# HISTORY OF MIAMI SHORES

## CHAPTER I

(Compiled by Edw. F. Hill - Information in this Chapter from C.G. Ihle)

On the 19th of February in 1888 a man who had served two five-year "hitches" in the United States Marines and had in those ten years of service traveled over most of the world, arrived in this section of Florida which is now the Town of Miami Shores.

Mr. C. G. Ihle, the first settler in Miami Shores, had taken his discharge from the Marines at Norfolk, Va. in the middle of winter. In his mind was the memory of a wonderful climate he had enjoyed in Pensacola, Florida, while there in service. Mr. Ihle made a "bee line" for the railroad as soon as he had his discharge and came directly to Jacksonville. With him was a Mr. David Burckhart, a Blue Jacket who had been with Mr. Ihle at the bombardment of Alexandria, Egypt in 1882, when they were both shipmates on the "Queenavog". On the way down an Englishman by the name of Sants who lived between Titusville and Enterprise advised them to keep on traveling south until they came to a section around Biscayne Bay -- because there vegetables could be raised all winter long.

Mr. Ihle and Mr. Burckhart took the Englishman's advice and boarded a train at Jacksonville for Titusville. The track - there was but one - went most of the way under water and palmettos were growing right in the right of way. Reaching Titusville after this eventful ride which was very different from the smooth fast traveling of today, they took a boat for Jupiter. From Jupiter they hired a hack to take them to the head of Lake Worth for a charge of \$2.00. This was as far as the hack would go and they were obliged to take a boat across to Palm Beach and stay there for a while at a boarding house of a Mrs. Moore. There was no such place in those days as West Palm Beach. The same boat later brought them to the foot of Lake Worth for the sum of \$5.00.

From this point they walked southward along the beach. There were no roads inland and they followed the only possible route in walking the sands, stopping as was the custom in those days for a week or so at each twenty five mile life-saving station along the way. The first station they arrived at was run by a Mr. Andrews who later came to Miami to live. The next station was under the direction of a Mr. Coleman and the station was located in the place where Ft. Lauderdale now stands. Mr. Ihle recalls a savage pony of Mr. Coleman's that one day swam right out into the ocean and was devoured by sharks.

Peacock's station was the next stop - where the two travelers stayed for more than a week. This station is on Miami Beach or was there up until the storm. When they were ready to continue on Mr. Peacock took them in a little sail boat across Biscayne Bay to where Lemon City is now and directed them to the home of E. L. White in Buena Vista which was the next town or village north of Miami.

Mr. White kept Mr. Ihle there with him for three weeks and wanted him to stay on indefinitely in Buena Vista to make starch. But Mr. Ihle explained that he came to Florida to make a home, not to make starch. So it came to pass that with Lindsey White's help Mr. Ihle bought 80 acres here at Arch Creek from the State of Florida at \$1.00 per acre and thus became the first settler in what has now become the Town of Miami Shores.

## CONTRACT AWARDED MORGAN-HILL PAVING COMPANY


### LOWEST BIDDER TO CONSTRUCT SIDEWALKS

At the Council meeting last Monday evening, the Contract for the construction of the 386,482 square feet of sidewalks was awarded to the Morgan-Hill Paving Company, this firm being the lowest bidder. The cost of the work will be 18.8¢ per square foot, and the Company agrees to accept the Town's bonds in payment at a price of ninety five and accrued interest. It is stipulated, however, that if the bonds should bring a price of ninety-five when offered at public sale, the Morgan-Hill Paving Company will receive 15.75¢ in cash per square foot. The Morgan-Hill Paving Company have agreed to give preference to citizens of the Town of Miami Shores in employment upon the work covered by the contract. Mr. R. P. Partridge, District Manager of the Company, has announced that work will begin some time in April.

### MUNICIPAL LIGHT AND POWER PLANT TOWN COUNCIL TO MAKE INVESTIGATION.

At the last meeting of the Town Council it was recommended by Mayor W. P. Brion that steps be taken without delay in order to remedy the unfortunate condition that now exists in many parts of our Town with respect to light and power. Mayor Brion stated that, "in view of the fact that many of our citizens are deprived of these facilities, it is incumbent upon the Municipal Government, either to bring about the improvement of this situation through private enterprise, or by the establishment by the Town of an electric light and power plant".

