Sharkey for the operation of the "Atlantis." The board also stated that the final approval should contain a clause providing for cancellation of the license effective ten days after notice.

According to the owners, the boat is to be used for all-day fishing trips at a cost of \$1.75 which would include water-taxi service from city docks in Miami, Miami Beach, and Coconut Grove.

Civilian Plan Also Draws Criticism

Resolution Asks Additional Funds For Operation

Plans of the Veterans' Administration to close off three floors of the Billmore Hospital and treat a capacity of 350 patients compared to the Army's 1,050 were the target for a blast of criticism leveled at the government agency today by the Coral Gables Post 98, American Legion.

The Legionnaires also labeled as "unwise and contrary to the best interest of the veterans" a proposal that part of the hospital facility be used by private practitioners for treatment of non-veteran civilian patients.

Formal transfer of the hospital from the War Department to the V.A. will become effective one minute after midnight on Monday, according to Dr. H. P. MacLellan, chief of the Veterans' Hospital on Miami Beach. Transfer of equipment will begin on Tuesday with the first patients slated to be moved on Monday, July 7.

The Legion's stand on the matter was made public in a resolution being forwarded to each of the 16 Florida senators and congressmen from Florida, in which they are asked to lend all possible support in obtaining additional appropriations from Congress for full-capacity operation of the hospital.

OUR TOWN

Bay Islands

By Jim Moore

In my opinion the future of the development of Biscayne Bay cannot be solved by merely answering with a "yes" or "no" the rhetorical question, "Shall there be any more man-made islands permitted in the Bay?"

Too many times in the past man has tried to plan for the future by making an inflexible rule that years later proved to be lacking in sound judgment and vision.

You have only to look at the planning of some of the older towns in the nation to see what happened when civic officials, who could not entertain such an invention as the automobile, planned streets and thoroughfares that have become traffic headaches to later generations.

To be sure, no one wants to see Biscayne Bay so cluttered with island developments that eventually the flow of traffic, once the lower portion of the water gives way to a solid stretch of land. But on the other hand, it doesn't seem wise to adopt a positive rule that no more islands should be allowed.

Let me give you an example: The lower portion of Biscayne Key lies within the city limits of Coral Gables. At the present time there is no way to travel from Coral Gables proper to the island. City planners, however, have long planned for a causeway linking the municipality with its part of the island.

The present county causeway, now under construction, will not be adequate to handle the flow of traffic, once the lower portion of the Key is developed with hotels, large homes and other structures, and as thousands travel daily to the upper portion to enjoy the beauties and facilities of Coral Park.

Right or wrong? It is not for me to say—but I will say that the idea appears to have some merit and should warrant thorough consideration by city and county planners.

Now, let me take another example. Any chart of the Bay will indicate that in certain areas there exist reefs and shoals, many visible only at mean low tide, but nevertheless proving dangerous hazards to navigation. Converting these to islands would only remove them as navigational hazards, but the dredging process would add a number of deep-water channels to the bay area, aiding, rather than hindering, boatmen.

Right or wrong? Again I cannot give you the answer. But again I submit—the answer cannot be found in a definite yes or no.

The future of Biscayne Bay lies in sound planning by men who know what they are talking about. And even then, I do not believe that any rules laid down should be positive ones. Let us give posterity some flexibility in case there are more things to come that our limited imaginations cannot foresee.

THE EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK PRIMER
Reams of material will be published in the next few months of the new National Park in Florida. We will mention almost all of it, but our readers at the Gateway to the Park must have in mind a few elementary facts with which to answer the scores of queries we will receive. Hence the Riviera Notebook submits this Primer—the A B C of our Everglades National Park.

As for AREA. At the southwestern tip of the Florida peninsula which is the only tropical area of the United States, there are 1,236,000 acres of land to be dedicated late this year as the 28th of our National Parks. When the acreage is extended to the full 2,200,000 as planned, the Everglades National Park will exceed even the mighty Yellowstone in area.

