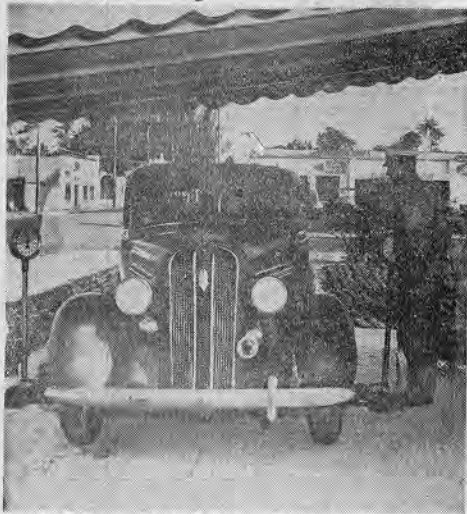

**4,000 VEHICLES STILL MUST FACE
SEMI-ANNUAL CHECKUP BY CITY**

"Doctor of Cars" would be a good title for Sgt. Floyd Brasher of the Coral Gables traffic division as the deadline for the semi-annual "check-up" of motor vehicles draws near.

Front foot brakes, emergency lights, dimmers, horn, windshield wiper, and rear brakes are checked off on your inspection card. If your car is in A-1 condition, he glues a little sticker on your windshield, which means that you can drive in the Gables for another six months if your tires last and you can get the gas.

"There are still over 4,000 cars in Coral Gables that must be inspected before the April 15th deadline. After that date car-owners without inspection stickers will be subject to arrest," Sgt. Brasher said.

The testing station at the corner of Avenue Giralda and Salzedo street is open daily from 8:30 a. m. to 12 noon and from one to five p. m. Saturday hours are from 8:30 to 12 noon.

For the convenience of defense workers and business men the testing station will open from 8:30 to 12 noon on April 14th, and it will be open all day on Saturday, April 14th.

The newly-installed Bendix brake tester is being used for the first time, taking the guess work out of the brake inspection.

**Healy Raps, Mayes Defends
His Two Years in Office**

On the Battlefield Politic

THOMAS C. MAYES

I am happy to accept the invitation of the Riviera to use its columns for a final statement before the city election next Tuesday. I am grateful to Publisher Al Harum for this privilege.

A story in the Miami Herald Wednesday intimated a last-minute issue would be projected into the campaign on the question of CIVIL SERVICE for city employees. This is a matter to which I have given much time and study for the past 2 years and I can say with confidence that Civil Service is not an issue, as the question has been settled; both as to the satisfaction of the employees and to the benefit of the taxpayers.

In my platform 2 years ago I advocated a full and adequate Civil Service. I stated further, "that I would support any movement for any necessary changes to provide such Civil Service."

One of my first official acts and that of the present Commissioners, was to take up the question of providing an adequate Civil Service for the employees of the city. An attorney representing them, accompanied by a group of employees, appeared before the commission and submitted a comprehensive Civil Service ordinance. The proposed ordinance set up a Civil Service Board composed of 5 members, two of

In addressing the citizens and voters of Coral Gables I have in mind that political campaigns every two years have been usually without so-called "issues", and the candidates for Mayor and Commissioner have refrained from charges and accusations against their opponents. This is as it should be. We like to think of Coral Gables as a quiet, well ordered City, where everyone, including the public officers, works for the best interests of the community, without a selfish or equivocal purpose.

A this time, however, an important decision must be made. Coral Gables is a wholesome, cultured home area. It was well planned by the founders and, by and large, has been well managed in the past twenty years.

Coral Gables cannot coast along on its good name. It has outgrown the village status and must take its place with the modern cities of Florida. Post-war progress and improvement will require that we keep step. **Election Eve
Rally is Set
For Monday at
Gables School**

With an election eve rally scheduled for Monday evening the five candidates for the three posts on the City Commission today were prepared to put their campaign to the ballot-test on Tuesday.

In a statement written for the Riviera Andrew T. Healy, candidate for Mayor and Commissioner, verbally spanked Mayor Thomas C. Mayes for not carrying through to completion his projects. The incumbent Mayor, in his statement, pointed with pride to his record in office and promised a continuance of his devotion to his duty if reelected.

