

# Our Town Getting a New Bank

A new bank—The Guarantee Bank of Miami—has been approved to serve an estimated 100,000 persons living in the Southwest Dade area.

Bids were to be opened today. (Thursday). The "open for business sign" is scheduled for June.

The \$150,000—\$175,000, one-story, state-chartered bank will be located at the southwest corner of Bird Road and SW 83rd Ave., according to L. H. Skeen, president.

An area bordered roughly by Tamiami Trail, Snapper Creek, Kendall Drive and Red Road will be served by the bank.

A survey indicates that there are more than 700 businesses in that area, all within a four and one-half mile radius of the new bank.

Both Skeen and Paul F.

Staup, vice president and cashier, came here from the Inter-City National Bank in Bradenton.

Temporary offices have been established at 8399 Bird Road where personnel are being interviewed and final plans made for moving into the new bank.

Approximately 12 to 15 persons will be employed initially, Skeen said.

Total capitalization is reported to be \$750,000. Of this \$500,000 is in stock, \$150,000 surplus and \$100,000 in undivided profits.

Eleven directors, including Coral Gables Mayor Robert L. Searle, will be led by G. D. Monroe, chairman of the board. Monroe is an investor.

Other directors are C. L. (Jerry) Dressel Jr., also a

Coral Gables city commissioner and owner of Dressel Dairies. Scott Braznell, owner of Trail Builders.

Dr. Dwight Burley, M.D. Fred S. Wilson, retired real estate man.

T. M. Pafford Sr., chairman of the board for MPS cement products.

Edward A. Thompson, door manufacturer.

W. Bruce MacIntosh, president of the Miami Laundry.

Charles Kimbrell, Miami attorney and Skeen.

All normal banking services will be provided — checks, installment loans, savings accounts and drive in teller service.

Savings will draw four per cent on deposits undisturbed for one year or more; 3½ per cent on deposit six months or more; and three per cent six months or more.

Two drive in windows will be provided.

Plans are to utilize only one of the five available acres, Skeen said.

The modern structure which will face on Bird Road, will have 5,000 square feet of floor space. A parking lot will accommodate 33 cars.

They are L. H. Skeen, new president and former president of the Inter City National Bank there, and Paul F. Staup, vice president and cashier and former vice president at the Bradenton bank.

Skeen, a native of Williamsburg, Ky., attended the College of Commerce, Bowling Green, majoring in accounting, commercial law and business administration. He also studied law.

His first bank job was with the Citizens Bank of Frostproof in 1929. In 1933 he was made

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## Richards to Build Unit On Coral Way in April

A new two-story, multimillion dollar Richards department store is scheduled to get under way at Coral Way Shopping Center in April, according to Paul S. Walker, president.

Richards has a long-term lease on the \$1 million building and will spend an additional \$1½ million for furniture and merchandise, Walker said.

The store, the fifth Richards in the Miami area, will be one of several large chain stores to join the Publix Supermarket at Coral Way and SW 87th Ave.

Richards, located just east of Publix, will have a 2,100-car parking lot on the 27-acre plot.

The building, whose second store will not be utilized for merchandizing immediately,

will have 67,000 square feet of space.

An additional 200,000 feet will be reserved for future building use.

The Richards group of stores is affiliated with Maison Blanche in New Orleans; Kaufmans in Louisville; Lovemans in Birmingham; Loweinstains in Memphis; and the W. T. Sloan Co.

Walker cited rapid growth in the area for the move.

The store will be leased from Samuel T. Sapiro and Associates, which is planning to add a large drug store and several other businesses, including a J. J. Newberry variety store.

Other Richards stores are located at Cutler Ridge, downtown Miami, 163rd Street Shopping Center and Lincoln Road Mall.

