

NATIONAL MUSIC WEEK MAY 1 - 7, 1927

The entire Greater Miami area will be turned into a home of music during the coming week, when the most ambitious program ever attempted in southern Florida will be carried out as Miami's contribution to National Music Week. Nine Mayors have issued proclamations setting this period aside in which to celebrate "the place and power of music in our life." Our glorious land of eternal summer, always echoing with the songs of unumbered birds, will become a veritable fairyland of music as great choruses and glee clubs sing the best of the world's compositions; as bands play their martial airs; as orchestras lift their sweet strains; as individual soloists delight their hearers with songs old and new; and as a mighty chorus of 1,500 school children lift their voices in the songs of childhood!

Miami Shores will have its place in all this as explained in the following pages. Particularly do we count ourselves honored in that the State President of the Music Study Clubs, who has conceived and made possible thru her magnetic personality in leadership and organization this week of music, is a resident of our community. Mrs. W.C. Littlewood, wife of Dr. Littlewood of the Community Church, has been the leader of this movement, and to her must go the major credit for

making it possible.

At the close of Music Week a booklet, double the size of the one produced last year and equally attractive, describing the activities of the week, and embellished with attractive pictures of scenes in the participating communities, will be prepared and sent thruout the nation, and to Music Clubs and Chambers of Commerce from Greenland to far away Australia. Miami Shores will occupy two pages in this book. Let us participate wholeheartedly in the activities of Music Week.


The greater part of the United States has come to believe that when the tourist season closes in Southern Florida the few remaining natives plod wearily along without any of the cultural privileges obtainable during the heighth of the season until the tourist throng once again brings the operatic star, the symphony orchestra, and the world famed band. National music week is about to demonstrate the fallacy of this idea, for in every corner of the greater Miami District during the coming week will be heard the finest of music in all of the modes of presentation.

A total of over one hundred and thirty programs will be given during the week, and not a one will be mediocre, but will be graced by the best of talent and sponsored by the most liberal and enthusiastic of music lovers. Mrs. W.Clifton Littlewood is the general chairman by virtue of her position with the Chamber of Commerce Music Department, her presidency of the Music Study Clubs of Florida, and perhaps most of all because of her remarkable ability for organization of anything of this nature, and her long years of experience in the field of music.

Governor Martin is the honorary chairman of the local committee, which is made up of many of Miami's best known people. In eacl participating community committees have long been appointed and have prepared programs of great variety and real merit.

The principal events of the week in Miami are as follows: Sunday, A Sacred Concert under the auspices of the Oratorio Society and the University of Miami. (All programs here mentioned will be given in Royal Palm Park unless otherwise stated.)

The following concerts will be given at eight o'clock in the evening. Monday night nine Church choirs will be featured, Louis Gates acting as chairman of this evening's entertainment. (Continued next page)

On Tuesday evening the massed community choruses of the several neighboring communities will occupy the evening hour under the able direction of C.S.Brierly. Two loving cups will be presented at this time by the Miami Chamber of Commerce, for the best of the community choruses produced under the Chamber's Miami Community Chorus Plan. Mrs. J.A.Johnson, who was connected with Mrs. Littlewood in similar work in Pittsburg, California, will present an honor banner.

Wednesday evening will be one of the high lights of the week as it is Public Schoo l Night with a massed chorus of 1,500 school child-ren under the direction of Sadie Lou Lindenmeyer. An orchestrs, harmonica band, physical drill and a play will be other features of the

evening.

Thursday's program will be given by the Music Clubs of the city under the chairmanship of Mrs. L.B.Safford, and will include the Junior Music Club, Student Music Club, and the Aeolian Chorus under

the direction of Bertha Foster as a feature.

Friday evening will find the male music organizations of Miami in charge, with the following participating: Mahi Shrine Chanters, The Homestead Glee Club, Lions Glee Club, Riverside Male Chorus, and the Hialeah Quartette,

Saturday night will be drama night. Dora Hood Jackson will give "The Pied Piper of Hamlin"; O.F. Steinmetz will present 80 members of Miami High School and Miami Beach High School, and the ever popular Erdel Meutchler and his band will give special numbers.

