Xmas Prizes Offered to Homes, Shops

Decoration Contests Are Announced by Geoffrey Helm

Both Gables merchants and residents will be able to participate in two Christmas Decoration Contests, plans for which were made public today by Geoffrey Helm, chairman of the Merchant's Bureau Christmas Contest Committee.

Revised for the first time since the war, the contests will offer fifteen attractive merchandise prizes to residents who decorate the exterior of their homes to carry out the Christmas spirit.

Three cash prizes are being offered by the Chamber of Commerce for stores producing the most attractively dressed Christmas windows.

Judges for the home decoration contest will consist of a city official, a local artist and a local architect, yet to be named. Three professional window dressers, from out of the city, are being sought to judge the store windows.

Store windows, which will be judged on how well the merchandise carried is used in a Christmas display, will be judged between December 9 and December 14. Homes will be judged between December 21st and 28th, and residents are urged to submit entry blanks as soon as possible.

Already offered as prizes are a Sunbeam Mixer from Rogers Electric; a \$25.00 dress from Berkeley Ltd.; a set of seat covers from Tutan Motors and a silver plate from Ringers. Twelve other prizes (Please turn to Page Three)

LOCAL REAL ESTATE BROKER SUPPLIES 2,500 TAGS

The "Shop in Coral Gables" campaign received additional impetus today with the arrival of 2,500 attractive metal tags, which Gables boosters may affix over their license plates.

The tags, done in the city colors of orange and green, are being supplied to Gableites without charge by Georges Courtois, local real estate broker, as his contribution to the promotion of the Gables shopping area.

As soon as they can be distributed, the tags will be available at all service stations in Coral Gables, and local residents are requested to boost their home town and their local merchants by affixing them to their cars. The tags are available now at The Riviera office to anyone desiring them.

In addition to the legend "Shop and Save in Coral Gables", the tags bear an illustration of the city hall and a clump of palm trees.

Gables Votes Democratic In Election

Coral Gables, which voted on the Republican side of the ledger in the last presidential election, swung back to the Democratic solid South in Tuesday's general balloting.

Of the 7,580 registered in the six precincts that lie wholly or partially within the city limits of the Gables, 4,823 voters went to the polls.

Of the Gables candidates listed on the ballot two were successful and one was defeated. Jimmie Henderson, Democratic candidate for school board in district three polled 2,341 Gables votes to his Republican opponent Earl Coffin's 1,364. Gableite Duncan Held, who was Republican nominee for county purchasing agent, failed to carry his home community, and was defeated 2,141 to 1,729 by Democrat Bill Joyce. Held did carry his home precinct, 84, 160 to 112. Rep. Richard Oelkers, Jr., returned to the state legislature with a wide margin of votes.

The Gables agreed with the rest of the area in sending Senator Spessard Holland back to the Senate and in electing George Smathers to the House of Representatives.

The Gables also went strongly for Bill Lantaff and "Bun" Gaudier, candidates for state legislature.

Fire Truck Purchase Gets City Approval

After hearing salesmen from various fire engine companies extol the virtues of their products for over an hour Tuesday night, the city commission authorized the purchase of a Mack, pumper-type fire truck at a cost of \$10,546.

Meter 'Take' Averages \$600 Each Week

An average amount of \$600 is being collected each week from parking meters, it was reported by E. D. Poorman, city finance director.

Overtime meter parking for the past week brought a revenue of \$40 from the 80 violators.

Orange Bowl Pool Show Is Slated

Reservations are already beginning to come in for the Coral Gables Orange Bowl Water Festival, slated for December 27 and 28 at the Biltmore Hospital Pool. Johnny Rosasco, manager of the Venetian Pool, stated yesterday.

The show, which has been officially accepted as part of the Orange Bowl program, will present the best professional swimming and diving talent in the area in addition to the pick of the night club entertainment, Rosasco stated. Proceeds will go to the Coral Gables War Memorial Youth Center.

