HISTORY OF MIAMI SHORES CHAPTER IV

After the road was built Mr. Ihle could do his hauling to and from the Bay with his horse. He did some hauling for his neighbor Mr. Pinder. At this time Mr. and Mrs. Fulford ran the life-saving station formerly run by Mr. Peacock. The present town of Fulford is named after this Captain Fulford. Mr. Ihle's dock on this side of the Bay was the only landing place across from the Station. The Fulfords secured a "Homestead" where the town of Fulford now lies and Mr. Ihle hauled their goods to the place. It is interesting to note that Captain Fulford obtained the Homestead land by paying only a \$7.00 fee for filing the claim for 160 acres. He made numerous trips over and back from the beach and built himself a house in which he lived for a number of years after retiring from the government service. After his death Mrs. Fulford went to live in California with her son.

During this first ten year period before the coming of the railroad with its influx of inhabitants, Mr. Thle tells us that no severe storm or hurricane visited this section. At one time however, a severe cold spell came down from the northwest. It was so cold that it froze and otherwise disabled many large tarpon weighing from 50 to 200 lbs each. Their eyes were frozen and they could be found in large numbers floating around the top of the water in the Bay - totally blind. Thousands of other fish were also frozen or stunned. Mr. Ihle and Mr. Baker easily caught some live ones for food and Mr. Peadon and Mr. Barnett who lived a little south of Mr. Ihle, hauled in hundreds of dead tarpon for fertilizer. They also caught a few live ones for food.

Many of us have wondered where or how Bakers Haulover received its name. At the time this history covers there was a sort of sand flat over which the pioneers hauled their boats. Hauling them over this narrow strip of low land from the ocean to the bay saved rowing or sailing down south to Narrows Cut (near the present main entrance to the bay). This was often done when a storm was coming up too quickly to allow time to make the trip around.

Bakers Haulover of the present day is about 1500 feet south of the original Bakers Haulover. When Mr. Dcuglass, who was the Dade County Commissioner at the time of digging the present cut, was ready to have the work started Mr. Ihle advised making the cut where it now is. This was because the bay is wider there and because it is abreast of Arch Creek.

When way back in 1888 Mr. Thle was on his way down here a Mr. Henry Flagler was going on a hunting trip at Melbourne on the Indian River in Florida. They were on the same boat. A salesman of Armour and Co. had been talking to Mr. Flagler and repeated to Mr. Thle a statement of Flagler's that a railroad would be put down to the Biscayne Bay Section in 10 years. Time proved that Henry Flagler kept his word. In 1898 the Florida East Coast Railroad reached Arch Creek and Miami. Mr. Thle hoisted the American Flag when the first train hove in sight. It sounded good to him to hear the whistle of the train as it went by after ten years of being alone in the silence of this tropical Florida. Progress has changed the place -- tourists come and go and think lightly about the Florida of old. But few remember how this country looked when the first engine came down to bring with it people from the north --to make possible the metropolitan Miami of today.

When the railroad came Mr. Ihle realized the value of having a good road thru his land. He cut down the Pines and Palmettos which grew everywhere and gave a 30 foot right of way to the county for the East Dixie.




