



THE OLD TIMERS REMEMBER TOMS GARAGE 1934 –1946 625 NE 125TH STREET PHONE 7-2984

Tom's garage was owned by Thomas T. Ritten between 1934-1946. The original building at 625 NE 125^{th} Street was constructed some time in the 1920s with the development of Iron's Manor. It was severely damaged in the 1926 Hurricane. The entire roof was blown away . It sat vacant until about 1934 when Ritten got permission from an out of state owner to use the rent free . That owner was not concerned with the heavily damaged building . He was not even paying taxes on it as was common in the depression era. Ritten began his auto repair business within the walls of a roofless building. He worked under large Tarpaulins erected over the remaining roof beams. As time went by the business began to prosper.

As Ritter's business prospered he engaged a lawyer and acquired the building. He fixed the roof and purchased the adjoining properties. He became one of several merchants who supplied the basics to a population which was beginning to revive.

Ritten was always active with the business community and during the 1940s was a member of the Town Council. He advocated in the 1930s the paving the Town's road rather than maintain the rock and oil topped streets.

The original building still exist, but is within continuous line of buildings, which run down the north line of NE 125th Street between West Dixie Highway and NE 7th Avenue. The tow truck shown is a 1932 La Salle Cadillac customized fro towing purposes.
