## Dade County Inc. Planned by Metro

Metro will reveal the details of a plan to incorporate large areas of the county or annex them to existing municipalities after the May elections.

The plan is complete, but the county does not want it released at this time for fear it will become a political football. The Guide learned last week from informed sources.

Coral Gables, South Miami and West Miami in our area would serve as the nucleus for the annexation phase. New municipalities would be created in other areas.

Last week, a Guide story told how Mayor Paul Tevis of South Miami is seeking to straighten out the awkward boundaries in that community. This would fit in with Metro's plan.

A group, known as "CITY," seeks to incorporate a large area west of SW 70th Avenue, south of Tamiami Trail, east of SW 97th Avenue and north of North Kendall Drive.

But this is not the area Metro wants to incorporate. And it would overlap an area South Miami is considering for annexation.

Metro would expand the boundaries as far west as Snapper Creek, but cut it short on the east at the Palmetto Bypass. The northern boundary would remain Tamiami Trail but the southern boundary

County residents may not be satisfied with their garbage and trash pickups, but County Manager Irving G. McNayr said last week that he is satisfied with progress made so far.

## Mr. McNayr Begs Off

We think County Manager McNayr is hiding behind the door on this problem of lousy trash collection.

What does his letter to us, reprinted alongside today, say he's going to do? Nothing.

Everything's progressing, he says, and getting better.

Tell it to the dozens of taxpayers who've specified their complaints.

Did McNayr say he'd check the complaints? No. Did he promise help? No. McNayr didn't do anything as far as we can see.

People will be reasonable when they're dealt with reasonably. That is, no one expects miracles from Metro. But we expect — and are entitled to expect — a do-something approach from our county government, not just syrup from the McNayr Jug.

Talk to your commissioner, particularly those who say they want the job.

In a letter dated March 7 to The Guide, the county manager acknowledged complaints received by The Guide and passed on to his office.

McNayr, however, did not answer the itemized complaints. Here is the text of the county manager's reply:

"I appreciate having the summary of the reactions to your article on waste collection.

"As you know this is a serv-

ice to which the public is particularly sensitive, and the county has had a good deal of difficulty in supplying something approaching a municipal-level type service to the widely scattered unincorporated areas.

"However, I am satisfied we are making good progress with

## Petry's Suspension Veiled in Mystery

No new city manager will be named for the time being. Mayor Paul U. Tevis said this week in the wake of the suspension of City Manager C. B. Petry and his secretary, Mrs. Nelda Chiboucas.

Petry was suspended on the old catchall — malfeasance, non-feasance and misfeasance in office.

Mayor Tevis said he could not spell out the charges in greater detail because he did not know the final outcome of the investigation by State Attorney Richard Gerstein's office.

No charges have been filed against Petry, Gerstein said Monday.

He expected the investiga-

tion to be completed sometime this week.

The suspension came Friday at a special meeting of the City Council as Petry waived immunity to talk to state attorney personnel.

Petry could not be reached for comment, but his attorney, Harry Prebish, said the city manager had cooperated with Assistant State Attorney John Wynne by waiving immunity and answering all questions about the financial operation of the city.

"I don't know of any investigation," said Prebish.

"We don't know what the charges are," he added.

"I can't get into my own of-

## McNayr Drops in on South Miami

County Manager Irving G. McNayr, often invited but never seen before at a South Miami Council meeting, was there Tuesday of last week.

Following regular council business, McNayr answered council's questions concerning South Miami's relationships with the county.

Speaking on every subject from annexation to the repaving of Sunset Drive, the county manager said the relationship of the municipalities to the county government is one of the most important problems facing both the county

and the municipalities.

He complimented South Miami on its cutting of ad valorem taxes and said he hoped it would set a pattern for others among the 28 municipalities throughout the county.

"While other cities' real and personal property taxes are going up, South Miami's seem to be going down. This is a good sign," the tall, balding county manager told the council.

While speaking on taxes, McNayr said that he hoped eventually that all tax collection could be done by the coun-

ty for services including countywide police, fire, recreation and libraries.

He blamed overlapping of county and South Miami services for some of the South Miami-county controversies and said that there was little chance of the city being reimbursed for services it has undertaken for the benefit of county residents.

Several months ago, South Miami repaved Sunset Drive from South Dixie Highway to SW 69th Avenue, the western

# Deposed SM City Manager Is a Businessman as Well

In addition to having been city manager of South Miami C. B. Petry was a part-time businessman on the side.

Petry's an amateur chemist. He's also the owner of a swimming pool. In addition, he was the city manager of South Miami.