As only 3,000 seats are available for both shows, Rosasco urged those wishing to witness the event to make reservations early, phoning the Venetian Pool (4-1801) to do so. A special preview performance for the hospital patients is planned for December 26th.

The Coral Gables Junior Chamber of Commerce is undertaking to sponsor the ticket sale for the event.

This will not interfere with the annual Coral Gables Swim Fest, sponsored annually by the Chamber of Commerce, the city and The Riviera, which will also be held during the Christmas vacation period. This swim fest is for Coral Gables youngsters and is an athletic competition.

Dam Suit Hearing Impending

H. H. Eyles Named Master To Hear Dispute

Coral Gables' dispute with the Dade County Commission over the attempted placement of a dam in the Coral Gables Canal at Dixie Highway will flare up again within the next few days when H. H. Eyles, special master in chancery, begins taking testimony.

The appointment of Eyles, to hear this community's attack on the county's water control plan, was made public this week and was the signal for City Attorney Edward L. Semple to start lining up an imposing array of witnesses. Testimony must be completed within 45 days from October 26.

The case developed several months ago when County Engineer Earle Rader attempted to place a dam in the canal at the highway in an effort to prevent salt water infiltration. The move brought an immediate outcry from property owners in the area and hostmen who claimed that such a move would block the canal to host traffic, lower property values and prevent the future development of the Riviera waterway section.

Milton B. Garris, consulting engineer, supported the city's stand by adding that the placing of the dam in that location would not produce the desired effect. The canal area was immediately posted as city property and county authorities were warned that any attempts to place the dam there would result in the workmen being arrested as trespassers.

The dam was placed in the canal, west of Red Road, pending the litigation.

The Youth Center president also reminded Gableites that the institution is a participating agency of the Community Chest, and urged that they participate fully in the coming campaign.

Approval of Chain Fences Is Denied

An ordinance permitting chain link fences in the rear of Coral Gables residences failed on second reading before the city commission Tuesday night for want of a second.

The ordinance had passed first reading at a previous meeting, but city commissioners did an about face when it came up for final enactment, expressing the opinion that such fences would mar the beauty of the Gables.

Apartment Owners Excused Tax On Own Units

Apartment owners, using one unit in their building as a permanent place of residence, need not pay city occupational license fees on that part of the building, the city commission ruled Tuesday night.

Any owner who has paid an occupational license fee, and counted such an apartment in computing his license, is entitled to a refund, the commission stated.

To Start Work On High School By June 1st

Construction on the first unit of the new Coral Gables High School is scheduled to get under way by June 1st and will be ready for use by January, 1948, Dr. James T. Wilson, superintendent of schools, said today.

The work was given the go-ahead signal by the school board Monday, when \$750,000 was appropriated for the first unit, which will be located on a 22-acre tract at LeJeune and Bird Roads. The first unit will have a capacity of 1,000 students, about half its eventual capacity.

The board also appropriated \$50,000 for an addition to the cafeteria at the Coral Gables Elementary School.

Testing Station Open On Wednesdays Only

The brake testing station at police headquarters will be open Wednesdays only, effective immediately, Lt. Floyd P. Brasher announced today.

Youth Center Drive Ends; President Thanks Aides

TOTAL OF \$60,000 SEEN BY HARRY MORGENTHAUER

Although still short of the \$75,000 goal, leaders of the Coral Gables War Memorial Youth Center called a halt to their drive this week in order not to interfere with the impending solicitation of the Dade County Community Chest.

In announcing the end of the campaign, Youth Center

President Harry W. Morgenthauer expressed belief that pledges may total as high as \$80,000 when some of the larger potential donors make known the amount they intend to give.

"There are still quite a few pledge cards out," Morgenthauer stated, "which prevents us from giving a complete total at this time. A number of them are in the hands of men and women who are potential donors of substantial gifts."

