## Cease-Fire in Indonesia Ordered by UN Council

PARIS, Dec. 24. (UP) — The United Nations security council today ordered a cease fire in Indonesia by adopting an amended American resolution from which a demand for troop withdrawals to the old truce lines was removed.

The council voted seven to nothing with four abstentions for the resolution which softened the vigorous stand taken by a majority of the delegates in condemning The Netherlands for opening a campaign against the Indonesian republic last Sunday.

## Israeli Forces Press Attack On Egyptian Lines in Negev

TEL AVIV, Dec. 24. (UP) — Israeli ground and air forces are continuing the attack against Egyptian lines of communication in the Negev, official sources said today.

An official announcement said Israeli planes also made another attack against the airfield at Tel El-Arish, which is inside the Egyptian frontier.

Israeli authorities tightened censorship as a result of the new fighting and all civilian traffic to the Negev area of Southern Palestine was banned.

Egyptian reports from Cairo earlier said the Jewish attack had been thrown back in a 17-hour battle.

Cairo reports said Jewish troops with tank units supported by air and naval units attacked Egyptian positions in the Negev Wednesday. This report did not specify where the attack was made, but United Nations sources indicated it was against the big Egyptian base of Gaza on the southern coast.

## Not Santa, But Klaus

MORRISTOWN, Pa., Dec. 24. (UP) — Judge George C. Corson said he couldn't think of a more appropriate time to grant the petition of George W. Oeljeklaus, Glenside, Pa.

Oeljeklaus, a bank employe, told the court he was satisfied with his first name and didn't want it changed to Santa, but he thought a surname of Klaus would be easier to pronounce.

## Free Emigration is Urged By Pius in Xmas Message

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 24. (UP) — Pope Pius XII said today that refugee populations should be permitted to emigrate freely to the United States and other countries capable of feeding them.

The Pontiff did not mention the United States, by name, but he said some of the world tension could be removed if more territory and raw materials were made available to the peoples of the world.

The suggestion was made in the Pope's 10th annual Christmas message to the world. The 5,000-word address, given in Italian, was delivered to the Sacred College of Cardinals.

"Instead of sending with great expense foodstuffs to refugee populations massed in some place or other in makeshift fashion, why not facilitate emigration and immigration of families, directing them toward regions where they will find more easily the foods which they need?" the Pontiff asked.

## Duggan Link to Spy Probe Seen 'Cruel' Publicity Piece

NEW YORK, Dec. 24. (UP) — Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt charged today that Rep. Karl E. Mundt (R., S. D.), acting chairman of the House un-American activities committee, was guilty of "an irresponsible, cruel piece of publicity" in linking Laurence Duggan's name to the Communist spy probe.

Mrs. Roosevelt wrote in her daily syndicated column that it "seems inconceivable" to suspect that the former State Department official might have taken part in un-American activities.

Duggan, \$15,000-a-year president of the Institute for International Education, died Monday in a plunge from his 16th story offices in mid-Manhattan. Police still are investigating to determine whether he jumped, fell or was pushed.

## Merry Christmas, Merry!

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 24. (UP) — Merry Christmas will mean a doll and a doll buggy for Merry Christmas tomorrow. That's what three-year-old little Merry Lynn Christmas told a downtown Santa Claus she wants, and that's what her mother says she will get.

## White Christmas on Menu For Most of the Nation

A snow storm swirled slowly over the Midwestern states today toward the Atlantic Coast, promising to bring a white Christmas to most of the nation.

A moderate to heavy fall of snow was sifting to earth this morning over a wide band extending from the Rocky Mountains to Ohio.

The bad weather struck as hundreds of thousands of persons began trips via auto, train, bus and airplane for Christmas visits at home or with relatives and friends.

Weather Forecaster L. L. Means issued a warning at Chicago that highway traffic would be hazardous in many areas, particularly in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri.

## Cut Off Aid to Holland, Pepper Urges to End Fighting

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24. (UP) — Sen. Claude Pepper (D., Fla.), urged today that the United States cut off all recovery aid to Holland because of her actions in Indonesia.

He said the administration acted "wisely and commendably" in halting aid to The Netherlands East Indies and in asking the United Nations security council to intervene.

But Pepper said this government should go even further and "freeze all aid to Holland herself."

Such a move is said to be under consideration by the administration as a further means of forcing the Dutch troops out of Indonesia.

## Gables Major Unhurt in Crash

SAVANNAH, Ga., Dec. 24. (UP) — Police said today that Maj. J. A. Stuart of Coral Gables, Fla., escaped unhurt when his light Air Force bomber crashed on takeoff at Hunter Field here yesterday.

The motor failed when the plane reached a height of 25 feet and the pilot, the plane's lone occupant, pancaked it on a mud flat.

