$500,000.

Mark Manor Homes accounts for sixty-one of the lots located at Venetian Point. Crossroads Construction Company have bought eight. Newport Building Corp. acquired 27 lots. Both Crossroads Construction Company and Newport chose the Cutler Ridge Pines for their purchases, as did Citation Homes who purchased 42 lots in this area. In the same Cutler Ridge Pines area Mark Manor has also acquired an additional 29 lots.

These same builders prior to the above purchases account for more than 700 additional lots in Cutler Ridge.

Florida Water and Utilities which supplies the Cutler Ridge area with water and sewer service states that, contrary to the general decline in home building its rate of hookups of new customer units has increased year by year.

In 1956 and 1957 it hooked up an average of 30 customer units per month; in 1959 an average of 75 customer units per month. For the first half of 1960 it has serviced an average of 112 customer units per month.

Caster Tells League

Savings, Loan Resources Will Grow To Billions

In a message to the membership, George B. Caster, Florida Savings and Loan League president, predicted last week that the state savings and loan present resources of \$3 billion will double in five years and total \$10 billion by the end of the decade.

"This, in spite of the fact that the 'sizzling, soaring 60's' haven't sizzled or soared as much as we would have liked them to at the beginning of the decade," he said.

Caster, president of Coral Gables Federal, spoke to representatives of the 111 League members in convention at the Colonial Inn, St. Petersburg Beach.

Percenters

On his list of competitive factors for savings and residential financing he listed "the so-called 8 percenters, which have mushroomed in the past year . . . apparently thriving here in the St. Petersburg area, and to a lesser extent in other parts of the state.

"The very fact that so many of these companies have sprung up in the past year, indicates that they have been successful in obtaining money from the public despite the ambiguity of their advertising.

"In many cases, it would appear that these companies place the funds entrusted to them in second mortgage paper, or in extremely high percentage first mortgages, and that investors must rely for security primarily on statements that their funds are insured against loss 'for any reason whatsoever.'

Brass Key Apartments Purchased By Gableites

Brass Key Apartments, located two blocks from the South Miami City Hall at 7019-29 SW 61st Ave., has been purchased by Edna and Joe Stein, of Coral Gables, for \$48,000 for the eight unit, 1-bedroom furnished apartment building and two adjoining business lots.

Seller of the property was Jack Stanton, of South Miami. Mrs. Stein is a well-known Coral Gables interior decorator. Cliff Suchman and H. A. Hooper of The Keyes Company's Kendall office cooperated on the sale.

"There is a public interest involved here and unfortunately these companies apparently are presently exempt from control under state security laws.

"The office of the Attorney General of the state of Florida has been studying these new investment companies, and perhaps the forthcoming session of the legislature will take steps to establish some type of effective control over their operation," Caster said.

Another competitive factor mentioned was "the continued efforts of the commercial bankers to obtain a change in the tax status of our business." He said if successful "it will result in weakening the financial structure of the nation's only specialists in the field of thrift and home financing."

On the plus side Caster pointed to savings in Florida associations that increased by \$407 million this past year. He said public faith and confidence brought them the 1.2 million savings account holders now in these Florida associations.

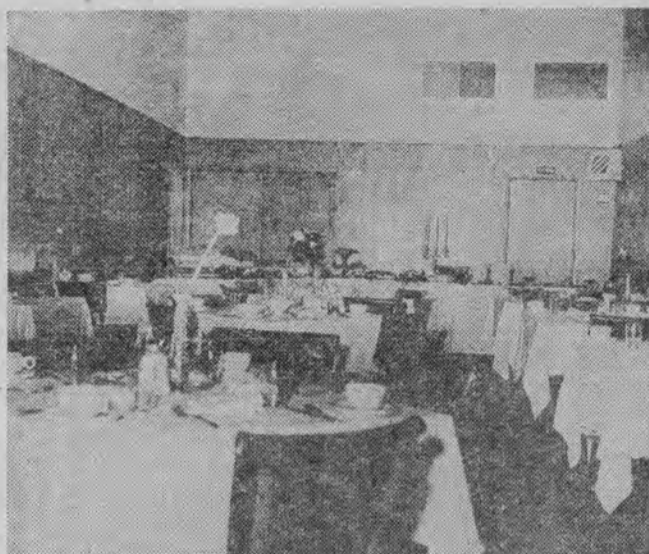
