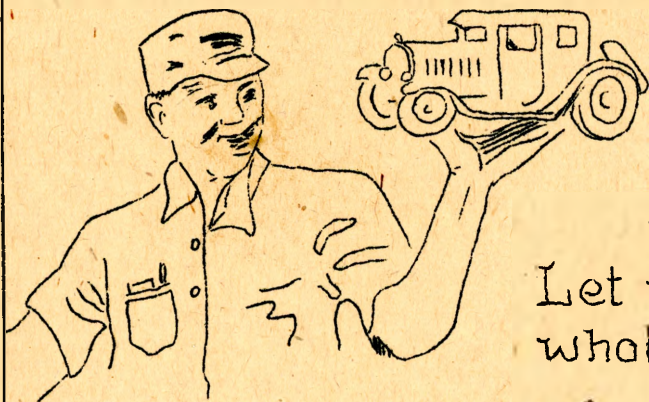
# Activities of The Chamber of Commerce

## REGULAR MEETING LAST TUESDAY

The bi-weekly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held in the Potts Building last Tuesday evening, President Wm.H. Blefgen in the chair. A small attendance because of conflicting dates caused the Chamber to set Wednesday as the future meeting night. The next meeting, then, will be held in the offices of the town on Wednesday evening, May the Fourth, at eight o'clock.

The Chamber of Commerce has taken the lead in bringing into being a recreational center for Miami Shores, and on next Monday night will submit an offer to the Town Council for their approval that will give the Community a plot of ground for a period of ten years, on which will be a ball diamond, tennis courts, and other recreational facilities, together with a building suitable for dances, public meetings, dinners, and other community activities. The next issue of the "BULLETIN" will carry a detailed story of this matter.

Membership in the Miami Shores Chamber of Commerce costs but \$2.50 a year. It is worthy of the support of every citizen and tax payer in the Town, for it is an unselfish, non partisan organization constantly on the alert to forward the interests of the community. (Continued)

All who frequent that particular corner have been urging such a sign for some time, as a large number of travellers have been stopping in confusion at the intersection every day to inquire their way. The fact that this sign points the way up the new Dixie should not be the cause of any hard feelings on the part of those whose interests lie on the old Dixie, but rather should it be an incentive to them to co-operate with officials of the Town in having a suitable sign erected at the same corner or placed on the silent policeman in the center of the road indicating not only the fact that the new road leads to the North, but that the old road leads to the Federal Highway, the Natural Arch and the North. South Florida is singularly backward in the matter of marking highway intersections. 

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Woods left Wednesday for Texas where they will make their home for a time. The younger set of the community will greatly miss them.

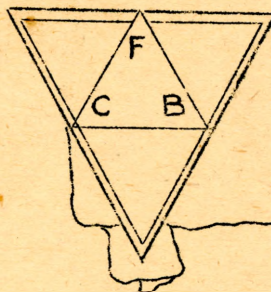
Mrs. Frank Snow left Tuesday for an extended visit in the North with members of her family.

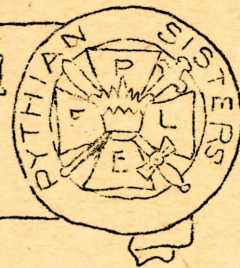

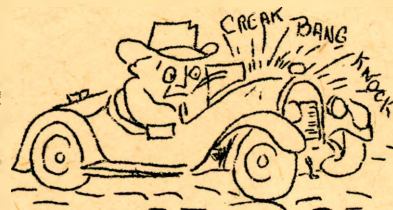

# At The Town Hall

## TOWN COUNCIL TO CONSIDER CHARTER DOCUMENT IS ON FILE IN TOWN HALL

It was announced by Mayor W.P. Brion that the proposed Special Charter for the "City of Miami Shores" is now on file at the Town Hall and is open to public inspection. The Charter was prepared by a Special Committee of the Town Council, which carefully studied a large number of Charters of other cities and towns and selected the best features of each. At the next meeting of the Town Council, the Charter will be read at length and given further careful consideration. It will then be submitted to the Florida Legislature for enactment into law.

## LICENSE TAXES DUE

It was announced by Mr. John A. Mahood, Collector of Taxes, that the Occupational License Taxes for the year beginning April 1st., 1927, are now due and payable at the tax office in the Bennett Building.

## SIDEWALK BONDS VALIDATED DECREE SIGNED BY JUDGE

The issue of Sidewalk Improvement Bonds in the amount of \$74,000. was validated by Decree of the Circuit Court, signed by Judge Atkinson on Wednesday. The Decree sets forth that it shall be fully conclusive as to the validity of said bonds against the Town of Miami Shores and against all taxpayers and citizens thereof, and that the validity of said bonds shall never be called in question in any Court in the State. The bonds were advertised to be sold on last Monday, April 18, 1927. The only bid was presented by the Morgan-Hill Paving Company, which offered \$70,300. plus accrued interest, for the \$74,000 issue, or 95% of par value. This bid will be accepted it was announced Thursday.

#### COME AGAIN FIREMEN THAT WAS A GOOD ONE

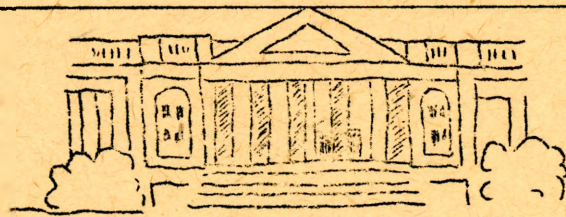
