REGULAR MEETING WEDNESDAY

The regular bi-weekly meeting of the Miami Shores Chamber of Commerce was held in the Town Offices last Wednesday evening. President Wm. H. Blefgen presided.

President Blefgen presented a letter from a large lithographing company in Chicago, quoting prices on colored postal cards for the town of Miami Shores. The prices are extremely low, and well within the reach of local people. It was suggested that a large quantity of these be made up in order that the Miami Shores folks have them to send to friends, relatives, and acquaintances in other sections of the country to interest them in coming to Miami Shores for the winter season. As these post cards need to be as representative of the community as possible the Chamber of Commerce desires the residents of this section to suggest suitable subjects for the cards. 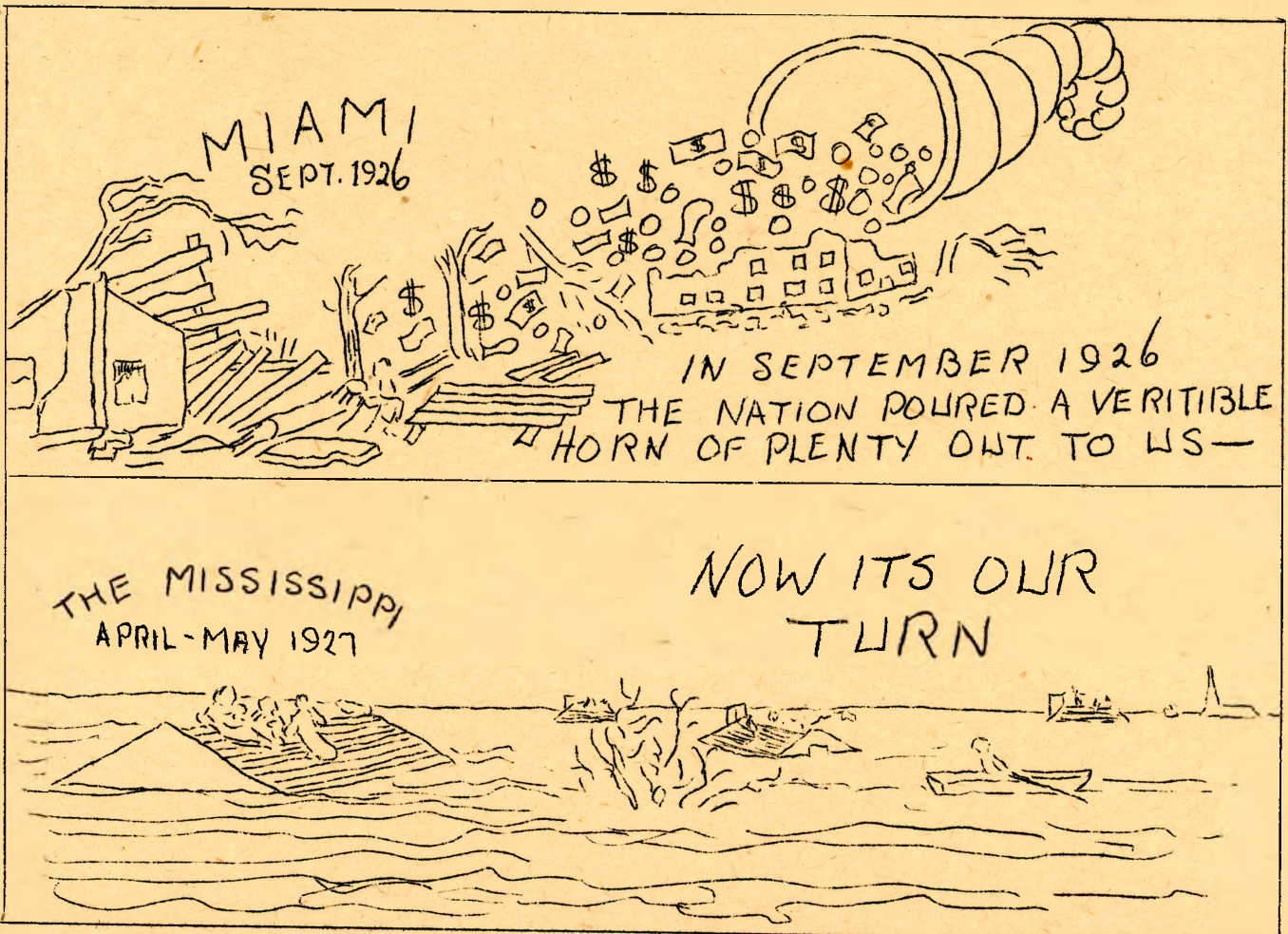

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FLOOD RELIEF NEWS CONTINUED.

