MERCEDES, Tex. (UP) — Water from a well on the Rio Banco farm of Mercedes produced enough extra milk in a year to pay for digging the well, Pete Melton said.

"The cows drink so much more of the well water than they did of the Rio Grande water that they give extra milk," he explained. Twice a day, fresh, cool water from the well is turned into a Bermuda grass-lined canal. The cows drink their fill and then browse on the lush grass.

**Andrew Jackson Rides Again In Bowman Foster Ashe**

The University starts its Summer session, and after a much needed rest, Andrew Jackson rides again. At least the spirit of Tennessee's "Old Hickory" re-appears in the person of Bowman F. son of Andrew Jackson Ashe.

The two fighters have quite a lot in common. As a lad, "Old Hickory" refused to shine the boots of his English captors; he fought for his education, battled for the good name of his wife, and went to war for States Rights.

Andrew Jackson learned by doing. He tried saddle and school teaching and farming. He took up law, drew up a Constitution for Tennessee, was Representative and Senator; Justice of the Supreme Court and President of the United States.

**Watched Florida**  
President Monroe offered "Old Hickory" a place in his Cabinet as Secretary of War, but the warrior declared he'd rather keep his eye on Florida. When he was consulted about yielding a part of Texas for Florida, his reply was a classic. "For the present," he said, "we ought to be satisfied with the Floridas."

Those who have watched the University of Miami rise to great heights of anticipation, fall to a new low in the depression and climb steadily to its present rank as a University will notice a strange parallel.

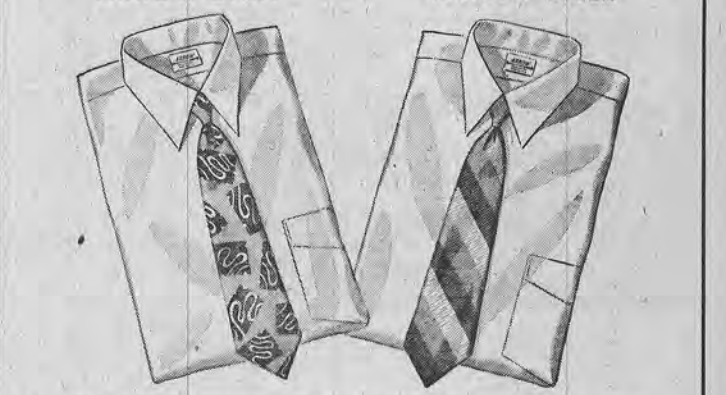
