

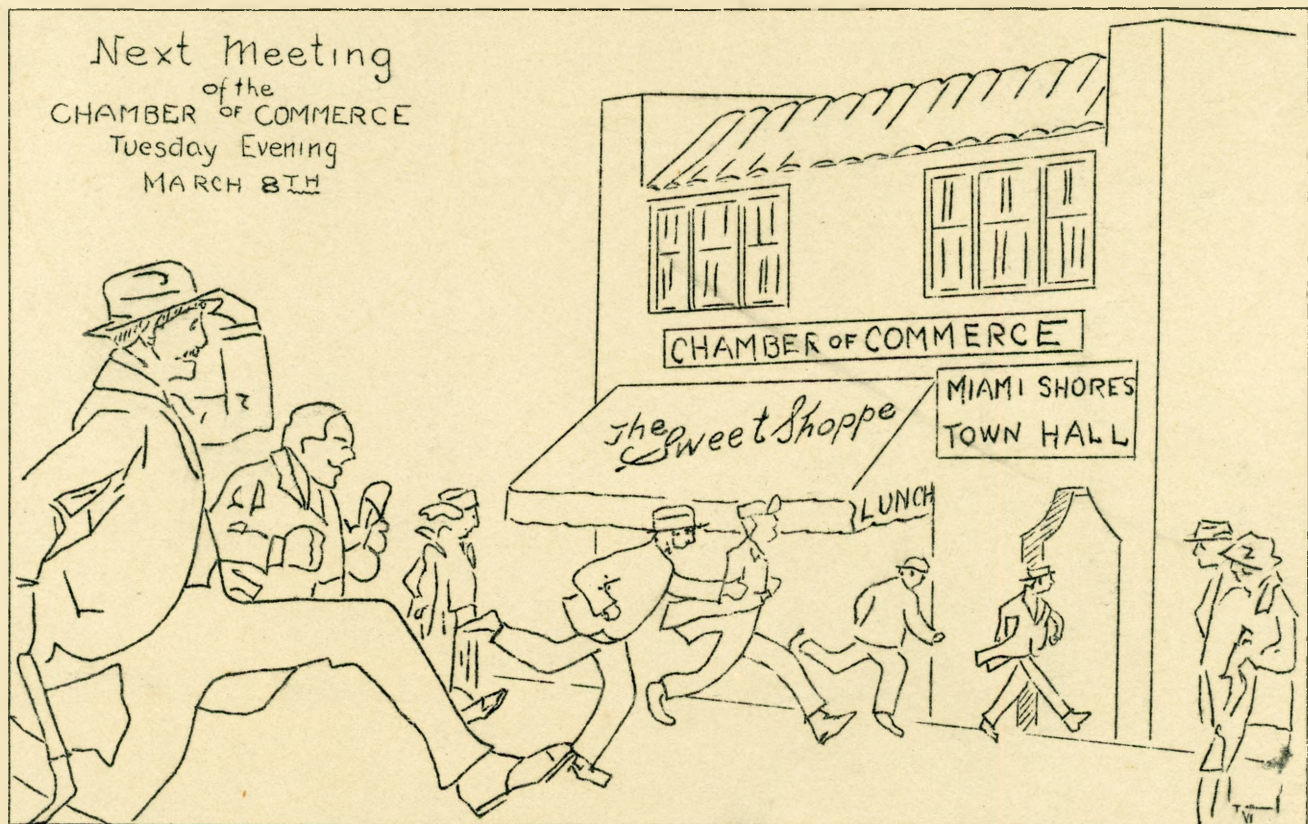

# HISTORY OF MIAMI SHORES

## CHAPTER III

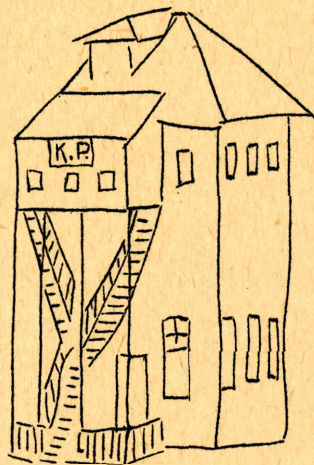
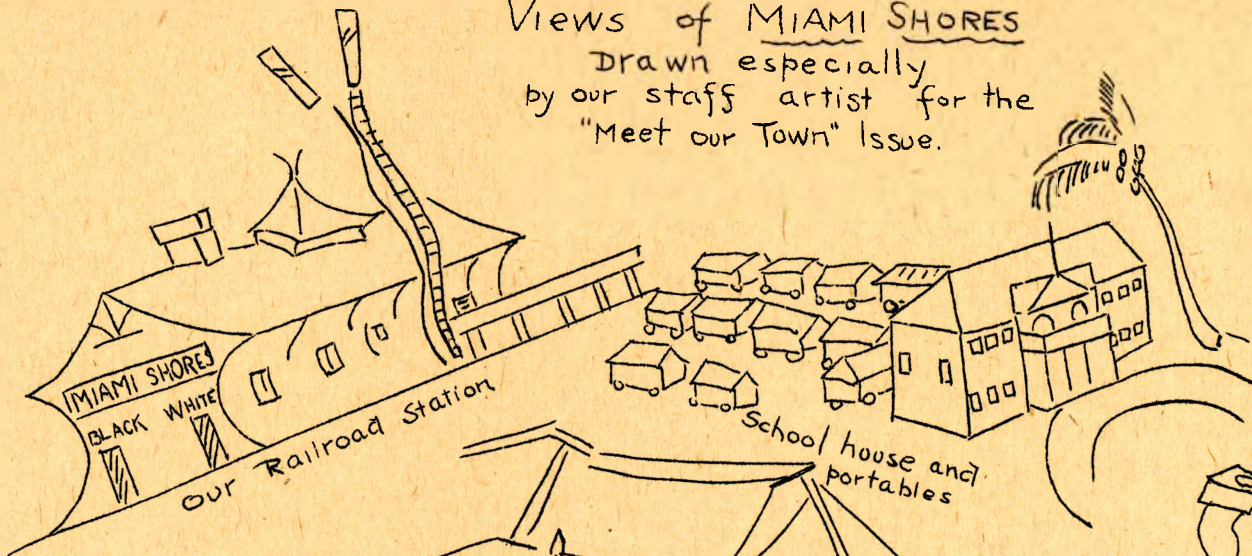
In our last Chapter we stated that tomatoes had to be taken to Lemon City and put on a schooner from whence they were transferred to a steamer at Miami. This was in error. The schooner carried them to Key West. The schooner belonged to Louis Pierce and the steamer line to New York was the Mallory Line. It was long afterward before any boats except schooners and sloops were able to come in and out of the Bay Biscayne. There was some traffic in bananas etc. from the Bahamas and West Indies and most of this came thru Bears cut or Cape Florida Inlet, both of which have now been deepened for large ships.

In these old days steamers and schooners plying between this country and Brazil, S.A. and the West Indies carried cocoanuts for ballast to keep the cargo from shifting. Many of the cocoanut palms growing along Florida's shoreline, are from cocoanuts washed ashore from wrecked steamers. Mr. Ihle planted many of these cocoanuts and many which he secured from Mr. Gilberts place (next to Brickells on the Miami River). He also planted sapodillas which he got from the Bahamas and Key West, - planted bananas and mangoes from Cuba, guavas and sour sop from Key West. Mr. Ihle, secured most of his fruit trees thru Mr. J. Pinder who came here from Key Largo and Key West and originally from the Bahamas. Mr. Pinder had bought 80 acres from Mr. Jennings who came to this section from North Carolina about four years after Mr. Baker had come to share pioneering experiences with Mr. Ihle. Mr. Jennings boarded with Brickells in Miami and then came here and built a one story frame bungalow about where Mrs. Dale lives on the east Dixie. Mr. Ihle helped him sink his well right on that corner.