Acting upon the Mayor's timely suggestion President Blefgen immediately appointed the following committee to take charge of the work: D.G.Henshaw, Chairman, Grady Keene, and L.H.Browning. Already many suggestions and offers of help have been received. Briefly the plan to be followed is: On Saturday volunteer helpers will be stationed at several principal points in the business section with necessary equipment to receive donations of money, clothing, or bedding. You will see them in several of the stores, and it will be greatly appreciated if you will go to them, make your donation, and offer your own services for anything that may be needed to do at that time. This will save a great deal of time, and will distribute the burden fairly. It is expected that each of the Churches will take up a special collection for this purpose to swell the total raised on Saturday. THE COMMUNITY SING SATURDAY

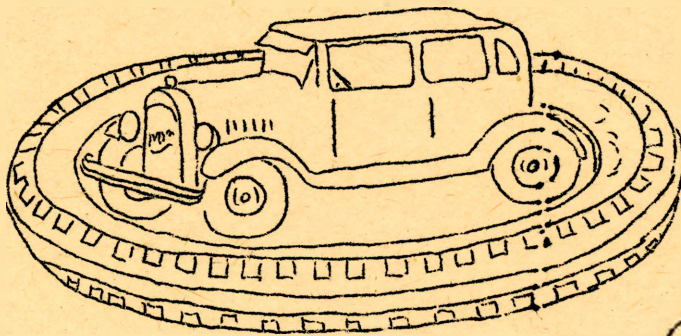

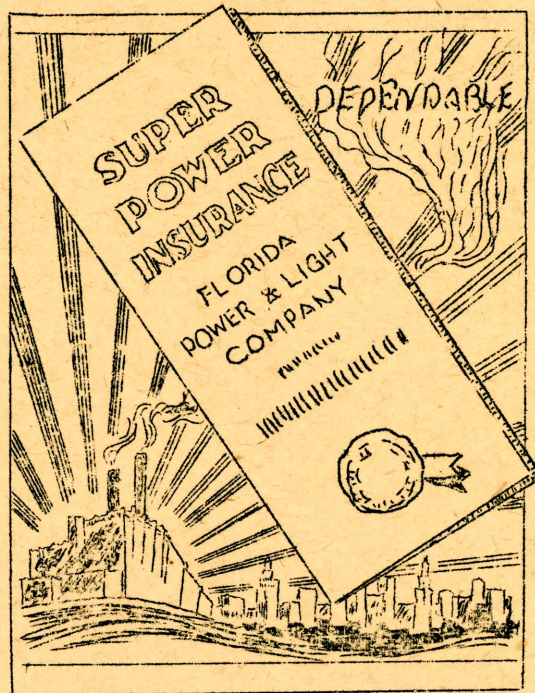
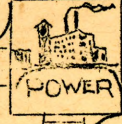

ANNUAL DADE COUNTY FIELD MEET SATURDAY IN MIAMI

Troop 42 of Miami Shores will compete in the annual Dade County Boy Scout Field Meet to be held in Royal Palm Park tomorrow afternoon. Although Troop 42 has never been in one of these competitions before it expects to give a good account of itself. Our troop is the youngest troop in Dade County, it being only five months old. Below are listed the principal events of the day's competition:

INSPECTION: Troops will be judged by percentage of members present, and general scout-like appearance.

SEMAPHORE SIGNALLING: Team of four scouts from each troop. Speed and Accuracy event.

INTERNATIONAL MORSE SIGNALLING: Same as above except International Morse code will be used with the wig-wag system of flags.

KNOT TYING RELAY: Team of six Scouts. Speed and accuracy event. Knots, Square, Sheet bend, Clove hitch, Bowline, Two half hitches, and the Timber Hitch.

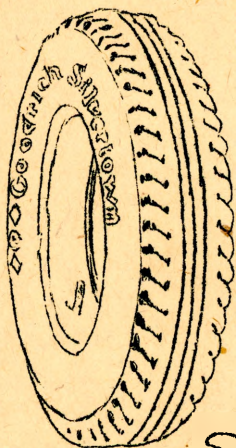
WATER BOILING: Boys will be provided with kettle, water, soap, and matches. Scout provides his own 2 x 4, 15 inches long for fuel, he will at signal cut up wood, start fire, hang kettle from supports, and boil the water until soap runs over edge of kettle. Speed event.

BUGLING: The following calls will be used in this event: Fire, Mess, Taps, Reveille, First Call, Assembly and Swimming. Howard Mahaffey and Henry Schaffer will compose the Miami Shores bugling team.

COMPASS PATROL RELAY: A relay event based on a knowledge of the points of the compass. Introduced into Dade County by Troop Scribe Joe Davies of Miami Shores.

FIRE BY FRICTION: Entire set, except leather thong, must be made by the contestant, all to be of natural material. Speed event.
