Planned by Metro

Last week, a Guide story told how Mayor Paul Tevis of South Miami is seeking to straighten out the awkward boundaries in that community. This would fit in with Metro's plan.

A group, known as "CITY," seeks to incorporate a large area west of SW 70th Avenue, south of Tamiami Trail, east of SW 97th Avenue and north of North Kendall Drive.

But this is not the area Metro wants to incorporate. And it would overlap an area South Miami is considering for annexation.

Metro would expand the boundaries as far west as Snapper Creek, but cut it short on the east at the Palmetto By-Pass. The northern boundary would remain Tamiami Trait the southern boundary but

Deposed SM City Manager Is a Businessman as Well

C. B. Petry was a part-time businessman on the side.

Petry's an amateur chemist. He's also the owner of a swimming pool. In addition, he was the city manager of South Miami.

The swimming pool, "as any pool owner can tell you," was the cause of his frustration. It required frequent repainting and other maintenance.

So a few years ago, he began experimenting in a small home laboratory. What he came up with was a plastic that can be mixed with color pigments and painted or sprayed on just about any sur-

When it worked on his pool, Petry decided to market the product. He formed Glastic aboratories with his wife, Margaret, as president.

Petry himself was too busy as South Miami's city manager to handle the day to day affairs of that and his several other companies. Like Glastic Laboratories,

In addition to having been the other firms for the most city manager of South Miami part turn out products Petry part turn out products Petry compounded. The single exception is a small printing company.

The products include a car battery additive, designed to prolong its life, which had \$50,000 in sales last year, a no-sun tanning lotion and a small machine that automatically chlorinates a pool.

"I just got tired of spilling chlorine all over myself," he said, explaining his latest product.

Petry feels Glastic has the most potential. It went on the market in January and already the company has a sizeable backlog of orders.

A big problem is training men in the proper application of the Glastic, which can harden in less than half an hour if improperly mixed.

He said market samplings indicate that sales this year should exceed \$100,000 in Dade County alone. He hopes to franchise operations and to move beyond these limits in the near future.

SUAVE DEBONAIR County Manager Irving G. McNayr charmed the South Miami Council last week.

It was a lesson in public relations, something the county has needed for a long time. The South Miami Council asked questions, listened, asked more questions and listened some more.

ALTHOUGH the county manager lives in South Dade and must go through South Miami each day to get to and from the courthouse, this is the first time he has attended a South Miami Council meeting.

The county manager spoke for only half an hour, but in that time he did more to acquaint the South Miami city fathers with the county point of view than hundreds of letters could have done.

HE ANSWERED questions the South Miami Council has been asking for years. He disspelled some Council fears and pulled no punches in telling the Council flatly what could and could not be done at this time.

The council appreciated the sincerity, laughed a few times and asked the county manager to come again soon. I'm sure McNayr will do just this. THERE ARE McNayr's views on several subjects brought up by the Council: Sunset Drive repaving - Mc-Nayr said he doubted whether the city would ever receive compensation for the repaying it undertook. 

More letters, some of which are published elsewhere in this issue, have been received by The Guide since receipt of County Manager McNayr's letter and more persons have called.

Meanwhile, at least one of the candidates for the Metro Commission District 1 post being vacated by Robert Haverfield made the garbage and trash issue one of the main planks in his platform.

He is Robert Brake, a former county resident now living in Coral Gables.

"Trash collection is once a month if it comes and sometimes it doesn't come months at a time," Brake said at a kickoff breakfast Monday in Coral Gables.

Brake expanded the trash and garbage problem to its disposal. He was critical of dumping and burning.

A group complaining to the county about dumping and odor near Key Biscayne, he said, was told to go out and get signatures to petitions.

"That's not the kind of thing we want in our Metro government," Brake said.

Ever since Metro's been in, the so-called improved garbage collection has been fouled up. If a holiday falls in a week there's usually one collection. Other weeks it's sup-posed to be Tuesday and Friday, but it could be any two days in the week.

Now this week it was Tuesday and Thursday --- making five days before the next collection.

Now the real joke - oncea-month trash collections. Every one knows there was almost no service at all for the first six months then hit-and-

In December there was no collection at all. After several letters back and forth to the County Manager's office they tried to tell me it was picked up. The Waste Department Manager said he interviewed several householders and they said it was picked up. There was green cuttings on piles to show it was just put out. Sure there was, as they were putting trash out for next collection on old piles. I know it was not collected.

Well they collected trash in January, but none in February. I phoned the County Manager's office twice. Finally wrote a letter in and they finally came around March 5.

Our collection week is the third week in the month . . . if ... but ... what.

In all fairness here—a gripe against the homeowner. Just as soon as trash is picked up some people - two in our — and metal junk block . . even furniture, refrigerators and stoves. It could be called "city dump." Even their children dig and play in it. You would think they would enjoy having a clean and nice front appearance.

Metro should have a regular service — a certain week each month - and a fine for anyone who puts out trash more than four days before pickup.

Aso they should not allow anything in the trash except limbs of trees cut in four-feet lengths and shrub and grass cuttings, etc. Let the homeowner pay to

Editor:

In your Feb. 22 issue you had an article about unsightly trash piles in the unincorporated areas.

You took the home owners to task about placing their trash on the parkways in front of their homes before the trash trucks came to collect it. You couldn't seem to understand why we do this.

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The answer is very simple, we have no idea when the trash truck will be by to pick up our trash, and apparently neither has the Metro Waste Department.

We pay for trash pickup, which is supposed to be on a monthly basis. We were given a schedule of when our trash would be picked up, but the trash trucks obviously were never given any schedule. Our schedule states that the trash would be picked up during the last week of each month. This means that you can expect the trash truck anytime from the second week of one month through the first week of the next month, or some months, not at all.

You seem to forget, the homeowner also has to look at his trash pile, and it is no more attractive to him than it is to his neighbor. Then at the end of the article you suggest the homeowners seek relief by jamming the Circuit Court with damage cases. Well, that brings up another point.

What about the homeowners who let their property go to rack and ruin?