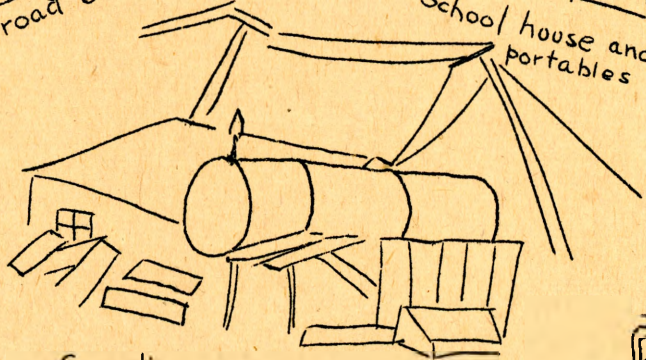
During all these first years, Mr. Ihle had to get all his provisions at Brickells in Miami. He walked to Little River - swam the river - and then walked to Miami. A Mr. Ewing lived on this side of the Miami River and he would take Mr. Ihle across to Brickells on the south side. After buying provisions, Brickells would bring Mr. Ihle back to the north side of the river. There was at Little River a Mr. Freeman who kept a canoe to take over passengers but often he was too far away to hear a call and anyone wanting to cross had to swim. Coming back Mr. Ihle would stop at Mr. Freeman's house and would get him to take him across the river with the provisions. This trip for food etc. was made every two or three weeks. Sometimes Mr. Peadon who lived a bit south on the East Dixie would bring supplies to Mr. Ihle and sometimes Mr. Morse in Miami would do the same.

Later Mr. Ihle bought a boat to make the trip down the bay and he also bought a horse. But even with these it was a task to lay in supplies. Oftimes it was necessary to carry on his shoulder a half barrel of flour - trudging along up from the boat at times in mud to his hips, - throwing it off and shouldering it again and again. The trip by boat necessitated cutting a path thru the Mangrove swamp and then thru sawgrass over a man's head - a quarter of a mile of this - and then thru palmettos to the house. It is hard for us now to picture such pioneering. But the first attempt to cut the path resulted in Mr. Ihle working almost in a circle - so dense was the swamp brush and so impossible to even see the directions. Mr. Ihle and Mr. Morse came to the conclusion that they must have an outlet to the bay - a road to save this tremendous task of carrying supplies thru the swamp. Mr. Ihle started the big job by digging two ditches four feet wide and three feet deep and throwing the dirt between the two ditches making a road bed twelve feet wide for a quarter of a mile. Then with the help of Mr. Morse the road was made for another eighth of a mile thru the mangrove swamp with five foot ditches on each side of a twenty foot road bed. On top then Mr. Ihle hauled rocks - about three hundred cartloads - working way into the night as the rocks sank so deep into the mud before a solid bottom could be made.