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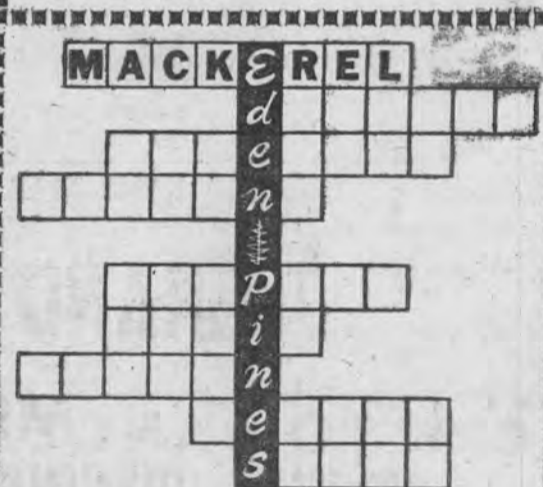

# Would Jesus Have Done As Max Morris?

(AN EDITORIAL)

We don't believe any perceptive observer of contemporary religion can find much fault in the precision of the devastating analysis offered last week in The Herald by the Rev. Max Morris as to why he resigned his pastorate at South Miami Baptist Church.

The youthful (33) departing cleric said his resignation was a "protest."

Among many things, he was protesting "that concept of the ministry which forces the pastor to be an executive, an administrator, an organizational genius, a public-relations expert, a confessor to hundreds of people who have 'stumped their toes' . . .

"A protest against ecclesiastical machines which measure success by attendance records, larger budgets and million dollar building programs . . . Against the idea that a pastor must be a 'jolly-do-well,' a back slapper, a smiling, affable dunce, and a good mixer . . .

"A protest against a system which makes out of the minister everything except what God expects him to be—a spiritual leader and preacher of the word . . ."

Mr. Morris will return, he says, to evangelism. He leaves his church with a congregation newly-embarked on a most ambitious building program of some half million dollars. His resignation was prompted in no way by any dissension or upset within his flock, he said.

The Baptist minister gives us much to think about. Unquestionably, he hits the bullseye on a major part of what is wrong with mid-20th century Christianity. And just as surely it is to be observed that these are man's problems, conceived in his own image and not in God's. It is nationally recognized that many ministers are led into mental breakdown by an overburden of organizational duties. The Christian people in America — not the church — stand indicted because of it.

As for that, Mr. Morris makes his point. The remedy, of course, is obvious: Let the laymen run the church.

We wonder about the form he took, with his resignation, he chose to cite Jesus Christ as a non-conformist and one who gave His life in "protest." We would not presume to lecture a Baptist preacher on the Bible but as we understand it Christ chose just the opposite method of protest.

Rather than retreat from the problems of the day, the Nazarene sought them. True, in the end he did give His life but only after doing everything else to alert His people to their moral decay and spiritual needs.

That method has stood the scrutiny of time; the method is to work from within, to be not overcome with evil but overcome evil with good.

There are many men of the cloth who agree with Mr. Morris about what needs to be done to return religion to its prosper perspective. The job is more apt to be accomplished by those thinking men who remain than by those who resign and flee.

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# Traffic Hazards Along Miller Road Need Investigation, Kids Plead

Members of Southwest Miami High School Student Traffic Safety Committee have written a letter to County Manager Irving McNayr calling attention to traffic hazards on SW 56th Street, known as Miller Road.

They ask that an investigation be made and steps taken to improve the road.

Many of the students and their brothers and sisters travel the road to Southwest, South Miami Junior High School, South Miami Elementary School, and Blue Lakes Elementary School twice a day.

Copies of the letter have been sent to the principals of the other three schools located near 56th Street, with the suggestion that they take similar action.

The letter calls attention to the two-lane road, too narrow for the volume of traffic which student checkers have found to be an average of 450 cars an hour at peak times morning and evening.

Rough shoulders ridged above the road make it especially dangerous for the many students who ride bicycles to the four schools. The canal with no guard rail which parallels the road between 92nd Avenue and 102nd Avenue is another hazard.

Fifty student committee members and 75 faculty (not all were contacted or travel the road) are asking the road be resurfaced to three lanes, which it was originally, that shoulders be smoothed level with the road and that a guard rail be placed by the canal.

ing to find a place to stand, sit or occupy.

Still another article brought out the reasons for our space exploration. We've got to find other places to put the people who will be born in the future.

**CLOSER TO HOME**, the predictions have been toward Florida's growth, the state's diminishing shore line, the draining of the Everglades, the growing lack of beaches for the resident and tourist bather and the congestion on the highways. Still closer to home, Dade County is pictured by the prognosticators as the probable largest county in the world.

