Show Desire for Peace, Truman Asks of Soviet

(Continued from Page One) speeches tomorrow. Mr. Truman addressed the Legionnaires as "a comrade in arms" and "Commander-in-Chief of our Armed Forces." He said there is no real reason why there should be war between the United States and Russia. Both countries, he said, have much to do to raise their living standards. But he said flatly that this country never will agree to another Munich. Hits War Talk Mr. Truman described as "wicked falsehood" reports that the United States deliberately is following a course that will lead to ultimate war. "Our firmness should not be taken for a warlike spirit," he said. "The world has learned that it is weakness and appeasement which invite aggression. A firm position on reasonable grounds offers the best hope of peace, and we have been open to reason at every point." He said the entire U.S. foreign policy, including military aid to Greece and Turkey and the Marshall Plan, was predicted on this theory. The United States, he said, rejects and detests the idea of war and has been working with "cool detachment" to avoid it. "Unfortunately," Mr. Truman

Emblems of World War II Invade English Landscape

By FLORENCE JONES TORQUAY, England—On the drive to Torquay we passed several air bases, for the open spaces of this section made ideal training centers. Our chauffeur explained the mounds we saw on the way. When the English expected the Germans to invade the country, hundreds of these dugouts were made overnight for gun emplacements, which in turn were camouflaged with turf and shrubs.

For days the Germans bombed seaside resorts that had no particular strategic importance, and all places listed on tourist guidebooks, trying to frighten the people into stopping the war. Of course all this had just the opposite effect. We stopped at the Grand Hotel in Torquay which is called the English Riviera—and rightly so. Many of the beautiful hotels stand high on the cliff overlooking the English Channel and down below is a wide boulevard that follows the winding shoreline.

Formal and Elegant We have stopped at some very large hotels and some very old and historic ones, but the Grand Hotel is quite pretentious and elegant. Here we had to don evening clothes for dinner and I was glad to have an opportunity to see the English enjoy themselves. The menu was good and everyone seemed very gay. The women were very smart looking and of course, having an eye for fashion, I noticed some very lovely creations.

Our Sunday breakfast was the best we have had. Our English friends told us we "struck it right" for only on Sunday can they give their guests bacon. Only once have I had a fresh egg for breakfast. At first I had the powdered eggs, but they have a peculiar odor and take quite a while to get used to. The English cannot make good coffee, so you soon settle down to your morning cup of tea, brought up to your room first thing before you even think about dressing.

All restaurants and hotels must abide by the food order and our breakfast menu was the notice: "A person shall not obtain or consume at any one meal more than a. one main dish and one subsidiary; b. two subsidiary dishes. In some restaurants, bread is considered a "course."

Socialized Medicine in Effect It is an accepted fact that the people of England are not getting the proper nor required vitamins in their present diet but a recent survey showed the general health of the country better than it has ever been. The recently passed health insurance bill permits persons for a nominal fee of four dollars per month to go to a doctor of their choice for any reason, and also to have the use of a hospital when necessary. The doctors here fought the bill but it is an actuality now and it is hoped that the benefits it affords the general health standard of the entire country.

The Hurricanes didn't have "Whitey" Campbell to dazzle the Detroit secondary—nor would the well-informed Titans leave Miami receivers uncovered enough to make passing worthwhile. Their tackles were trapped a few times, but they soon wised up and became well-nigh impenetrable to those capers.

'Up the Gut' Surprised Detroit

So the only plays left for Quarterback Jack Del Bello to call were "up the gut" where Detroit least expected to give ground. He absorbed the shock of that solar plexus punch that netted 57 precious yards and kept Detroit off-balance at least some of the time.

Davies Was Key Blocker, Del Bello Outsmarter

Center Art Davies cleared the way for Del Bello in the greatest display of one-man strength and endurance blocking that a Hurricane team has developed in several years. Del Bello did the outsmarting.

Frank Smith, Ghaul Split Difference

For that the sports writers covering that amazing game gave him due credit—balloting him Riviera-Times Star of the Week with 16 votes. As alternates they voted evenly for Frank Smith and Harry Ghaul (check back on Thursday's Scorecard, pul-ezzé), with Tommy Flynn, Sam David and Davies getting plenty of mention for the third straight week.

That Lead Could've Been Blown So-o Easily

More than his quarterback sneaks, they picked Del Bello for his field generalship. Some of it was sound and logical, like calling four long-count, time-consuming "no-where" plays in the final 90 seconds. But Del Bello had better than three full periods in which to blow that six-point margin but on defense as well as offense he made it stand up.

Del Bello Was Spotted Early

Scorecard dislikes to repeat "Told You So" (it sez here) but Del Bello was spotted by this writer for just the calibre of play he proved capable of Friday night away back in March. That was before Jack Harding announced his resignation as head coach and the players themselves reported that he was going to make a helluva halfback. Came Andy Gustafson and Del Bello developed as a "made-to-order" quarterback, although he lacked finesse the first two weeks and still has not completely mastered his lessons.

He's a Lot of Promise for One Package

Vital statistics paved the way to putting Jack in the saddle for stardom. He was made eligible his freshman year by enrollment in school in February. That gives him at least two more years on a "building" team. Gustafson likes his quarterbacks tall and he's six-foot, two inches off the turf. He likes 'em tough and few lads are bred to a gentle life in South Philadelphia, whence Del Bello hails. He's about the only back who has not nursed an ache, pain or bruise through rugged spring and pre-season practice as well as three games so far completed. At 20, with enough service-time to be draft-proof, he's a lot of promise for one package.