At the noon hour every day many of Miami's finest artists will be heard in special programs at the Park. Composer's hour will occupy the evening from seven thirty until eight when the programs outlined above will be given.

Nearly every noon hour and evening will also find some well known organist at the White Temple organ in recital. Several of the hotels,



are combining for concerts and recitals. In all of this rejoicing in song the sufferers in the Flood will not be forgotten. At the Sunday afternoon concert, features of which will be the Boy Scout Trumpeters and the American Legion, a collection will be taken to become a part of the fund now being raised in Miami for relief. The Lyra Chorus will also give a concert at the Trinity Methodist Church for the same purpose.


Mascagni. She will also sing several other numbers.



The bi-weekly meeting of the Town Council was held last Monday evening in the Auditorium of the Potts Building. Officials present were: W.P.Brion, Mayor, Edward C. Dougherty, Town Clerk and Treasurer, and the following councilmen: V.Earl Irons, J.B.Jeffries, F.D. Snow, and W.F.Hamilton.

In the absence of Council president Earle Morgan J.B.Jeffries was chosen to preside. He called for the principal item of business for the evening which was the reading of the proposed charter for the "City of Miami Shores." This document filled sixty-four pages

of legal paper and took nearly two hours to read.

After the completion of the reading acting president Jeffries invited the citizens present to comment upon the many sections of it or to ask any questions concerning it. A number of those present availed themselves of this privilege, and were informed carefully by the councilmen on all matters in question.

Of particular interest to most of those present was the fact that by granting Miami Shores this Charter the State Legislature will cut off for all time any attempt of adjacent communities to annex

Miami Shores without the consent of our citizens.

After all questions had been answered satisfactorily and any doubtful points cleared up the Council accepted the Charter and instructed its committee to hasten the steps necessary to have it passed by the Legislature. After being "o.k'd." by the Town Attorney it will be sent to the New York bond attorney who will also pass upon (CONTINUED)



it and then it will be taken to Tallahassee for enactment by the State Legislature. The councilmen expressed themselves as being hopeful that it would be completed within the next three weeks.

Town Clerk E.C. Dougherty was granted a ten days leave of absence without pay, and Mrs. Brasher, the Town Hall secretary, was made Deputy Clerk for the period of his absence.

Mayor W.P.Brion announced that after the Charter had been granted, and the City Planning Board formed, it would become possible to start the program of beautification of the town's streets which has been long desired. Lack of funds, he stated, have made it impossible to repair the damage wrought on the thousands of trees in the parkways and along the streets. At the present time the only possible way to accomplish this is by means of convict labor. He suggested that in the meantime every citizen of the community busy himself in his idle moments in caring for the trees that are injured, and which need immediate attention as the growing season is at hand. He also pointed out that care of shrubbery on one's own property, and along the streets adjacent to one's property would not only make the town more attractive, but would guarantee life to many shrubs and trees now in such a condition that without care they will die.

MIAMI SHORES GIRLS GIVEN OPPORTUNITY TO COMPETE FOR INTERNATIONAL BEAUTY CROWN.


Patrons of the Rosetta Theatre will be given an opportunity on Wednesday May the Fourth to pick the most beautiful girl in all of North Miami.


TOWN COUNCIL ACCEPTS OFFER FOR COMMUNITY CENTER




AFTERNOON AT THE HOME OF W.A.RIDDLE IN CELEBRATION OF NATIONAL MUSIC WEEK.


by all who were fortunate enough to be present.





ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FORMED




ed" by Wilson, sung by Mrs. Mahaffey and Mrs. Howard Henshaw.


On last Tuesday Lynn Henshaw gave the story of Esther from the Bible, and Mary Louise Jenkins sketched the character of "Becky Sharp"

Another drinking fountain has been installed at the school.


The parade of the school children scheduled for next Friday,