Both the majority candidates' statements—and shorter ones from Frank N. Holley Jr., Paul H. Brinson, and Col. Alfred Lindeburg—are printed in full under the heading "The Battlefield Politic" elsewhere in today's Riviera.

Three posts on the commission—one of which must be designated as Mayor—are at stake in the Tuesday voting. The polls will open at 7:30 a. m. and close at 7:42 p. m.

All of the candidates have accepted the invitation of the Non-Partisan League of Women Voters to address a meeting at the Coral Gables Elementary School on Monday evening from 8 to 10 p. m. Dr. Franklin Williams of the University of Miami will act as moderator during the open forum questioning following short addresses by the candidates.

**520 Oppose, 9
Voters Favor
Consolidation**

Sixty-one more Gableites cast their vote against Miami Mayor Thomson's consolidation plan to bring the total vote to 520 for and nine against the merger, winding up the straw ballot conducted by the Riviera during the past three weeks.

**Shaw Curbs \$4110 Raised
Water Use For Red Cross**

**Drought Imperils
Pressure Here**

Sharp curtailment of water use in Coral Gables was ordered today by City Manager George N. Shaw as a result of prevailing drought conditions. Shaw declared that water pressure has fallen to a "dangerous low" as a result of too liberal use of water for sprinkling lawns and shrubbery.

"Until further notice," the City Manager declared, "sprinkling of lawns and shrubbery will be permitted in Coral Gables only on Tuesdays and Fridays, except between the hours from 4:30 p. m. to 7:30 p. m. The total elimination of sprinkling between those evening hours on the days when sprinkling is otherwise permitted is due to the existence of a peak demand at that time of the day for kitchen and other household purposes which, when combined with sprinkling use almost eliminates pressure."

Shaw issued his warning after conferring with W. A. Glass, director of the city water and sewers department.

Water used for sprinkling the Biltmore golf courses is obtained from the drainage canals and pumped by electric pump, according to Col. H. C. Chenault, commanding officer of the regional station and convalescent hospital. This statement is being made because of telephone calls to the hospital by residents, protesting the apparent use of prohibited city water by observing the water sprinklers in use.

The soil-less growing of vegetables was explained to members of the Kiwanis Club of Coral Gables this week by Sgt. Foley F. Smith, attached to the Biltmore Hospital laboratory staff.

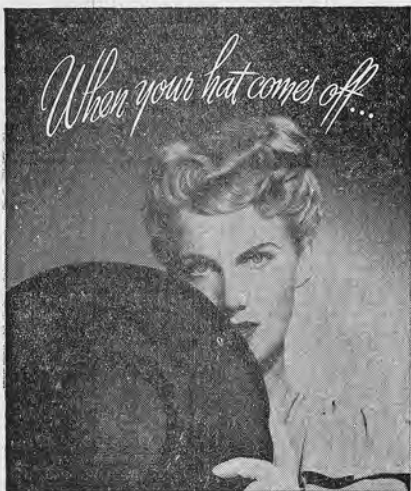

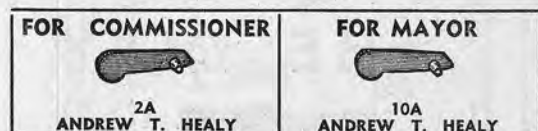

Benjamin Franklin at San Francisco

The nations soon to meet at San Francisco are resolved, this time, to bring the world lasting peace. But meetings and resolutions in the past have failed to bring lasting peace. How can the conference of nations at San Francisco do what the League of Nations at Geneva failed to do?

"Fifty-nine national policies do not make an international policy," said a newspaper observer at Geneva. Can forty-odd national policies make an international policy at San Francisco?

There was a time, during our own first Constitutional Convention, that the policies of our thirteen original colonies did not make a national policy. After six difficult weeks the delegates still failed to agree and the convention was on the point of breaking up. Then Benjamin Franklin made one of the greatest speeches of his career.

"The longer I live," he said, "the more convincing proofs I see of this truth: That God governs in the affairs of men. And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it possible that an empire can rise without His aid?"