Mayor Brion suggested that a thorough study should be made as to the advisability of the establishment of a municipal electric light and power plant by the Town. After considering the matter, the Town Council voted to create a Special Committee for the purpose of making a complete investigation into the feasibility of this proposal. Councilmen Snow and Hamilton were appointed by Pres. Morgan, as members of this Committee, and were asked to present to the Council at the earliest practicable date

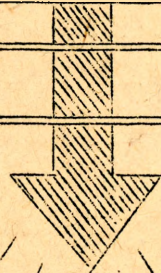

FIRE WELLS TO BE DRILLED  
KISER DRILLING COMPANY AWARDED CONTRACT

At the last meeting of the Town Council, sealed proposals for the drilling of approximately fifteen fire wells were opened and read. Mr. W. J. Duey proposed to drill 6" wells at a price of \$7.00 per lineal foot. The Kiser Drilling Company proposed to drill the wells complete as required by the specifications at the rate of \$5.50 per lineal foot for 6" wells and \$7.50 per lineal foot for 8" wells (double connection), or \$7.00 per lineal foot, single connection. A bid was also presented by Mr. A. B. Anderson, but was rejected by the Council because it covered merely the work and did not include the casings. After considering the bids, the contract was awarded by the Council to the Kiser Drilling Company. It is announced by Fire Chief MacDonald that the drilling of these wells will be started some time next week.

STREETS IN FULFORD HIGHLANDS MAY BE PAVED  
PETITION PRESENTED TO COUNCIL.

A Petition was presented to the Town Council on Monday, bearing the signatures of thirteen residents and property owners of Fulford Highlands, requesting that the Council provide for paving of the following streets in Fulford Highlands:--

- Nash Avenue, Block 1 and 2
- Lodge Avenue, Blocks 3 and 4
- Beary Avenue from Avenue "E" to Cardinal Road
- Highland Boulevard from Sturdevant Ave. to Fulford Boulevard.

In accordance with the rules of the Council, the matter was referred to a Committee, and action will be taken by the Council upon the Petition at its next regular meeting on February 23.

It is believed that the Council at that meeting will approve the Petition and direct the Town Engineers to prepare detailed plans and specifications and estimates of the cost of the improvement.

If finally approved by the Council, as appears likely, bonds will be issued to cover the cost of the work, and special assessments will be levied against the lots fronting upon the streets named, payable one-tenth each year for a period of ten years.

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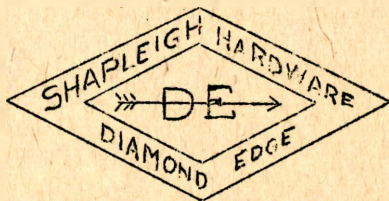

LEGAL NOTICE

SEALED PROPOSALS for the paving of Avenue "D" from Eighth Street to the Old West Dixie Highway, and for the paving of Harding Avenue from Dixieanna Avenue to the center line of Section 29, Township 52 South, Range 42 East, will be received by the Town Clerk of the Town of Miami Shores, Florida, at his office in the Town Hall until eight o'clock P.M. on Monday, February 28, 1927, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read at a meeting of the Town Council, and the award of the contracts made as soon thereafter as practicable.

The Engineers' estimate of quantities is as follows:

- 11,800 square yards subgrading
- 11,800 square yards 6" Macadam pavement
- 5,600 square yards oiling (one application)
- 6,200 square yards oiling (two applications)
- 4,950 lineal feet concrete gutter
- 190 lineal feet concrete headers

Each proposal shall be made in good faith on forms which may be secured at the office of the Town Clerk. Each proposal shall be accompanied by a certified check upon a Bank or Trust Company of Florida, payable to the Town of Miami Shores in an amount equal to two and one half (2½%) per cent of the total amount of the Proposal.

The deposit of any bidder to whom a contract is awarded, will be forfeited to the Town as liquidated damages if the bidder for twenty days following written notice of such award fails to execute the written contract and furnish the required bond. This deposit, however, will be returned to the bidder when the contract has been executed, the bond furnished and both approved by the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores. The deposits of other bidders will be returned within three days after award of the contract or the rejection of all bids. In each Proposal by an individual or firm shall be stated the name and address of every person interested in it, and in the case of a corporation the names and the addresses of its officers.

