Here is a golden opportunity for us all to get together.


DEBATE!



## COMMUNITY AUCTION TO BE HELD

Next Thursday, February 23rd, will see our community placed in the spotlight again. Through the co-operation of several leading real estate operators and the townspeople of Miami Shores, as well as the people in the Miami section of Biscayne Park Estates, an auction sale of choice home sites will be held.

Mr. Arthur M. Griffing, developer of Biscayne Park Estates, who conceived the idea, predicts that it will be the needed movement to start real estate back to "normalcy".

Approximately 30,000 winter visitors will be invited to attend the sales, through newspaper advertising, dodgers, circulars, and the personal invitation methods.

Any property owner may put his property up for sale by arrangement with Mr. Griffing, Mr. Emerson or Mr. Duncan. The principal burden of the expense is being borne by Mr. Griffing, Messrs. Baker and Riddle, Mr. E.W. Amidon, Mr. W.P. Brion, and Mr. Earl Irons, who are offering the greater part of the property to be sold. It is pointed out that this is to be in every sense a COMMUNITY auction sale of property and all citizens are urged to place such property as they desire to dispose of, with the leaders of the movement. It is understood that the expense will be slight, consisting mainly of the necessary commission for the sale.

Erdel Muetchler and his Band have been retained to supply music for the occasion, while several inducements have been offered as well. Free airplane rides will be given, and during the course of the sale a valuable lot will be given away free.

Luncheon will be served each day of the sale by a committee of women from the community. It will be remembered that the sales of the early part of our history were made famous by the type of lunches served to visitors. It is fully expected that this will again be the case.

As a preparatory measure the Mayor has set aside next Monday as "Clean Up Day" throughout the Town of Miami Shores and as indicated elsewhere by him in these pages, every citizen is urged to make his property as attractive as possible, realizing that the beauty of the Town will be the principal factor in selling home sites.

It is also urged by leaders in the movement that all citizens who can possibly leave other tasks be present at the sales and help make it a success by personal contact with the prospective purchasers. These people will be strongly attracted to the Town if it is shown to them by the residents that it is a GOOD PLACE IN WHICH TO LIVE. It is undoubtedly true that the prospect will take the word of the citizen who stands beside him before he will that of the man on the platform.

## GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

### COUNCIL MEETS

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held last Monday night in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, president Morgan, presiding. Mayor Jeffries made an address in which he outlined the policy of his administration for the coming year, and announced that the key word and slogan would be "Economy".

He stated that he would appoint several committees to consider with him the necessary appointments for the coming year, and the salaries to be attached to the various offices.

He then announced that his appointee for the vacancy on the Council was Mr. Louis Nathan, owner and developer of Sunkist Groves, and placed the appointment before the council for confirmation. Mr. Bennett moved that it be unanimously approved, and the motion was seconded by Mr. Hamilton. Mr. Griffing announced that he felt that the only person he could support for the vacancy was Mr. E.W. Amidon, who received the highest number of votes among the defeated candidates for the council in the General Election. This sentiment was also expressed by Councilmen Bettles and Hamilton. Several people in the audience also spoke upon the matter. When the vote was taken it stood as follows: Yea, Morgan, Snow and Bennett; Nay, Griffing, Hamilton and Bettles. It was then moved and carried that the Council transact no business until the vacancy was filled. Followed adjournment.

Telegraphic advise from the attorney in New York later stated that a tie vote in such a case would confirm the appointment, and also that on all matters the president of the council has a right to vote.

During the meeting Mr. Griffing stated that he expected to resign within the next few weeks because of pressure of business and necessary absence from Town. Rumor has it that Mr. Amidon will take his place on the Council, with Mr. Nathan filling the Jeffries vacancy.


It is expected that at an early date there will be a special meeting of the Council, and the matter fully decided.

To the Editor of The Miami Shores Bulletin:



I believe that the people of Miami Shores would be much disappointed if the rumor that Mr. Griffing is to resign from the Town Council should prove to be true. Mr. Griffing was recently re-elected to the office and the voters at that time - and Mr. Griffing himself - knew that it would be impossible for him to attend all the routine meetings of the Council. It is not necessary that he should. It is necessary, in the judgement of many, that Mr. Griffing remain on the Council, both for the Town's welfare and his own; and that in view of the important decisions to be made in the coming year he should not resign in favor of anybody, more especially in favor of one - however competent - whose name was not before the voters last November.

It is also a matter of regret with many that there has been any delay in the appointment of Mr. Amidon to fill the vacancy in the Council. Strangely enough, the only opposition to this appointment seems to come from certain associates of Mr. Amidon on the recent Harmony Ticket, one of whom received but a single more vote than did Mr. Amidon. If votes indicate the sentiment of the Townspeople it would seem that Mr. Amidon is clearly entitled to the position. By the same token Mr. Bettles, as high man, should be President of the Council.

It is suggested that the citizens of the Town make their views known immediately to Mr. Griffing and also to other members of the Council.

BOY SCOUT EVENTS