This was the power that gave America birth. Men, planning for the future of their nation, found they could tap the great creative resources in the mind of God. Unless we do this at San Francisco too we will, in Franklin's words, "succeed in this political building no better than the builders of Babel. We shall be divided in our own little partial local interests; our projects will be confounded, and we ourselves shall become a reproach and byword down to future ages."

Men and nations, in these crises, have been so busy looking after No. 1 that they have no corner of their hearts and minds free to listen to the Real No. 1. They have even refused to pray about their disagreements on the ground that they do not want to use God as a fire escape. They forget that prayer is two-way: that God's direction for unselfish living is available at an international convention or at any other time.

If the Spirit of Benjamin Franklin presides at San Francisco, and men again call for and accept direction from the "Father of Lights," we will find the unselfish hinking and living which can build a world that works. And the world men want.

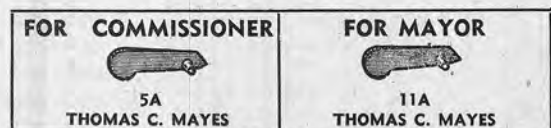

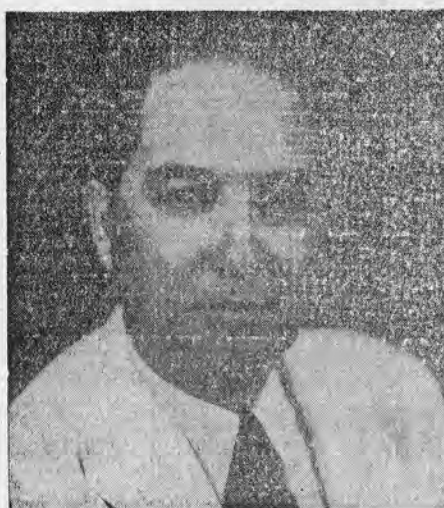

whom were to be selected by the employees, two by the Commissioners and the fifth to be named by the four selected. The proposed ordinance further provided for a separate office with a full time secretary and personnel. Scheduled examinations were to be given regularly to employees and an eligibility list established. The city manager could hire no one not named on the eligibility list. The annual minimum cost of this Board was estimated to be \$5,000. An exhaustive study of this ordinance revealed the plan was too complicated for a city the size of Coral Gables; that it was contrary to the fundamental principles of the city manager form of government, and the cost of operation was not justified. Convinced that this conclusion was right, I as Mayor, sought other ways and means to provide security for the city employees, for after all, security for the employees was the sole objective to be attained. I suggested a Trial Board could be set up whose members would serve without pay. This Board would settle all differences which might arise between employees and the city manager and would provide the same protection, without cost to the taxpayers, as the Civil Service Board. At the same time a Pension Plan would be created to provide adequate security. These suggestions were the subject of numerous conversations between the Commissioners and employees and they met with universal approval.

On April 27, 1944, your commission appropriated monies to engage a recognized actuary to develop and submit a suitable Pension Plan. Mr. Arthur S. Hansen of Chicago was engaged and on October 7, 1944 he presented his plan to the city manager. This plan was studied as to adjustments and Mr. Hansen was called in for a final conference with the Commissioners. The completed plan was accepted by the commission on February 20, 1945, and submitted to the city employees on February 26, 1945. Accompanying the plan was the recommendation that it was the best method of giving the employees adequate security, together with a Trial Board as described; that it provided all that a Civil Service Board could provide, but without cost to the taxpayers and without the objectionable features.

A committee from the employees, representing all departments, and numbering 50 or more, received the plan and recommendations and gave it unanimous endorsement. Your Mayor and Commissioners lost no time in taking steps requisite to passing an ordinance setting up the Pension Plan. New enabling acts by the State Legislature were necessary and a series of meetings with the Dade County Legislators were held. The Enabling Acts are being formulated and legal notices were inserted in the newspapers, as of March 30, 1945. My reelection as Mayor and Commissioner will permit me to carry on uninterrupted the work started 2 years ago and should assure an early enactment of the Pension Plan ordinance. I point with pride that during the 2 years of effort and study on behalf of the city employees, none of their rights and privileges have been jeopardized during this time and not one employee has been discharged or suspended. Harmony and good will predominate in all departments and I shall continue to foster this spirit when reelected Mayor.

