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PARENT TEACHERS ASSOCIATION NEWS



# At The Town Hall

## TELEPHONE SERVICE

Telephone service will be extended to the Town of Miami Shores, if a sufficient number of our citizens want it, according to an announcement of Mayor W.P.Brion with Vernon Baird, District Manager of the Southern Bell Telephone Company and Telegraph Company. Mr. Fitzpatrick a representative of the telephone company last Monday began a canvas of the Town and secured on the first day twenty-six applications, which number was increased to fifty-eight by Thursday morning.

The Town Council met last Monday night in the new Council Chamber -- the central auditorium of the Potts Building. The Plans for the new Town Hall were presented by W.P.Shappell, Architect, and were considered by the Council. A resolution was passed providing that the compensation of the Architect should be three percent (3%) of the amount of the contract for the erection of the Town Hall.

By unanimous vote the Council ratified and approved the execution of a lease of the offices in the Potts Building, for use as a Town Hall, for a period of six (6) months.

NEW FIRE WELLS NEARLY COMPLETED

Marshall McDonald announced Thursday that the digging of the thirteen wells being drilled by the Kiser Company was nearly complete. The drilling itself is all done, and the wells are now being cleaned of all sand and gravel by means of the air compressor system that "shoots" the well. The next step will be to test each one of the wells with the fire apparatus, and upon completion of the final test they will be turned over to the Town. The wells range in depth from 45 to 150 feet in depth, and are expected to supply more than enough water for any fire emergency. The drilling of these wells gives nearly every house in the Town protection, the Marshall stated, and should bring about a lower scale of fire insurance rates. This will also be helped by the installation of the Miami Shores Telephone system.

The Warden of the Town Jail, who is also engineer of the Fire Truck, sleeps in the Fire House in order that any call for either police or fire assistance can be immediately answered. Bear this matter in mind, and in an emergency report to the Fire Hall AT ONCE, and the efficient fire ladders or police as the case may be will respond within a minimum of time.

On Tuesday evening of next week the Firemen will have another Smoker. Those sponsoring the affair announce that the card of boxing will be better than ever, they having been able to secure the services of several white boys in addition to the usual colored bouts. All men in the Town are invited to be present and enjoy the evening's entertainment. Refreshments will be served.