Georgia Likely to Be Straddled and Scored

True, Del Bello's passing leaves something to be desired in accuracy. But after a three-game "shake-down" he's ready to start connecting—and Mr. Wally (Please turn to Page Six)

Gus Puts U-M Back to Work For Bulldogs

Coach Andy Gustafson hurried his University of Miami Hurricanes back on the road of hard work Monday, preparing for Friday night's Orange Bowl game with the University of Georgia. Miami's thrilling 6-0 win over highly ranked University of Detroit last week has aroused football interest to a fever heat in Miami and estimates as to the size of next Friday's crowd range from 50,000 to a capacity turnout of 60,000.

However, Coach Gustafson has been quick to point out to his squad that Georgia is no Detroit and the Hurricanes will be up against a different kind of team in the Orange Bowl Friday night. For one thing, Detroit had no passing attack, falling miserably on seven tries while Georgia has Johnny Rauch, one of the nation's top passers. The Bulldogs also have a running game which is just as powerful as the one which netted Detroit 295 yards against Miami.

Gustafson told his men that Detroit underestimated the Hurricanes and took them too lightly but Georgia will not make that mistake. Coach Wally Butts has a 26-21 thriller back in 1945 to remind him of Miami's prowess even if he didn't have that Detroit score to go by.

Big question mark on the Hurricane side of the picture is the condition of Bob Campbell, ace fullback whose bad leg kept him from making the Detroit trip. Andy has stated he would not use "Whitey" until he was fully recovered—and this morning Campbell still had a bad knot on his leg. His chances for playing against Georgia are not bright.

The block and tackle business in recent years has looked like basketball with the dribble. Most youngsters didn't get a chance unless they could make slingin' Sammy Baugh look like he wore handcuffs, over mittens. Any coach who saw his grandmother toss her ball of knitting wool clear across the parlor tried to get her to play tailback.

Penn, trembling on the brink of defeat, was saved in the last 32 seconds by its air arm when Bob Spornagle made an end zone catch which beat Columbia, 20 to 14. And Ohio State's pandal savior went up and over to lead the Buckeyes home ahead of Indiana, 17 to 0.

Keff Fleischmann roared to three touchdowns as undefeated Cornell smothered Syracuse, 34 to 7.

Harding Sees 3 Road Games A Possibility

The University of Miami's 1949 home football schedule was already hand assembled today before the current Hurricanes has more than 30 percent of this year's schedule under their belts.

Detroit's Titans, whom Quarterback Jack Del Bello & Co. humbled Friday night in the Motor City, has been scheduled to pay a return visit to the Orange Bowl on November 4, 1949, and South Carolina will be the guests on November 11. The Gamecocks skipped this year's schedule after thumping the Hurricanes 8 to 0 last year.

Announcement of the two games was made by Athletic Director Jack Harding during the return leg of the Detroit trip Saturday. Rollins College has been mentioned as an opening opponent for Coach Andy Gustafson's sophomore year, the scheduling of Purdue's Boilermakers was made public two months ago, and Florida will be a traditional "home" opponent.

Harding added that the Hurricanes will definitely play two "road" games next season and possibly a third, depending upon how far the U of M will have to travel.

No details of negotiations for other games were released. Miami University of Oxford, Ohio, is another "probable" for a third "Confusion Bowl" game and one Southwestern Conference team will probably be selected. Miami missed connections fixing a game with Southern Methodist this year as well as Mississippi of the Southeastern Conference.

"That's about as far as we've gotten with our scheduling. After the Southeastern Conference meeting in Gainesville in December we may have two or three more opponents lined up and some of our road games will depend upon talking things over with representatives of schools we'd like to play at the national coaches' meeting at San Francisco in January."

Outside of Detroit and Florida there are no home-and-home agreements with any teams on this year's Hurricane schedule. Villanova, whom Miami has visited in 1946 and 1947 and played host to this year, has already booked its schedule for next year.

First 'Public' Appearance Tucker Talks T-Formation, Shows Quarterbacks Films

Fired by the Hurricanes' win over Detroit Friday night, a capacity crowd of Quarterbacks' Club members jammed the Miami Downtown Club at noon today to hear Lt. Arnold Tucker talk football and show the films of the Miami-Villanova game.

It marked the first public appearance for Tucker, former West Point great, as a Hurricane coach. He is on leave from the Army and is assisting Coach Andy Gustafson with the squad—with particular concentration on developing Quarterbacks Jack Del Bello, a freshman, and Sophomore Dave McDonald.

Tucker explained to the members after the luncheon that both boys have much to learn in T-formation quarterbacking finesse but that they have shown vast improvement over performances during spring workouts, when he first started tutoring them. Continued improvement can help make the Hurricanes a great football team, he assured the members.

The quarterbacks were pleased by movies of the October 8 game, which the Hurricanes dropped to the Main Liners, 19 to 10, after playing brilliant ball for most of the first three quarters. The sequence of Bob "Whitey" Campbell's sensational 67-yard punt return was re-run several times.

Comment on the Hurricanes' remarkable victory at Detroit were skipped by Tucker, since he was scouting Chattanooga, a November 12 Hurricane opponent, as they mated Presbyterian 35 to 0 at Nashville the same night.
