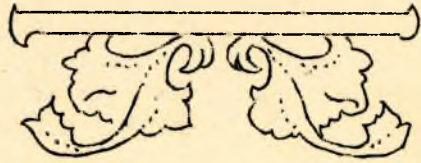

POLITICS

Every newspaper and magazine the hand chances to pick up of late has been filled with political predictions, calculations, exhortations and much plain old fashioned mud-slinging. The grand old game of politics is again entering the arena --- for next year is presidential election year! "Will Cal run again? Has Al a chance in the South? Did you read what Senator Blah said about McAdoo? Oh, Boy! Wasn't that a rap Representative Whatchamaycalem handed out to Jimmie Cox?" These are the questions of the hour on every lip and tongue and pen!

For the next fifteen months we will be deluged with propoganda from every corner of the political arena. And by the time National Election arrives in November 1928 we will not know which way to vote! The result will be that most of us will say, "Shucks, what's the use, anyway? Wall Street is running this election (Or Tammany Hall depending on what party owns us) There's been too much mud slinging to suit me; politics are too rotten for an honest man to monkey with. Ma, I think you and I will stay home and let em' fight it out to suit themselves!" And so the political machines pause a moment to titter, and move on again to accomplish their purpose. Here and there a courageous soul rises up to do battle with the dragon, and the rest of us secretly sympathizing with his cause, look on and wonder how soon he will meet the inevitable defeat. Here and there an organization moves into the forefront of public view, announces a worthy program, enlists an enthusiastic following, creates a stir, frightens one or two politicians, and then perishes a victim of petty bickerings, selfish strife and dissension within its own ranks! And the machine grinds on!

Do you remember the World War and the ideals for which we fought? Do you remember the boys who went away joyously --- and never came back? Do you remember the service flags with stars of blue -- and gold? How soon after the Armistice was signed we forgot all our war time patriotism. A poem came out of that period describing a post war scene of Jazz, Bootleg, and License --- and each verse at its close painted a picture of dead soldiers -- "Shadows of dead men watching them there!" We wonder if today, with over half of our American voters staying at home on election days; tolerating injustices; forgetting patriotism in the scramble for dollars; sacrificing the ideals and institutions founded in the sacrificial blood of our wars; ignorant of our government ----- we wonder if there are not "shadows of dead men --- soldiers of Revolution - Civil War - Spanish War -- WORLD WAR --- watching us here?"

If we would be good citizens, worthy of our heritage, we will live honestly, walk uprightly, fear God, respect all men as brothers, bow not down to political machine or demagogue, and cast a ballot at every election dictated to only by a conscience that is Clean.

The Boy Scout's Page

INTER - PATROL CONTEST NOW ON

The Scouts of Troop 42 are now deep in the midst of an inter - patrol contest with an attractive week end at Camp Pine Island at the expense of the Troop as a prize in view. It will be recalled by the boys and parents alike that the last contest held was for individual supremacy and advancement. The present contest, which got under way on May 12th, and which will end June the 2nd, is being fought out by the patrols as groups. The following list indicates the events in the contest and the values in points of each one:

1. Each tenderfoot examination completed 5 points
2. Each 2nd. Class examination completed 5 points
3. Each 1st. Class examination passed 5 points
4. Each merit badge examination passed 5 points
5. Each boy obtaining fire by friction at regular meeting under same rules as at field meet 5 points
6. Each boy boiling water in eight minutes or less, using his own fire by friction outfit, otherwise same rules as field meet 5 points
7. For each standard shelter tent obtained by patrol as patrol property 5 points
8. Each pair of boys pitching shelter tent in four minutes or less, same rules as field meet 5 points
9. Each victory in compass game at regular meeting 5 points
10. Each patrol to appear at a regular meeting of the troop with every member present in full uniform (same rules as for inspection at field meet) The uniforms must be clean and complete with all the buttons in place and buttoned.

The winning patrol at the close of the contest must have scored at least twenty points in event number 5 (Fire by Friction). In case the patrol with the highest number of points has not scored 20 or more points in this event the next highest patrol that has scored the necessary 20 points will win the contest.

COURT OF HONOR TO MEET NEXT WEDNESDAY FOR EXAMINATIONS

Owing to the fact that school examinations will fall upon the regular date of the next Examining Court of Honor the Scout Officials for this Division have decided upon next Wednesday evening for the event. There will be a large number of Scouts up for first class ranking, and an even greater number for merit badges. Those successfully passing the review examinations of the Court will be awarded their insignia at a gigantic Awarding Court of Honor in Royal Palm Park early in June.

A number of the Scouts have returned to the North with their parents for the summer, but will be back in ranks next fall. In the meantime they can swap tales with the Scouts they meet up there and fascinate them with their tales of adventure on the Indian Reservation at Camp Pine Island. The fellows left behind will probably be out there at the Camp having the times of their lives!

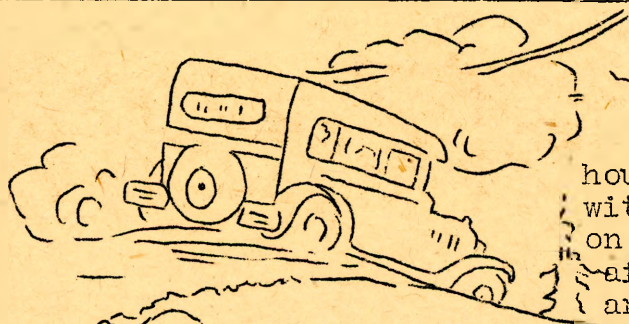
