Along with old timers were loads of folks who have lived in the community for many years and shortly will be reaching the old timers stage. The food was great and abundant. The Johnson and Wales University team from over on the south fork of Arch Creek catered the affair. The principal at William Jennings Bryan, Paul J. Greenfield and his Assistant Principal, Eileen Wacks, were more than gracious in assisting the city employees who set up the electric, the audio-visual sound system, and the many other little problems that always jump up at the last minute. While the Jr. R.O.T.C. Cadets were escorting, the boys and girls of the Police Explorer Post under the guidance of Lieutenant Kathy Ruggerio were directing parking in the overflow area of the schoolgrounds. They did a great job. There were no fender benders or temper tantrums and all is/was well. This Police Explorer Post is the oldest post in the State of Florida, having its roots with a Junior Police organization that was initiated in 1945 by the then Chief of Police Karl Engle.

Julie Washington, the publicist at City Hall, and Gabe Colon, in City Planning, developed a "Power Point" show of 60 or so photos and records that were researched by Glenn O'Hearn of the GNMHS that documented the basic history of North Miami. It was a great show and in the future will be part of the city publicity program with a copy being turned over to the GNMHS for future use. The city employees who worked on this party but are unnamed did a great job as usual. Their work is always noticed, like in the Orange Bowl Parade floats, the Winter National Event, and now at the "Big 75." Great job folks.

Last, but not least, is the volunteer squad of the Board of Directors of the GNMHS especially Glenn O'Hearn and Jackie Biggane who assisted Commissioner Scott Galvin, the Bryan School Administration and the City Staff. Commissioner Galvin is the spark plug of the GNMHS and you might say he is the founder of the organization. In 1997 he invited a group (that he considered local history buffs) to a meeting and from that meeting came the present organization that has gained considerable recognition in the community as well as some historians in the area. With every good job, there is one person who pushes it over the top. Anita Holoway, the Deputy City Manager, dealt with the organizational details and the follow ups and got the show over the top and on the road

You would think that this party was enough but the City set aside money for a big blow out that was held on the waterfront of the Cal Kovens Center at F.I.U. This party included a huge fire works display in the evening, and a midway with jugglers and clowns in the crowd. There were free cookies, cotton candy and popcorn from carnival type vendors. For the small children there was a booth that would paint and decorate their faces in clown fashion or showy with attractive designs. The fire works show at the end of the evening was spectacular. On the serious side of the affair was the Greater North Miami Historical Society's presentation of the last 75 years with photos, ephemera, and documents of the city's early struggle to stay alive in the depression and then its booming recovery in the late 50's that has gained it the name of the "Today's City of Progress." Jackie Biggane, Glenn O'Hearn and Blair Conner of the GNMHS teamed up with the Staff from M.O.C.A. (Museum of Contemporary Art) to organize and present the best of "75" collection. The Staff from M.O.C.A. was comprised of Jeremy Chestler, Kevin Arrow, and Claudia Miyar who added the professional touch of symmetry and color to the "75" collection. There were several hurdles to over come for this presentation, such as cases and stands to display the original photos, documents and ephemera. Once again the unnamed heroes of the city staff came to the rescue. They constructed protective glassed in cabinets and sturdy racks to display the items. They also refurbished the frames for a large collection of photos that has been stored the E. May Avil Library. The Power Point show that made its debut at the Bryan School party was improved, added too, and set on automatic.

As citizens moved through the lobby they had the opportunity to the sign in the guest book and put their name down for the future. Some one remarked that a time capsule should be placed at City Hall with items from the 75th Year to be opened at the 100th year celebration and that the book be placed therein. Sounds like a good idea?

The overall coordinator of the 75th Celebration at the Cal Kovens Center fell on Irma Plumer the Assistant City Manager for the City of North Miami. Irma set her plan in action and drew on the Directors of the GNMHS and the staff at M.O.C.A. and on her very talented employees. Without Irma and the city staff the festivities may not have happened. Thanks Irma and please compliment your city employees. All of you did a great job.




