

Israel Turned Down on United Nations Membership

EGYPT LODGES PROTEST AGAINST ENCIRCLEMENT BY JEWISH TROOPS

PARIS, Dec. 17. (UP)—Israel lost its bid for membership in the United Nations today. Its application failed to get the necessary seven votes in the security council. Five nations voted in favor of admission, one against, and there were five abstentions. The security council also refused to consider at this time a protest from Egypt that "masses" of Israeli troops are attacking encircled Egyptian troops at Valuja in Southern Palestine. The United States joined Russia, the Ukraine, Argentina and Colombia in voting in favor of Israel's application for membership. Britain, France, China, Belgium and Canada abstained. Syria voted against the application. Jacob Malik of Russia opposed any delay. He said that the British proposal was tantamount to refusing Israel membership in the UN. "The United Kingdom does not wish to admit Israel and therefore is compelled to resort to all kinds of quibbling argument," he said.

Beach Woman is Upheld On Communist Declaration

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 17. (UP)—The Florida Supreme Court today upheld the right of a Miami Beach woman to refuse to testify whether she is a Communist. In a 5 to 2 decision, the court reversed a lower court order sentencing Mrs. Leah Adler Benemovsky to 90 days in jail for contempt of court. Mrs. Benemovsky, 50, a Dade county resident for seven years, had been subpoenaed by County Solicitor Robert R. Taylor for questioning in connection with a Communist fund rally held in a Miami Beach hotel last February. Taylor said he promised her "immunity" but that she refused to state whether she was a Communist. Hailed before Criminal Court Judge Ben C. Willard on a contempt citation, she was sentenced to 90 days in jail April 15 for again refusing to answer the direct question, "Are you a Communist?"

Litvinov, Chamberlain Named In Withheld 'Spy Papers'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17. (UP)—Secret documents involving former Soviet Foreign Minister Maxim Litvinov and the late British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain are among four "spy papers" which the State Department has refused to clear for publication, it was disclosed today. The four papers are the only ones still unpublished out of a batch of 200 stolen state secrets which reformed Communist Whittaker Chambers turned over to the House un-American activities committee. They were taken in 1938, but the State Department said they cannot be made public even at this late date because they might endanger the individuals concerned. A department spokesman said they contained information received by this government from confidential non-American sources who are still alive.

The Postman Rang Late
GREENFIELD, O., Dec. 17. (UP)—When John Rooks entered the Army in World War I he packed his shirts, pajamas, socks and underwear in an Army issue carrying case, put his home address on it and handed it to a supply sergeant to mail. He eventually went to France with the Army, came back to Camp Sherman near Chillicothe, O., and was discharged in May, 1919. This week the mailman delivered a carrying case to Rooks. It was the one containing his clothes he had mailed 30 years ago.

Butts Reveals Three SEC Teams Refused Georgia Bid

SANDERSVILLE, Ga., Dec. 17. (UP)—Georgia football coach Wally Butts, defending his refusal to play a Southeastern Conference foe in the Orange Bowl, revealed today that three of the SEC's strongest teams refused to schedule the Bulldogs in 1949. "I approached the head coaches of Tulane, Mississippi and Vanderbilt and offered to meet them in 1949," Butts said here, adding that he got no takers. He said Tulane had an open date the Saturday before the Louisiana State game and said he suggested the Greenies schedule Georgia. "I didn't fill the date," Butts said.

Red Forces Storm Wall Of China's Ancient Capital

NANKING, Dec. 17. (UP)—Communist forces have driven into Peiping's new business district and stormed to the walls of China's ancient capital, semi-official sources reported today. Communist artillery also has forced evacuation of the last Peiping airfield remaining to the Nationalist forces, in the southern suburbs of the city, thus cutting Peiping off from all but radio communication with the outside world, the same sources said. Fierce street fighting is raging in the new business district, lying outside the southwestern Fucheng gate of the walled area of the ancient capital of the Manchu dynasty, it was reported. Communist troops also have taken the area of the Wan Shan-Yuan Zoo, which is only one mile outside the west gate of the old city, reports said.

Soldier's Heroism is Told To Plane Crash Probers

GREENVILLE, S. C., Dec. 17. (UP)—A story of heroism was told today by Air Force officers investigating the crash of a C-82 Packet which killed four men and injured three others. Sgt. William T. Raulston, the first to reach the flaming hulk of the crashed airplane yesterday, dragged its pilot, Capt. Thurston B. Walker to safety, saving his life, officers said. Then Sergeant Raulston rushed back into the blazing "flying box-car" to rescue others. He was overcome by smoke and had to be carried away by military police arriving shortly after.

