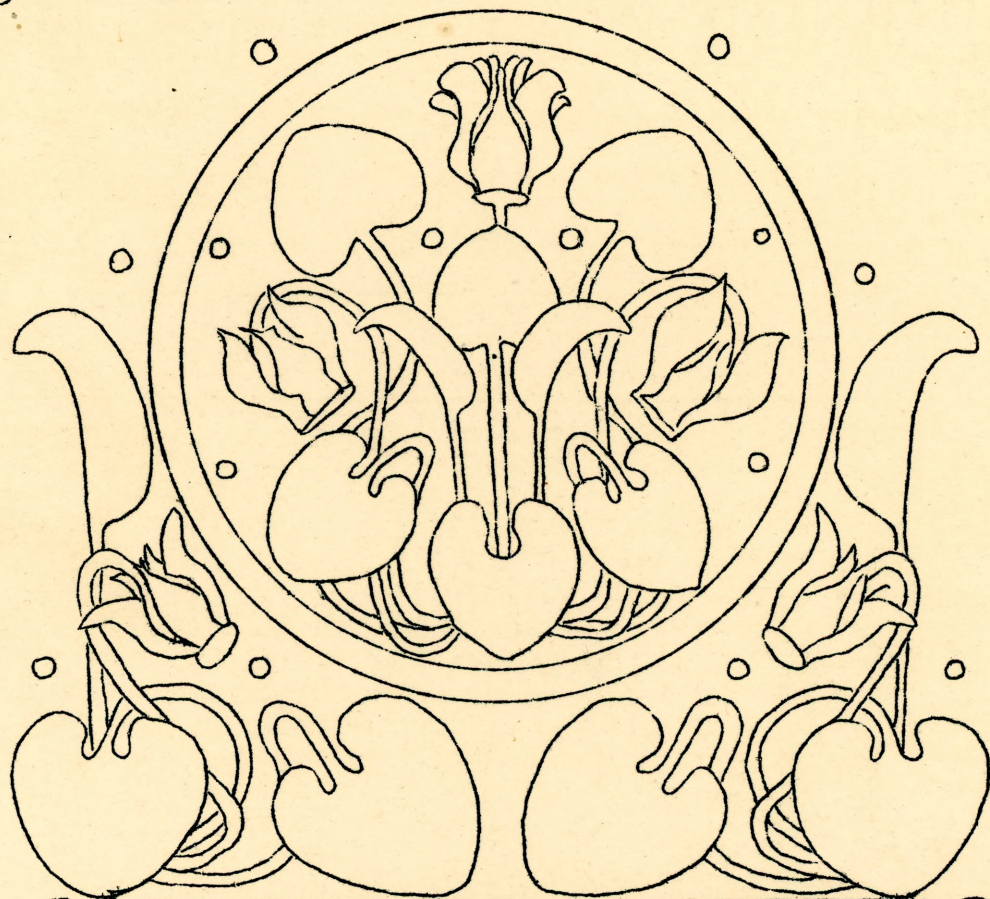

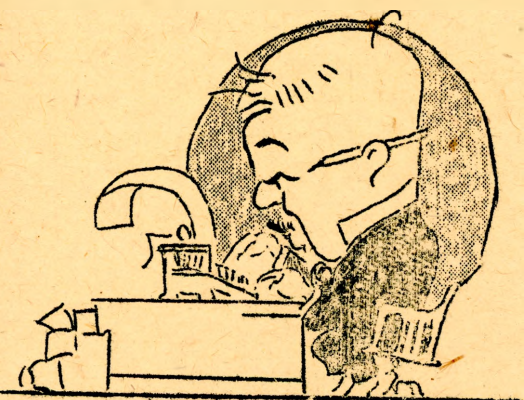

FLOOD RELIEF CAMPAIGN

As stated in the last issue of the "Bulletin" the Chamber of Commerce was requested by Mayor W.P. Brion to handle the raising of funds and relief materials for the Flood sufferers in the Mississippi Valley. President Blefgen of the Chamber of Commerce immediately appointed the necessary committees and the work was soon under way. Several hundred pounds of bedding, clothing and other needed materials were generously given by the people of the Town, together with a good sum of money.