"On behalf of the directors and myself, I want to thank all of those who participated in the drive," Morgenthauer added. "Many of our workers were tireless in their enthusiasm and their work reflects credit not only on the Youth Center, but on the community itself."

Morgenthauer also expressed thanks to those who had made pledges during the drive and assured them that the building would be completed, "to stand as a living memorial to the men and women who fearlessly served their country in time of stress."

CITY TO FIGHT BUS LINE TO BEACH

The right of the Florida State Railroad Commission to grant permission for the operation of a bus line between Miami Beach and the University of Miami will be attacked in court by the City of Coral Gables, City Attorney Edward L. Semple announced today.

The permission was granted for the Inter-City Coach Co. to start such service on Monday, charging a 25-cent one-way fare for students and 50-cents for non-students.

The city attorney stated that a previous agreement with Fred B. Hartnett not to attack the company's plea for a certificate of convenience and necessity had been nullified because the company had not held to all stipulations of the agreement.

Semple contends that the bus is in direct competition with the City of Coral Gables transportation system.

He also stated that the case will provide a proving ground for the city's long-standing contention that the Railroad Commission exercises jurisdiction without authority in such matters.

Business on Vacant Lots Is Prohibited

An ordinance designed to prevent the establishment of business places on vacant lots and requiring that all such enterprises in Coral Gables be adequately housed was placed on first reading Tuesday night by the city commission.

An additional ordinance, zoning future used car sales enterprises to the Industrial Area, was also placed on first reading.

DRIVE LAUNCHED AGAINST IMPROPER HAND SIGNALS

A campaign against drivers failing to use proper hand signals was launched this week by the Police Department Traffic Bureau. Lt. Floyd Brasher, in charge of the bureau, said that offenders will be subject to arrest.

"This one item of neglecting to use proper hand signals causes most of our minor accidents," said Lieutenant Brasher "and we are bearing down on the enforcement of this law."

A new traffic light will soon be installed at the intersection of Bird Road, Granada Boulevard and University Drive to aid the congestion of University students driving to and from South Campus, Brasher said.

He revealed, too, that a recommendation will be made for the immediate installation of a signal light at Blue Road and University Drive.

Riviera Columnist On School Program

Mary Helm Clarke, who conducts the Riviera Notebook column in The Riviera will be the principal speaker at the assembly program, December 4, at the Coral Gables Elementary School.

Drawing from her column material, Miss Clarke will tell of oddities in Coral Gables and throughout the state.

The school children are keeping Riviera Notebooks of their own, containing interesting information about their town, gleaned from the columns of the community newspaper.

CONTROL HERE SEEN AT STAKE

Coral Gables' battle to defend its ordinances preventing liquor bars will go into the first round on Nov. 17, when the circuit court will hear a city motion to quash the alternate writ of mandamus issued to Ed Hassenfeufel, operator of the Howard Johnson Restaurant, City Attorney Edward L. Semple revealed today.

Street Light Program Is Launched

The city launched its long deferred street lighting program on Tuesday evening with the authorization for the immediate installation of 17 street lights, mainly in the residential areas.

City Manager William T. McIlwain said that these compose the first of a group of 100 lights the city plans to install this year. Further improvements in the street lighting system will be planned for the next budget year.

Two lights are planned for Galliano street at Avenues Aragon and Giralda. Seven lights will be installed on Hernando Street at Avenues Valencia, Almeria, Palermo, Catalonia, Malaga, Santander and Anasias. Another will be placed at Cardena and Malaga.

Lights will also be placed on Marmore and Daroco Streets, both 100 feet west of LeJeune Road, while others are planned for Hardee and LeJeune, Andalusia and Cordova, the Trail at El Radio and Alberca and on Alhambra Plaza between Galliano Street and Douglas Road.

Okell Scores Apathy of Local Voters

Lack of "understanding" of issues at stake at the polls, and "apathy" on the part of voters was severely criticized this week by George Okell, Gables attorney and former member of the State Legislature. Okell addressed members of the Coral Gables Lions Club, meeting at the Country Club of Coral Gables.