The swimming pool, "as any pool owner can tell you," was the cause of his frustration. It required frequent repainting and other maintenance.

So a few years ago, he began experimenting in a small home laboratory. What he came up with was a plastic that can be mixed with color pigments and painted or sprayed on just about any surface.

When it worked on his pool, Petry decided to market the product. He formed Glastic Laboratories with his wife, Margaret, as president.

Petry himself was too busy as South Miami's city manager to handle the day to day affairs of that and his several other companies.

Like Glastic Laboratories,

face," said Tevis, following the padlocking of a suite of offices in City Hall following the move by the State Attorney's office. Guards were posted also.

"We're open for business," said Tevis.

The mayor said charges of "Gestapo tactics" had been leveled at the council over handling of the matter, but

the other firms for the most part turn out products Petry compounded. The single exception is a small printing company.

The products include a car battery additive, designed to prolong its life, which had \$50,000 in sales last year, a no-sun tanning lotion and a small machine that automatically chlorinates a pool.

"I just got tired of spilling chlorine all over myself," he said, explaining his latest product.

Petry feels Glastic has the most potential. It went on the market in January and already the company has a sizeable backlog of orders.

A big problem is training men in the proper application of the Glastic, which can harden in less than half an hour if improperly mixed.

He said market samplings indicate that sales this year should exceed \$100,000 in Dade County alone. He hopes to franchise operations and to move beyond these limits in the near future.

It was a lesson in public relations, something the county has needed for a long time. The South Miami Council asked questions, listened, asked more questions and listened some more.

ALTHOUGH the county manager lives in South Dade and must go through South Miami each day to get to and from the courthouse, this is the first time he has attended a South Miami Council meeting.

The county manager spoke for only half an hour, but in that time he did more to acquaint the South Miami city fathers with the county point of view than hundreds of letters could have done.

HE ANSWERED questions the South Miami Council has been asking for years. He dispelled some Council fears and pulled no punches in telling the Council flatly what could and could not be done at this time.

The council appreciated the sincerity, laughed a few times and asked the county manager to come again soon. I'm sure McNayr will do just this.

THERE ARE McNayr's views on several subjects brought up by the Council: Sunset Drive repaving — McNayr said he doubted whether the city would ever receive compensation for the repaving it undertook. But it did bring out that within the next few years, Sunset Drive will be

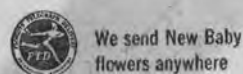

ANNEXATION by South Miami of properties north and south and even west of the city to square off the city boundaries — McNayr said those county residents in question do not want to be annexed, the county couldn't make them be annexed and what services these county residents need should be given them on a contractual basis.

HE AGREED with the Council that the city should have more of a say-so in the annexation and even called for a united effort to have the next Legislature change present laws to allow for easier annexations. This double taxation doesn't sit too well with the countyites.

ON THE POSSIBILITY of South Miami furnishing better garbage and trash collection to thousands of homes west

of South Miami, McNayr said he was all for this and would certainly give it some attention.

RECREATION was discussed quite freely, with the county manager offering the city little satisfaction in its request for matching county-city recreation funds. The city fathers brought out that 50 to 60 per cent of those taking part in South Miami's recreation program were county residents.

McNAYR SYMPATHIZED with the city, but said that all county recreation funds are going to be spent in the county, no matter what the cities