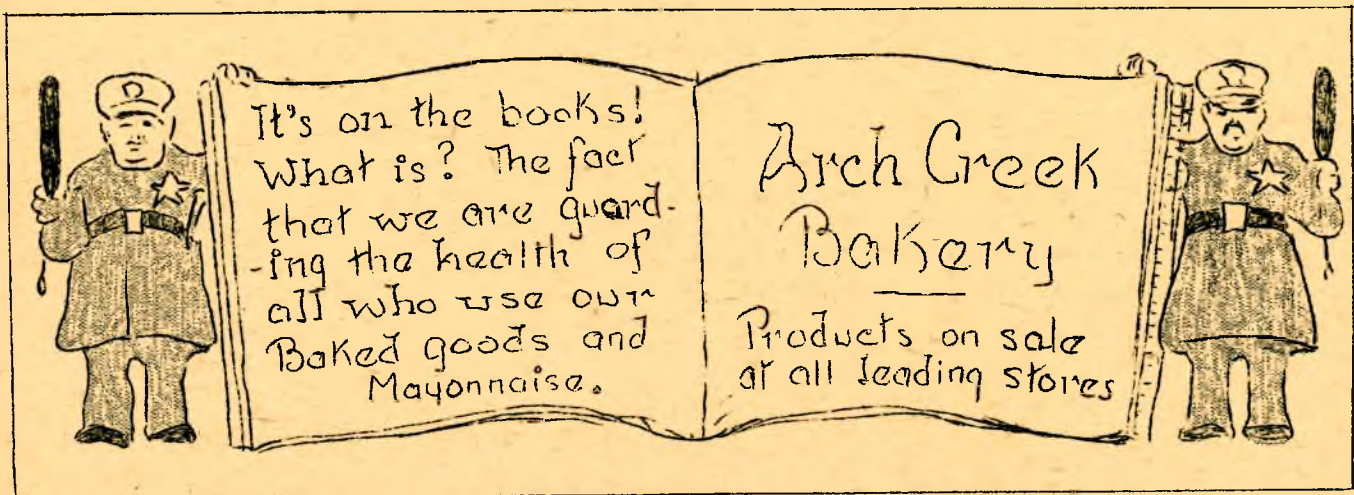
Many of the townspeople had already made their donations through agencies in Miami or fraternal or social organizations in Miami Shores. This undoubtedly lowered the total somewhat. Until the present approximately \$112.00 has been received or definitely pledged. The Community Church thru collections at both services, and a donation from the Sunday School treasury make up about seventy dollars of the above sum.

The clothing and other materials have already been placed in the hands of the American Legion for direct shipment to the flood zone, and arrangements have been completed for the Legion to also send the money. Any who have not had the opportunity to give and who desire to do so may communicate with L.H. Browning, Grady Keene, or the editor of the "Bulletin."

CITIZENS MILITARY TRAINING CAMPS SOON TO OPEN

The Chamber of Commerce has been requested by local American Legion Officials to present the matter of Citizens Military Training Camps thru the Bulletin, in order that the people of this vicinity might become better acquainted with this phase of government activity, and that all eligible might be given an opportunity to take a month's vacation in one of Uncle Sam's great Army Camps.

For several years the United States Government has given young men between the ages of 17 and 24 an opportunity to attend these summer schools of military training, and literally hundreds of thousands have responded from every corner of the nation. Entirely aside from the valuable military education acquired, the camp is a builder of good bodies, and a means of eradicating physical shortcomings. There is no expense --

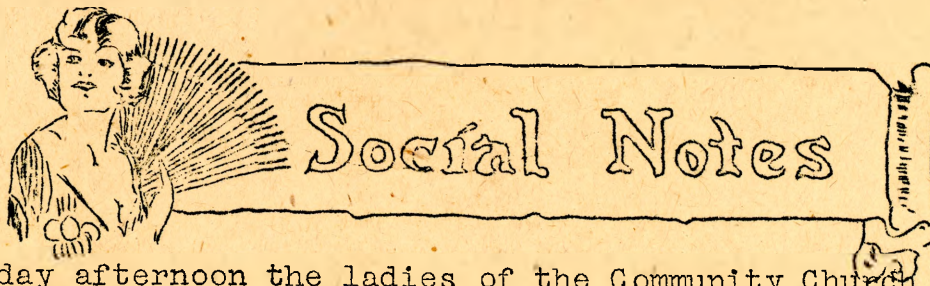

LAMBSKIN CLUB FORMED

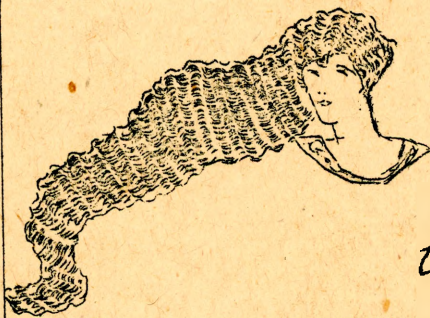

MRS. COLLINS REPORTED BETTER

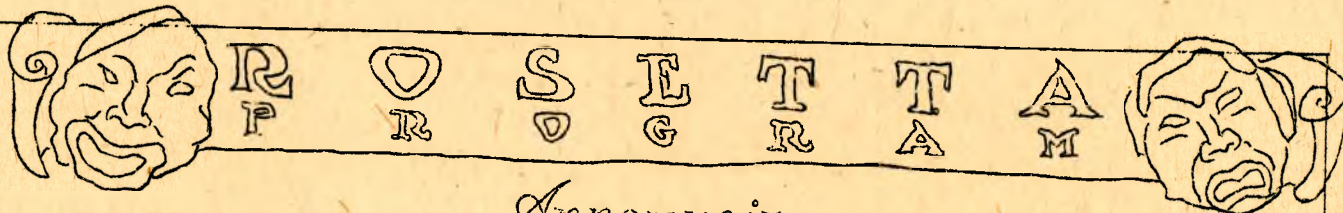

DAUGHTERS OF AMERICA ACTIVELY ORGANIZING IN MIAMI SHORES

The Daughters of America, a secret, patriotic, benevolent and fraternal order affiliated with the Junior Order United American Mechanics has started an active membership campaign in Miami Shores, and each night of meeting finds an increasingly large delegation travelling to Weeman Hall in Little River for the purpose of affiliation.