I chose to give you the complete story on Civil Service, according to the record, and have not mentioned the other achievements of the past 2 years. This record is given in a folder which I enclosed with my letter to the citizens of Coral Gables, and may be found elsewhere in the Riviera.

My 4 years as your Commissioner and 2 years as Mayor have been busy but happy years of service. The next 2 years will produce many complex problems which experience alone can solve. THIS IS NOT THE TIME to change experience for good intentions!

genial, self supporting living, and will attract to us the type of home owner and merchant we desire.

Fortunately, for the good of the community, Coral Gables is not so large that a political candidate can make sweeping statements of accomplishments and expect the people to believe him. THESE THINGS ARE TOO EASILY CHECKED. Nor can a candidate confuse issues and befuddle the public by glittering promises just before election time.

My opponent, the present Mayor, appeals to the voters that this is NOT the time to change officials who have shown that they are "able and qualified". Let us see what the record shows as to HIS achievements and accomplishments, if any.

FIRST, suppose we refer to his platform promises, announced in April 1943, when he was a candidate for the office of Mayor:

Item: A SANITARY AND STORM SEWER SYSTEM—No progress. Why not have promised a subway system too, which, obviously was as unattainable under war conditions.

Item: REPAIR OF STREETS, SIDEWALKS, BRIDGES AND WATERWAYS—No progress, except that shortly before this present election time certain streets were oiled and sanded (for \$124,000.00).

Item: ACQUISITION AND DEVELOPMENT OF COMMUNITY PLAYGROUNDS—No progress. The site for the War Memorial and Youth Center was not furnished by the City, but cost the Center \$17,500.00. Is this not a community play project?

Item: BEAUTIFICATION OF BUSINESS DISTRICT AND PLANTING OF PARKWAYS Progress here. Hibiscus hedges on vacant business lots.

Item: NEW INDUSTRIES—No progress, in spite of the fact that in surrounding areas many new small industries have located through activities of the city executive.

SECOND, suppose we refer to his record of achievement, published in March 1945, on which he seeks re-election:

Item: 6500 VACANT LOTS BACK ON TAX ROLL—Taxes on many vacant lots, long delinquent, are being paid solely because of the current active real estate market. A product of the war.

Item: REIMBURSEMENT OF \$35,000.00 BILTMORE TAX LOSS—A laudable achievement, when it is accomplished. This program was originated before the term of the present Mayor.

Item: POST WAR PLANNING—With the keenest rivalry among Florida cities for post war advantages and City Planning, no steps were taken by the Mayor until one month before re-election time.

Item: CITY EMPLOYEES SALARY INCREASE—This increase was necessary to retain and secure efficient employees. The departments of public safety have too long been under-paid and under-staffed.

Item: NEW EQUIPMENT—No miracle here. The abnormal increase in bus traffic provides the money for this and many other benefits. A product of the war. Our transportation system, operating under wartime handicaps, compares favorably in efficiency and courtesy with any in the country, and it always has.

One achievement of his administration, of which the Mayor does NOT boast, was the lowering of building restrictions, which has attracted a type of housing units far below the standard set by Coral Gables planners. It is doubtful if this accomplishment will reflect credit on his administration or will be productive of major tax revenue.

In reviewing the campaign promises of 1943 we find few, if any, of them fulfilled as promised.

In reviewing the record of achievement, recently published for pre-election expediency, we find that few, if any, of the items claimed were originated by the present Mayor. How can he expect re-election on the basis of unfulfilled promises of two years ago, and appropriation of undue credit for occurrences during the past two years. Initiative and constructive leadership have been conspicuous by their absence.

POST WAR PLANS AND SPECIFIC PERFORMANCE, INSTEAD OF POLITICAL PROMISES, ARE WHAT CORAL GABLES CITIZENS ARE INTERESTED IN. THE ONLY WAY TO INSURE THESE IS TO ELECT THE LEADERSHIP NECESSARY FOR AN EFFICIENT ADMINISTRATION OF CITY AFFAIRS. CONDUCTED SO THAT THEY WILL BENEFIT ALL OF US.

The objectives I have announced for myself are important and practical. FURTHER, they are possible of accomplishment, even under continued war conditions; AND, finally, they are possible without increase of debt or taxes.