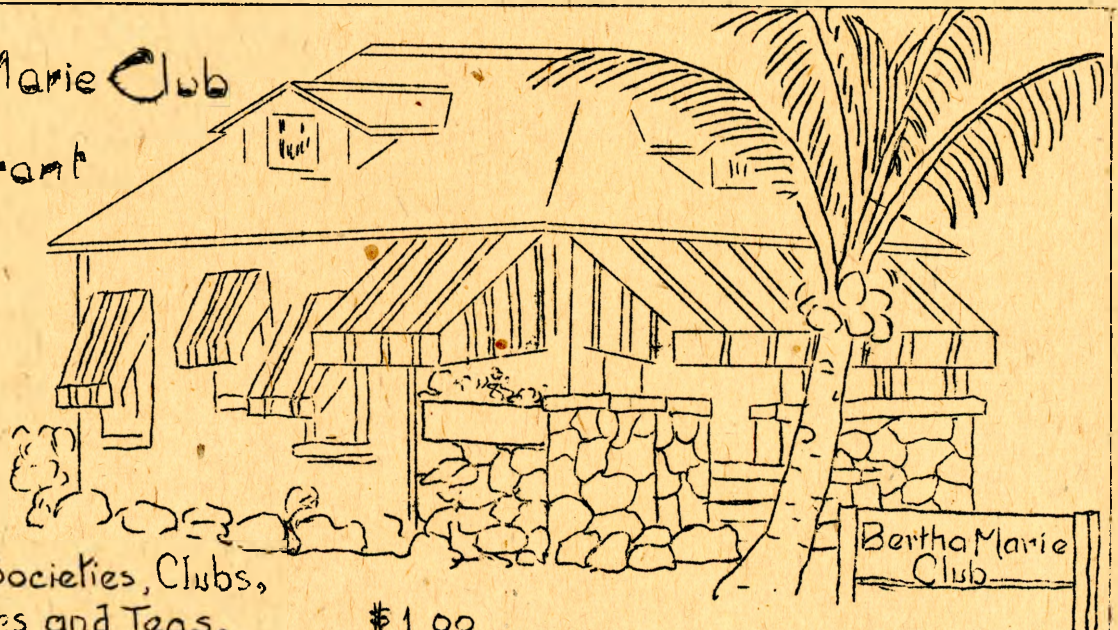

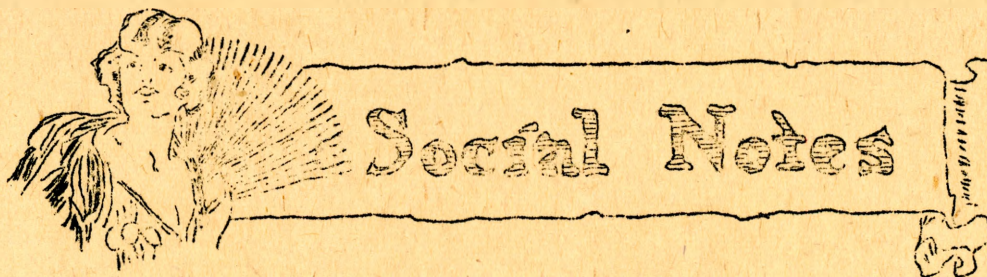

Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Burchby and family left for Chicago by train on April the first.

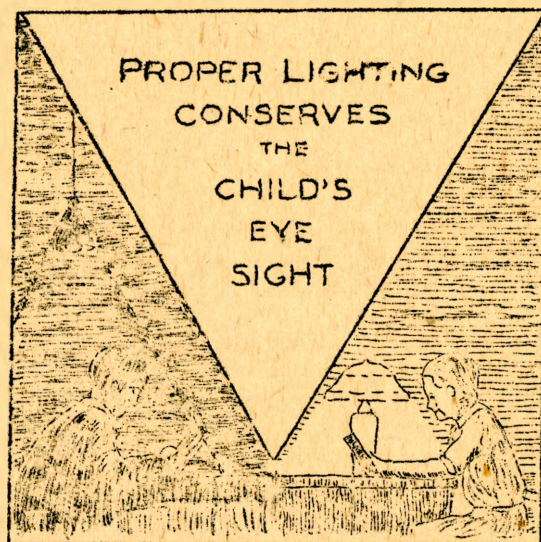
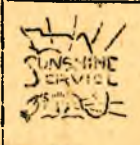
Mr. and Mrs. Oscar A. Kiyasted and family left for Chicago by motor on April the fifth, to make their future home there.


MOSQUITO CONTROL NEWS

As was mentioned in our article in last week's "BULLETIN" but a few of the numerous species of mosquitoes breeding in Florida are disease bearers. The mosquitoes which carry the germs causing Malaria and Dengue Fever breed principally in places furnished by man.

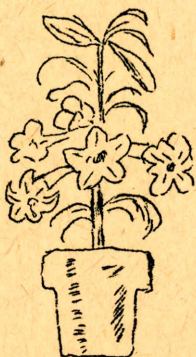
The citizens of this town can help materially in the control of mosquitoes by removing from their own premises the things that furnish breeding places for disease carrying mosquitoes. Old cans, tubs and buckets, old auto tire casings, etc., should be collected and hauled away by the garbage collector to the city dumping ground and there disposed of. See that the washtubs are not allowed to collect water. If possible screen the rain barrels and cisterns, and outside toilets. THIS IS YOUR JOB. The Department of Mosquito Control can then concentrate all their efforts on the outlying territory. To date we have dug approximately 12,000 feet of ditches which drains a large area of low land containing many low places which were natural breeding places for mosquitoes. We have cleared the undergrowth from most of the natural waterways, so that the sunshine can penetrate, also allows passage for the workmen in oiling these streams during wet weather. A great deal of work is still ahead of us and with the aid of the citizens of the town in cleaning up their own premises, we hope to make the town of Miami Shores as free as possible from mosquitoes.

This is not a hopeless proposition, but one that requires the concerted action of every one of us.

The State Anti-Mosquito Association is in session this week at Hollywood, and the writer will have some interesting facts for your perusal next week.