"The people of this state will have good government only if they take a proprietary interest in its operation—and that means acquiring a thorough understanding of legislative proposals which face them at the polls," Okell declared.

The former legislator expressed regret that the proposed fourth and fifth amendments had been defeated in Tuesday's voting.

"Under the present system of handling monies the various bureaus and departments of the state government receive funds each year under continuing appropriations whether they need the money or not—and their expenditure is left entirely up to the head of the department or bureau," Okell explained.

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Okell Scores Apathy of Local Voters

to submit a budget for the efficient operation of his department or bureau for the year to a director of the budget appointed by and responsible to the State Legislature.

Okell cited the fact that the State Legislature had enacted the beer and cigarette taxes last year despite the existence of a balance of \$36,000,000 in various departmental and bureau funds.

"It costs the people of Florida \$120,000,000 a year to run the state," Okell continued. "Yet the elected legislature controls the expenditure of only \$22,000,000 of that amount."

The speaker compared the operation of the state with that of a large business corporation and pointed to the fact that in the latter all operations are on a budget principle.

"This lack of control is costing the state taxpayers in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000 per year," Okell declared.

Proportionate fire loss in forests protected by modern fire-fighting methods is one-ninth that suffered in unprotected areas.

To the Citizens of CORAL GABLES AND COCONUT GROVE
And to the Special Attention of Veterans of World Wars I and II

Greetings:
The following protest is made public only after mature consideration and with a marked degree of regret that its publication is deemed necessary.

I am a resident of the Gables, a Veteran, the head of a family and its source of support. At this moment I am being subjected to court eviction proceedings on a pretext so anti-social that should it succeed, the precedent established could do substantial harm to the welfare of these University communities, I believe.

Fact No. 1. As of October 6th, 1946, I advised my Landlord (Lady), Mrs. Wm. Proctor Hill, 3681 Palmetto Ave., Coconut Grove, that I had opened my home (her house) to three veteran students who are attending the University of Miami, until such time as housing facilities were adequate to provide normal living conditions for all of the students at the local institution.

Fact No. 2. I pay Mrs. Hill (whose phone number is 41461) full OPA rental for the residence at 5133 Riviera Dr., Coral Gables; and I have been a resident since November 27th 1945. The OPA ceiling is \$2,400.00 annually (increased \$300.00 just prior to my entry).

This house is entirely too large for the needs of my family, and I thought that taking in these boys during the current housing emergency was in the nature of a public-spirited act; they are charged the nominal rental of \$30.00 a month each for the two bedrooms they occupy and such home facilities as they wish and require).

Fact No. 3. However, instead of being a good citizen, with a reasonable degree of consideration for the needs and capacities of others; I find that in Mrs. Hill's opinion I am a "violin of a substantial responsibility of tenancy" and subject to summary eviction!

Possibly I am, and the further fact that I had offered to appear before the OPA in an attempt to obtain an increase in rental for Mrs. Hill, based upon the additional occupancy of her property, has little bearing.

I believe that Mrs. Hill is being unfair to a responsible tenant who owes her nothing, not even courtesy. And, a tenant who has had to do his own maintenance and repair on the property of another; Mrs. Wm. Proctor Hill having consistently refused to spend one red cent on her property since the day I possessed the property and found the front door hanging askew and the house open to trespass.

In addition, and to illustrate the pressures to which a tenant may be subjected; she, Mrs. Hill, has at frequent intervals appeared at these premises and begged certain items of furnishing (leased property!) which she would remove for purposes of her own.

Fact No. 4. Mrs. Hill wants to sell this property to gain immediate possession.

Neither she nor her agents have shown the least consideration in their efforts to "show the property". And either she or her agent has already tried this eviction case out of court, as evidenced by a possible purchaser who appeared at an unreasonable hour and demanded entrance as he had been assured that he could obtain immediate possession!

