More than 300 new students call-ed at the Chamber of Commerce Monday in search of rooms, and a slightly 1 ess er number appeared each succeeding day. "We are cleaned out," said Mrs. Mary T. Moore, executive secre-tary, "My one assistant, Mrs. Bernadine Saunders, who is in charge of housing, has had her time fully occupied with the task all week," Mrs. Moore stressed the need for reasonably priced rooms. Students were lined up at 3 a.m., Wednesday at the University, hop-ing to register.





They must see that national economy is not a matter of nation resources but of national and international morality, where men and nations care for each other instead of clutching at the other fellow's resources or clinging to their own. And that no real sten towards real peace can do sourthing but step towards real peace can do anything but help our national economies.

Men with this "know how" will know how to make peace. To send anybody else to do the job is like sending expert concrete mixers to mix batter for your pancakes.

Drums of 'Gimme'

The American Legion at its national con-vention will hear two bonus proposals, one calling for veterans of World War II to be paid a bonus amounting to \$30.00 for each month served in the United States and \$60.00 for each month served overseas.

Figuring my service roughly, as a vet-eran, I would be entitled to a bonus of ap-proximately \$1,740, if congress saw fit to adopt such a proposal.

At the risk of being called erazy for spurning that amount of money, I say that the idea of a bonus stinks to the heavens!

Maybe I'm sticking my neck out, but I don't think the average straight thinking veteran wants to be doled out a bonns. He wants a place to live and a chance to stand stand

wants a place to live and a chance to stand on his own two feet and earn a decent living for himself and his family. The placing of a premium on patriotism by offering any man who joined the armed forces a "tip" in the form of a cash bonus should be considered a slap in the face. Yet on any street corner you can find the "professional veteran" chanting his little "offence" tune and demondum bic orte cash

the "professional veteran" chanting his little "gfmme" tune and demanding his exta cash gratuity because he answered his country's call when his country needed him. And to make matters a little more galling, some of the guys who shout the loudest for the pay-ment of a bonus are the ones who go the little cards that said "Greetings, you have been selected by a group of your friends and neighbors . . ."

" Our 297.2 billion dollar national debt (if Our 297.2 billion dollar national debt (if prorated to our 55 million workers) means that everyone who works owes the govern-ment \$5,400 upon which he pays an annual interest of \$100 in taxes. And yet our "Pan-handler Patriots" would add additional bil-lions to that debt in the form of a bonus. Aids to the veteran in education, medi-cal service, business loans and housing are fine—provided the VA gets the kinks out of administering them. But there is nothing in the creed of America that can condone an out-and-out dole to veterans. The veterans organization that condemns such an idea and demands that it never be paid is the one that numbers true patriots on its rolls—not the one that beats the drums of "gimme, gimme."





DO IRON BARS A PRISON MAKE?

DO IRON BARS A PRISON MARE! I saw two service men pause at the corner of Ponce de Leon and Alhambra Circle to locate the source of the chimes. The familiar melody of the doxology, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow" filled the plaza. The music was coming from a building approached through colonnades and protected by barred windows. A bulletin board said it was the First Presbyterian Church of Coral Gables, but the men studied the iron bars, wondering if they were to keep the sinners out or the saints in. The Riviera Notebook could have told them the bars were there to keep hoodlums out, yes, but not out of church services. They were reminders of the days when the church was the original Coral Gables Bank. When the new Presbyterian congregation bought the

What the original coral capies bank. When the new Presbyterian congregation bought the property from the bank, it was difficult to visualize a church auditorium. The barred windows didn't matter, but the large columns inside the bank obstructed the view of the pulpit and the vault took up much needed space.

The men of the church tackled the vault first. They assumed that it would take only a couple of weeks' work with hammer and chisel to crumble the walls. At the end of the second week there was no appreciable progress. It was plain that only dynamite would clear the space needed.

Now blasting on the outside is dangerous enough, but dynamiting the inside of a building is something else again. It took courage to let such a contract, but the fuse was lit and the wall tumbled down, and the southeast transept was added to square off the floor space.

Later, alternate pillars were removed and gradually the bank was re-designed to make one of the most beautiful churches in the area.

Back of the bank building was the original Coral Gable Back of the bank building was the original Coral Gables Post Office, and with the colonnades between, they formed a triangle around a patio. The church congregation was glad when the post office also decided to move to a more central location and sold their property to the church for a church school building. A large painting of "The Smiling Christ," whittling sail boats for children, is hung in the church school Fellowship Hall. It is the gift of the artist, Upton Ewing, Coral Gables architect.

architect.

The next time you hear the chimes at Ponce de Leon and Alhambra Circle, take a stroll around the triangle which forms the First Presbyterian church, enter the auditorium with reverence and visit Fellowship Hall with a feeling of "belonging." You'll be convinced that iron bars do not "a prison make" when a church is the center of a community, "where cross the crowded ways of life."