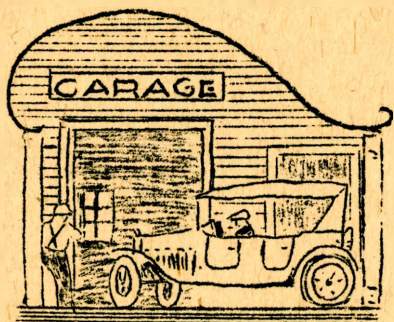

# The Boy Scout's Campfire

## ENTERTAINMENT TONIGHT

The long planned and anticipated Boy Scout play and entertainment will take place tonight at eight o'clock at the School House. The play will consist of five acts, between which there will be special entertainment numbers arranged by Mrs. Earle Morgan. The cast of characters includes Dr. W. Clifton Littlewood, Mrs. Gepfert, Prof. Lane, Earle Henshaw, Joe Davies and A.J. Hamilton, jr. as principals, with the entire troop taking part in three of the acts. In the first scene we find Bill Acton (Joe Davies) about to be expelled from the school, his parents are about to send him to military academy, and then a little piece of rope saves him and gives him a new start! In the second we learn the mysteries of the Tenderfoot Initiation ceremony. In the third we enjoy a few minutes around the campfire at Camp Pine Island in the Everglades. The fourth takes us before the Examining Court of Honor, and gives us an intimate glimpse into the very heart of the Boy Scout Movement. The final scene is the epilogue where we find Joe, Dad and Mother again --- but what a change! The proceeds of the play will go into the general treasury of the Troop, and will eventually be used to erect the Scout building. The admission is 25¢, and the program will begin at eight o'clock.

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Wednesday night the monthly Examining Court of Honor was held in the auditorium of the School. Earl Morgan, Chairman of the Court presided. Don G. Henshaw, Deputy Scout Commissioner, examined for the County headquarters. Other members of the Court were Messrs. Young, Riddle, Scoutmaster Earl Henshaw, and Professor Lane. The following Scouts appeared for final examination as First Class Scouts: Phil Nix, Eugene Hundley, Charles Beck, William Bromley, William Riddle, A.J. Hamilton, jr., and Lynn Henshaw. These Scouts after passing a very creditable examination were elevated to the First Class Rank. First Class Scouts Joe Davies and Wilbur Dale applied for the two merit badges each, having passed the examinations before the proper examiners they were reviewed and promoted. Dale received the badges in Scholarship and Surveying. Davies received those for Life Saving and Swimming. These badges will be publicly awarded the above nine Scouts at the next County Awarding Court to be held in Miami the first week in May. 

THREE MORE WINS FOR MIAMI SHORES!

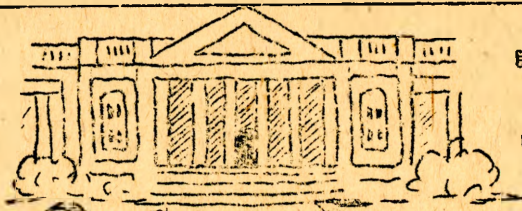

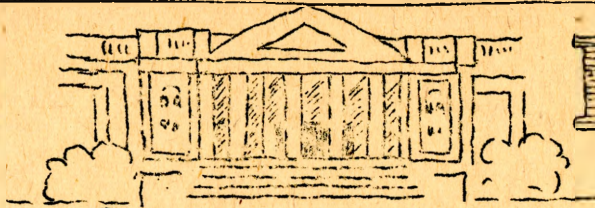

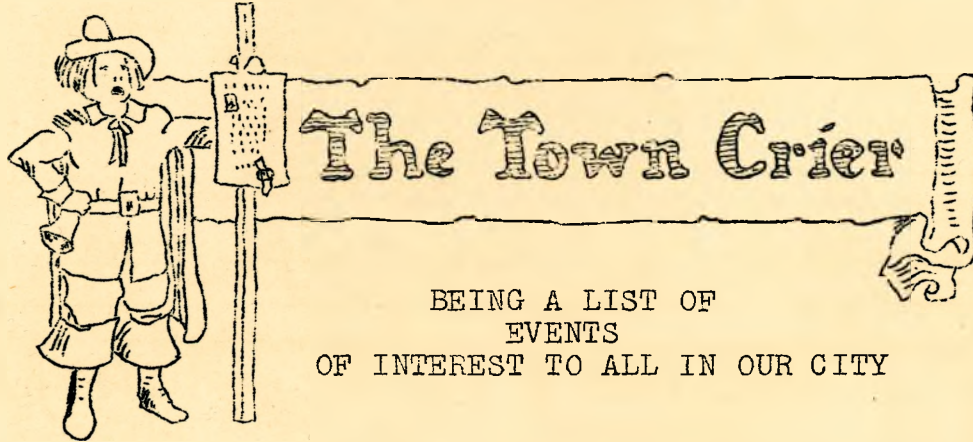