As for BIRDS, and BOTANY and BIOLOGY. Something like 30 species of birds may be spotted on an average excursion into the Everglades. A few, like the swallow-tailed kite, may not be seen anywhere but in South Florida. Mandarin ducks in the park are rivaled only by the Asiatic. Botanists find in this area the native trees and shrubs, some of which, like the mangroves, coccolup and cypress, stand with wet feet in the marshlands. Others, like the cabbage palm, gumbo limbo, mahogany and royal palm prepare hammocks of dryer land. Nearly thirty species of orchids may be found in the park area, although many of the accessible treasures like orchids and tree snails will be revealed and new growth will eventually restore the area to its original abundance.

Biologists will also rejoice that the few remaining black bears and white-tailed deer will also some day be as abundant as the lizards, reptiles and alligators.

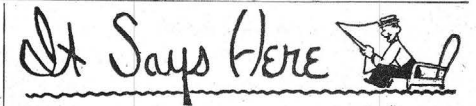

Keep Down Crisis

It is often easier to fight and die for your country than to work and live for it. In war the spirit rises to meet obvious danger. But in peace danger hides beneath the surface. The spirit is not self-rousing. Unless, in fact, you happen to feel "victimized," your spirit does not rise in peace even during economic crisis.

Even when these crises are not deliberately engineered they play their part in ideological war.

Our defense abroad may be a firm stand which says in effect—"We see your game of conquest and are going to call a halt to it." Far from an unfriendly act, such firmness may be the only way to make a friendly bear fruit for totalitarian lands.

And we need an equal firmness in our home defense. We need to see the game of conquest that is going on here too, and to see that we can deal with it only as we rouse the human spirit to halt its progress.

Coral Gables Included In Price Survey

Results of a national survey on prices received by the Chamber of Commerce this week revealed that Coral Gables was high on all wages, low on six out of nine building material items, and low on four out of ten market basket items as compared to the rest of the country. This survey, conducted by the Sarasota Chamber of Commerce, was made on one day, May 29, in cities of varied sizes and areas.

Block Cheaper In building materials, Coral Gables was lower than the national average on concrete block, grade A concrete, sand, gravel, sheeting and sheet rock. On market basket items, the Gables was lower on rolled butter, pure lard, large eggs and calves liver.

Wages Higher Higher than national wages were paid here to journeyman carpenters, master electricians, journeyman plumbers and helper plumbers. As compared to the Florida East Coast, however, Coral Gables paid lower wages to master electricians and helper plumbers.

rounding area with a DDT high-pressure spray, is available to any organization sponsoring a large, outdoor affair, Stutz said. Ordinarily the treatment is effective for 24 hours or longer, but due to a recent influx of the pests from the Everglades, the effect of the treatment does not last as long, he added.

Requiring with requests to spray everything from fleas on cats to caterpillars in trees, the office has more work than it can handle. As a result Stutz stated that any Coral Gables organization planning an outdoor affair, or desiring the mosquito-proofing service should notify his department a day in advance.

Just in the way of advance warning to ambitious mosquitoes—the control division has a lot of new equipment ordered.

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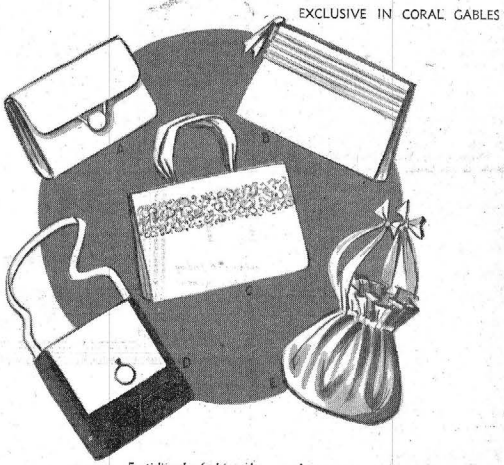

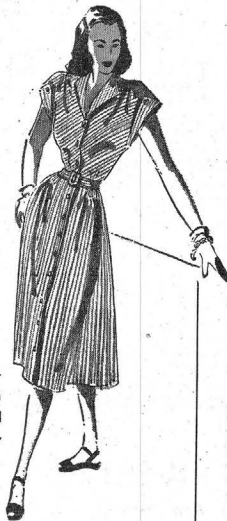