To Mrs. Wm. Proctor Hill I want to publically state that this eviction case is not as yet adjudicated. At this writing (November 5th) the date for a jury trial has not been set!

When Mrs. Hill may obtain immediate possession of her property, is of a jury of my peers to decide. Personally I do not experience any feeling of guilt in offering a home to three veteran students, average age 21, who now occupy two bedrooms, otherwise unused, in my home. Nor do I believe that Mrs. Hill has been injured in any degree.

I do believe that an action of this kind—eviction attempt on pretext—is selfish and ill-advised, and I can not believe that such actions can be condoned by the sane and reasonable element of these communities.

Consequently, in self protection and with due regard to a substantial principle involved; I intend to contest Mrs. Hill's to me, unwarranted attack, to the full extent of the laws of this State, and to the limit of my resources.

The lady may succeed in evicting myself, my three minor children and the aforementioned three veteran students. But, I suspect that it will be the loudest eviction which has occurred in the Gables in many a day.

I am fully aware of the rights of property ownership and all of its implication, and I am sure that at some reasonable time in the near future Mrs. Hill could and will regain peaceful possession of her property and its contents.

Mrs. Hill should understand that I do not pay her \$2,400.00 annually because I like her, but for the reasonable and normal use of her property. It might also be advisable, it certainly would be in the proper community spirit; if Mrs. Hill and others so minded, bear in mind that the process of living involves factors more important and desirable than greed, selfishness and rancor.

Things like the right to the peaceful occupancy of rented property; the right of veterans to live like normal humans, again; and to receive the minor assists that many of us can give, and that most of us want to give.

The writing of this protest was not pleasant, and its publication not inexpensive; its justification, however, in the mind of the undersigned, is unquestionable.

Waste of Time

While 18 citizens of Coral Gables waited to bring their problems before the city commission on Tuesday night, the city fathers spent one hour and sixteen minutes listening to a parade of fire truck salesmen extol the merits of their products. While I'll admit that the purchase of a \$10,546 fire engine should be given serious consideration, I strongly feel that taking up that much time at a commission meeting, while other citizens sit by and fidget, is wholly unwarranted.

In the first place, I agree with Mayor Mayes, when he explained to the salesmen, after they had made their spiels, that neither he nor the other commissioners knew a darned thing about fire engines, and that they would be largely guided by the recommendations of Safety Director William Kimbrough, Fire Captain "Top" Hardin and City Manager McIlwain in making their choice. There you have it in a nut shell. The city hires such men as McIlwain, Hardin and Kimbrough because they are supposed to be experts in their lines. Yet the commission evidently does not place enough faith in their abilities and judgement to allow them to hear the salesmen, weigh the merits of one engine against another and then abide by their decision.

The same thing happened when we were buying parking meters. The commission spent almost two hours watching the salesmen taking the coin devices apart and explaining their workings, only to buy the meter recommended by McIlwain and Kimbrough.

What good are department heads if we don't place enough faith in their judgment to allow them to select a piece of equipment? Certainly it is creditable of the commissioners to be interested in what is being done in the various departments, but not to the extent of taking up a lengthy portion of the commission meeting to discuss the purchase of a piece of equipment. Not only is it discourteous to the citizens who are waiting to bring their problems before the commission, but it evidences a lack of confidence in the department heads that is unwholesome.