Government Board Urges 40-Hour Rail Work Week

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17. (UP)—A special Presidential Board today recommended that the nation's railroads give 1,000,000 of their employees a 40-hour work week as a way to avert a threatened nation-wide rail strike. The rail industry is the only major industry in the country that does not now have a 40-hour week. The Presidential Board, reporting directly to President Truman, said the 40-hour week is "now firmly a part of our national industrial policy."

'U' STUDENTS WARNED ON MIXED PARTIES

Inter-racial social gatherings in Miami's Negro section, which police say have been attended by University of Miami student-members of the "Young Progressive Party of America" will continue to be dispersed until he receives different instructions, Police Chief Walter E. Headley stated today after a meeting of members of the mixed group with City Manager O. P. Hart. Police last Friday night broke up a mixed social gathering and dance at NW Third Avenue and 19th Street at which police say a number of the University students were present. The University group was represented today at the meeting with Hart by Peter Hammond, who was introduced by Mrs. Theresa Cantor of Miami Beach, who recently refused to testify in criminal court whether she was a member of the Communist Party. Mrs. Cantor, the spokesman of the Negro and white groups, demanded that police be instructed to desist from interfering with their social meetings and that the group be provided with police protection should "hoodlums" attempt to break up the meetings. Chief Headley said that he was carrying out the long established policy of the city commission against mixed social gatherings and until the policy was changed he will continue to break up such meetings. Hart said the matter will be referred to the city commission within a few days. Today's meeting adjourned with no promises made by police to protect the group and no promises made by them to discontinue their social gatherings and dances.

Gables Cited For Junior Net Interest

Members of the Coral Gables Tennis Club at Salvatore Park were cited for producing the best junior development program in South Florida last night as committees for the Orange Bowl tournament met to complete plans for the December 27-January 1 event. The Gables committee of Chairman Edgar Johns, H. T. McDonald, Dr. Jack Q. Cleveland, Ike H. Macy, Leo Fullwood, C. D. Arnold, R. W. Setze and Albert E. Harum will be in charge of transportation for the more than 175 junior players expected to enter before the deadline tomorrow night. Originally it was planned to quarter the many international and country-wide court acts at the University of Miami's 20th Street Housing Project, but an attractive offer has revised that arrangement in favor of a Miami Beach hotel. Official draw for the tournament will be held at 3 p.m. on December 22. Foreign players will be seeded in the upper bracket, with players across the country and from South Florida placed in the lower bracket in each of three divisions. Junior Boys', Boys' Small Boys', and Junior Girls divisions will be held with doubles and mixed doubles play in each. In accepting the praise of the Orange Bowl group in behalf of the community last night, Johns told the meeting that most of the credit should go to City Manager William T. McIlwain, Macy, Fullwood and the University of Miami's Gardner Mulloy, whose cooperation and permission to use courts in this city for tournaments has aided the junior development program.

Both drivers were held on charges of reckless driving and causing an accident.

The couple married in West Palm Beach August 9, 1926, and separated at South Miami December 2 this year when the alleged attempt to kill the wife was made. They have no children. Mrs. Benebee said that her aged mother was present when Benebee threatened to kill her with the rifle and that her mother died shortly after from a heart attack. Mrs. Benebee seeks to have the court award her permanent alimony and possession of the South Miami residence.

Use of State Money in Trusts Seen Aiding Cities
State Sen. R. B. Gautier Jr., was on record today as favoring the use of money in state trust funds to aid cities and counties in worthwhile projects such as low rental housing. Gautier, in an address to the Slum Clearance Committee, said there are "millions of dollars" in Tallahassee being held in trust in various funds for such purposes as pensions and retirements. "I have always thought the state Internal Improvement Board should put low interest bonds into these trust funds and make the cash available to cities and counties for worthwhile improvements," he said.

A Coral Gables resident strolling through Bayfront Park in Miami early today was stung, beaten and robbed of \$259 in cash and valuables. The victim, Herbert Polhemus, 1553 Avenue Malaga, told police that he was walking through the park shortly after midnight when a man approached him and engaged him in conversation. While talking to the man, Polhemus said, four other white men appeared and suddenly began beating him while one of the men threatened him with a knife. The five men ran away after taking \$14 in cash, a \$175 wrist watch, Polhemus' wallet, a railroad ticket to Trenton, N.J. a gold ring and an identification bracelet.