## Gables Folk To Worship In Churches

### Special Rites Are Planned For Christmas

Homage to the Christ-child will be paid by Gables residents this week-end at special services to be conducted tonight and tomorrow morning in four local churches.

Midnight mass will be held at twelve o'clock midnight at the Church of the Little Flower. From 11 p.m. until midnight, the congregation will participate in the singing of Christmas carols.

In the morning, the Rev. Fr. Thomas Comber will conduct masses at 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 o'clock.

Two festival choral eucharists, the first beginning at 11:30 p.m. tonight and the second with a sermon tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, will mark the Christmas observance in St. Philip's Church, 1121 Avenue Andalusia.

A special Christmas service will be held tonight from 11 o'clock until midnight at St. James Lutheran Church, 110 Avenue Phoenicia. Dr. O. C. Mees will use, as his Christmas sermon topic, the theme, "A Child is Born."

The senior choir will sing during the service, and the service will close with a candle lighting ceremony.

Christmas Eve caroling, an annual affair for the young people of the church, will again be observed this year at the University Baptist Church. The young people will meet at the church tonight at 7:30 o'clock to go caroling.

Tomorrow, a Christmas day service will be held at the church at 10 a.m. At this time, the pastor, Dr. Ladislau Biro, will deliver a message on the topic, "Let us now go to Bethlehem."

## Valdosta Alerted On Wanted Man

Valdosta, Ga. police were alerted today to be on the lookout for Isaac Wilcox, one of two escaped Negro burglars wanted in connection with an attempt to burglarize the Protect-U Jalousie Corporation on Tuesday evening.

Det. Lieut. A. M. Bishop said this morning that a Miami officer had missed Wilcox by two hours in Pahokee, but that information received there led them to believe that he was headed for Valdosta, his former home.

Wilcox and Henry Smith escaped during a gun battle with Gables police officers on Tuesday night when he had surrounded the building when an alert watchman gave the alarm. Two other men, Leroy Wright and Charles Hughes, were captured and Bishop said that they have implicated the quartet in 10 safe jobs in the Southeast Florida area. Hughes was shot in the arm by Officer E. F. Peagram, who returned the Negro's fire during the gun battle.

## Were Held As Suspects In Holdups

### Trio Cleared When Gotham Bandits Confessed

Three University of Miami students, held and later exonerated in connection with a series of filling station holdups in the Gables area, have filed claims for damages against the City of Coral Gables for \$50,000 each, Safety Director William G. Kimbrough revealed today.

The three, John Sonrier, Lebanon Springs, N. Y.; Walter E. Brooks, Syracuse, N. Y. and John S. Evans, Onondaga, N.Y. were picked up on Ponce de Leon Boulevard on October 14, when they were "identified" by one of the bandit victims.

Charges against the students were dropped on October 21, when a trio of New York gunmen confessed to the series of hold-ups. The three men, Sherman L'Honmedien, Francis Hart and Arthur Hufnager were later sentenced to prison terms.

The students are represented by Albert G. Hartog and Martin Lemlich, attorneys, who stated that they intended to file suit if the claim is not met. The letter was addressed to City Attorney Edward L. Semple.

The attorneys claimed that the youths were caused embarrassment on the campus and in their home towns, as the story was widely circulated by the wire services, and further claimed that their careers have been jeopardized by the bad publicity.

## 2 Miami Dailies Join Forces in Strike Situation

Miami's two daily newspapers joined forces today to "make every effort to continue publication" after union printers went on strike at the Miami Herald yesterday. Despite the absence of members of the International Typographical Union (AFL) employed by the Herald, the newspaper was published this morning.

Management of the Miami Daily News announced that it considered the action had terminated its contract with the union, also.

The two papers had been negotiating jointly with the ITU for a new contract to replace one which expires tomorrow at midnight. The union is still negotiating with other dailies in the area, including the Riviera-Times.

Emmett C. Choate, who represented both papers in 32 negotiating meetings with the union, said that henceforth both papers would employ journeymen printers at the same rate of pay "and upon conditions as the publishers may from time to time require."

He said that the two newspapers, in order to serve the public, would "jointly make every effort to continue publication . . . including the interchange of their facilities, until each composing room is again manned."