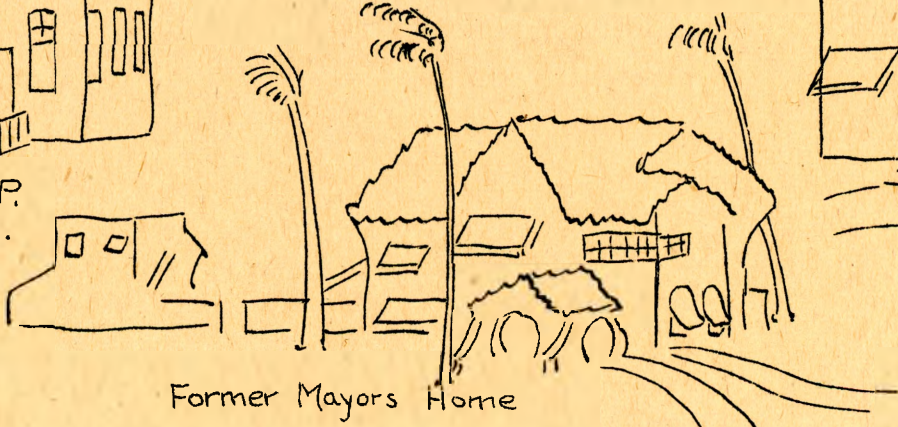

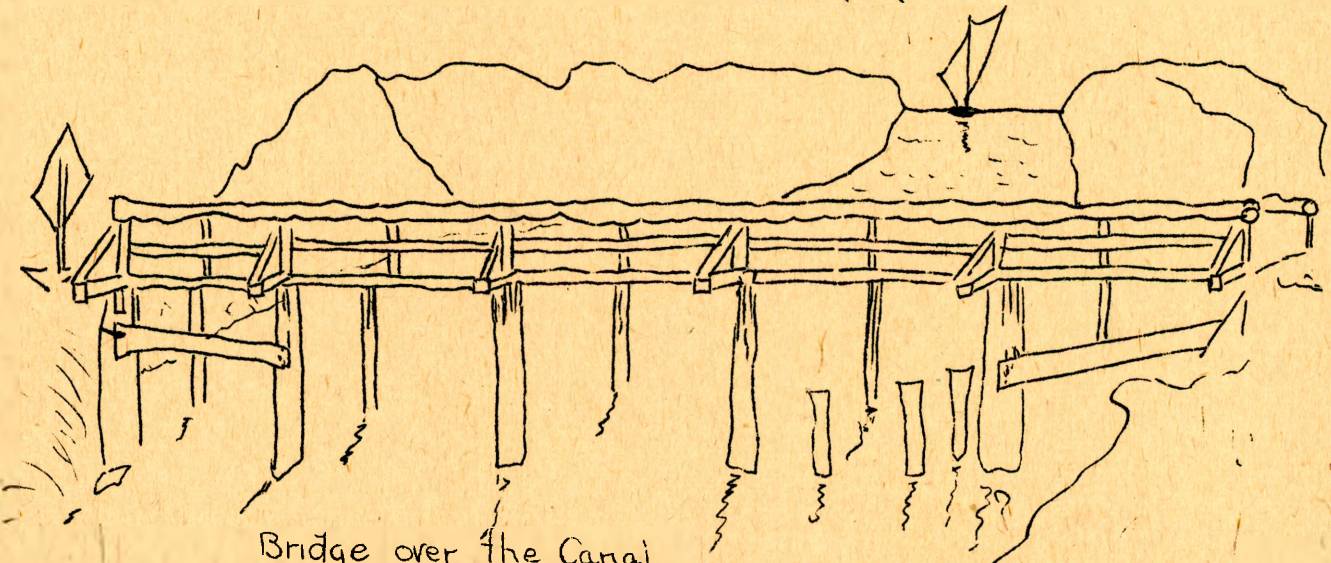


# COMMUNITY NEWS

## BOND MONEY COMING CHECK EXPECTED WITHIN WEEK.

It was announced at the Town Hall yesterday by Mayor W. P. Brion that \$50,000. in General Improvement Bonds of the Town of Miami Shores, accompanied by the final approving opinion of Messrs. Caldwell and Raymond, Bond Attorneys, have been shipped from New York to the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, Fla. Delivery will be made in Jacksonville, Fla. to Messrs. Pierce and Richards, purchasers of the bonds, upon receipt of a certified check for the amount of the purchase price. Mayor Brion stated that he believed the check for the purchase price of the \$50,000. bonds would be received at the Town Hall within the next week. Delivery and payment for the remaining \$125,000. is to be made at the rate of \$25,000. in bonds each month until the entire issue is taken up, according to the contract with Messrs. Pierce and Richards.

## HARDING STREET ASSESSMENT ROLL APPROVED NO OBJECTIONS PRESENTED.

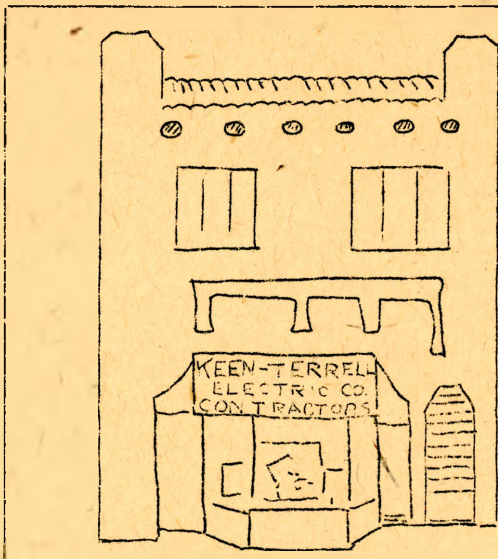

the hard-surfacing of Harding Avenue. The roll had been published in the Miami Tribune for the past three weeks, and all citizens were invited to present their protests to the Council. No objection was voiced, however, and the Council proceeded to approve the assessment roll as published. The total estimated cost of the improvement is \$7,392.00