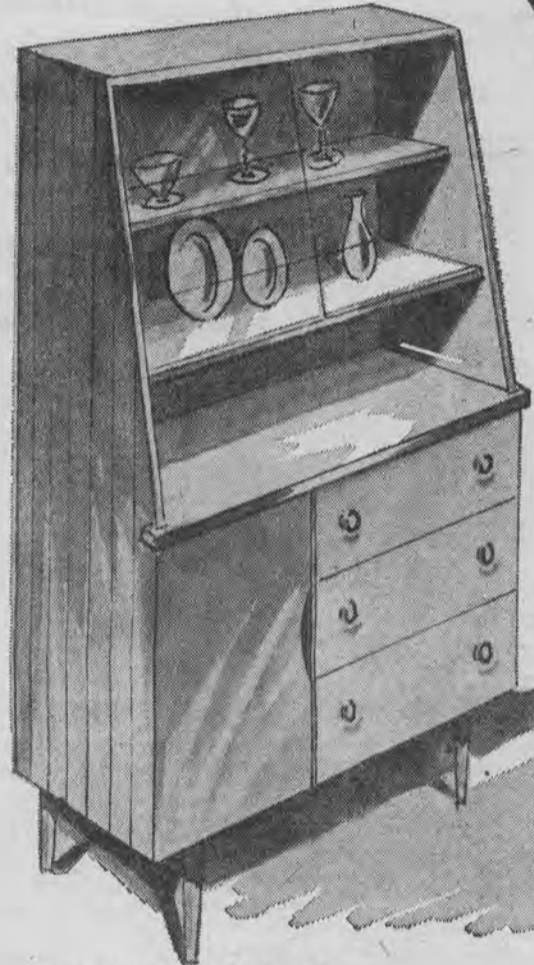

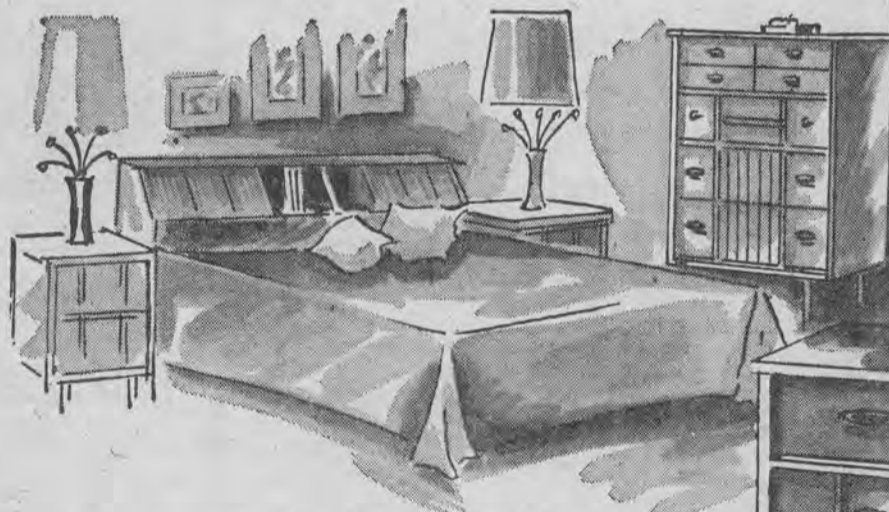

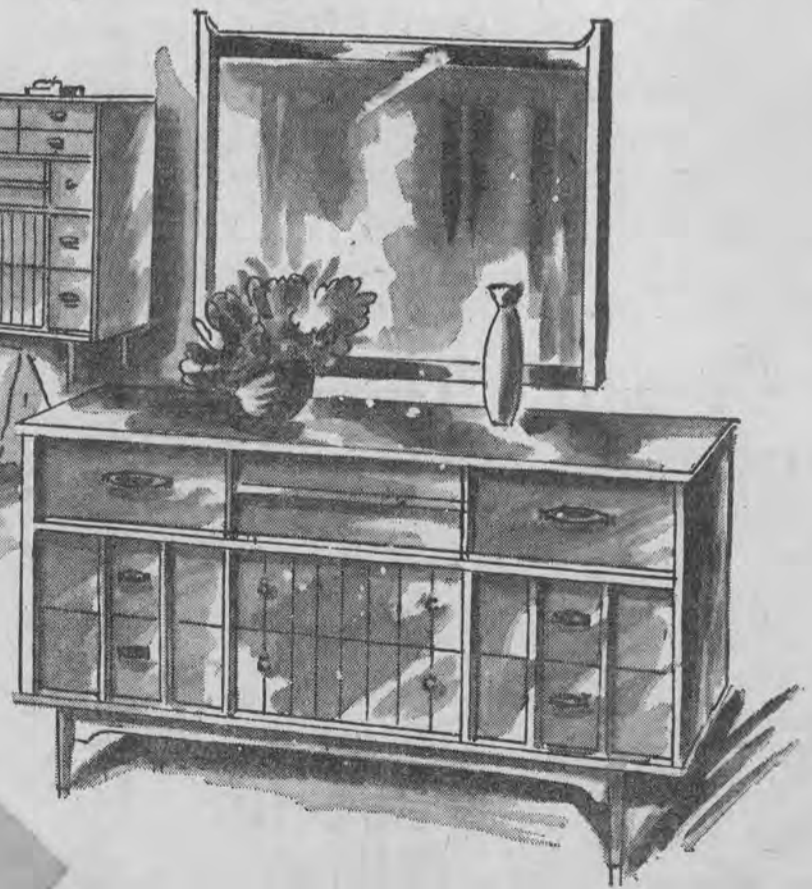

# More Readers Sound Off About Trash Collection

this program and that it will continue to improve.

"I hope your paper will continue to explore the various services in which our citizens are interested and let me know of any further reactions you receive."

