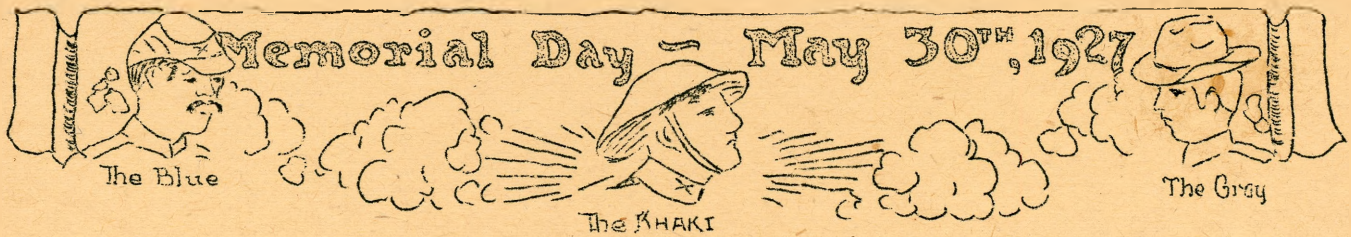
IN MEMORIAM

The only special observance of Memorial Day in Miami Shores will be the Sunday services at the Churches; as there is to be a widespread observance of the day in Miami the folks of Miami Shores are expecting to participate in the exercises there.

The local American Legion Post urges all of the citizens of the Town to observe the day by ceasing business, attending the exercises in Miami, and visiting the graves of the departed soldiers of our several wars.

It is gratifying to observe that with the passing of the years the dead of both armies of the Civil War are coming to be thought of in a common ownership -- "our dead!" The names of Grant and Lee are linked together, not just because of that epochal day at Appomattox, but because America recognizes in both of them sons of whom any nation might well be proud.

Official observance of Memorial Day will begin at 10:15 A.M. with a parade in which all of the veteran organizations represented in the Miami District will participate. Virgil Ector, Commander of the Harvey Seeds Post of the American Legion will be Grand Marshall. Among the organizations already assigned positions in the parade are: the Legion Fife and Drum Corps, Florida National Guard Companies, Naval Reserve, Civil War Veterans, their auxiliaries, Spanish War Veterans, their auxiliary, U.S. Reserve Officers, American Legion Auxiliary, The Veterans of Foreign Wars, Canadian War Veterans, British War Veterans, and members of the various American Legion Posts.

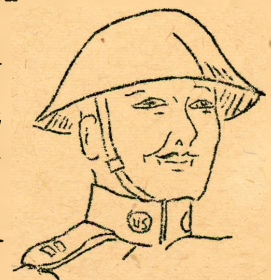
The parade will march south on Biscayne Boulevard from N.E. 10th. St. to Royal Palm Park where a memorial service will be held. Major Harvey R. Payne, Past Commander of the Florida American Legion will be the principal speaker.

At the conclusion of the service all veterans and others interested will go to Woodlawn Cemetery where the services will be continued and the graves of the veterans decorated with floral tributes and flags.

A marine service will be held in the early afternoon by the members of the G.A.R. assisted by the other organizations, at the first bend in the County Causeway. A floral tribute to the sailor dead will be placed on the waters of Biscayne Bay.

As Memorial Day is not a legal holiday in Florida the banks will not close, and the Mayor's of the various communities will not issue proclamations. However, the fact that South Florida is largely made up of people from the North, who have been accustomed to observe this day thru the years, will mean that the greater part of the people will

take the day for a holiday in which to pay honor to the memory of the dead of all armies and all wars. We consider it unfortunate that a more widespread observance of the recent Confederate Memorial Day was not had in Miami. It passed almost unobserved, but we feel confident that all of us will pay to the soldiers of the "Lost Cause" as deep a homage as to those of the Army of the North.

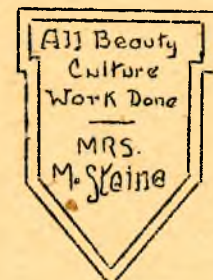

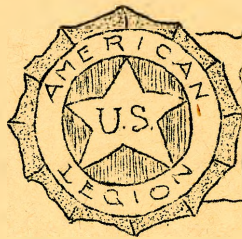

On April the 14th. Virgil C. Ector, Commander of Harvey Seeds Post of Miami, came to an especially arranged meeting of the post to install officers and to hold the first initiation of members. He was accompanied by a representative of the State Department of the American Legion. Members of the Hollywood Post were also in attendance and rendered assistance. A very large percentage of the membership was present and Mr. Ector with the assistance of the other visitors splendidly performed the various ceremonies, after which there were a number of short addresses, and refreshments were served. The speeches were both interesting and instructive and the feeling of goodwill on the part of the visitors for us evoked similar expressions in reply from members of our post, and it seemed about to develop into a "mutual admiration society".