STREET IMPROVEMENT BIDS RECEIVED.  
THREE PROPOSALS PRESENTED TO COUNCIL

At the Council meeting Monday, proposals were presented by H. L. Clark & Sons Co., Morgan-Hill Paving Company and T. B. McGahey Paving Company for the paving of Avenue "D" and the hard-surfacing of Harding Avenue. H. L. Clark & Sons Co., proposed to do the grading at 31¢ per square yard, paving at 70¢, oiling (one application) at 17¢ two applications 34¢, concrete gutter at 59¢, concrete headers at 59¢ and they agreed to take Town bonds in payment at a price of ninety five and accrued interest and to complete the work within thirty days. Morgan-Hill Paving Company proposed to do the grading for 30¢, paving 68¢, oiling one application 16¢, oiling two applications 30¢, concrete gutter 70¢, concrete headers 70¢ and also agreed to accept Town bonds in payment upon the same basis and to complete the work within sixty days.



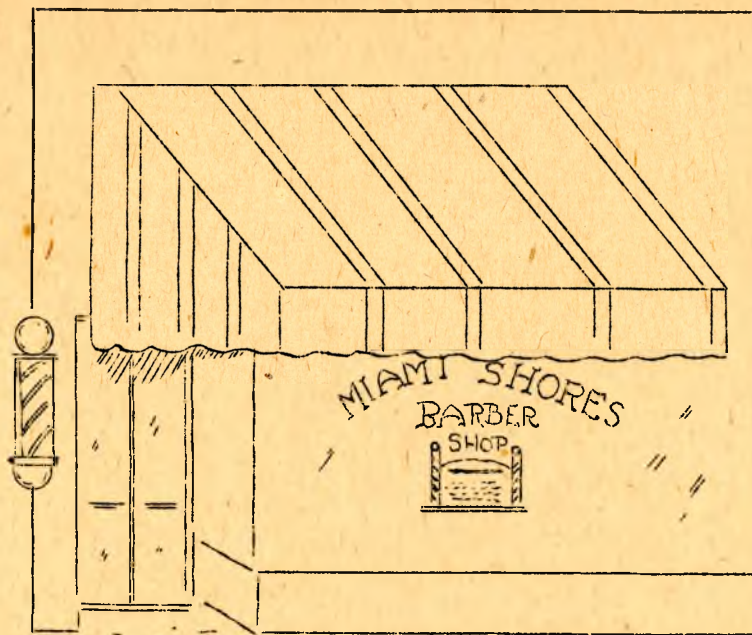

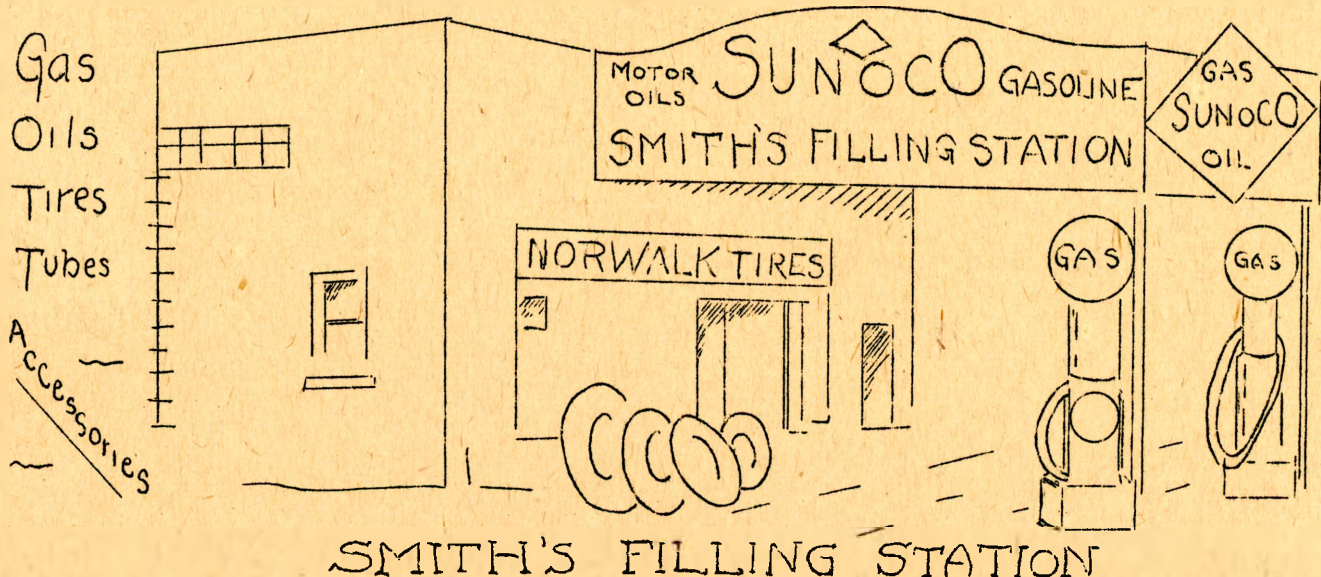

T. B. McGahey Paving Company presented a bid, but this Company was unwilling to receive municipal bonds in payment. A certified check in the amount of  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$  of the bid price was presented with each proposal as evidence of good faith. Upon computing the proposals, it was found that the total amount of the H. L. Clark & Sons Co., bid was \$18,010.60, while that of the Morgan-Hill Paving Company was \$17,918.00, a difference of only \$92.60 in the two bids.

