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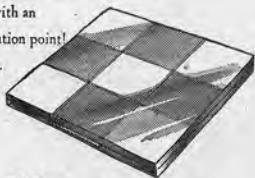

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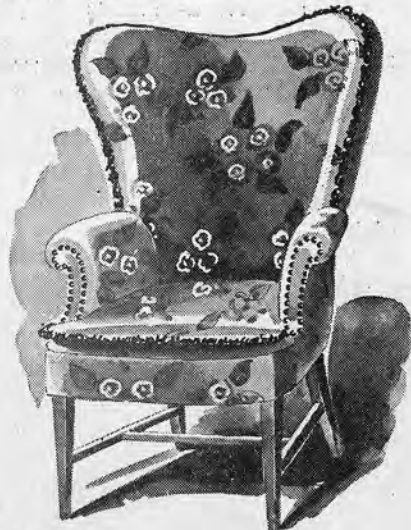
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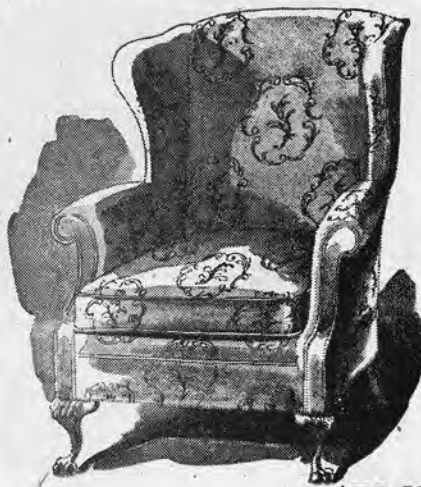

ATLANTA, Ga.—Major General John H. Hester, U.S. Army, of 26 Avenue Calabria, Coral Gables, has been awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Legion of Merit, Headquarters, Seventh Army announced here today.

The citation accompanying the award states: "He performed exceptionally meritorious service to the government while Commanding General, Infantry Replacement Training Center, Camp Croft, S.C. during the period June 1944 to August 1945. His devotion to duty, untiring energy and keen foresight were instrumental in the promotion of Infantry doctrine, advancement in methods of Infantry training, and the production of 41,825 trained Infantry replacements.

Keep State Green Drive Started

Gov. Millard F. Caldwell will "spark" the "Keep Florida Green" movement at Tallahassee on October 30, President Leonard K. Thomson of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce announced here today, in outlining the broader details of a statewide movement designed mainly, he declared, to prevent the destruction by fire of Florida's forests. He said that 15,000 forest fires, most of which were deliberately set, were recorded in Florida last year.

"We feel greatly encouraged by action of the Governor in accepting our invitation to open the forthcoming conference," Thomson said, "which will be attended by representatives of several hundred statewide groups, all interested in the conservation of the state's timber," adding that X. L. Pellicier of Saint Augustine, who is president of the Florida Forest and Park Association, had accepted chairmanship of the movement.

Thomson said the Forestry Division of the State Chamber, at a recent conference, determined "to come to grips at once" with timberland arsonists. The remedy, he declares, lies more in the field of education than it does in the realm of law enforcement. "We hope," he asserted, "to impress upon our people the urgent need of forest preservation, and prove to them that setting fire to the trees is criminally wasteful, and serves no economic purpose whatsoever."

Materials Are Still Needed To Complete Vet Houses

The "starting" of veterans' dwellings in Florida is easing a bit but materials needed in "finishing" are not yet to be had, the Florida State Chamber of Commerce reported yesterday in its weekly business study, released by the organization's research and industrial department. "Until the veterans' home building program gets nearer the established goal by thousands of homes, millions of dollars in authorized industrial building are practically at a standstill," the report reveals, "and will not move on to the Florida production line at other than a snail's pace."

"Factual data incident to the actual number of veterans' homes under construction in Florida is worth little," the report continues, "in face of Civil Production Administration's report that stubborn scarcities will persist even in 1947. Contractors know of no way to substitute extra bricks for doors which cannot be found, nor can they use glass for nails. Homebuilders wish they knew the alchemy of doing so, because precisely such shortages and surpluses, side by side are becoming more and more tantalizing.

In some categories, the report added, but even under the lash of government, shortages in other categories vital to the necessities of habitability, are monumental.

'Keep Your Thumb Out of the Soup', State Sanitary Engineer Asks Waitresses

An appeal to waitresses and the management of all Coral Gables eating places to be more careful in their food handling habits and to tighten up on sanitation rules in their establishments was made today by David B. Lee, chief sanitary engineer, State Board of Health.

Mr. Lee pointed out that the opening of the tourist season in Florida is drawing near and that he hopes employees in eating houses will feel more responsible for presenting a sanitary front to our out-of-state visitors.

Cracks Hide Germs

Cracked cups and dishes should be thrown away as a number one must. Battered and chipped utensils make good hiding places for germs. They are virtually impossible to sanitize.

Waitresses should always wear hair nets when on duty. Loose hair not only presents an untidy appearance but all hair carries myriads of bacteria and should not be allowed to hang loose and blow over food.

He said that most states have laws controlling these two offenses and that visitors will be particularly sensitive to them. Florida so far however, has no way of controlling them but appeals to the management and individuals.

Keep the pencil out of your hair . . . bacteria from the hair is passed on to the check, the check is laid on the table, and the whole thing becomes a vicious cycle.

Watch Abrasions

Be careful about open abrasions. Cuts on the hands and arms and pimples on the face are filled with staphylococcus, a bacteria peculiar to the skin and highly poisonous. One pimple can carry enough bacteria to make an entire city block of persons ill.

Keep fingernails clean and cut short. Uniforms should be changed regularly. A clean, neat appearance does a lot not only for the customers' morale but your own as well. Keep your hand off your face and away from your hair.

Pick up glasses from the bottom and knives, forks and spoons by the handle—never touch the portion that will come in contact with the customer's mouth.

No sweeping please, while customers are eating. Never touch butter with your hands . . . it should be picked up by a fork or spoon only.

And, keep your thumb out of the soup!

By following these simple, everyday habits of cleanliness you can "keep a good taste in your customers' mouths and go a long way toward controlling disease."