**IT COULD** well be, too, except for one thing—other parts of the world are growing, too.

But Dade is growing at a tremendous rate, too fast, actually for its own good. And this brings us to our section of Dade County and what it will be like from 10 to 20 years hence.

**YOU CAN SUM** it up in one word—GROWTH. Some of the greater strides in residential construction will be in West Dade, which will go deeper into the Everglades. Remember, with each drainage ditch that is dug, more land will be made available for development.

**WHAT WE** recognize now as West Dade will be comparatively close in in the year 1972. There will be expressways running every which way, ones to take us downtown, one to take us west and others to zigzag crosstown. By the year 1972 it will become evident that Dade County chose the expressway system of moving people over the rapid transit system.

**WE FOLLOWED** the example of Los Angeles over New York in this respect.

Metro by that time will have tightened its hold on the County to such an extent that there are few municipal governments left.

Included in this group are Miami, Miami Beach, Coral Gables, Hialeah, Homestead, South Miami, North Miami and North Miami Beach.

**RECREATION** has become the by-word of Metro's functions. With the shorter work week, all of South Florida has looked to Metro for more swimming pools, boat marinas and recreation centers.

Every high school has its own stadium. They say that Metro's recreation program kept the voters from voting

the county government out of existence.

**BUT EVEN** with the multiple expressways, the worst problem facing the county resident is the traffic congestion. Every family has two cars now. One is a station wagon. The other one is a compact model, much like the Volkswagen.

When the family wants to take one of several yearly vacations, it takes the wagon. To go down to the supermarket, it takes the compact.

**SOUTH DADE?** It has become an industrial giant. There are missile centers, oil refineries, shipyards and a new harbor, especially built for all those tankers that are leaving oil streams in once-beautiful Biscayne bay.

The homes are getting smaller in South Dade. What was once estate zoning is no more.

And the county finally has finally constructed a new road paralleling South Dixie Highway. It's called South Dade Freeway.

And the elite? Where are they going to get away from it all now? To Naples, of course, Naples on Florida's west coast.

"I don't understand what it's all about" said Dr. Burley.

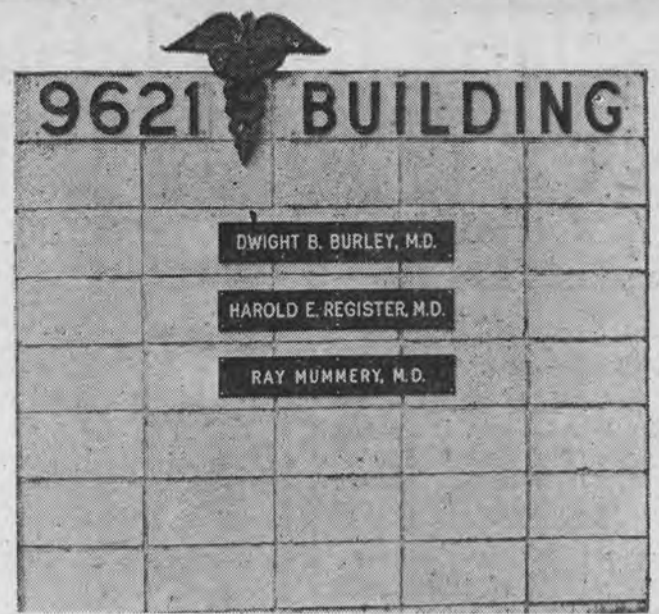
He said he planned to landscape the clinic as far back as 1957 and the work has just been completed.

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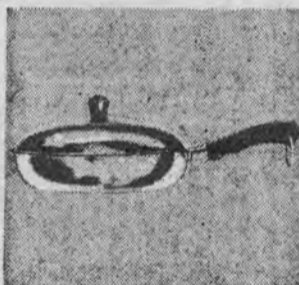
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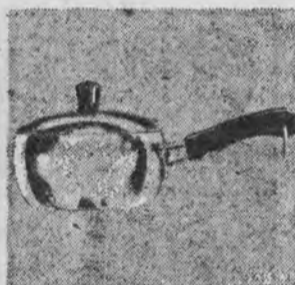