\$74,000 SIDEWALK BONDS TO BE ISSUED.

At the Council meeting last Monday, Resolution No. 79 was passed, authorizing the issuance of Sidewalk Improvement Bonds in the amount of \$74,000.00. The Council decided that the bonds should be dated April 1st, 1927, bear 6% interest and that \$7,000.00 should mature on April 1st of each year from 1928 to 1933 inclusive, and that \$8,000.00 should mature each year from April 1, 1934 to April 1, 1937 inclusive. Both principal and interest is payable at the United States Mortgage & Trust Company, in the City of New York. The contract covering this sidewalk improvement work was let to the






Morgan-Hill Paving Company on February 14, and the Company has agreed to purchase these bonds at the price of ninety five and accrued interest.

FULFORD HIGHLANDS PAVING APPROVED

The Town Council last Monday directed the Town Engineers to prepare plans and specifications and estimate of cost of paving the following streets in Fulford Highlands:-

Nash Avenue, Blocks 1 and 2  
Lodge Avenue, Blocks 3 and 4  
Beary Avenue from Avenue E to Cardinal Road.

Highland Boulevard from Sturdevant Avenue to Fulford Boulevard. A petition requesting the paving of these streets was presented, bearing the signatures of C. W. Linton, W. A. Tuthill, Vernon Weinnenberg, Ben B. Stoudt, Chas. Brodhun, H. Hood, C.M. Keith, H. G. Shotwell, G. W. Sornberger, F. L. Shirner, R. J. Button, and J. B. Cowrie.

A SCHOOL BOYS ESSAY ON AIR.