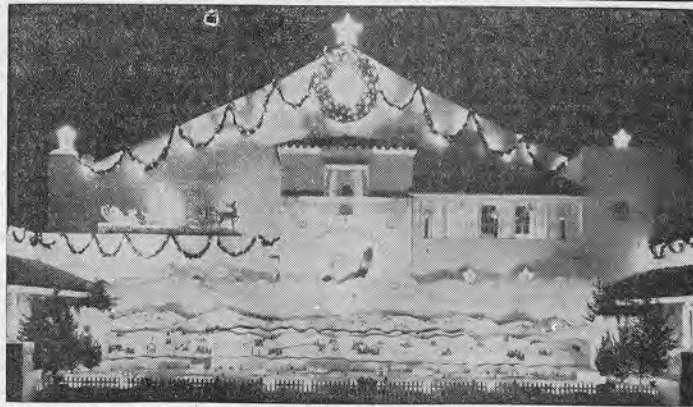

Not a very exciting tale, is it? It could have happened here—in a trailer park or a grimy tourist cabin. An event like that is commonplace in Greater Miami—hardly worth a stick of type or a raised eye-brow from a sleepy night city editor.

But it wasn't Miami. It was Bethlehem and the time was nearly 2,000 years ago. And as the tired and pain-wracked mother held her Child in her arms, wondrous things began to happen.

A bright, gleaming star appeared in the heavens and on the hills surrounding the town a host of heavenly angels sang their immortal song.

"And on Earth, Peace to Men of Good Will."

That night in Bethlehem, long ago should seem very close to us here in South Florida as we re-live it again this evening. We have no "White Christmas," it's true. But we have the soft, velvet sky and the flame of the poinsettia to remind us that the Christ Child came to us on just such a night. Silent Night. Holy Night.

## Ponce Netters Eligibility Hopes Chilled

Possibility of reinstating four members of Ponce de Leon High school's state championship tennis squad was almost liquidated today when Cavalier Athletic Director Jack Gramley revealed that Lafayette Golden, executive secretary of the Florida High School Athletic Association denied an appeal to reinstate the youths for tennis eligibility this year.

The four, Billy Merriam, Dick Murphy, Paul Setze, all members of last year's team, and Al Harum Jr., were suspended by the school after they participated in South Florida Tennis League matches on December 5. ## Merriam Quits OB Net Tourney For Jax Event

Coral Gables brightest tennis prodigy, Billy Merriam, has withdrawn from South Florida's biggest test for junior netters—the Orange Bowl tournament which starts Monday—to play in the Florida State Public Courts championships at Jacksonville which will be held on the same dates.

The lanky Ponce de Leon High school senior, who won the state scholastic championship last spring but has been declared ineligible for participating with three teammates in outside league matches, said this morning he considered the upstate event a better chance to improve his ranking than the local event. He will probably be seeded behind Dick Holroyd of Miami Edison at Jacksonville, whereas he was not ranked in the star-studded field which will play in the Orange Bowl tournament.

Meanwhile, Edgar Johns, president of the Coral Gables Tennis Club representing this city on the Orange Bowl tournament committee, said today that opening rounds of the small boys' division, in which Gables youth comprise 10 of the field of 12 youngsters, will be played at Salvadore Park. Girls' singles matches will open at the University net stadium on Monday, also he added.

# North South Tilt Even



GEORGE BLANDA, Kentucky quarterback playing for the South All-Stars in the Mahi Shrine game tomorrow night at the Orange Bowl, tomorrow, may decide the first annual score in favor of Dixie with his passing and running attack.

The pioneer game of what may become South Florida's biggest football event of the year—the North-South All-Stars clash sponsored by the Mahi Shrine in the Orange Bowl tomorrow night—is rated what every "dream game" should be—a toss-up.

Coach Andy Gustafson is supposed to have the strongest backfield culled from Dixie schools not signed for bowl games to be matched by Herman Hickman's northern line which for fame alone is incomparable. Yet the starting Southern forewell, which will outweigh the opposition by 10 pounds per man at a 218-pound average, is hardly a slouch with Mississippi's great end, Barney Poole, the Hurricanes' Ernie Settembre, Phillip Poole, Maryland's Gene Kinney, U-M's Mario DeMarco, Alabama's Ray Richeson and Jim Cain up front.

With really great backs hard to come by after this past season of specialization, both squads have done exceedingly well in recruiting seasoned talent that will have the collective mouths of the many professional grid scouts who will be in the stands drooling. Both Gustafson and Hickman will employ almost identical T-formation offenses so quarterbacking may be decisive. Gus has Kentucky's George Blanda, who will also do the passing and kicking, under the center with Navy's Pistol Pete Williams, Alabama's Dixie Howell and pudgy but potent Lynn Chewning of Hampden-Sidney to do his backfielding.

Hickman brought along his own Yale quarterback in Robert

Furse. He has two brilliant breakaway runners available in Penn State's Elwood Petchel and Notre Dame's fabulous Terry Brennan plus the best of the Ivy League fullbacks to work for him in John Weber of Princeton.

Both squads were scheduled to hold a light workout at their respective Quarterbacks' Field and Miami Beach's Memorial Park this afternoon after mastering their new blocking assignments remarkably fast.