No Proposal shall be withdrawn after it is filed unless the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores fails to accept it within forty days after the date for opening the bids. Each bidder is to examine the location of the work, also the plans and specifications on file in the office of the Town Clerk of the Town of Miami Shores, and on file in the office of the Town Engineers, Messrs. Huff and Roberts, Miami, Fla. and otherwise familiarize himself with the character and extent of the proposed construction before making his Proposal. Each bidder is to state what experience he has had in such construction, and furnish satisfactory references as to business standing, for no bid will be accepted without complete and satisfactory evidence that the bidder is experienced in such construction and has the capital available for furnishing the equipment necessary, and for employing a sufficient complement of labor to execute the work promptly according to the specifications. The bond required is one hundred (100%) per cent of the estimated cost of the work at the contract prices, which is to be executed by the successful bidder as principal and by a Surety Company authorized to do business in the State of Florida; this bond is to be filed within twenty days after the acceptance of the Proposal on forms which will be furnished by the Town Clerk of the Town of Miami Shores, for the faithful performance of the contract.

N O T I C E

Because of a possible misunderstanding on the part of the tax payers and citizens of the Town of Miami Shores, I wish to make the following statement.

The gross tax assessment on property within the Town limits amounts to \$44,000.00 which will be somewhat lessened by discounts and other exemptions. Of this figure the Tax Collector is paid on the basis of 5% on collections, making his yearly income approximately \$2000.00.

All expenses of renting and maintaining an office with the exception of the purchase of books and official stationery is borne by the Collector.

The following is a list of expenses the Collector will assume in 1927.

Office rent for the year - - - - -	300.00
Furniture and equipment of office - - - - -	300.00
Salary to Assistant Collector - - - - -	780.00
Premium on Bond furnished- - - - -	65.00
Postage (approximately)- - - - -	200.00
TOTAL	<u>\$1645.00</u>

Leaving a possible balance of \$500.00 as remuneration for the Collectors services. This does not take into consideration the minor expenses such as going to the bank almost every day to deposit collections and other office expense.

At a Council meeting on January 31st, 1926 a resolution was read before that body to pay the Tax Collector a straight salary of \$1,000. per year, the Town paying all other expenses and the office to be open four hours each day only. However, the resolution was not adopted and I believe the reader will agree the Town is getting off with less expense and with better service according to the resolution which was adopted.

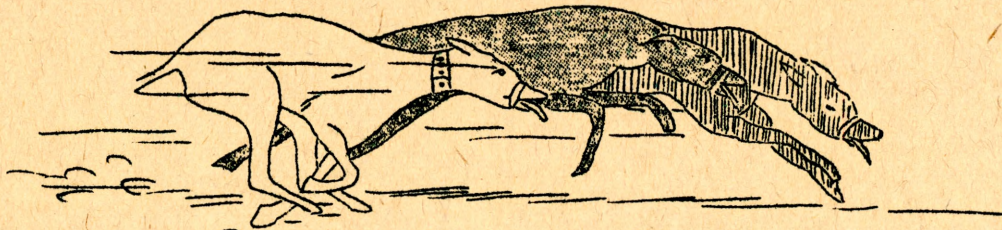
I wish to state further there are 15,000 parcels of land within the corporate limits of the Town for which itemized statements are being made up and sent to all owners where it is possible to locate same. This involves a tremendous amount of office work and in addition there is a constant flow of inquiries pouring in by every mail which must be replied to promptly.

On July 1st, 1927 all unpaid taxes are delinquent and all property upon which the tax is not paid will be advertised and sold and taxes collected for same. The work involved in this matter will cover several months time, in fact will run well up into the following year.

The margin of profit I will make out of the Tax Office is very small and I will give practically my whole time. In the past year I have given freely of my time and efforts for the Town's welfare. In the future I shall deem it no less my duty and privilege to work for the common good of our Town and its people.