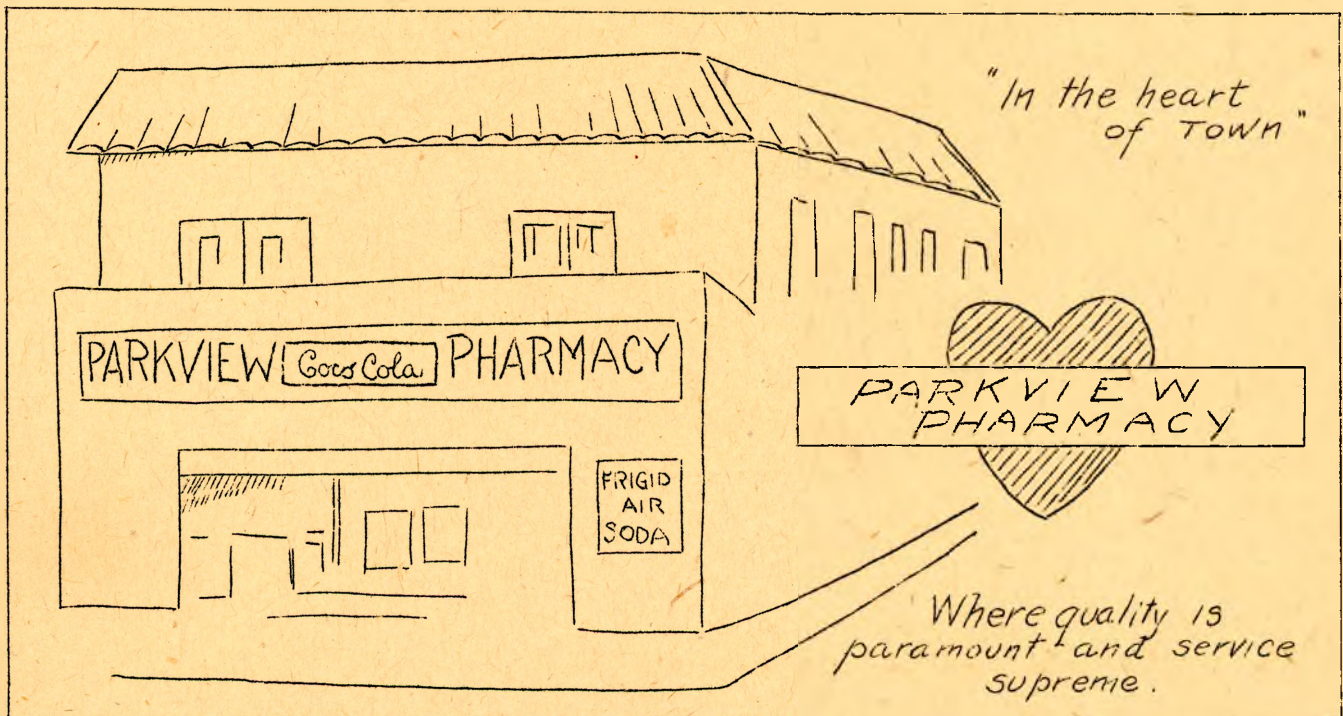

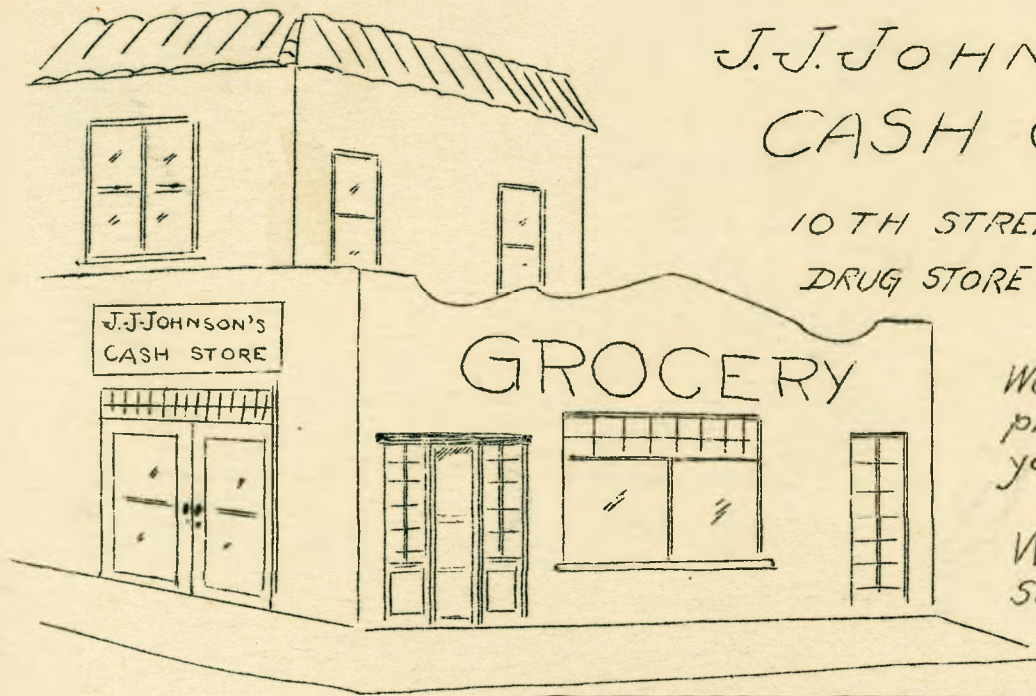