More letters, some of which are published elsewhere in this issue, have been received by The Guide since receipt of County Manager McNayr's letter and more persons have called.

Meanwhile, at least one of the candidates for the Metro Commission District 1 post being vacated by Robert Haverfield made the garbage and trash issue one of the main planks in his platform.

He is Robert Brake, a former county resident now living in Coral Gables.

"Trash collection is once a month if it comes and sometimes it doesn't come months at a time," Brake said at a kickoff breakfast Monday in Coral Gables.

Brake expanded the trash and garbage problem to its disposal. He was critical of dumping and burning.

A group complaining to the county about dumping and odor near Key Biscayne, he said, was told to go out and get signatures to petitions.

"That's not the kind of thing we want in our Metro government," Brake said.

### EDITOR:

Ever since Metro's been in, the so-called improved garbage collection has been fouled up. If a holiday falls in a week there's usually one collection. Other weeks it's supposed to be Tuesday and Friday, but it could be any two days in the week.

Now this week it was Tuesday and Thursday — making five days before the next collection.

Now the real joke — once-a-month trash collections. Every one knows there was almost no service at all for the first six months then hit-and-

miss service. If you phone in they might come by.

In December there was no collection at all. After several letters back and forth to the County Manager's office they tried to tell me it was picked up. The Waste Department Manager said he interviewed several householders and they said it was picked up. There was green cuttings on piles to show it was just put out. Sure there was, as they were putting trash out for next collection on old piles. I know it was not collected.

Well they collected trash in January, but none in February. I phoned the County Manager's office twice. Finally wrote a letter in and they finally came around March 5.

Our collection week is the third week in the month . . . if . . . but . . . what.

In all fairness here—a gripe against the homeowner. Just as soon as trash is picked up some people — two in our block — and metal junk . . . even furniture, refrigerators and stoves. It could be called "city dump." Even their children dig and play in it. You would think they would enjoy having a clean and nice front appearance.

Metro should have a regular service — a certain week each month — and a fine for anyone who puts out trash more than four days before pickup.

Also they should not allow anything in the trash except limbs of trees cut in four-foot lengths and shrub and grass cuttings, etc.

Let the homeowner pay to haul other stuff away.

Editor:

In your Feb. 22 issue you had an article about unsightly trash piles in the unincorporated areas.

You took the home owners to task about placing their trash on the parkways in front of their homes before the trash trucks came to collect it. You couldn't seem to understand why we do this.

The answer is very simple, we have no idea when the trash truck will be by to pick up our trash, and apparently neither has the Metro Waste Department.

We pay for trash pickup, which is supposed to be on a monthly basis. We were given a schedule of when our trash would be picked up, but the trash trucks obviously were never given any schedule. Our schedule states that the trash would be picked up during the last week of each month. This means that you can expect the trash truck anytime from the second week of one month through the first week of the next month, or some months, not at all.

You seem to forget, the homeowner also has to look at his trash pile, and it is no more attractive to him than it is to his neighbor. Then at the end of the article you suggest the homeowners seek relief by jamming the Circuit Court with damage cases. Well, that brings up another point.

What about the homeowners who let their property go to rack and ruin?

What do you do about people who move into a nice neighborhood and turn the house they buy into something just a notch above a sharecropper's shack?

What do you do about people who burn trash, even though it is against the law?

What about the neighbors who let their children destroy your property, tear up your yard, and leave tricycles and all manner of toys on the public sidewalks?

How about the lovely folks who allow their animals to roam at will?

Shall we haul all of these people into Circuit Court too?

Instead of blasting out at homeowners, why not turn your editorial wrath on the Metro Waste Department and find out why the people of the unincorporated area aren't getting the service they are paying for? If you really think taking your neighbor to court over a trash pile will solve the situation, or improve neigh-

borhood relations, you're dead wrong. However, since the people of this area are damage happy and love to sue, (as witness the accident and automobile insurance claims; I am sure the Circuit Court will feel a response to your suggestion. Nice going . . . for your next project, why don't you seriously consider bombing some of the world's trouble making countries off the face of the earth . . . for aren't they causing damage to our foreign policy?)

Attila, with one of the girls' stuffed dolls clenched between his teeth, shook his head vigorously. It seemed as if the room wasn't large enough to contain him as he reared up on his hind legs like a horse.

"And they sleep in our bed under the covers," Mrs. Banas said, nodding to her Greyhounds, huddled together like fawns on an orange sofa.

"They radiate a lot of heat, probably because they don't have much hair. So in winter," she laughed, "it's extremely nice to have them under the covers."

