

## HISTORY OF MIAMI SHORES CHAPTER II

By E.F.Hill-Information in Chapter 2 from  
C.G.Ihle

It was almost a year before Mr. Ihle found that he had settled on the wrong piece of land. During this first year he had done some clearing and had built himself a hut of palmettos. Most of the time, however, he had spent helping a Mr. Fred. Morse who was clearing a piece of land next door to the Brickell place in Miami. Mr. Morse would sometimes come after Mr. Ihle in his boat "Emmie" but oftimes Mr. Ihle had to walk the Indian Trails to Miami.



The land on which Mr. Ihle had settled this first year was about a half mile north and east of the Fountania. The underbrush at this early period was so dense that it was difficult to walk anywhere. Palmettos grew higher than a man's head. Rattlesnakes were everywhere and Mr. Ihle had killed a dozen while walking along the narrow trails. So one day he set fire to the woods and cleaned out every bit of brush and incidently killed a bunch of the rattlers.

In those days deer were scattered thru here and as Mr. Ihle would not shoot them they became friendly and half tame. An otter, on one occasion came right up to the hut with a deadly Mocassin snake in his mouth as if to show that he had killed an enemy of man. About this time the land office of the state notified Mr. Ihle that he was on the wrong piece of land and he had to move to the spot not far from his present home -- the spot where he spent most of the years of his pioneering.

En in those early days the nearest large gathering of Seminoles was at Cypress Swamp - back in the Everglades about forty or fifty miles. But different bands of Seminoles roamed at will and used to come to the little palmetto hut. Altho few whites knew it, many of the tribe could talk a broken English when they wanted to. They came to talk; never to work. Seminoles in those days as now made what money they obtained by selling to the white people aligator skins and fine birds feathers. Now of course there is a ban on the killing of beautiful birds for their plumage. Mr. Ihle says that the Indians were quite friendly most of the time. In fact he tells a story on himself of how a Seminole saved his life when he had fallen off the stern of a boat after he had taken too much of Brickell's cider which was pretty hard then. It is interesting to note that in all his dealings with the Seminoles Mr. Ihle never found one thing to criticize about their honesty or fair dealing.

As soon as he had a palmetto shack built-a piece of the new land cleared and a few other necessary things done, Mr. Ihle started right in to raise tomatoes. No other white person lived within two miles. A few were in Lemon City, two or three in Buena Vista and a half dozen families lived in Miami. The tomatoes had to be taken to Lemon City where they were put on a schooner to be taken to Miami and put on a steamer for New York. For three years Mr. Ihle lived alone with the nearest neighbor on the north at Ft. Lauderdale. He lived a good deal on fish-trout, snappers, checks and sometimes tarpon and bass. And he also caught turtles which came up on the beach to lay their eggs. Mr. Ihle lived in this way for three years until Mr. W. B. Baker came here from the Bahamas and the Keys thus making two settlers in this section sharing "grub" and trials and happy fishing days together.

## L E G A L   N O T I C E

SEALED PROPOSALS for the paving of Avenue "D" from Eighth Street to the Old West Dixie Highway, and for the paving of Harding Avenue from Dixieanna Avenue to the center line of Section 29, Township 52 South, Range 42 East, will be received by the Town Clerk of the Town of Miami Shores, Florida, at his office in the Town Hall until eight o'clock P.M. on Monday, February 28, 1927, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read at a meeting of the Town Council, and the award of the contracts made as soon thereafter as practicable.

The Engineers' estimate of quantities is as follows:

- 11,800 square yards subgrading
- 11,800 square yards 6" Macadam pavement
- 5,600 square yards oiling (one application)
- 6,200 square yards oiling (two applications)
- 4,950 lineal feet concrete gutter
- 190 lineal feet concrete headers

Each proposal shall be made in good faith on forms which may be secured at the office of the Town Clerk. Each proposal shall be accompanied by a certified check upon a Bank or Trust Company of Florida, payable to the Town of Miami Shores in an amount equal to two and one half (2½%) per cent of the total amount of the Proposal.

The deposit of any bidder to whom a contract is awarded, will be forfeited to the Town as liquidated damages if the bidder for twenty days following written notice of such award fails to execute the written contract and furnish the required bond. This deposit, however, will be returned to the bidder when the contract has been executed, the bond furnished and both approved by the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores. The deposits of other bidders will be returned within three days after award of the contract or the rejection of all bids. In each Proposal by an individual or firm shall be stated the name and address of every person interested in it, and in the case of a corporation the names and the addresses of its officers.

No Proposal shall be withdrawn after it is filed unless the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores fails to accept it within forty days after the date for opening the bids. Each bidder is to examine the location of the work, also the plans and specifications on file in the office of the Town Clerk of the Town of Miami Shores, and on file in the office of the Town Engineers, Messrs. Huff and Roberts, Miami, Fla. and otherwise familiarize himself with the character and extent of the proposed construction before making his Proposal. Each bidder is to state what experience he has had in such construction, and furnish satisfactory references as to business standing, for no bid will be accepted without complete and satisfactory evidence that the bidder is experienced in such construction and has the capital available for furnishing the equipment necessary, and for employing a sufficient complement of labor to execute the work promptly according to the specifications. The bond required is one hundred (100%) per cent of the estimated cost of the work at the contract prices, which is to be executed by the successful bidder as principal and by a Surety Company authorized to do business in the State of Florida; this bond is to be filed within twenty days after the acceptance of the Proposal on forms which will be furnished by the Town Clerk of the Town of Miami Shores, for the faithful performance of the contract.

Plans, specifications, and Proposal and Surety Bond blank forms may be obtained from the Town Clerk or the Town Engineers upon deposit of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

Payments will be made upon monthly estimates to the Town Engineers to the amount of seventy (70%) per cent of such estimates of value of materials delivered and work performed, and the balance due shall be paid within sixty days after the final acceptance of the work by the Town Council of the Town of Miami Shores, Florida.