CHANGES IN LOCAL BUSINESS INSTITUTIONS

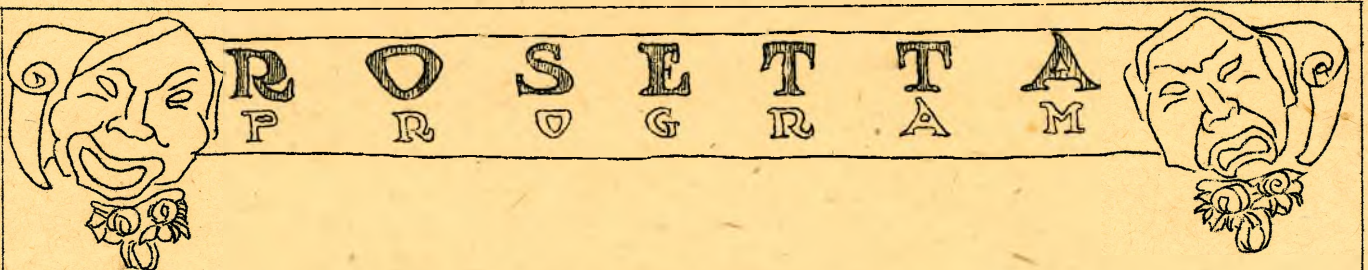

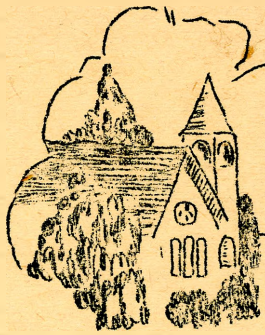

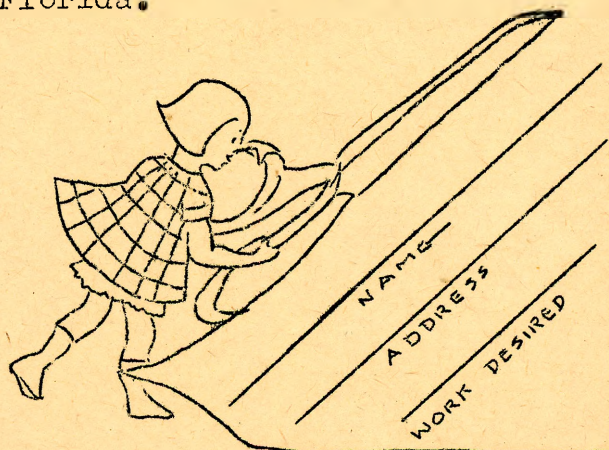

## THE FLAG SITUATION IS STRAIGHTENED OUT

The Bulletin was informed last week that after repeated requests from the principal, janitor, and P.T.A. to the School Board for a new flag to replace the one floating in rags on the pole, that at last one had been obtained. We have since been informed by the school authorities and others that in addition to these requests several civic organizations and individuals requested the flag but in every instance were told that the present flag would have to do until the end of the year, or that there were none in stock at the Educational Board stock room. We are further informed that finally in thorough disgust at the procrastinating ways of the School Board an appeal was made to the Women of the Ku Klux Klan who immediately presented the school with the new flag for the standard and one for one of the school rooms which had not one. It is indeed fortunate that there are individuals and organizations in this post war day who retain enough patriotism to insist that the Flag of Our Nation be flown over the Public School, the birth place of patriotism, and that it be a Flag, whole and undamaged.

## SECOND GRADE TO HOLD EXHIBIT OF WORK

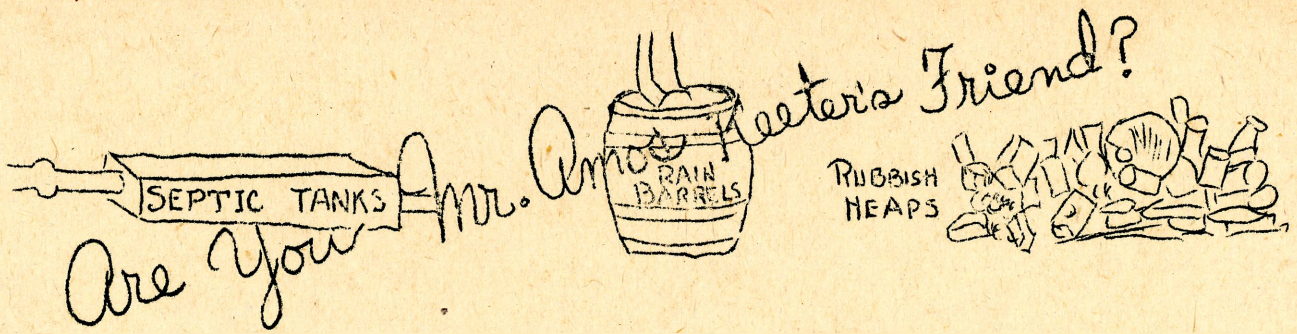

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ROSSETTA BALL PARK SOON TO BE COMPLETED FOR TEAM

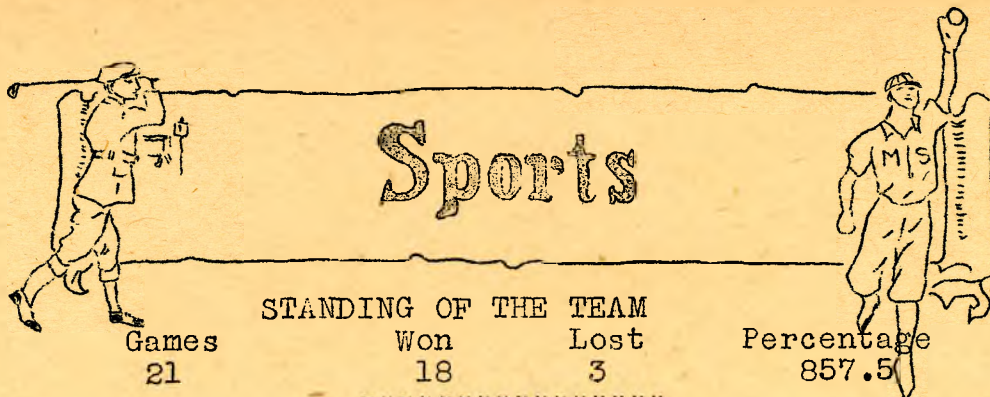