Her Greyhounds are a bit larger than the norm of Italian greyhounds, which is eight pounds and 12 inches tall. Attila, just a baby at six months, will double his present weight of 50 pounds and add some five inches to his height of 27 inches.

Only 430 Italian Greyhounds (they're not for racing) were registered last year

with the American Kennel Club, said Mrs. Banas. Gino, who has won nine of 15 dog shows, is an AKC champion and Jodie holds an obedience title.

After the girls' 11 a.m. nap and lunch, Mrs. Banas takes them and the dogs for a walk and women and children come from all directions to watch and ask questions.

At night, Mr. Banas, a psychiatric nurse at Jackson Memorial Hospital, turns off the

TV and the dogs instinctively fly to the door for their evening walk.

The dogs get scraps and left-over gravy from the evening dinner. The Wolfhound puts away almost two pounds of food each day; the Greyhounds eat about one-half pound each.

"We have a cat, by the way, Caesar," said Mrs. Banas. She shook her head.

"He didn't come home this morning."

## NEURITIS THE CAUSES & CURES

By Dr. Melvin P. Deutsch



Neuritis is one of the most painful and nerve wracking experiences known to mankind. The pain is boring and stabbing. The victim is unable to get any rest or sleep. Every moment means suffering. There is loss of power and feeling. A local inflammation of a nerve is called simple neuritis. It is usually caused by pressure on a nerve at a point of exit from the spine. Pressure on a nerve near the surface of the body, such as the shoulder or elbow will result in numbness and tingling. Repeated constriction and pressure may result in inflammation of the affected nerve. The nerve sheath or neurolemma may squeeze the sensitive nerve fibers and form adhesions. This will aggravate the neuritis and develop into a chronic stage. Blows, falls, contusions and long exposure to cold will result in a similar way. The spine should be checked in all cases.

Newcomers to Miami complain they never have a feeling of belonging.

They never feel they have actually put down roots. They never get to know their city, its historic landmarks, its museums or its places of interest.

The chief reason is the high cost of admission to these places.

A family with more than two children finds the average \$1.25 adult and the \$.75 children's admission fee a big nut. They say the only thing that they can do is go swimming.

Invariably they end up by saying disgustedly that Miami is strictly a tourist town.

This need not be. By some simple expedient such as a driver's license to establish residency, admissions fees to such places as the Seaquarium, Vizcaya, the Spanish Monastery and museums could be automatically cut in half.

In this way, more families

would soak up local culture and background. This would do much toward fostering civic pride and promote a feeling of permanence and belonging.

This plan could be extended to include hotels and motels. A large number of families cannot afford to go away on vacation in the summer. A two week stay at a motel would prove a welcome change of scene.

This could be a summer time operation, thus leaving the winter season for the tourists and full price.

Let's face it, business is not so good in the summer as some would have us believe. In this way perhaps the native population could take up the slack. Some business is better than no business.

Schools have field trips to these places for the children and this is fine. But what of the adults? They are often more curious about the local scene than the children.

Usually it proves to be more fun and more informative to go in the small family group. This way more time can be spent poking about and learning.

Miami is comparatively young and growing. Something should be done to encourage the population to take pride and interest in its many landmarks.

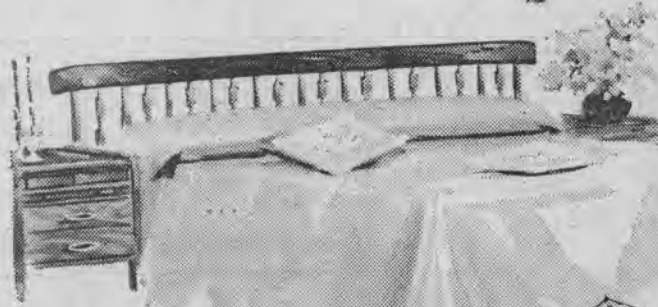

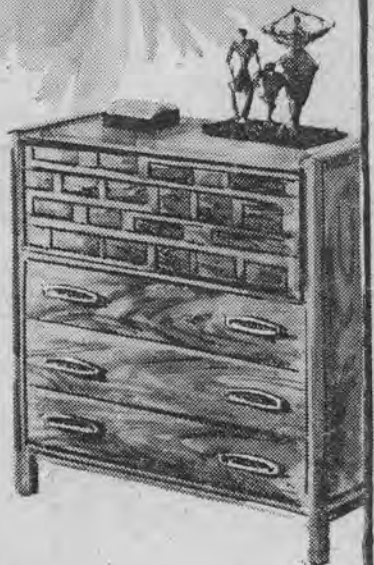
