

Is homosexuality curable?

Much of the defense of deviation is that it is not -therefore why try to do something about it?

Many knowledgeable persons hold the same view and maintain that the only way to curb its evils is to contain the pervert to the privacy of his bedroom and make it prohibitevely costly to attempt to recruit youth.

Now comes the New York Academy of Medicine with the flat statement that homosexuality is a disease and that it may be cured.

The following article is printed from the Wall Street Journal in the interest of further informing our readers about a serious problem.

Just as You Lose Faith in Man...

Just when you are about to succumb to the idea that people are no darn good, you hear a heartwarming story that reassures your faith in mankind.

We had just mulled over events of the past few weeks in which:

A woman was murdered and not one spectator called the police, let alone helped her.

Another woman was raped, called for help, but no one answered her pleas.

A boat sinks in sight of bystanders, a desperate struggle for survival ensues but ends tragically for some youths when help fails.

A boy flounders in a pool but no one dives in to help.

Then we get a call from Fire Chief Paul Matheson of Coral Gables that insures us all is not gone wrong with the humanity.

A man lies unconscious in a fire . . . a young man, Carl Boerger, 19, 315 Madrira, risks his own life to enter the apartment and drag the victim out.

The victim, still unconscious, was given mouth to mouth resusitation by Fireman T. R. Hamm, who revived him.

One act took much guts. The other took much compassion.

It gives one a good feeling to know that there are still many people around you could depend on to aid if the circumstance developed.



Question: Life's hopeless so why don't we just admit it and give up trying to do anything about it?

Answer: Life is a bitterness to the fool, a void to the loafer, and a teacher to the wise.

Question: How many missionaries could be supported in the field with the money the church spends on buildings and ornate sanctuaries each year?

Answer: More missionaries than are volunteering for the task. However, the question was well put. We should not worship in a barn, agreed. NEW YORK - The influential New York Academy of Medicine urged the nation's physicians to state clearly that homosexuality is an illness, and in some cases can be cured.

Society is "uncertain and confused" about what its attitude toward homosexuality is, the academy's committee on public health stated in a nine-page special report,

"Homosexuality is indeed an illness, the contrary conviction and protestations of the confirmed homosexual notwithstanding," the report declared. "In a strict sense it is a symptom of illness."

ed by a growing aggressiveness on the part of homosexuals in trying to promote their way of life, an increase in salacious literature and a rising veneral disease rate in New York City.

A spokesman for the Mattachine Society indicated there wouldn't be any immediate formal commitment on the report, but he said, "we don't believe the idea that homosexuals can be cured."

The society describes itself as an organization of homosexuals and others. It has a library, bail bond service and monthly lectures and has contributed to research projects on homosexuality. A spokesman said the group has about 300 members.

The academy began work on the pioneering study in December. It was decided first to state clearly the medical nature of the condition. "We wanted to set the matter straight." a spokesman said. "As time goes on, we may come up with additional thoughts on what might be done.'

Homosexuality is regarded as sinful by major religious groups. Under certain circumstances it is against the law in New York,

The number of homosexuals, however, remains unknown. "The aggressive homosexual so familiar to society, may only be a small proportion of the total homosexual population," the committee reported. It said that by the very nature of the condition, data are often inaccurate and misleading. "It is exceedingly difficult to take a census ... as many go their unobtrusive way and would be missed in the count," the medical group explained.

The physicians warned, however, that homosexuality appears to be more open and obtrusive. It said the condition is more prevalent in literature and the theater. Many homosexuals, would have it believed theirs is a noble way of life, the committee said.

"This is a fallacious argument that is contrary to fact," it added,

"The homosexual is an emotionally immature individual who has not acquired a normal capacity to develop satisfying heterosexual relationships," the academy said. It added that the condition may be an expression of fear of the opposite sex or an inability to accept adult responsibility.

The family is believed to exert the most influence on homosexual development, the medical group said. It added that homosexuality is "frequently associated with a fatherless home or its equivalent, as an absent or neglectful father, or a dominant mother with a weak, ineffectual mate."





FP&L Eyes Homestead Plant Site

More electricity for Dade County is the aim of Florida 'ower and Light Co., which hopes to build a new fuel burning plant at Turkey Point, off Homestead, and add one 425,000 killowatt natural gas unit at its Cutler plant.

These new expansion plans came on the heels of a company announcement that it could not guarantee the availability of natural gas to accept a permit for two units at Cutler.

Officials sent a letter to County Commissioners advising them of an option to buy the land if it be zoned for industrial usage.

"When we're certain that gas is available, we'll reapply for a permit at Cutler," a company spokesman reported.

The three-square mile Turkey Point site is $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles east of South Dixie Highway and $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles south from Homestead Bayfront Park.

The new site is far from any residences compared to the Cutler site surrounded by luxury homes. The Southwest and Cutler Residents Association was formed to fight expanding the Cutler plant.







Ideas For Improving Designs

Apartment buildings that are squeezed into a lot with a shoehorn, and awkward homes that add no quality to a community are quietly being negotiated "out of site" by an interesting innovation by Biscayne Federal Savings and Loan Association whose success is hailed not only by architects, but by commercial investors all over the coun-

The story opened three years ago when E. Albert Pallot, Bis-cayne's president, pioneered an architectural advisory board consisting of five top area architects whose function was to give professional verdicts on the merits of building designs submitted for loan applications.

The architects actually slt in review with the loan committee to evaluate every new structure. They are paid monthly retainer, their professional services come free of cost to the builder and homeowner applicants. The architects make changes, revisions, recommendations. Their work is to criticize and improve. The result has become so unique a marriage of the practical and the creative that national magazines have picked up the idea as a new direction for civic and property enhancement, and easily adopted by the more than 5,-000 savings and loan associations in the United States.

Not the least important is the enthusiasm of the architects themselves who have welcomed "the opportunity to express with commercial people," as one architect put it. All five were interviewed this week to give a professional verdict on their own merits in elevating, changing or removing some designs and standards they always deplored.

The hand-picked five on the Architectural Advisory Board, all Fellows of American Institute of Architects. are Herbert H. Johnson who succeeded the late Robert Law Weed, Robert M. Little, Russell Pancoast, Igor Polevitzky and Robert Fitch Smith.

"This area needs develop-ment," said Murphy, "and what better way than by allowing private enterprise to build with the stipulation that they provide plenty of open space and off-street parking."





There is a pilot group already started in LaJolla. This group will experiment and determine which approaches are successful.

The Institute will study the causes and cures of cancer, birth defects, arthritis, and other biological maladies. The "Dry" scientists will try to find ways of making the aged