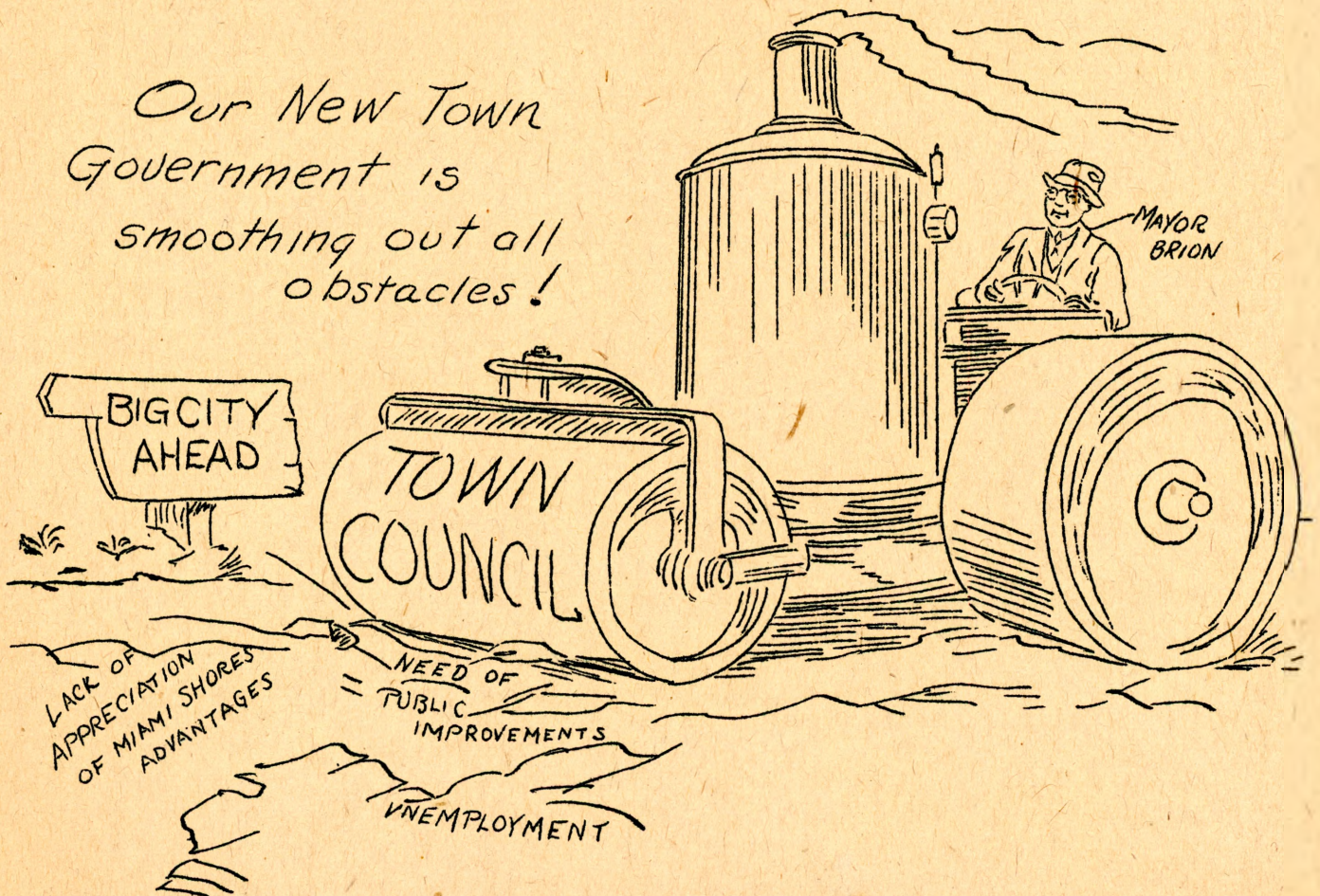

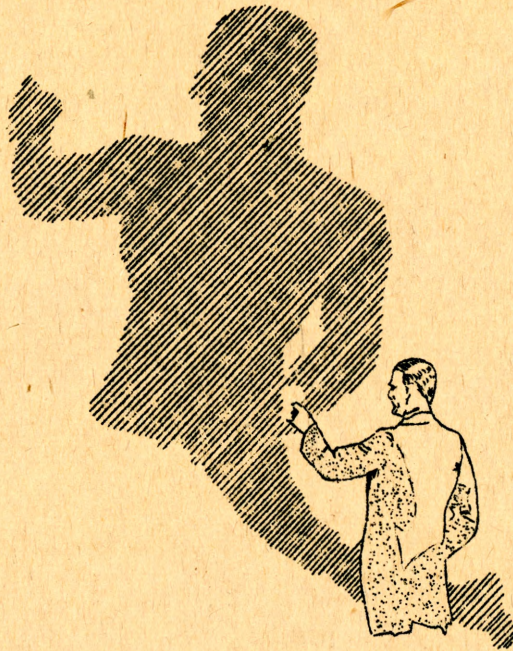