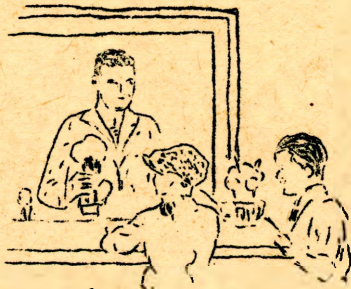

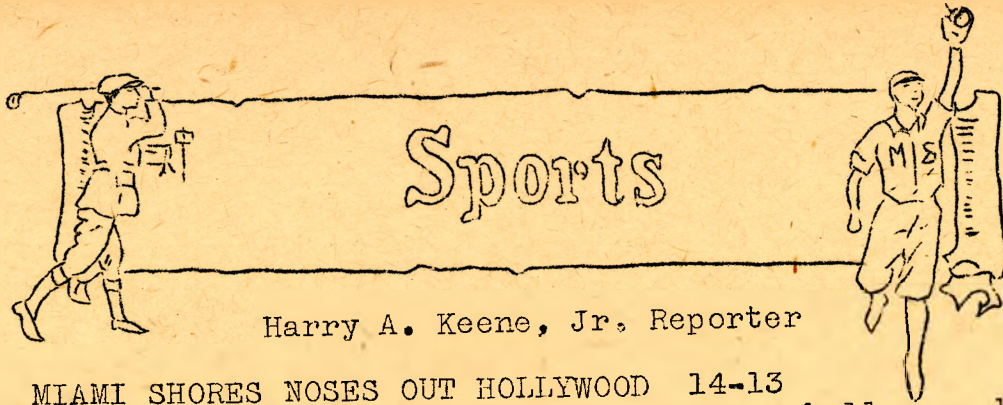

MIAMI SHORES NOSES OUT HOLLYWOOD 14-13

The home town club invaded Hollywood and won a ball game by a 14 to 13 verdict last Sunday. Up until the ending of the sixth frame it looked as tho it were to be one of those hard fought battles, for the boys stood right behind Chase's nice pitching. Both teams played a good brand of ball, and at the beginning of the sixth it stood at 4 to 3 in favor of the Miami Shores aggregation. Pete Allaben, our new catcher --- snappy boy, is Pete, and hardy with the stick, too --- led the barrage attack of hits that took the pepper, salt, and what have you out of Hollywood's younger set. F.Keene followed suit, while "Fritz" Chase did exactly the same thing. Jimmy Linton hit a nice one and stretched it into a double when Poole, Hollywood, scorched his hand trying to get close to it. No, Poole, didn't fall or slide on his hand, but the air thru which that ball passed had a temperature of 190 degrees. Ritter hit a nice one, only to get a a decision of "Out at Second" from the umpire. Well, Dale pushed them across the plate totalling four runs for that inning. MIAMI SHORES ATHLETIC CLUB ELECTS

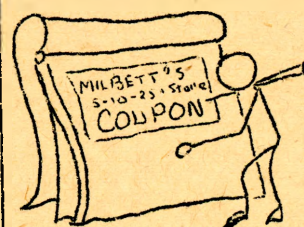

PINE ISLAND SUMMER CAMP TO OPEN JULY 5TH.

The Dade County Boy Scout Camp at Pine Island in the Everglades west of Davies (on the U.S. Indian Reservation) is to open on July 5th. Announcements from County headquarters this week stated that the camp could accommodate 96 boys a week. The camp will close on August 15th. It can be readily seen that not nearly all of the Scouts in the County will have the camp privilege this summer, as there are over 1,200 of them in the county, and less than six hundred can be accommodated. It will be necessary for the boys desiring to go to make application at once, stating the period which they desire to spend at the camp. Application can be made at the County Headquarters or thru either Earl Henshaw or Don Henshaw. The camp is under the direction of a staff of trained experts who endeavor to develop each boy according to his particular needs. The staff is headed by Field Executive Brookfield, and supervised by the Dade County Executive John C. Norsk, one of the best known officials in all Scouting. Other members of the staff are all experts in their particular fields. No professional summer camp in the country has better training facilities and opportunities than our own Boy Scout Camp. The cost is extremely low, \$6 per week. Parents are advised to take up the matter of their boy's attendance with one of the local officials at once as it is expected the reservation list will be filled in a short time.