Edwin J. Hess, Papaya Pioneer, Dies in 78th Year

Edwin Jesse Hess, 77, who pioneered research in Papaya in the Coral Gables area, died last night at his residence, 4419 SW 13th Terrace. Hess not only developed new processes for the preserving of the tropical fruit, but through research extended the use of by-products to include meat tenderizers and even hand lotions. For several years he operated a laboratory and processing plant at Avenue Aragon and Salzedo Street, the site of the present Riviera-Times plant. Born in Ottawa, Ill., he later located in Kansas City before coming to Coral Gables. He is survived by his wife, Ethel; two sons Robert P. and Philip N.; a sister, Mrs. A. E. Gilman of Ottawa and a brother, Harry C. Hess. Funeral arrangements will be announced by the Coral Gables Philbrick Funeral Home.

WILMINGTON, O. (UP). — A weather balloon was sent up by the air weather service detachment at the Air Force base here more than 21 miles for the second highest recording ever made.

Capt. Lawrence E. Robertson said the 112,800 foot ascent was exceeded only by a height of 120,000 feet made at the Air Force weather station at White Sands, Mexico.

The balloon carrying a radio transmitter which sends signals indicating the temperature, humidity and pressures, was followed during its climb by means of radar until it burst. The equipment then was floated to earth by a parachute.

Signals from the balloon's equipment are recorded on paper by a receiver on the ground.

AROUND COURTHOUSE CORRIDORS

With all this agitation about the county evicting the city of Miami from the courthouse, has it ever occurred to the taxpayers of Miami Beach and Coral Gables that they have been helping the city of Miami pay its annual \$60,000 rent?

It's strange, but true and was recently discussed at a meeting of the county budget board which inquired discreetly into the matter at their last session.

Here's how it was explained to the budget board members by Harry S. Sweeting, clerk to the county commission.

The city, while claiming to pay 65 per cent of the taxes paid to the county, doesn't pay that much. Based on this erroneous statement, which was made by members of the city commission, Miami suggested that the county help financially in building a new city hall.

Miami's city departments and jail now occupy about half of the space in the courthouse, and their \$60,000 is designed to assist in paying for the maintenance of the building.

This year the maintenance bill will be \$258,000 and half of that amount is \$129,000, or 69,000 short of half of the bill. Therefore, the other municipalities in the county must contribute to the upkeep of the courthouse, and naturally, if the county takes taxes from the unincorporated areas for its half, the municipalities, including Coral Gables and Miami Beach, have been paying Miami's rent for many years.

Incidentally, the city of Miami since July 15, 1940 has been occupying space in the courthouse without a lease. Back in 1940 the city was figuring on building a new city hall, and no new lease was executed. Came the war and nothing was done, except that the city continued to occupy its space and pay the \$60,000 a year.

Perhaps the University of Miami doesn't know about it, but there is a chance that they may not get the \$20,000 which the county commissioners included in the 1948-49 budget.

No one will talk about it, but recently at a meeting of the county commission, some mention of the appropriation was

Don't let anybody scare you out of retouching either. If you don't like your nose, make the man change it.

"Mark your proofs with a pencil," De Mille advised, "to show what you want changed or removed. Some photographers are rushed at Christmas and don't take much time."

Movie stars, says De Mille, use these devices every day. And some of them have got their first breaks in movies through well-posed photographs. De Mille cast Hedy Lamour as the dark-eyed temptress of his Paramount picture, "Samson and Delilah," because he saw attractive pictures of her as Tondelayo in "White Cargo."

He wouldn't be surprised if some of the Christmas pictures photographed with his suggestions come back to him. "I always get a lot of pictures of pretty girls after Christmas," he said. "The girls give them to friends who think they ought to be in pictures."

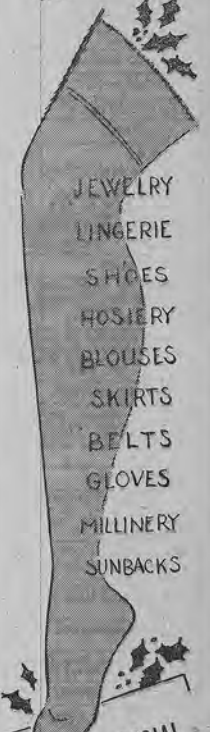