Gableites Even Leave Sick Beds To Cast Ballots in Tuesday Election

Bawling babies, bicycle riders, an irritated deputy sheriff, and women rising out of their sick beds to enforce women's suffrage rights, highlighted the elections in Coral Gables on Tuesday. In what should ordinarily have been an off year election, Gables residents thronged the polls in six precincts to top the primary count. By 11:30 a.m., nearly all the precincts could boast one third of their eligible voters checked in, with particular interest centered around the bond issues. At the University of Miami, Mrs. Collis Phipps, chief clerk of the 7th precinct, summed up the opinion of the other precinct directors by saying that "Activity is running smooth". "We ran into difficulty only once, soon after the polls opened, when the electricity failed, and the machines were thrown out of action. However, most people were reluctant to leave, and the few that did returned later to cast their ballot," she said. "Women have shown great interest in this election, turning out in droves. Among the early voters was an 80-year old woman, who told me that she climbed out of a sick bed to which she's been confined for the past six months." Still another early visitor was Mrs. May H. Dreesbach, 3615 Durango Street, who proudly arrived with her nurse and family. Mrs. Dreesbach said she was "one of the initial proponents of women's suffrage; therefore, nothing could keep me from voting." A heavy morning load threw the undermanned 80th precinct into turmoil. Precinct clerks scratched their heads when women arrived pushing baby buggies, others on bicycles, while many had packages strewn around the entrance to the Coral Gables Elementary school. However, voters showed keen interest in the bond issues, and the amendments, according to those in charge of instructing inquirers as to the proper function of the machines. Many read the issues two and three times, before entering the booths. While the majority of the 80th precinct clerks sought brief rest periods for a bite of lunch, one unidentified clerk begged time off to rescue her dog which she locked in the house in her rush to report for duty at the polls. At the Country Club of Coral Gables, comfortable chairs were provided the weary voters, while endless streams of cars flooded the 84th precinct entrance. Nearly 85 per cent of the voters reported before 1:00 p.m., a near record for this district.

The past year saw the Marine Corps undergo an amazing transition. Nearly a half million veterans were returned to their homes and civilian pursuits, as, from the hard-hitting combat forces, was welded a mighty "minute-man" defense force of 100,000 volunteers, pledged to preserve the peace for which their predecessors so gallantly fought.

Every Marine will be reminded of this new task during traditional cake-cutting and other ceremonies which will mark observances at Marine stations everywhere, by their Commandant, General A. A. Vandegrift, in his annual message to the Corps.

Even as the commandant speaks, Marines everywhere will be training on land, in the air and on sea. On sandy Atlantic and Pacific beaches, Marines are daily perfecting the techniques of amphibious warfare, which they have developed and improved since their initial landings on New Providence Island in the Bahamas back in the year 1775, until now, they are the World's foremost exponents of amphibious warfare.

On the eve of their 172nd year, the Marine Corps can be found, always, prepared... ready to meet responsibilities of victory with the same devotion that has marked the performance of duty by Marines in peace and war since the days of the Revolution.

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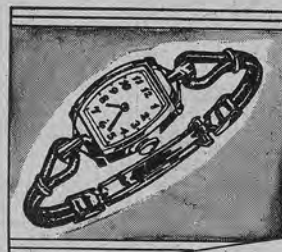

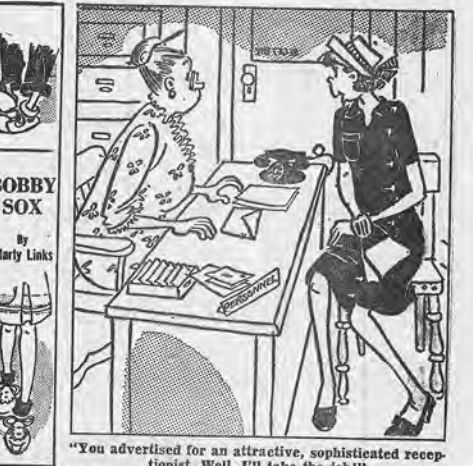

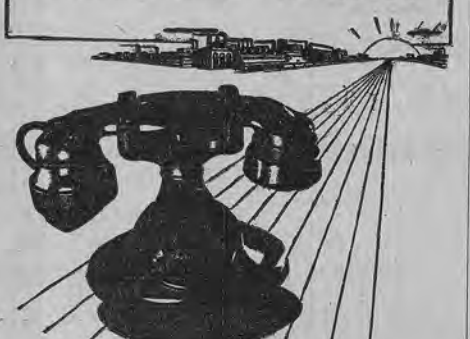
